Justice of the Peace Garvin Jones said, "I was called to the scene of the shooting and arrived there at approximately 8:30 p. m. The two bodies were lying in the front yard, several feet apart, and the shotgun was lying between them, with four spent shells."

It was later determined that Mrs. Teague was shot one time in the left side of the body and Mr. Teague had been shot twice in the left side. Powder burns were found on the clothing of Mr. Teague. It was uncertain where the fourth shell was fired. Justice of the Peace Jones ruled Wednesday that it was a murder and suicide.

Funeral arrangements are pending with Higginbotham Funeral Home in Cross Plains. Mr. and Mrs. Teague were married at Cottonwood on Aug. 16, 1961. Mrs. Teague was a member of the First Baptist Church in Holly Hilliard.

Law Enforcement Training School July 27, In Breckenridge

COLLEGE STATION — Texas A&M University will conduct a six-week law enforcement training school for the multi-county West Central Texas Council of Governments starting Monday, July 27.

Ira E. Scott, chief instructor for A&M's Police Training Division, said all classes will be held in Breckenridge. He explained the Abilene-based council is paying for the training program through an action grant approved by the Texas Criminal Justice Council from the state's share of federal Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act funds.

Classes will meet four hours each day with approximately 30 officers enrolled. Law enforcement officers are expected from Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Stephens, Young, Throckmorton, Shackelford, Jones, Haskell, Nolan, Fisher and Stonewall Counties.

Chief Scott noted the officers will receive the required courses to complete minimum requirements for certification under Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Education requirements.

However, Scott pointed out the men must have one year of law enforcement experience before being fully certified. The law, passed by the 61st Legislature, is effective in mid-September.

Federal funding comes from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration of the U. S. Department of Justice to the state, which has funneled \$1.3 million through the Criminal Justice Council to local governments.

Texas A&M's Police Training Division is a part of the Texas Engineering Extension Service. The seven-man staff trains officers on-campus and through extension programs throughout the state.

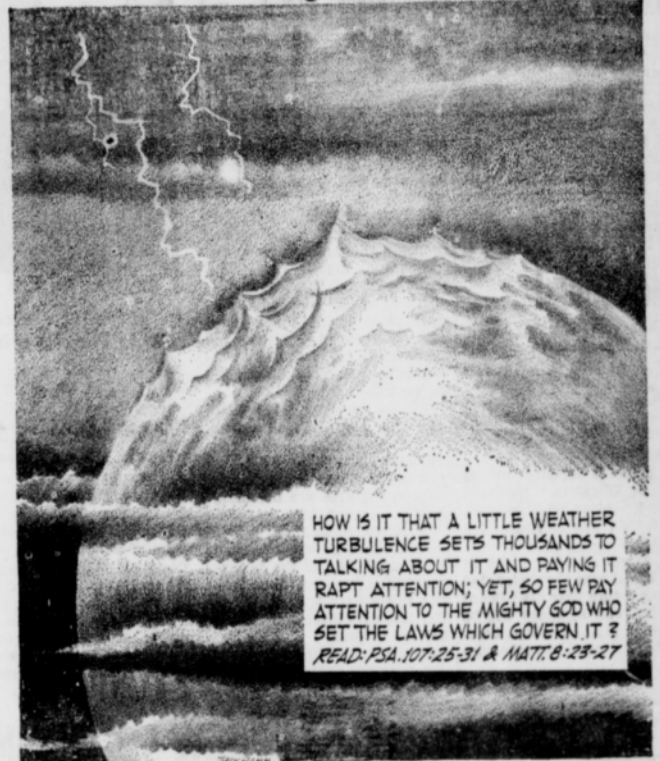

TELL IT LIKE IT IS

Are preachers "telling it like it is" when they tell people that there is nothing in a name and encourage them to be called by man-made names?

The whole problem is summed up in God's word to the people of Israel in Isaiah 30:9,10. " . . . This is a rebellious people, lying children, children that will not hear the law of the Lord: Which say to the seers, See not; and to the prophets, Prophecy not unto us right things, speak unto us smooth things, prophesy deceits."

When will we awake and insist that every man "tell it like it is" in the word of God?
