Homestead Exemptions Available In Callahan County

Tax relief for property tax purposes is available to Texas homeowners.

Albert Lovell, chief appraiser for the Callahan County Appraisal District, announced the availability of several residence homestead exemptions which can reduce the tax burden for homeowners who qualify. Beginning in 1982, a one-time application is required, and homesteads must meet the following qualifications:

As of January 1, 1982, the home must be owned by the person(s) claiming the exemption;

The home must be designed or adapted for human residence;

The home must actually be used as a residence; and

The home must be occupied as the principal residence of an owner who qualified for the exemption.

A residence homestead is a structure, together with the land and improvements, which are used for residential purposes.

Mobile homes, if they meet the qualifications, can be claimed as a homestead even if they are on leased land.

"A taxpayer can still qualify for the exemptions even in a portion of his residence is used for other purposes, such as a business in the home," Lovell said. "Additionally, a homeowner will not lose the exemption if he temporarily moves away, provided that he intends to return and does not claim a homestead elsewhere."

Various types of homestead exemptions exist. Applications for any must be filed with the chief appraiser after January 1 and before May 1.

School districts grant a \$5,000 general homestead exemption to all qualified homeowners. A \$10,000 school homestead exemption is offered to citizens 65 years or older and to disabled persons.

An advantage associated with the over-65 exemption is that senior citizens receive a "tax freeze or tax ceiling" on school taxes they are assessed in the first year of qualification. Although the appraised value of their homesteads are free to fluctuate with the market, the school taxes will not increase.

An exception to this would be the addition of an improvement, excluding repaired or general maintenance. In that case, the value of the new improvement would be taxed at the current rate and added to the previous tax ceiling to create a new ceiling.

Counties offer a \$3,000 general homestead exemption to all taxpayers. This exemption can be granted only on the portion of the county tax levied for farm-to-market roads/flood control.

Sheriff's Office Clears Up Co. Burglaries, Arrests Bank Swindlers

The Callahan County Sheriffs' Office was kept busy this past week.

Two men were arrested Friday morning when they tried to swindle the First National Bank of Baird out of several thousands of dollars.

The men, James Gerald Hicks and James Andrew Smith had opened an account earlier in the week using the name of a local business. They had opened the account with a check of a relatively small amount. On Friday, they attempted to deposit a check for over \$7,800 and withdraw a large portion of it. Fred Boble became suspicious of the two and called the sheriffs' office. They were arrested outside the bank and are being held in the Callahan County jail under \$50,000 bond each.

In other action, the sheriffs' office cleared up at least eight Cross Plains burglaries with the arrest of John Schlittler, 17, of Cross Plains. Burglaries being closed up were those of Higginbothams, Griders Gulf Station (which was robbed twice) the Cross Plains Discount Center and several home and auto thefts. They burglaries all occurred between November and March and guns appear to be the main object.

All the stolen property has been recovered and he is in the Callahan County Jail under a \$5,000 bond.

Another rash of house burglaries were

cleared up with the arrest of a 37 year old Clyde man.

At 4:30 p.m. Monday, Deputies Mack West and Jess Henley received a call from Taylor County advising them to be on the look-out for a red Chevrolet Nova. The car was seen leaving a house near Hamby that had been burglarized.

After learning the man's name and address through a license check, the two deputies went to the man's home to wait for him.

Taylor County officials notified them a half hour later that the suspect was in custody.

He is charged with two counts of burglary in Schackleford county, two counts in Jones County and two counts in Taylor county. All of these are in addition to the burglary charges filed in Callahan County.

Deputy West stated the same M.O. was used in several of the burglaries. Most occurred on Monday afternoons between 2 and 5 p.m.

As in the Cross Plains robberies, guns appeared to be the objective.

The sheriffs' office is in the process of recovering the stolen items. Four guns from Shackleford and Taylor Counties have been recovered.

The suspect is in custody in the Taylor County Jail under \$10,000 bond from Callahan County.

Sales Tax Rebates Distributed To Area Towns

Bob Bullock, Comptroller for the State of Texas has released the figures of the March sales tax rebates. The rebates are made to all Texas cities who levy the one percent city sales tax.

Baird's rebate for March was 28% higher over the same period last year. That figure is deceptive though, in that Baird did not receive a rebate check last year. The amount of this year's check was \$656.76. The state does not mail out checks for small amounts but holds it un-

til the next month.

Clyde's rebate was 38.17% higher than last year's \$2,519.05 check. This month they received \$4,895.61.

Also showing an increase was Cross Plains with 14.74% boost. They received \$4,322.25 as compared to \$2,572.00 for last year.

Putnam received \$1,319.05 this month for a 48.60% increase, however, like Baird, they did not receive a payment for the same period last year.

City Council Leases Power Plant To Oklahoma Firm

An emergency meeting of the Baird City Council was held Thursday morning at 10 a.m.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the leasing of the city owned power plant building to a firm based in Oklahoma.

The firm, Astron Petroleum Products, Inc., manufactures a wheel jack for oil field use. A company representative, Dub Sumners, was on hand at the meeting. Mr. Sumners stated that the

building would be used as a base in this area for the company. The firm plans to bring in two people and hire three local people. They hope to have ten employees by the end of the year.

The city council agreed to lease the building for \$260 per month on a six-month lease with an optional six month renewal.

Mr. Sumners expected to begin moving in immediately.

Playground Equipment Installed

At Elementary School

Three members of the Baird MFT were on hand Saturday morning at the Baird Elementary School playground to install new playground equipment. Also helping were three members of the Hardin-Simmons ROTC.

Installed Saturday was a geodesic climbing apparatus. The MFT also hopes to install two seesaws and a natureville, a redwood and metal climbing center in the next few weeks. The equipment was pur-

chased with funds raised through the volleyball tournament and the Halloween Carnival.

All but about \$400 has been raised to pay for the equipment which costs \$3,400.

Peanut Markets Dictate Cut In Additional Plantings

After surveying the current export market outlook for U.S. produced peanuts the National Peanut Growers Group Steering Committee has advised growers to make decisions on the planting of additional peanuts in a cautious manner.

Ross Wilson, said that a delegation of U.S. peanut found marketing opportunities to be in a depressed state. Factors contributing to the poor mar-

ket outlook include inflation, lack of strength in the dollar and surplus of peanuts world wide.

Wilson said that prices for shelled goods presently being quoted by foreign users of U.S. peanuts convert to prices on farmers stock substantially below the cost of production. He said therefore, the National Peanut Growers Group has recommended that growers not plant

additional peanuts in 1982 unless a contract has been secured that will assure a satisfactory net return to the producer. Wilson stated that growers should remember that additional peanuts not contracted must be placed in the area association pool and that pool dividends depend on both domestic and export edible demand. He said that there currently exists a considerable inventory of 1981 crop segregation 1 peanuts held by handlers and by the three area grower associations under the loan program. "We can only conclude at this point, Wilson said, that any production of 1982 crop additional peanuts without contracts will only add to the oversupply situation and further deteriorate markets.

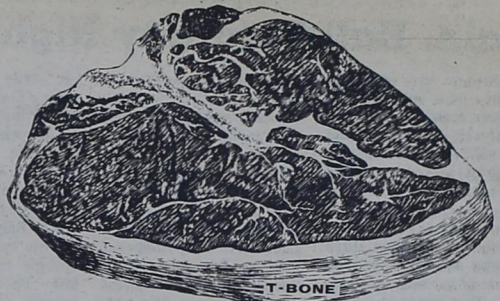

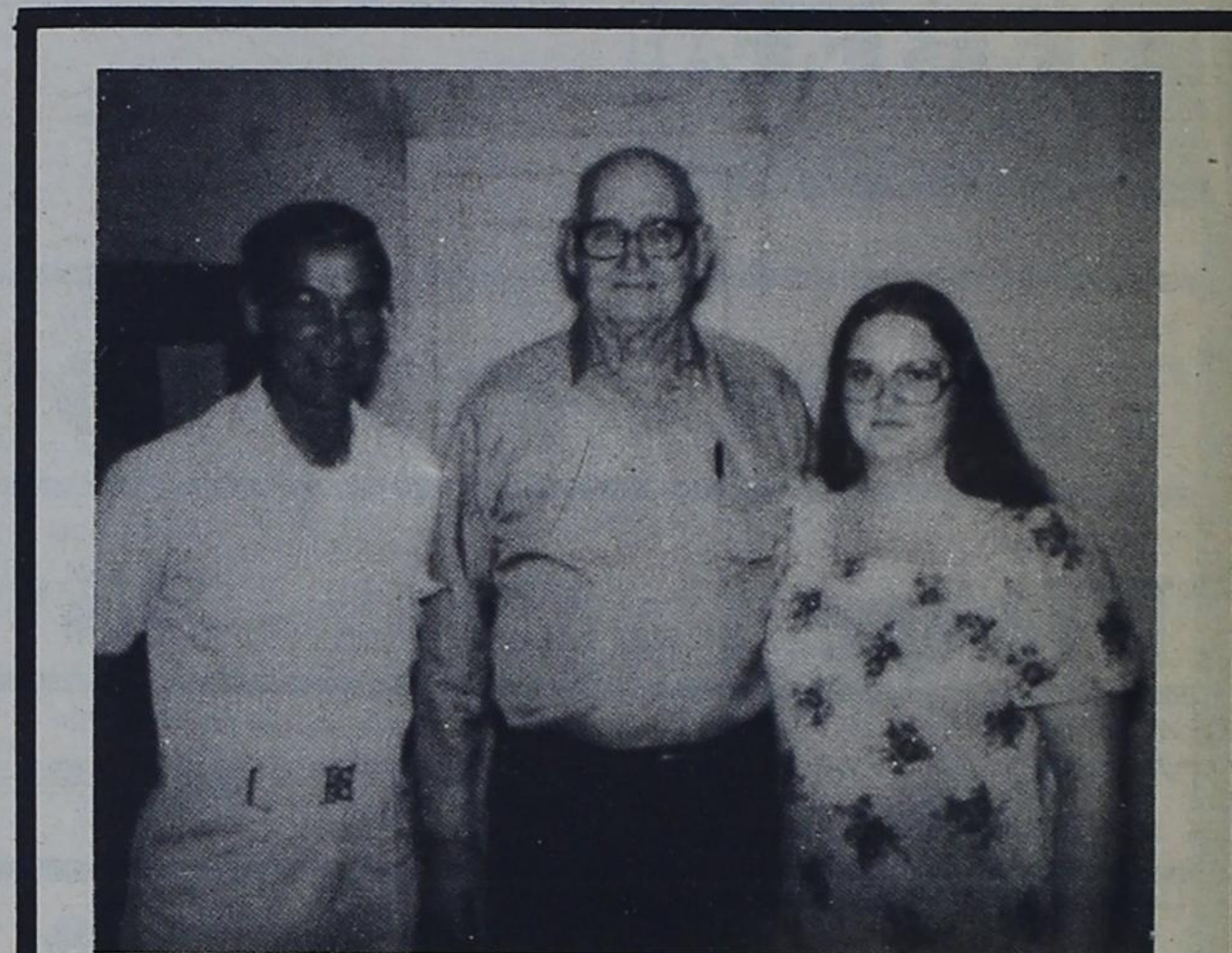

Overpass Near Putnam To Be Widened

Bids for three highway improvement projects in Abilene and surrounding counties will be accepted by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation on March 9 and 10.

Included in the projects is a new pavement marking for 166 miles of roadways in the 13-county Abilene district. The marking will be made from a new thermoplastic material with a higher intensity

and longer service life than older paint solutions.

Also included is the widening of the Missouri Pacific Railroad overpass east of Putnam on I-20. The existing structure is too small for the volume of traffic currently utilizing the facility.

The third project is the improvement of one mile of Barrow Street in Abilene from South 14th to South 27th. The stretch of roadway will be widened, resurfaced and new signals placed at three intersections.

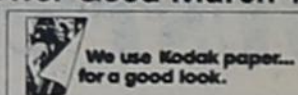
