## ACC Rodeo Club To Stage Show At Baird Saturday, Nov. 29th

The Abilene Christian College Rodeo Club is sponsoring an amateur rodeo at Baird Saturday Nov. 29.

The club, affiliated with the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Assn., has contracted for the use of the Callahan County Sheriff Posse rodeo arena.

The show will open with a parade in Baird at 1 p. m. Saturday and the first performance will begin at 2 p. m. The second and final performance will begin at 7:30 Saturday night.

Events will include bareback, bronc and bull riding, tie-down and ribbon calf roping, goat sacking, wildmare race, bulldogging, and barrel races for girls.

Entries may be mailed to ACC Rodeo Club, 3317 South 4th St., Abilene, or to Jack Hankins, Box 651, ACC Station, Abilene, Texas. The entry fee in calf roping is \$12 and in barrel racing \$10.

The riding events have already closed, with 23 entries in bareback bronc riding and 17 in bull riding.

Entries in the other events are still open. Six teams had entered the goat sacking event and 10 teams had entered the wild mare race.

Stock for the rodeo will be furnished by McHood and Smitty. Ken Simmons is to serve as announcer.

Champions will receive belt buckles, plaques or trophy cups, according to Bobby Gillis, Austin freshman, club president.

Other officers of the club are Jerce Rowland, vice president; Mona Wilbeck, secretary; Sarah Jones, treasurer; and A. G. Murphy, publicity director.

All net profits from the show will go into a fund for the purpose of building a rodeo arena at the college, Gillis said.

Baird stopped Early's first drive on the Bear 20 on a recovered fumble but was forced to kick on fourth down.

Guard Robert Sunga's punt went into play on the Longhorn 36.

A five yard penalty moved the ball back to the Early 31.

Left halfback Larry Palmer brought the sellout crowd to its feet when he tore off the 69 yards in great big chunks to set what Longhorn fans expected to be the night's pattern.

A pass for the points failed.

Early fans, who had seen only two teams score on the 8-B Longhorns during the regular season, were disappointed for the next two quarters.

Baird, forced to punt each time it got the ball, either stopped Early by sharp defensive play by quarterback Terry Joy or and Gary Gilliland or managed it by the recovered fumble route. The Bears gobbled up four Longhorn fumbles.

Suniga kicked to the Early 45 to get the final period underway.

Three plays later Reed flipped the ball to receiver in the right flat.

The tall, rangy Gilliland scooped up the ball and bowled his way to paydirt to tie the score, 6-6.

The attempt for extra points left the score unmarred with 9:20 left in the game.

Taking the Baird kick, the Longhorns drove 73 yards in 12 plays to go ahead 12-6. Right halfback Tommy Blackwell and fullback J. B. Forrest did the Lion's share of ground gaining on the drive.

The Bears roared right back. The return by Odell plus a 15 yard clipping penalty gave the Bears the ball after the kickoff on the Longhorn 43.

A 22 yard pass from Joy to fullback Ross Odell was the key play. Odell scored from the 10 on the next play.

Two minutes and 40 seconds remained on the scoreboard after Reed tackled Odell on the try for the two points.

Then the costly miscue on the kick and the Longhorn march to the victory TD.

Early's Blackwell, who contributed 62 yards on 15 carries for the night, went the final 29 yards.

Palmer was the big gun in the Longhorn attack with 133 yards on 18 carries with Forrest adding 82, also on 18 carries.

Gilliland's pass receiving, the interception and his defensive work left a warm feeling in the hearts of the Baird fans.

Odell and Joy also did yeoman's jobs with Odell carrying nine times for 33 yards and Joy seven for 15.

Suniga's kicking, including two quick kicks and one blocked punt, was good for a 32.5 average on nine boots.

## Early Longhorns Defeat Baird In Bi-District Tilt Friday Night

Early Longhorns drove across the winning touchdown with 11 seconds remaining on the clock for an 18-12 win over the Baird Bears Friday night. The bi-district game was played at Cross Plains before a sellout crowd.

Baird was stalemated until the big fourth quarter when a 45 yard return of an intercepted pass and their only sustained drive of the night chalked up 12 points.

A miscue of an attempted on-side kick was instrumental in putting the rugged Longhorns on the track to the winning touchdown.

The Longhorns got the ball on the Baird 43 when tackle Bobby Curtis barely knocked the ball off the kicking tee on the kickoff after the second Bear touchdown.

The rugged Early defense held the Baird lads to only three first downs, all coming in the final period and a total of 104 yards on the ground.

A stable of fast backs coupled with good, clean blocking in the line were just too much for the heavier Bear line.

The Bears were able on three occasions to keep the door shut when the Longhorns knocked, but let fleet halfback Tommy Blackwell slip through for 29 yards and the winning score.

Nearly every week in the year has been marked off by someone to celebrate something, sensible or outlandish. But, mark down November 16th to 22nd as a week deserving your special attention. If you don't see your doctor during this time—set aside by the American Diabetes Association as Diabetes Week—you owe yourself a check-up soon.

Untreated diabetes can lead to early aging and premature death, and half the people who have diabetes don't know it. Early symptoms include excessive appetite, along with loss of weight, or strength, or both, constant thirst and frequent urination. Many of us are so frightened of finding out something is "wrong" with us, that we put off having the simple medical tests that can actually save our lives.

Today, there is more hope and less reason to fear than ever before. On the eve of Diabetes Week this year, a new drug became available to treat hundreds of thousands of diabetics previously dependent on as many as four daily insulin injections, rigid diet, or both. Called Diabinese, the new drug is taken by mouth it is the most potent oral treatment for diabetes science has found.

Since the discovery of insulin in 1922, diabetics have lived long useful, active lives. Mayor Fiorello LaGuardie, New York's "Little Flower" had a colorful, busy career — as did the great French statesman, Clemenceau, Thomas A. Edison, the inventor; H. G. Wells, the historian; Puccini, the composer; and Cezanne, the artist—all of whom were diabetics. In sports, there are diabetic big-leaguers—Billy Talbert, the former tennis champion and now U. S. Davis Cup captain is just one of them.

Unfortunately, insulin can never be taken by mouth—digestive juices destroy it. The new oral drug, Diabinese, promises freedom from insulin objections to more than 4 out of 5 diabetics. Some people, of course, will have to go on taking insulin injections. But, the new drug succeeds in many cases where all earlier oral treatment has failed.

For those who learn of their diabetes early, the out-look is indeed bright. The important thing is to take your symptoms to your doctor.

## EDMUND WEBB HAS HISTORIC LETTERS

Edmund Webb was in Baird last Friday displaying some interesting letters exchanged between his grandparents 108 years ago. One interesting fact was that these letters were mailed before postage stamps were in general use in the United States.

Letters did not require envelopes in those days, either. The paper on which letter was written was merely folded and then sealed with sealing wax, addressed, and had 5c written in the corner, designating that was the fee charged by the government for carrying the letter. In the upper left hand corner was the round imprint of a hand stamp, carrying name of town in which it was mailed.

Mr. Webb's grandfather, Col. B. R. Webb, was the first Secretary of State for Mississippi in 1860. The letters he wrote his wife, who was a second cousin of the governor of Mississippi, were carried 200 miles, in three stages, first by train to a point on the river where they were picked up by steamboat, then finally making an overland trip by stage to their country home.

## Good Study Lamps And Homework

Every home needs well lighted, cheerful places to study and read. A good desk lamp properly placed goes far in preventing eye strain and reducing fatigue, according to extension home furnishings specialists.

A table lamp, wall model, or even a pair of wall lamps can do the job. The important thing is be sure the lamp is equipped with a glass or plastic reflector bowl under the shade, or with a wide harp to accommodate an indirect type bulb. Both these types of under-shade construction give a combination of upward and downward light that reduces the eye-irritating difference in brightness between the desk top and the rest of the room.

Height of the lamp from the desk is very important, too. A lamp that is too short gives such a small spread of light that part of the desk is virtually dark. A lamp that is too tall places the bottom of the shade above eye level with a resulting brightness that is uncomfortable. Most people find that a height of 15 inches between desk top and bottom of the lamp shade is most satisfactory.

Third important factor is placement of the lamp on the desk. It should be placed on the side of the desk opposite the writing hand. If twin lamps are used, such as two small lamps, mount them with the center of the shades about 30 inches apart.

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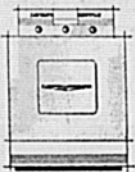

## Quail Season Opens Dec. 1st

Two more shooting seasons on important species will open Dec. 1, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission. Of widest importance will be the opening of quail season, with a bountiful crop is reported throughout the state. The deer season west of the Pecos also will open at that time. Shooting of quail will be legal until Jan. 1, but trans-Pecos deer season will end Dec. 8.

All dove shooting in Texas now is over for the year. Any further killing of doves is illegal.

The season also is open now on all species of geese. It is now legal to kill Canadas and white-fronted geese. He warns, however, no more than two of either of the Canadas or spees, or one of each, may be legally killed.

## IT'S THE LAW In Texas . . .

### "RIGHT OF WAY" RULES EXPLAINED

Possibly the most mystifying of all traffic rules to the average driver are those relating to "Right of Way" at an intersection. In reality, however, these rules are quite simple.

In trying to understand the laws regulating intersecting traffic, it is best to start off with the premise that all streets are of equal dignity, legally speaking. Traffic signs and signals may vary this rule somewhat, but when in doubt it is safest to assume that all drivers crossing your path have a claim to the right of way equal to your own.

Obviously, however, in many cases one driver or the other will be legally entitled to the right of way. When it becomes necessary to determine right of way in a particular situation, the driver who reaches the intersection first, or who is going to get there first, is ordinarily favored.

But when two automobiles are an equal distance from the intersection, that one approaching

**POLIO STILL POWERFUL**

The widespread epidemic recently raging in Detroit served notice to a startled nation that polio has lost none of its powerful impact. The disease still strikes unpredictably and with savage force. It finds its victims among the unvaccinated.

In Michigan, during a brief few September weeks, large numbers of children and adults were stricken with polio. More than 500 cases were concentrated in the city of Detroit. There were 16 deaths.

The epidemic first hit the low income areas. Then it spread out, following its own shapeless pattern, striking without warning, hitting people of all ages. Pre-school-age children and young adults were the principal victims. Fully half the cases were paralytic.

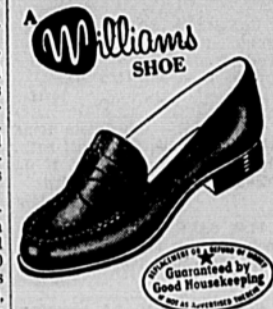
Emergency vaccination centers were opened by the Health Department when the National Foundation sent in 100,000 doses of vaccine to make shots available for people of all ages, and also provided needles, supplies and volunteers to staff the clinics, help parents with their children and distribute factual information to families and the entire community. People were frightened. There was a veritable stampede for Salk shots. Families, including babies and teenagers, as well as mothers and fathers, turned out by the thousands to get protected against paralytic polio before it was too late.

Surely there is a sober lesson to be learned here.

People have been smug. They are gratefully aware that polio incidences has been relatively low. They know there is a vaccine to prevent paralytic attack. But too many seem to forget that vaccine on the druggists' shelves cannot prevent anything.

To be effective in stopping paralytic polio, vaccine must be used. Three shots properly spaced out as the doctor directs, have the power to prevent polio's paralytic attack. Get them for yourself and your family while there's still time. Don't

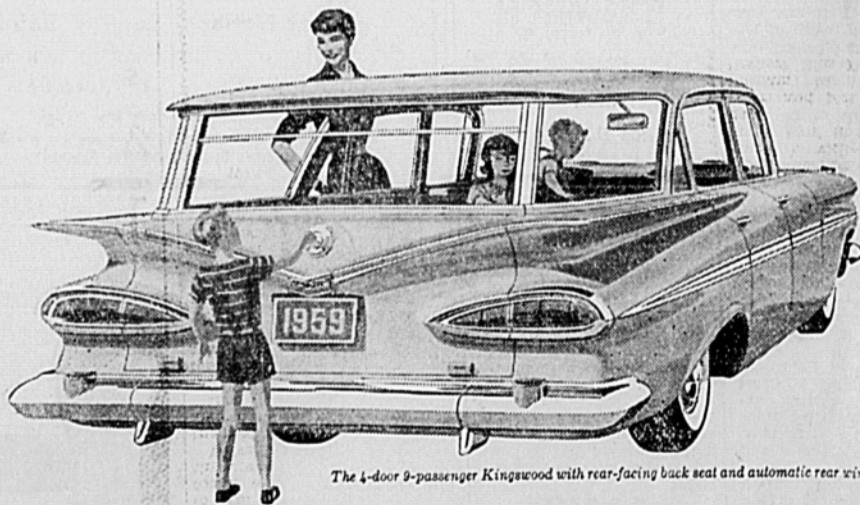
