Santa Anna Downs Bears Friday Night As New Season Commences

The Baird Bears dropped their opening grid game of the 1963 season to the Mountaineers from Santa Anna Friday night by a close 6-8 score. The contest was played before a good crowd at the Bears Stadium.

The light weight and inexperienced Bears scored first in the opening quarter and held on to a 6-0 lead until the beginning of the fourth quarter when Santa Anna tied it up. The visitors scored a safety about midway of the final quarter to go ahead 8-6.

The Bears lacked punch in the backfield. A long punt return by Harris and a 38 yard scamper by Steve Stanley were about the only two plays that gave the local fans excitement. The Bears were held to four first downs. Defensively the team looked slightly better. Jaggars at guard, Ault and McIntosh at tackles, Windham at his linebacking post and hard hitting Bruce Bell were defensive standouts. Bobby Black, playing his first varsity football game showed promise at an end post.

Danny Ross and Pat McKinnon showed some good offensive blocking in the line. Eddie Childers and Freddie Alexander, both light weights, slashed at the line for short gains, but the holes were rarely open. Quarterback Tommy Barton had a good pass completion per centage for the game. The total running yardage for the Bears was 111, but losses amounted to 37 yards, leaving a net of 74 yards on the ground. The 28 yard scamper by Stanley left a balance of 36 net yards for the rest of the evening. The Bears got off nine pass attempts and completed four for 33 yards for a good average.

Wally Harris, Dimintive speedster, furnished the crowd its biggest thrill when he took a Mountaineer punt around his own 15 yard line and scampered the remaining 85 yards behind fast forming blocking to open the scoring. The play came about four minutes deep in the game and on the first time the Bears got a hand on the ball. Baird opened the game by kicking off to the Mountaineers on the 15. Two first downs later the Mountaineers were stymied and Quarterback Terry McIver, a jack of all trades, punted to the

Baird 15. Harris picked up a lot of good blocking and went the distance to cross the visitors goal standing up. The try for point failed.

The game remained 6-0 in favor of the Bears until 1:15 of the fourth period when 175 pound Bill Horne broke through the left side of the Bear line on a beautifully executed trap play and went 39 yards for the score which knotted the count. The Bear forward wall held on the point after attempt and the score remained deadlocked. With about four minutes left in the contest, McIver zeroed in on a punt and hit the sideline at about the Baird one yard line on a beautiful punt. The Bears, with their back to their own goal line, attempted to get running room but on the first play, Quarterback Tommy Barton was hit behind his own goal line and the Mountaineers scored a two point safety to go ahead 8-6 and win the game.

The Bears started a drive on the ensuing kickoff and worked to the Mountaineer 10 yard line, but lost the ball on downs. The drive was highlighted by the 38 yard run by Stanley.

This week Coaches Vernon Townsend and Ed Cotton were working the boys hard for their game Friday night with Wylie. Wylie, which is about five miles south of Abilene on the Buffalo Gap road, lost their opener to Rule 12-0. Quarterback Ronnie White and Fullback Dickie McMahan form the backbone of the Wylie attack.

County Hospital Air Conditioned

Two new air conditioning units are being installed this week at Callahan County Hospital in Baird. The new units are being placed in windows in the west and the east ends of the hall.

The air conditioners are large 8,300 c.f.m. units and are of the evaporative cooling type. The cooling will be controlled in the patients rooms by opening or closing of the doors. Engineers said that the units were large enough to keep the entire hospital much cooler.

The front and rear doors of the hospital will be kept closed to allow the air to flow through the rooms and offices.

Repairs are also being made on the central heating system and they will be ready for use during cold weather. Room heaters will be eliminated.

Additional painting is being done, and other needed repairs made. The surgical department is being painted as is the obstetrical room, Administrator Edwin L. Kirklen reported.

Air Conditioner Is Installed At Baird City Hall

For some time members of the City Council have discussed the installation of refrigerated air conditioning at the City Hall, and last month the Council did something about it. The City Hall is now equipped with an air conditioning and heating system comparable to other modern offices.

It replaces the old evaporative cooling system which had been in service for the past five years. At the July meeting some of the Council indicated they would like to know the cost of a refrigerating unit and the City Secretary obtained rough estimates for such an installation. Estimates were received at the regular meeting July 23rd. A motion was made and seconded that the secretary obtain competitive bids for refrigerated air conditioner for the City Hall.

Secretary Asbury obtained bids from the two lowest estimates and a meeting was called Monday morning Aug. 5th, to consider the bids. The estimates ranged from \$900 to \$1600 for the air conditioner unit with an optional bid for heating unit combined.

The lower of the two bids was for 4 ton cooling unit installed \$950.00, with heating unit combined, \$1225.00. The other bid was cooling unit installed, \$1544.30, with heating unit combined, \$1875.00.

A motion was made by Irvin Corn, seconded by J. W. Loper that the City accept the \$1225 bid of H. & H. Plumbing Co. for 4 ton cooling and heating unit to be installed at the City Hall as agreed. The approval of the motion was unanimous.

Bear Cubs Win Opening Game

The Baird Bear Cubs, representing Baird Junior High School opened their 1963 season at Bears Den Tuesday night by outscoring the Cross Plains Buffalo Calves 24-8.

The Cubs looked good in their first outing, and Coach Winn Talley will work out weak spots as the season progresses.

Baird scored first in the opening quarter when Johnny Strange took a pitchout from quarterback Larry Towler and went around left end to score. The play covered 25 yards. Strange ran the ball over after the TD for the two extra points.

Montgomery evened things up for Cross Plains in the second quarter when he outran Baird defenders to score. He ran the extra points over and that ended the scoring for the visitors.

Bryan Lee Reese scored Baird's second touchdown on a quick opener to the left. The play went for eight yards. Robbie Talley plunged over for the two extra points.

Quarterback Towler executed a beautiful reverse to score the final Baird touchdown. He faked to the left and reversed to the right for 22 yards and the score. Talley again carried over for two points.

Other standouts in the game were Johnny Hill at end and Roy McAdams at guard.

The next game for the Cubs is at Bears Den Tuesday night, September 17, at 7 o'clock when Wylie furnishes the opposition. A "B" team game is scheduled for 6:30 p.m.

FIRST BAPTISTS TO DEDICATE NEW BUILDING AT HOMECOMING SUNDAY

Dr. P. D. O'Brien of Houston will be the speaker Sunday morning at Homecoming services at the First Baptist Church as members welcome former members; and will speak again Sunday afternoon at dedication ceremonies for their new auditorium.

Dr. O'Brien is a former pastor of the Baird church. He will also be the speaker for revival services which begin Sunday and continue through Sunday, September 22.

Invitations have gone out to former members and to former pastors of the church to attend the special services. A large number of visitors are expected

to join with resident members in the homecoming ceremonies and at the dedication ceremonies.

The new building, constructed at a cost of approximately \$60,000, has been completed for some three months and has been in use since that time. It replaces a frame building which was constructed in 1934.

The Baird First Baptist Church was organized in 1881. The first meeting house was constructed in 1889 at the site of the present building. In June, 1895, the building was destroyed by a cyclone and the falling walls killed Mitchell Mayes, son

of the pastor, J. L. Mayes. The building was rebuilt and used until it was replaced in 1934.

The first parsonage was built in 1892-93 on a lot south of the present building. It too was destroyed by the 1895 cyclone and rebuilt at the time the church was rebuilt. The present parsonage was built in 1938. In 1953 the present two story educational building was built.

Bobby Eklund joined members in inviting everyone to the dedication services Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, and to the revival services all next week. Services will be held at 10 a.m. and 8 p.m. each day.

The \$3,800 will be distributed among the following organizations: The Boy Scouts, The Girl Scouts, the Cancer Fund, the Polio Foundation, West Texas Rehabilitation Center, the Red Cross, Heart Fund, Goodfellows, Salvation Army, Crippled Childrens Foundation, Texas United Defense Fund, Baird Youth Club, Mental Health Association, Diabetic Foundation and the Alcoholics Council. The heart fund is a fund set up this year to assist local heart patients.

Budget Adopted By County Shows Reduction Over Preceding Years

Callahan County Commissioners have adopted a reduced operating budget for the 1963-64 fiscal year and are seeking state approval of a switch from a fee to a salary system for county officials.

The \$477,000 budget approved by the Commissioners' Court Monday is about \$22,777 under expenditures for the previous year and \$130,000 more than two years ago.

The county expects to derive about \$315,000 from ad valorem taxes, with the remainder of the

budget being met from other revenues. County Judge Byron Richardson said the tax rate of \$80 per \$100 valuation in effect the past several years will be retained.

Richardson said Tuesday he had applied to State Comptroller Robert Calvert for approval of the commissioners decision to change from a fee system to a salary system for county officials.

The new compensation schedule would go into effect Jan. 1, following state approval. Justices of the Peace are not included in the application for a change.

Under the present fee system, county officials get a monthly guarantee from the state — the highest of which is \$157.20 per month — and then can draw against the fees charged for handling or recording various items at the end of the year after an audit and report to the state. Maximum allowed by the state under this system is \$6,750 per year.

Such county officials as the treasurer, court clerks and county assessor came under the present system. All Texas sheriffs' salaries are provided for under a state law of several years ago.

Richardson said that the following approval of the change-over to the salary system, fees collected in various offices would "remain at home" and salaries would be paid out of the county budget.

Prominent Callahan Countian Dies Wednesday; Services Set For Friday

Fred Heyser, 68, prominent Callahan County rancher and civic worker died of a heart attack at about 5:30 p.m. Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Heyser was stricken while bird hunting with Jack Smith on the ranch of a neighbor, Raymond Demeree, south of Putnam. He had been suffering from a heart condition the past several years.

He was born October 19, 1894, on Zion Hill Ranch where he had lived all his life.

Funeral services will be held at 3 p.m. Friday at Godfrey Funeral Home Chapel in Baird. Rev. William Crawford of Clisco and Rev. J. W. Waller of Putnam will officiate. Burial will be in Ross cemetery.

A member of an early-day Callahan County ranching family, he was active in cattle association affairs, Red Cross work and veterans affairs. He helped organize the annual Callahan County Old Settlers Reunion in 1936 and was founder of the American Legion Post at Baird. He was a veteran of World War I and a Methodist.

He is survived by his wife, the former Naomi Lidia, whom he

married in Anson, May 27, 1938; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Don Wilson of Abilene; two sisters, Mrs. Hattie Stewart of El Paso and Mrs. T. A. Hicks of Wichita Falls; one brother, Shields Heyser of Wichita Falls and three grandchildren.

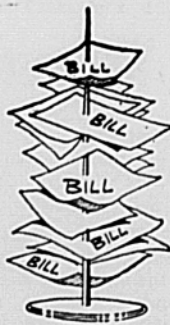
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Mrs. Will Cheek, multiple bruises and abrasions, fractured right wrist, in serious condition and treated for shock.

James Henry Henson, 69, of Clyde, severe chest injuries, fractured left arm, multiple bruises and abrasions, in poor condition.

Highway Patrolman George Reese, investigating officer, said a 1957 GMC pickup driven by Henson was headed east toward Clyde and that a 1956 Chevrolet driven by Ralph Cheek was going west toward Abilene.

Both cars were on the north side of the highway, it was reported, locked together by the impact. The car's windshield was shattered and the front of the trailer rammed under the rear of the vehicle.

The father and his son were pinned inside the front seat of the Chevrolet and a wrecker was used to pull the two vehicles apart before they were removed. Workers for the wrecker company used a wrecking bar to open a front door so the bodies could be removed.

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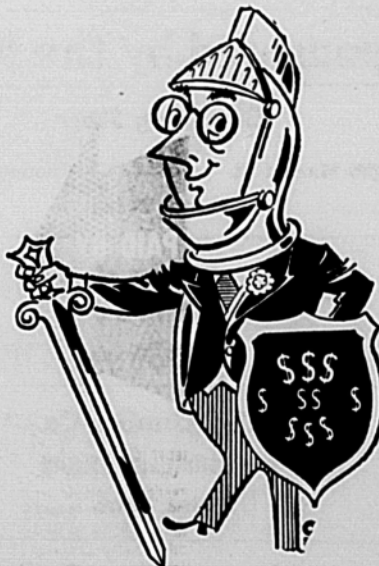

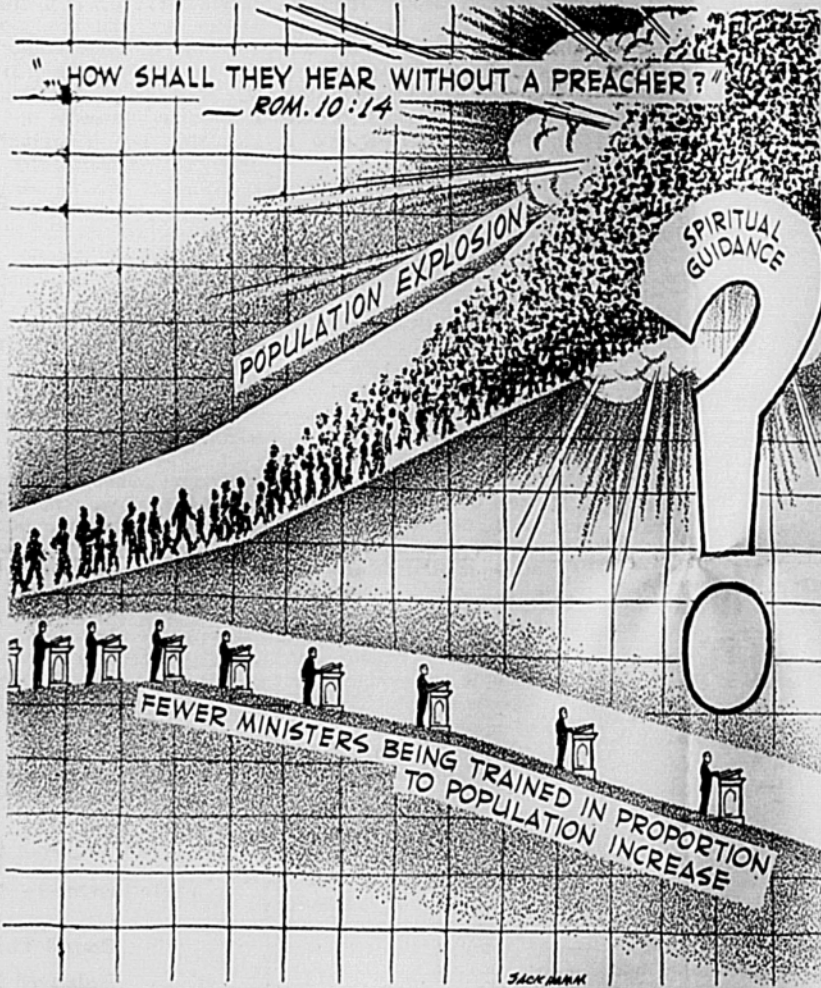

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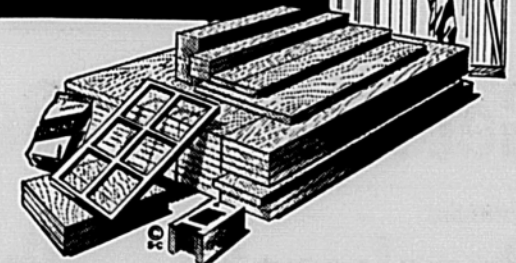
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Rural Fire Truck Answers Calls; \$1,200 Needed To Finish Work

A total of \$1,849.50 has been contributed as of Tuesday on the some \$3,000 needed for the completion of the rural fire truck to be used in the fighting of

range of building fires in the rural area of Callahan and surrounding counties, it was reported by the committee of farmers and ranchers in charge of the truck.

The truck was given to the area farmers and ranchers through cooperation of the Soil Conservation Service.
