

John Crawford, Former Clyde Resident, Killed Near Dallas

CLYDE — A former Clyde resident was shot early Sunday morning on the outskirts of Dallas. A Dallas County deputy sheriff called it one of the most bizarre shootings he had ever seen.

Killed was John T. Crawford, 32, who was in the process of moving to Dallas from Houston.

Officials said that Crawford was following another vehicle involved in the move on Interstate 75, about 1:20 a. m., when the driver of the first vehicle noticed a third vehicle pull up beside the Crawford car.

The lead vehicle slower, anticipating car trouble, and when Crawford pulled even, Crawford said he had been shot and slumped over in the seat.

Crawford has been shot four times in the chest, neck and arm, and he died at 2:15 a. m. in Parkland Hospital.

The deputy said there was no apparent reason for the shooting. There was no robbery involved, and he said there are no suspects.

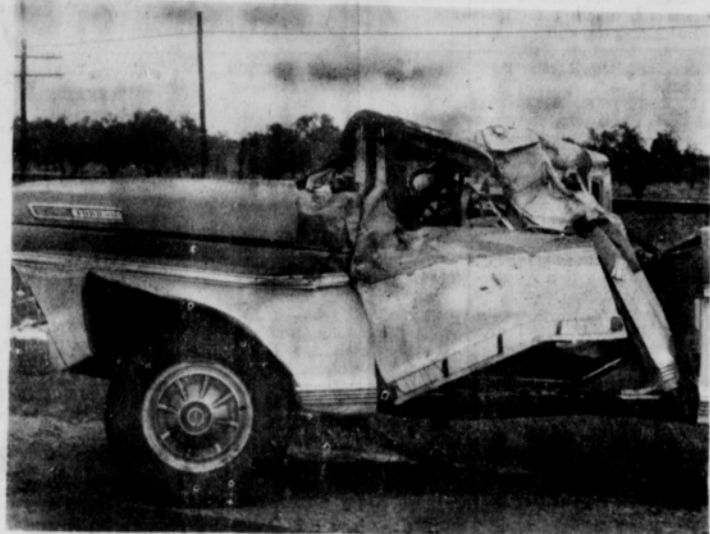
Funeral services were held at 4 p. m. Monday in the Denton Valley Baptist Church with the Rev. Riley Fugitt, pastor of the

First Baptist Church of Clyde, officiating, and Rev. Charles Strickland of Denton Valley Baptist Church assisting. Burial was in the Denton Valley Cemetery with North's Funeral Home of Abilene, directing.

Born January 29, 1938 in Callahan County, he attended school in Clyde. He entered the Armed Service in 1956 and served in the Army four years.

He married Gloria Harber on June 19, 1957 in Abilene. He was employed by Texas Instruments in Dallas since his discharge from the Army. In 1969 he was transferred from Dallas to Houston. He was moving back to Dallas from Houston when he was killed.

Survivors are his wife, Gloria; one daughter, Kay, 13, one son, Kevin 10; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Crawford of Route 2, Clyde; five sisters, Mrs. William (Ruth) Skelton of Madrid, Spain, Mrs. Clarence (Sue) Miliron of Eula, Mrs. Thomas (Shirley) Hall of Groton, Conn., Mrs. David (Melba) Stout of Dallas, and Miss Leta Crawford of Clyde; four nieces and four nephews.

Drought Broken By Heavy Rains

BAIRD — Mr. B. C. Chrisman, U. S. Weather Observer, reports that Baird officially received a total of 5.07 inches of rain. On August 6, we received .10; Aug. 10, .10; Aug. 12, .65; Aug. 13, 1.18; Aug. 14, 2.90 and Aug. 15, 1.14 inches.

Many other places in town received much heavier rainfall, over 4.10 was measured in one place in Baird Saturday morning.

The area drought situation appears to be broken by these much needed rains. Tanks are catching run-off water and the creeks are running and filling area lakes. T&P Lake, just South of town, was going over the spillway, and Baird Lake was within a foot of being full.

Local fishermen report that catfish are really biting since all the fresh water was running into the lakes.

Semi-Pro Baseball Tournament Re-Scheduled For This Week

CLYDE — The Semi-Pro baseball tournament, which was rained out last week, has been re-scheduled to be played this week. The first game is scheduled for 7 p. m. Thursday between the Merkel Raiders and Abilene Jets.

The Clyde Raiders will play Ranger at 9 p. m. Other teams in the double elimination tournament are: Abilene Aces, Bob Lilly Cowboys, Coleman and Snyder.

In addition to the two games Thursday night, there will be three games Friday night, at 7, 9 and 11. There will be seven games Saturday, beginning at 9 a. m. in the morning. Two games are scheduled for Sunday at 2 p. m. and the championship game will be played at 9 p. m. Sunday night.

An admission of 25c for ages

6-12 and 50c for 13 and older will be charged. Admission for the championship game will be 50c and \$1.00.

Trophies will be awarded to the championship team and the runner-up team. Individual trophies will be presented of each member of the first two teams. Trophies will also be awarded to the players judged as the best pitcher, best hitter and the most valuable player. To qualify for the best hitter award a player must have at least 10 official times at bat.

The Clyde Raiders will be favored to win the tournament, since the Abilene Sports had to withdraw due to other commitments. Snyder, Merkel and Coleman could all pose a threat to upset the Raiders, which should add some excitement to the tournament.

Baird's New School Buildings In Various Stages of Completion

BAIRD — The new Junior High School Library and Science building, being constructed by Rose Construction Co. Inc., of Abilene, will be completed Sept. 1st. This completion date will enable students to begin using the facility shortly after school starts.

The new building is constructed of metal framework and metal exterior, with sheetrock and texture interior, and is located between the two existing wings.

Construction on the new gymnasium is 50 percent complete. It is expected that the dressing facility will be ready for use by August 30. Final complete date on the building is expected to be Oct. 22.

Other phases of the current building and improvement program are the construction of

a new vocational agriculture building, painting and remodeling of existing buildings.

The agriculture building will be started about Sept. 1 and is expected to be completed about Oct. 15.

The old agriculture building and the old dressing rooms have been painted bronze and white to match existing and the new buildings. All elementary classrooms have been painted in white and bright colors on the inside, and repainted on the outside.

Drought Funds For Livestock Reservoirs Difficult To Obtain

BAIRD — Approvals for 80% cost-share assistance for the construction of livestock reservoirs will be difficult to obtain in Callahan County, due to the recent heavy rains.

Eligibility requirements are that a farmer or rancher must have had adequate livestock water facilities, but due to the current drought the watering facility failed. Also, before approval is granted, the County Committee must determine for each individual case that the

drought conditions still exist. Several weeks ago nearly all producers would have qualified, where as now only a limited number could be considered.

If anyone was unfortunate enough not to have received adequate rains to replenish their livestock water supply, they may file an application at the ASCS Office for consideration by the committee.

All reservoirs approved must be completed by September 30, 1971.

Add \$480 per year to the income level for each additional family member.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from

unusual circumstances or hardship, are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches.

The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining

eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy the principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official, he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. The superintendent of school has been designated as the hearing official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

CAN YOU RECOMMEND YOUR RELIGION? (continued)

We should not recommend to others that for which we have no authority in the Scriptures. "If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God." (1 Pet. 4:11)

Can you recommend the kind of organization in the church to which you belong? That is, is it the organization which is authorized in the Scriptures? Is it the organization taught and approved by the Apostles?

Upon this basis we should not recommend any church that has an earthly head or an earthly headquarters. Such organizations does not have the sanction of God's word. The Scriptures reveal that Christ is the only head of the true church. (Eph. 1:22,23)

What about the organization in the local church to which you belong? Can you recommend it upon the basis of what is authorized by the Bible? The Scriptures authorize having elders as overseers in the local congregation (Acts 14:23, 20:21,28) There men are also called bishops (1 Tim. 3:1-5) and pastors (Eph. 4:11). The Bible also authorizes the appointment of special servants in the church called deacons (1 Tim. 3:8-13, Phil. 1:1). I can recommend this kind of organization in the church because it has divine approval and authority. I cannot recommend having governing boards, synods, councils, conventions, etc. in the organization of the church. Such would have to be wholly without heaven's sanction.

Can you, upon the authority of the Scriptures, recommend the creed which you believe and which you endorse? I can recommend my creed — the word of God. Paul declares that it "furnishes man completely unto every good work" (2 Tim. 3:16,17). It is all-sufficient for "doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness" (ibid.). I cannot recommend anything else without incurring the disapproval of God. (2 John 9) We are warned not to go beyond what is written (1 Cor. 4:6), and that we must not add to nor take from God's word (Rev. 22:18,19). If the creed you believe has more than the word of God, it has too much. If it has less than the word of God, it has too little. If it has just the word of God (no more and no less), then it is the word of God.

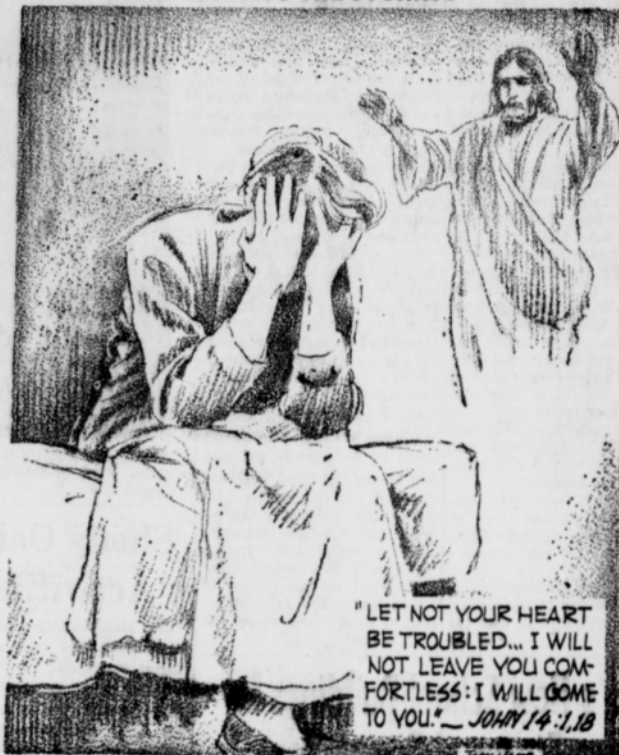

ROWDEN AREA RECEIVES NINE INCHES OF RAIN LAST WEEK

STATE CAPITAL
Highlights
AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — Legislative Redistricting Board will meet here August 24 to begin consideration of state senatorial reapportionment.

Shortly after the Board announced its meeting date, Gov. Preston Smith issued a sharply-worded statement calling on the Board to forget "political considerations" and start work on a House of Representative redistricting bill also.

Smith noted the fact that Attorney General Crawford Martin's appealing a district court decision invalidating the 1971 legislative act which attempted to reapportion the House does not preclude the Board from preparing for any eventuality.

Supreme Court of Texas, Governor noted, may uphold or over-turn the district court's August 2 decision that the Legislature illegally divided more than 20 counties. In either case, he said, the Board should be prepared with a House as well as a Senate reapportionment plan to avoid the need for a "million dollar" special session of the Legislature.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, a member of the Legislative Redistricting Board, expressed surprise at Smith's blast. He said the Board has made a decision not to consider House redistricting and, indeed, had not even discussed the issue.

Board has just 60 days to draw the reapportionment after its initial meeting which means its lifespan expires in late October.

State Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert S. Calvert said the Court will meet within 48 hours after receiving a request for an appeal hearing and can reach a decision in 10 days or less.

Attorney General Martin said a transcript of the lower court proceedings is being speeded to completion and can be placed before the Supreme Court within another week.

AUTO INSURANCE RATE CUR BASKED — Governor last week called on the State Board of Insurance to permit no increases in auto coverage rates this year.

He summoned three members of that agency to his office to hear his proposal.

Board is due to meet this month to review requests of insurance companies for increases totalling almost 10 per cent on all types of auto insurance. Board staff members have proposed a modest 2.8 per cent average hike effective September 1.

Governor asked the Board to begin study immediately of no-

fault insurance plans with a view toward adopting one for Texas. He said Massachusetts achieved a substantial reduction in auto insurance rates under its no-fault concept.

Smith also urged the Board to study the feasibility of establishing a flexible and competitive insurance rating system in an effort to reduce rates.

Ruby Barekman Rites Held in DeLeon

Funeral services were held at 1 p. m. Thursday in Higginbotham Funeral Home in DeLeon, with Rev. Ralph Heckman, pastor of the First Baptist Church officiating. Burial was in West End Cemetery at Stephenville.

She was born May 24, 1903 in Emory. She worked as a nurse at Stephenville Hospital for 15 years, and served at the Tarleton Student Health Center for 20 years, before moving to DeLeon three years ago. She married J. A. Barekman in September 1937 in Stephenville. He died in 1961.

Survivors include two stepsons, Dr. W. H.
