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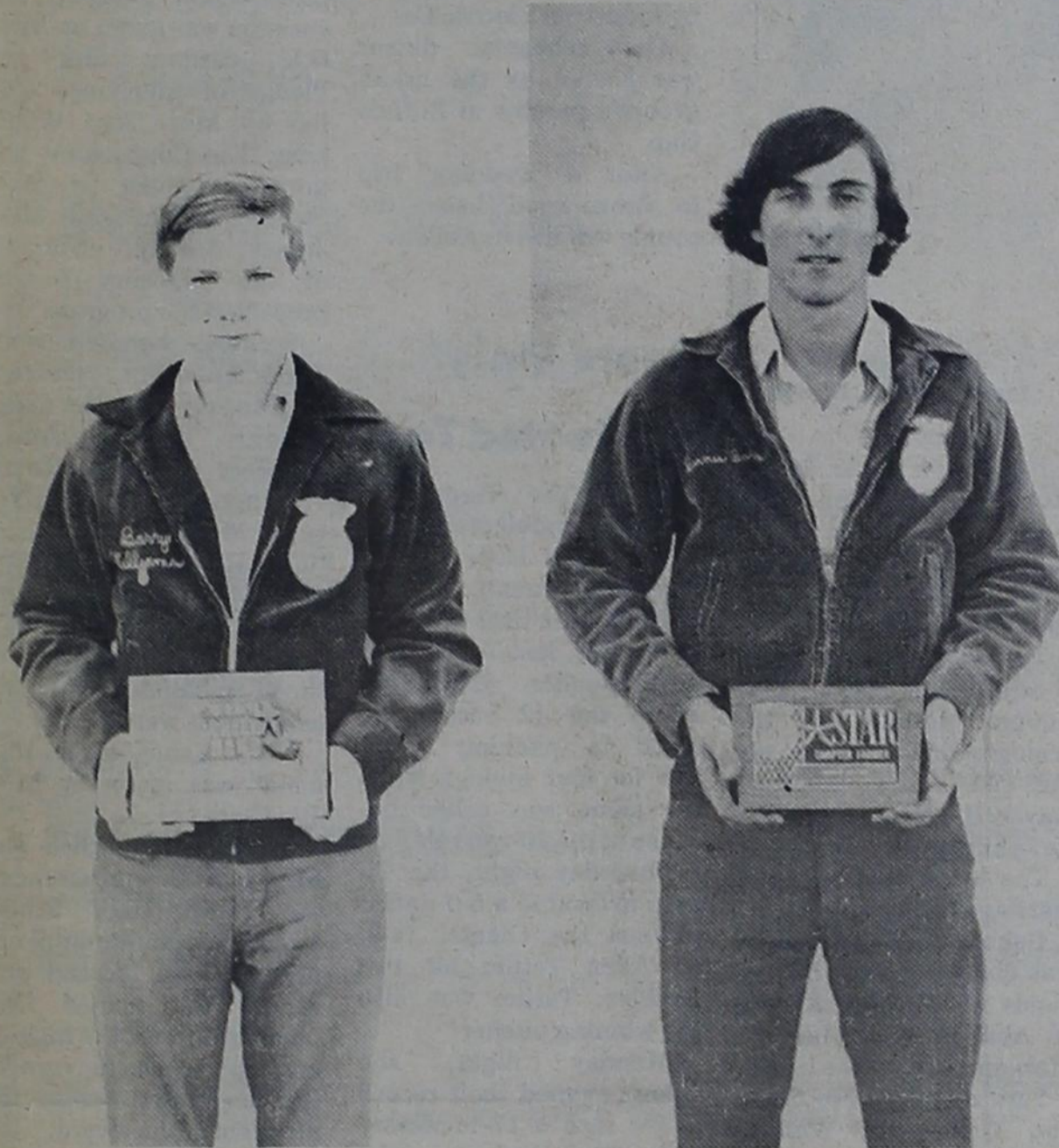

Baird Junior Rodeo Set for June 22 - 25

BAIRD—The 1977 Baird Junior Rodeo has been slated for June 22-25. Performances will begin at 8 p.m. nightly in the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse arena and admission will be \$1 for students and \$2 for adults. Rodeo producer will be Runt Sloan.

Rodeo competition is divided into three age brackets for both boys and girls: 12 and under, 13-15 and 16-19.

Girls events will include barrel racing, pole bending, flag race, breakaway roping and goat tying. Boys, 16-19 yrs. old, will compete in bareback riding, ribbon roping, bull riding, tie-down roping & breakaway roping. Thirteen to fifteen yr. old boys will compete in bull riding, barrel racing, breakaway roping, flag race, and tie-down roping. Calf riding, barrel racing, flag race, breakaway roping and goat tying will be for boys, 12 yrs. old and under.

The three-man team in wild steer

saddling is for boys, 19 and under.

Entry blanks may be obtained by contacting Sarah Campbell, Star Rt. 1, Baird. Deadline for entries is 2 p.m. Friday, June 17. Entry fee is \$10.00 per event, with the exception of the wild steer saddling, which is \$15.00.

Only the first 60 paid entries will be accepted in the bareback bronc and bull riding events.

Buckles will be awarded to all first place winners and saddles will be presented to the all-around cowboy and cowgirl of the show.

The rodeo will also offer a contest for all cowboys and cowgirls, 8 years of age and under—the Boot Race! There will be no entry fee for this event and awards will be presented each night.

Downtown Baird will be the scene of the annual rodeo parade Saturday, June 25, beginning at 5 p.m.

Reservists To Stage Mark Disasters

COUNTY—Army Reservists from Abilene will conduct two civic action projects in Callahan County during their two weeks of active duty in June.

One team of the Reservists, headed by Capt. Johnny Bough of Coleman, will conduct Civil Defense surveys in Baird and Cross Plains, then stage mock disasters in both towns to provide training for local Civil Defense volunteers.

The mock disaster at Baird is set for 9 a.m. Wednesday, June 8. The disaster alarm will be blown for 2 full minutes at that time. Then an emergency operation center will be activated at the Baird Chamber of Commerce.

A training session at Cross Plains will be held the following week, probably on June 14 or 15. Coordinating the efforts in Cross Plains will be O.B. Edmondson.

The training provided by a similar disaster drill which the Reservists conducted in Coleman three years ago was credited with helping save the lives of several persons when a tornado actually hit Coleman the following year.

A second team of Reservists, headed by Capt. Jim Isbell of Cross Plains, will work out a map and numbering system for all roads in Callahan County. Using aerial maps and checking the roads on the ground, the Reservists will list major landmarks. Capt. Ben Stephenson will be involved in this project.

County officials said the maps can be invaluable to the various volunteer fire departments for help in finding the shortest route to rural fires.

In his civilian job, Capt. Stephenson is director of the Baird Chamber of Commerce and has been appointed Callahan County Civil Defense coordinator by County Judge A.E. Dyer Jr.

Stephenson, Judge Dyer and Baird Mayor Charles Walker recently attended a Civil Defense seminar conducted by the Texas Department of Public Safety in Austin, to familiarize themselves with the roles they will play in the upcoming survey and drill.

The Reservists are members of the 490th Civil Affairs Co., headquartered in Abilene and commanded by Lt. Col. Charles Clark.

AUSTIN-The Honorable A.E. Dyer, Jr., Judge and Civil Defense Director of Callahan County, the Honorable Charles Walker, Mayor and Civil Defense Coordinator for the City of Baird, and the Honorable B.P. Stephenson, appointed Civil Defense Coordinator of Callahan County, completed a three-day special seminar (May 17-19) for local officials in Texas Civil Preparedness at Disaster Emergency Services in Austin, Texas. They were three of approximately twenty-five officials from around the state participating.

The course dealt with responsibilities

and actions the attending officials must know in order to benefit local communities under emergency disaster conditions. Such conditions—it was stressed—could range from hurricanes, floods and tornadoes to butane explosions and nuclear attack.

The seminar—one of several each year—was conducted by members of the staff of the Governor's Division of Disaster Emergency Services. The seminars are scheduled each year in an underground fallout shelter which serves as a round-the-clock Emergency Operating Center at the Texas Department of Public Safety Headquarters.

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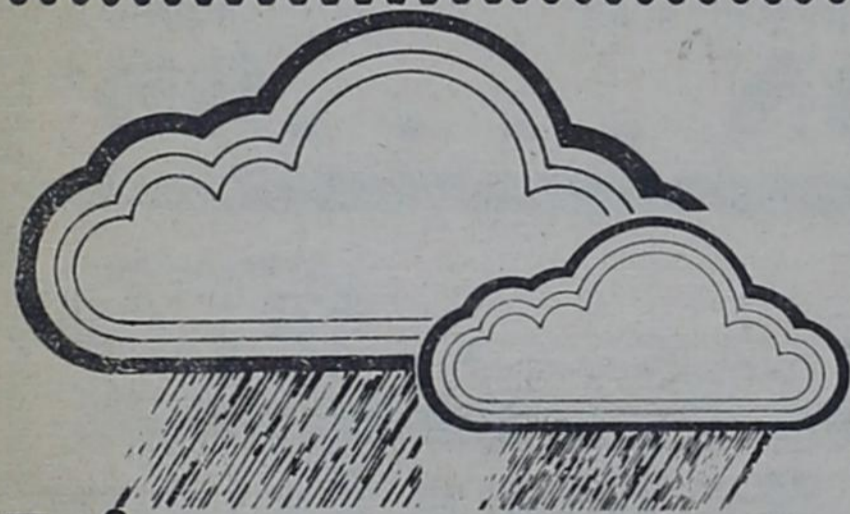
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Baird Woman's Mother Dies

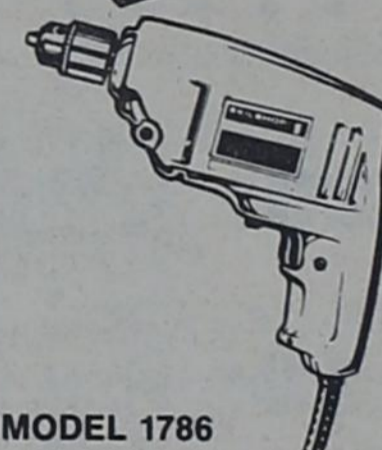

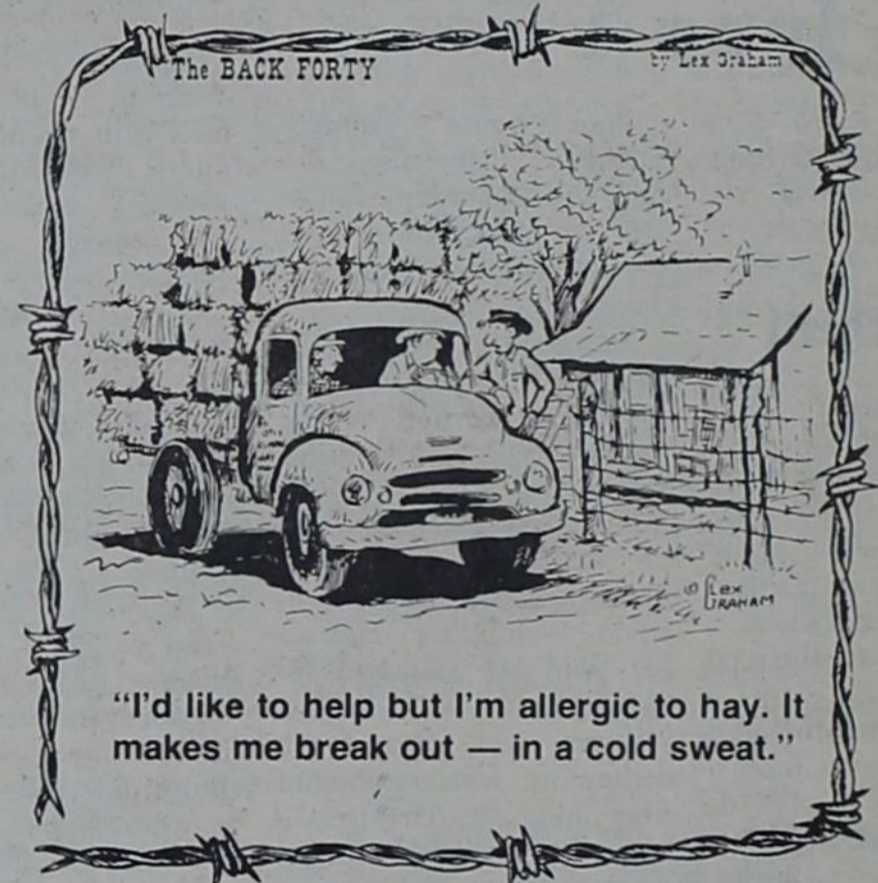

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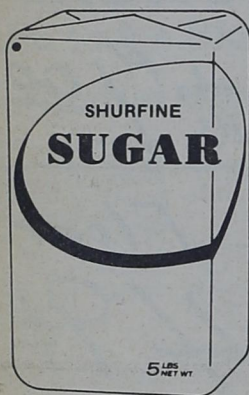

Long Hot Summer Expected In County

COUNTY-A long hot summer could produce some of the highest electric bills in years, West Texas Utilities Co. officials warned this week.

And according to some weather observers, official and otherwise, a hot summer is long overdue. West Texas, like much of the nation, has enjoyed five relatively cool summers in a row. The law of averages, therefore, would indicate a change.

One of the consequences would be more use of air-conditioning, requiring more electric energy. This could run bills up sharply.

There already are indications that customers may soon be jolted out of their summer lull. During the first 21 days of May, temperatures in Abilene average 5.81 degrees above normal and electric usage went up accordingly.

A change back to even the normal weather pattern could bring the impact of higher usage and higher costs, a company spokesman said.

Historically, the four peak months for electric usage in the WTU territory are June-through-September. The peak day usually comes in August. Last year, the system's electric load peaked at 5 p.m. on August 11.

Weather records for Abilene and San Angelo show that June-through-Septem-

ber temperatures have averaged below normal for the past five years. The result, WTU officials say, has been that the customers have grown accustomed to relatively lower summer electric usage.

WTU officials are not worried about meeting the energy demand. The company's generating system is adequate to supply all the electricity needed even on an extremely hot day. But they are urging customers to practice conservation in order to hold their usage and bills down.

The key to lower bills this summer will be efficient handling of home cooling. Proper ceiling insulation and adequate attic ventilation are two of the most important factors. WTU engineers also suggest that thermostats be set at 78 degrees, that houses be opened up to take advantage of nature's cooling when the outside temperature is less than 75 degrees, and that shades be kept pulled on the sunny side of the house.

They also urge that air-conditioners be checked to see if they are in good working order, and that air-conditioners not be left running if everyone leaves the house for a substantial length of time.

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Here beginneth the account of Nathaniel Morton, secretary and keeper of the records for the Plymouth Colony, concerning those memorable circumstances of the year 1620:

"So they left that goodly and pleasant city of Leyden, which had been their resting place for above eleven years, but they knew that they were pilgrims and strangers here below, and looked not much on these things, but lifted up their eyes to heaven, their dearest country, where God had prepared for them a city (Hebrews 11:16) and therein quieted their spirits.

"When they came to Delfs-Haven they found a ship and all their things ready; and such of their friends as could not come with them followed after them, and sundry came from Amsterdam to see them shipt, and to take leave of them. One night was spent with little sleep with most, but with friendly entertainment and Christian discourse, and other expressions of true Christian love.

"The next day they went on board, and their friends with them, where truly doleful was the sight of that sad and mournful parting, to hear what sighs and sobs and prayers did sound amongst them; what tears did gush from every eye, and pithy speeches pierced each other's heart, that sundry of the Dutch strangers that stood on the Key as spectators could not refrain from tears. But the tide (which stays for no man) calling them away, that were thus loath to depart, their Reverend Pastor, falling down on his knees, and they all with him, with watery cheeks commended them with the most fervent prayers unto the Lord and His blessings, and then with mutual embraces and many tears they took their leaves one of another, which proved to be the last leave to many of them.

"Being now past the vast ocean, in a sea of troubles before them in expectations, they had now no friends to welcome them, no inns to entertain or refresh them, no houses, or much less towns, to repair unto to seek for succor; and for the season, it was winter, and they that know the winters of the country know them to be sharp and violent, subject to cruel and fierce storms, dangerous to travel to no places, much more to search unknown coasts.

"Besides, what could they see but a hideous and desolate wilderness, full of wilde beasts and wilde men? And what multitudes of them there were, they then knew not: for which way soever they turned their eyes (save upward to heaven) they could have but little solace or content and respect of any outward object, for summer being ended, all things stand in appearance with a weather-beaten face, and the whole country full of woods and thickets, represent a wilde and savage hew.

"If they looked behind them, there was a mighty ocean which they had past, and was now as a main bar of gulph to separate them from all the civil parts of the world."

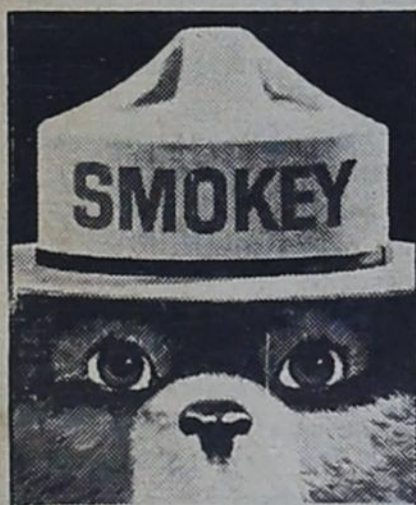
