## Denton School Opens Monday

Denton-Dudley school children started school Monday, being the last in county to get started. The delay has been due to the completion of the elegant \$8,000,000 building opening exercises featured Monday children secured their texts day, children secured their texts and went home, to return Thursday for the first class-room work.

## Judge Bowyer Pays Tribute to Brother

William McDonald Bowyer, founder of Anson in Jones county, Texas, was the oldest child of James Hubard Bowyer of Virginia, and Aurelia McDonald of Washington D. C. At the time of the surrender of Richmond in 1865, he was a V. M. I. cadet, he V. M. I. corps being located in the Alms House in that city that time together with other cadets he walked from Richmond to Lexington. Afterward he attended Washington Lee University. He built the first house in Anson with lumber hauled from Belle Plain by our long time friend, the late John Flores, father of Claude Flores.

William McDonald Bowyer was a man of absolute integrity of character. His life was gentle and kindly, but full of strength and courage, when the emergency arose. He was not a member of any church. He was christened in the Episcopal Church with which his people were affiliated for generations.

His great grandfather, Captain Michael Bowyer of the 12th Virginia Regiment, Continental line, was a vestryman in that church in Augusta County, Virginia prior to the Revolution, and was married by the Rev. John Jones, an Episcopal minister in 1776.

Mr. Bowyer was very charitable and liberally fulfilled the Bible injunction in giving one tenth of his income to charity. This called forth the remark of the Rev. Ward in his deep, rich voice he said, "Mac Bowyer is the best man in Jones County."

William McDonald Bowyer would have been 91 years of age on the 29 of this month. He and I were the last of the Bowyers born at Thorn Hill, the fine old Bowyer home near Lexington, Virginia.

All high school students in West Texas are being invited to the annual "High School Day" at Abilene Christian College Oct. 21.

Feature in this annual event will be the football game between A C C and Southwestern University to which all of the high school students will receive free tickets.

Several thousand identification blanks are being mailed to high schools in the surrounding 61 counties. These blanks, signed by a high school instructor, will be presented for the football tickets. Provision will be made for students from school not receiving these blanks previous to Oct. 21.

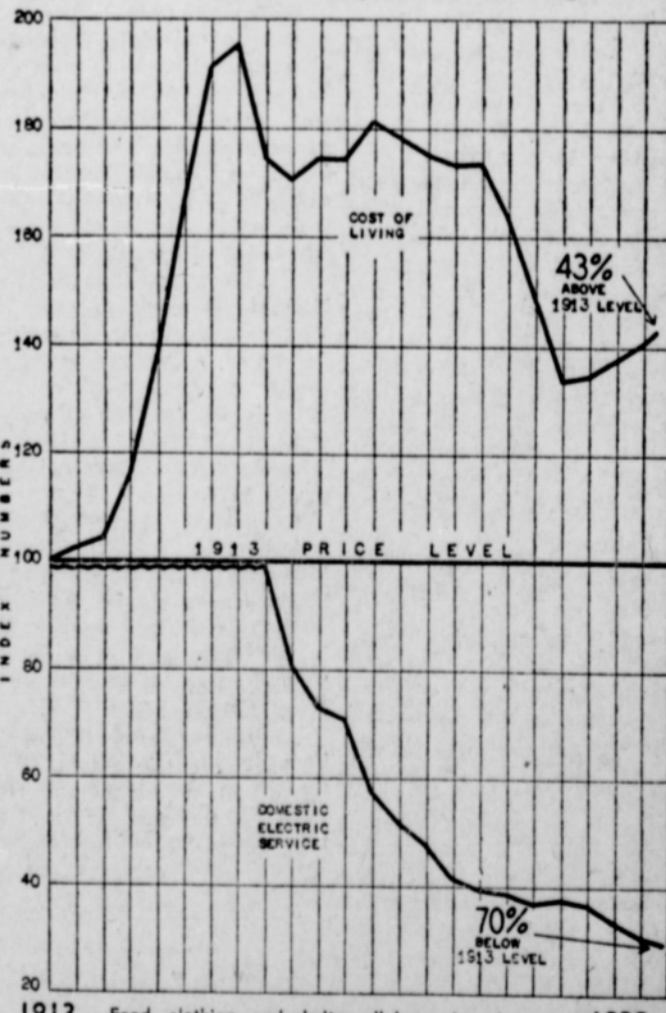

All Texas farms growing peanuts for commercial use will be given allotments for 1940, B. F. Vance, assistance state AAA administrator, has announced.

Last year peanut allotments were set up for only eight counties, Vance said, but approximately 100 counties will have allotments for 1940. Allotment counties last year were Frio, Medina, LaSalle, Atascosa, Bexar, Eastland, Comanche and Wilson.

Any farmer growing commercial peanuts during 1937, 1938 or 1939, or growers should contact their county officers and furnish them with their peanut-producing history for the past five years, and newcomers to the field likewise should notify their county officers, Vance declared.

Allotments will be based on acreage planted during previous years and adjusted for the trend of individual farms.

By commercial peanuts, the AAA means only those removed from the vine for the purpose of sale, Vance pointed out. Allotments will not be set up for peanuts grown for hay or for use on the farm.

Allotments will not be figured until county and individual peanut histories are received and the state allotments is set, Vance said.
