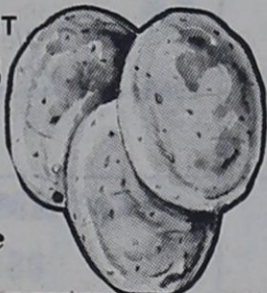

Informative Series On Callahan General Hospital

BAIRD—During the coming weeks, through a continuing series of articles, Callahan General Hospital hopes to acquaint the citizens of Callahan County with the hospital and the many services offered to them. We at the hospital feel that there is a need to update the public on various aspects of how the hospital is managed, its organization, its policies and government regulations affecting it.

Callahan General Hospital was built in 1938-1939 as a WPA funded county hospital. The first administrator in those years was Mrs. Stella Smith. Physi-

cians using the hospital at the time were Dr. Cockrell and Dr. R.L. Griggs. Both were practicing in another hospital downtown and moved their practice to the new hospital upon its opening. During World War II, M.L. Stubblefield came to Baird while about the same time, Dr. Cockrell moved away. During later years, there were many physicians practicing at one time or another in Baird and Clyde including Drs. Wallach, Couch, Gray, Vernezobre, Brooks, Robert Evans, J.E. Mikeska, Jessie Umali and John Viola.

As a county institution,

the hospital was governed by the county judge and a board of directors. For many years, the hospital served the community successfully until the loss of several physicians and the inability to secure younger qualified doctors to come to rural areas such as ours.

In 1975, it became apparent that the county could no longer support the hospital. At this time, concerned citizens under the leadership of Judge A.E. Dyer, began a campaign to recruit doctors to the area. The board viewed the only other alternative was to close the hospital.

About this time, Dr. L.T. Gayao came to Baird. The commissioner's court voted in May of 1975, to lease the hospital to Dr. Gayao for five years. At this point, the hospital was no longer a county institution but a private hospital. Therefore, the hospital now received no federal, state, county or city tax money and was totally self-supporting. After leasing the hospital Dr. Gayao was instrumental in bringing other doctors to the community. In 1976, Dr. R.N. Calvo Jr. moved to Baird, opened his practice and later built a new clinic located at 5th St. and Arch.

Without any outside funding, it became necessary, as in any other business, to formulate new guidelines. Some of these included deposits on admission for private-paying patients, cash basis for Emergency Room services, cash basis for out-patient

laboratory and x-ray services. This was not intended as an undue burden on the public but to enable the hospital to offer good medical care.

The implementation of these policies have made it possible for us to update many services and purchase new laboratory and x-ray equipment. The operating room and delivery room were opened with

some new and better equipment.

The basis aim of the hospital in its operation is to provide the necessary services, adapted to the needs of the physicians in the community, enabling them to provide good medical care to patients. We believe that a hospital is people serving other people. Except for the older type structure which is outgrown because of continued progress, we are now able to provide services equivalent to or better than the services offered by similar sized hospitals. This has been possible through the concentrated effort of management, physicians, employees and members of the community which have supported the hospital.

Ica Beck Dies January 26

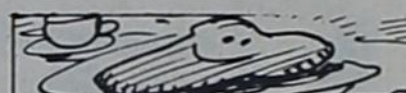
HOUSTON—Ica Bell Beck 103, of Houston died at 6 p.m. Friday, Jan. 26, in Houston.

Callahan County ASCS News Report

1979 COTTON PROGRAM— The target price has been tentatively set at 57.7 cents per old. The final target price will be announced when 1978 data becomes available. The national loan rate is 50.23 cents per lb. There will be no set-aside or voluntary diversion this year. Deficiency payments, if any, will be on all the planted acreage when the 1978 acreage is underplanted by at least 15 percent this year. To qualify for cotton program benefits, a farm with a set-aside crop planted must also

comply with set-aside and NCA requirements.

1979 WHEAT AND FEE GRAIN PROGRAM: The loan rate for wheat is \$2.35 and the target price is \$3.40 per bu. Grain sorghum loan rate is \$1.90 and the target price is \$2.30 per bu. The barley loan rate is \$1.63 and the target price is \$2.40 per bu. The required set-aside for wheat and barley is 20 percent of the planted acreage and 10 percent for grain sorghum.

REMEMBER: The total

acreage of NCA crops planned plus required set-aside cannot exceed the NCA base established for the farm.

PROVEN YIELDS: The base period for proving wheat and feed grain yields for 1979 is 1976, 1977 and 1978. In order to prove a yield, a producer must have planted and harvested (or have appraised) acreage in each of the above three years. Acceptable production evidence includes sales receipts, loan documents, warehouse ledger sheets,

and must identify the farm, producer, year of production, and the buyer. Appeals must be made in writing and filed within 15 days from the date of the yield notice.

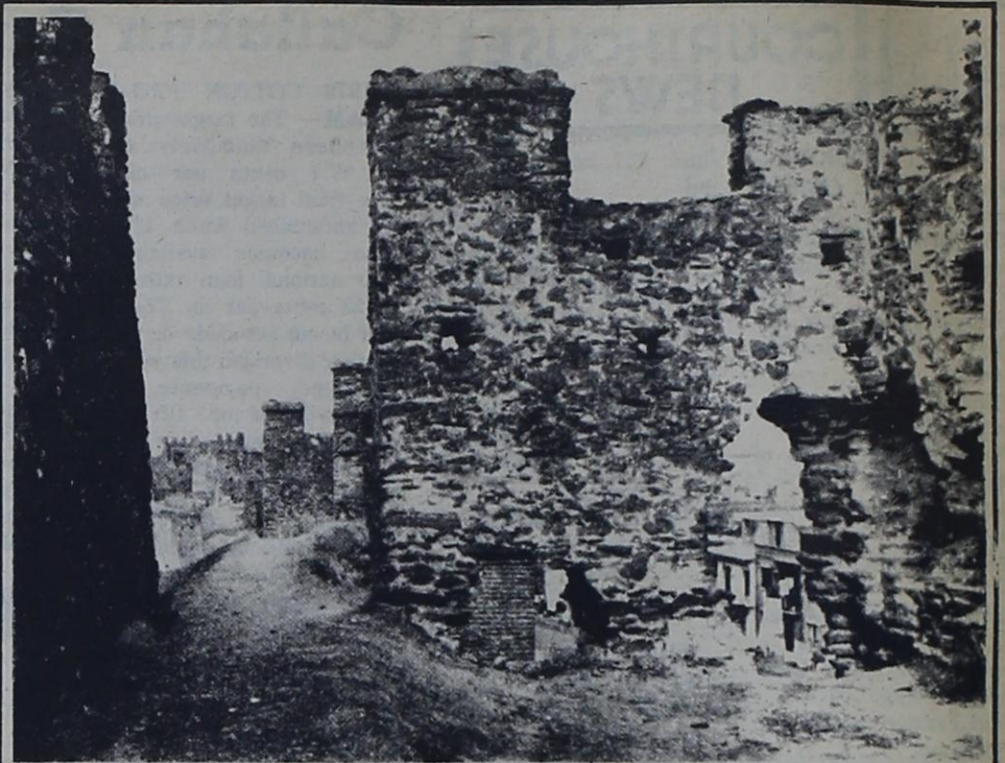
APPENDIX A

Statement of Nondiscrimination
