## County Farm Bureau Trying To Improve Image For Agriculture

The Callahan County Farm Bureau is making a special effort this year to build a better image for agriculture, according to Winford Gardner of Eula, President of the local farm organization.

"We hope to do this by explaining to the consuming public how farmers and ranchers are helping hold down the cost of living," the Farm Bureau leader said. "Food continues to be a tremendous bargain for consumers primarily because farmers and ranchers have almost doubled their productivity in the past ten years," he added.

As an example of how farmers have increased their efficiency, Gardner said, that a farmer today feeds 45 persons, compared to 23 persons just ten years ago. To help do this, the average investment per farm has jumped from almost \$44,000 to almost \$93,000 in the past ten years.

The farm leader said that the average American family spends only about 16 percent of its after-tax income for food, compared to some 30 per cent spent in Europe and 50 per cent in Russia. Also, the American housewife has a large variety of wholesome foods, attractively packaged and even pre-cooked in some instances, to choose

from.

Mr. Gardner pointed out other examples showing that the consumer is still getting a bargain where food is concerned:

To buy a pound of white bread 40 years ago required 9½ minutes of factory labor, and takes only 4½ minutes today. A dozen eggs required 34½ minutes of factory labor 40 years ago, yet today a dozen eggs can be purchased with wages from only 11 minutes of factory labor.

It took 15½ minutes of factory labor to buy a quart of milk 40 years ago, compared to just 6 minutes today.

An hour's wages today will buy 57 per cent more fruits and vegetables than an hour's wages would buy 20 years ago. What this all adds up to, Gardner said, is that the American consumer of today spends less and less of his income for food, leaving him more money for better housing, medical care, recreation, and all the other things of life.

"The farmer is glad to have a part in providing the abundant life," Gardner said. "The outlook is for even increased efficiency, but prices farmers receive will have to reflect increased costs of production and a reasonable return on investment."

## Measles Vaccine For Clyde Students

CLYDE — Measles vaccine for Red (7-day) Measles will be given at the Clyde School on March 25 to all children, ages one through the third grade.

The vaccine will be given at 1:30 p. m. in the Elementary school and will be free of charge. The Texas State Department of Health will furnish the vaccine, and it will be given under the direction of Dr. Evans, County Health Officer, Mrs. Lynn Ault, R. N. Clyde Lions Club will pay for any expense.

This is not the measles vaccine for German (3-day) Measles that was given at the school in January.

Every child in this age group should be protected against Red Measles. Children who have had the measles or the vaccine are already protected and do not need the vaccine. Unlike the German Measles, Red Measles is a very serious illness and complications can be severe. Is your child protected against this dangerous disease?

The church of Christ is different because it has no man-made creed to state its position or for members to subscribe to. Its members ascribe to and believe the Spirit-inspired word of God as its only rule of faith and practice. (2 Tim. 3:16, 17, John 16:13, Matt. 17:5, Heb. 1:1, 2).

The church of Christ is different because it calls Bible things by Bible names and does Bible things in Bible ways. Peter said, "If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God." (1 Pet. 4:11). Therefore the church of Christ does not call the preacher "Reverend", nor "pastor", nor "priest", nor "Father." It does not refer to the Lord's supper as the "eucharist" nor "the mass."

The church of Christ is different because it is not a denomination. It is nothing more, and nothing less than the spiritual body of Christ (Eph. 1:22, 23), the church of the Lord, which He purchased with His own blood (Acts 20:28), and to which all of the saved are added. (Acts 2:47).

# Stocker-Feeder Day To Explore Beef Cattle Industry

SEYMOUR — A Stocker-Feeder Day, designed to explore the beef cattle industry in the Rolling Plains, will be held at Seymour on March 25.

The program will get underway at 9:45 a. m. in the Farmers National Bank, according to Callahan County Agent, Gregory Gerngross. All farmers and ranchers in the county are encouraged to attend the event, which is being sponsored by the Rolling Plains Economic Program (R-Rep).

Topics to be discussed include the types of cattle desired by feedlots, treatment of cattle prior to shipment, backgrounding or preconditioning custom feeding, ownership of cattle through the feedlot and financing feedlot cattle.

Presiding at the meeting will be Joe Antilley of Abilene, rancher and chairman of R-REP.

The leadoff speaker will be R. L. Bland of Trent, vice president of Western Beef Co. and manager of Cal-Tex Feedlot. He will talk on "Custom Cattle Feeding Steers." He will be followed by Joe Van Zandt of Amarillo, director of Membership Relations, Texas Cattle Feeders Association, who will discuss the "Demand for Rolling Plains Cattle by High Plains Feedlots."
