Clyde Couple Indicted For Robbery, Two Men On Theft

James Lewis Hart 35, and his wife, Linda, 37, of James Trailer Park in Clyde, were indicted on robbery charges Friday by the 104th District Court grand jury in Abilene.

The couple was indicted for robbing Deloris Jones, a clerk at the Skinny's convenience store at 2990 Pine in Abilene at gunpoint on August 19.

The clerk was forced to hand over more than '100 to a woman who pulled a pistol, then ran to a waiting car.

Mrs. Hart, also known as Linda Burkhead, and her husband had previous conviction before-Hart of robbery in Taylor County in 1975, and Mrs. Hart of forgery in Nueces County in 1963.

Timothy Conner, 18, of Clyde, and Danny Alward, 22, of Route 1, Clyde, were also indicted for the May 19 theft of a .22 caliber pistol from Wayne Davis of 3001 S. 12th, Abilene.

Improvements Brighten Future Of Once Ailing Hospital

Russell Payne, Callahan Memorial Hospitals newly appointed administrator, said the recent change over from Rural Management to United Hospital has been hectic but smooth transition. Everyone is pleased with the change over.

United is planning to completely remodel the hospital. New ceilings, lighting, carpet and paint are just a few of the changes being made.

The brighter paint will transform the once dreary interior to a more pleasant surrounding.

All 17 rooms are private suites, with no double bed rooms. Each room will be equiped to have oxygen piped in, eliminating the oxygen tank in the toom with patient. Several of the rooms are set up similar to CCU rooms with heart monitors. This way the hospital will have 4 or 5 CCU's instead of just one.

A new nurses call and paging system is in the works, which will make patient care more efficient, making their needs more readily known to the staff.

There is a definite possibility of a

surgeon coming in on a regular basis. This will help to increase the hospitals

The key to the hospitals success is the communities needs and use of the facilities.

Medicare and insurance claims will be precessed by Computer providing the patient and hospital with more accuracy.

Personnel has been assigned specific jobs to ensure efficiency. Each staff members knows their job and will not be hendered by trying to do two jobs at once. This will also be beneficial to the patient.

The old black and white televisions are being replaced by remote color televisions, as well as the nurses station being equipped to monitor patients in their rooms.

Mr. Payne said the County Commissioners were by and toured the hospital. All were very pleased at the present improvements. Mr. Payne feels that they have 100% support from the county residents and their officials.

Commissioners Meet, Approve Bid, Plan Visit To Jail, Hospital

County Commissioners met Tuesday morning at 9:30 A.M. for their monthly meeting. Appearing with business before the council were, Dora Hounshell, county treasuer, Burl Walker, jailer, Albert Lovell, Tax Apprasier, and three Eula

First on the agenda was a motion to sign a 3 year lease contract with Zerox instead of a 2 year. This would save the county approximately '14 a month. Darlene Walker told the commissioners the work by the machine saves the county even much more than the 14.

County treasurer, Dora Hounshell discussed the county finances with the commissioners, and presented a letter she had received from the Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department, thanking the County for the '3,000 donation they had received for updating fire equipment.

Burl Walker, county jailer, ask the

commissioners to approve a bid made by a local firm to replace 4 windows in the jail. This was approved by the court.

Three Eula residents appeared before the court requesting county maintaince on a private road that they would deed over to the County. Members of the court agreed to look at the proposed road and the commissioners could make a ruling at the next meeting.

Albert Lovell proposed an opitional homestead exemption that would be benefical to homeowners, but would mean ranchers, farmers and utility companies would have to pay a little more. This was accepted by the commissioners.

The commissioners agreed also that they would tour the jail and hospital to view the improvements of both facil-

The next scheduled commissioners meeting will be Nov. 8th at 9:30 A.M.





Strike Ends---Toilet Bowl To Be Played In Baird

Agreement was finally reached late in the week between all players and management in the upcoming Baird Booster Club Football Classic to be held this coming Saturday night at Bear Stadium. There had been a considerable amount of concern caused by the NFL strike, but all players agreed to participate in the gridiron classic.

The two division champions of their respective leagues; the BEARLYS and the NEARLYS, are executing with the perfection that is normally found only in the Cowboys and Oilers training camps. If Mondays final scrimmage was any indication of the intensity in the upcoming game, all area fans are in store for an old time barn burner.





4-H Scholarship Highlights Agriculture Briefs

STEER EVALUATION **PROGRAM**

A special Steer Production and Evaluation Symposium is planned for May 20-21, 1983, at Texas A&M University. The symposium will be conducted for 4-H and FFA youth with steer projects, for beef cattle breeders and feeders, and for those involved with beef cattle breed associations or steer shows. A unique feature of the symposium will be a display of two groups of steers-one fed and managed as "show" steers and the other fed and managed as "feedlot" steers, says an associate professor of animal science at Texas A&M. The event dfwill be in the new Animal Pavilion on the university's west campus.

Brazos Bermudagrass To Be Released

Brazos, a new bermudagrass hybrid that tops Coastal in performance, will be released through the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station's Foundation Seed Service at Texas A&M University in early 1983. Brazos has a higher level of digest-

ibility and has produced The challenge now is to better weight gains in cattle than Coastal bermuda, says a forage scientist with the Experiment Station. To qualify for sprigs of the new grass, individuals must have their land free of other bermudagrasses and must have passed inspection by Texas Department of Agriculture officials to protect the new Brazos variety from contamination.

National Forest Products Weeks

To recognize the usefulness of forests and forest products, President Reagan has declared the week of Oct. 17-23 as National Forest Products Week. Texas boasts some 23 million acres of forest, about half of which are considered commercial forest land which is capable of providing a continuous income for timber growers. Private individuals own more than 60 percent of Texas' timberland. The timber industry has taken steps to improve harvest operations and to reduce waste in manufacturing plants, says a forestry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.
