Clyde Man Loses Business To Fire November 6

An automotive shop owner, who had been in business a little over one year, in Clyde, lost everything he had just after lunch Wednesday, November 6, along with his customers vehicles and the building he rented.

Wes' Automotive Repair, located at 609 South First Street in Clyde, looked to be a total loss after the fire which started about 1:30 p.m. Wes Morris said he had "pulled the gasoline tank" off a pickup and was testing the electric fuel pump when something sparked setting the gas tank on fire. Wes said he emptied a five pound fire extinguisher on the fire but it failed to knock it (the fire) down. He and his two employees, Tim Sybert of Baird and Pop Morris, then exited the building for safety. All three men were checked by Citizens EMS personnel but refused further treatment, according to Paramedic Dianne Hayes.

The Clyde Headstart, a preschool facility, is right next door and the 3 Teachers, 1 cook, and 17 students were evacuated safely. Kathy Hambrick, one of the teachers, said most of the children were out on the playground on the opposite site from the auto shop at the time of the fire and parents had picked up all the students by about 2:30 p.m. The Headstart building did not suffer any noticeable damage during the blaze even though it is just about 15 foot from the gutted mechanics shop.

Clyde Fire Department responded to the call at

about 1:35 p.m. and called for backup from Baird at 2:00 p.m. Clyde Fire Chief Rick Gilmore said the building was fully involved when his units arrived and they battled the blaze to keep it from spreading to other structures. Clyde Fire Department used foam equipment to knock the blaze down due to all the gasoline on the cement shop floor from ruptured fuel tanks on vehicles inside. Gilmore said they had seven firemen and four trucks at the scene and added he wanted to thank Baird for their assistance. Baird Fire Department Assistant Chief Russell Robbins said his department responded to the call with one truck and six firemen. Firemen finished up at the scene and opened up South First Street about 3:30 p.m.

Wes said the pickup he was working on belonged to Cargile Plumbing and held all of Cargile's tools and equipment, which were totally destroyed along with three other vehicles belonging to customers. All of Wes' tools and equipment looked to be ruined including his records and receipts for the business. The structural steel in the metal building suffered severe damage due to the intense heat causing large beams to sag. Wes said he had no insurance and estimated losses at over \$100 thousand dollars not counting the building is owned by a Clyde man. When asked what he would do he said he didn't know.

A fund has been set up at the People's State Bank in Clyde for Morris. Bank

November Starts With Local Emergency Personnel Busy

BAIRD-November started with a rash of accidents that has kept area emergency personnel running.

A one vehicle crash at the F.M. 880 overpass on IH-20 East of Putnam on the 1st of this month started what seemed like an almost unending string of calls for emergency personnel. The F.M. 880 accident took the life of a young mother and her four year old son. "First Flight" helicopter transported two of the victims because of the severity of injuries. A five year old passenger in the pickup survived. Baird Rescue and Citizens E.M.S. extracted the victims from the vehicle and gave primary care to the patients.

Saturday morning a Dallas man wrecked the U-Haul truck he was driving when he struck the guardrail on the Union Hill overpass on IH-20 between Baird and Clyde. He was not injured although the truck was rendered undrivable. Baird rescue responded to the call.

Sunday afternoon a young driver lost control of the small vehicle she was driving sliding sideways into a tree. Clyde & Eula Rescue personnel worked for about two hours to free the driver from the twisted wreckage. "First Flight" transported her to the hospital and Citizens E.M.S. carried the passenger.

Monday morning Baird Rescue and Cross Plains E.M.S.

were called to a wreck 1 mile East of Hwy 283 on Hwy 36. One patient was transported to the hospital by "First Flight" and one by Cross Plains ambulance.

Monday afternoon Baird and Eula Rescue personnel assisted two Citizens E.M.S. ambulances with treatment of five victims, all from Rising Star, of a one car rollover West of Hwy 283 on Hwy 36. One sixteen year old girl in this accident was almost 9 months pregnant.

Wednesday brought disaster to a Clyde man when his business, Wes' Automotive, was totally destroyed in a fire. Baird Fire Department assisted Clyde Fire Department tap out the afternoon blaze.

Wednesday evening brought another fatal car crash just East of Putnam. Three vehicles were involved in the wreck that killed two young children and sent 8 people to the Hospital. Baird Rescue, Citizens E.M.S., Cisco E.M.S., Eastland E.M.S., and First Flight helicopter were all used at the scene and transporting patients.

All of the Callahan County's Law enforcement agencies and the Texas Department of Transportation have responded to all or some of these incidents also.

Three Vehicle Accident Takes The Lives Of Two Children

Eight people required a trip to the hospital and two children were fatally injured in a three vehicle accident on rain slickened Interstate 20 just east of Putnam Wednesday evening about 7:00 p.m.

Six people were traveling east on IH-20 in a 1983 Chevrolet Station Wagon when they had car trouble just east of Putnam and turned around trying to make back to the small community for assistance. Due to the vehicle not running right they were traveling slow in the west bound lane at about the 320 mile marker when a truck tractor overtook them suddenly. According to DPS Trooper Bill Russell the driver of the 1996 International swerved to avoid hitting the station wagon missing them with all but the trailer tires which struck the car on the left rear of the vehicle. A DPS report said the Chevrolet then spun through the center median into the east bound lane. The car was then struck again in the rear by an eastbound 1991 Lexus knocking it back into the median. All the occupants of the Station Wagon were ejected and according to a DPS report none were wearing seatbelts.

Dorothy Terrell, 30, and Willie Mumpfield, both from Arizona, were flown to Hendrick Hospital by "First Flight" helicopter. Ray Andrus, 33, and Jimmy Wallace, 25, of Baylis, Illinois, were taken to Hendrick by Cisco EMS Ambulance. Andrus, Terrell's cousin, was admitted to Hen-

dricks while Wallace, the driver of the Chevrolet, was treated and released. The other two occupants of the station wagon, Nick and Anthony Fry, 10 and 11 year old sons of Dorothy Terrell were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Don Burns. Arrangements were still pending with Parker Funeral Home of Baird. Mumpfield is still listed in critical condition in Hendricks Critical Care Unit. Terrell and Andrus are in stable condition according to a Hendrick spokesperson Tuesday.

There were four occupants in the 1991 Lexus that was eastbound when it struck the first car and all were transported to Hendrick Hospital by two ambulances from Citizens EMS. All were treated and released except Nancy Groce of Abilene who was admitted for treatment of a broken back and was released Monday. All occupants in the Lexus were wearing seatbelts according to a DPS report.

The driver of the 18 wheeler was not physically injured in the accident, said Trooper Russell.

Both lanes of IH-20 were blocked for about three and one half hours to allow for emergency personnel to work in safety at the scene of the accident. East bound traffic was routed off at the Putnam exit to the service road and westbound traffic was detoured at the 880 north exit to the service road. A heavy thunderstorm, that moved into the area at about 9 p.m., made investigation of the accident that much more difficult

for law officers.

Baird Fire Department personnel assisted with Medical Treatment at the scene and Callahan County Sheriff's Department and Texas Department of Transportation handled traffic control.

AUSTIN — House Appropriations Committee Chairman Rob Junell, D-San Angelo, said he will co-sponsor legislation to reduce school property taxes, which account for about 60 percent of Texas homeowners' tax bills.

"I want to help solve the problem. I have told the governor that I want to be part of putting something together," Junell told the *Austin American-Statesman* last week.

Finding ways to relieve the property tax burden on Texas homeowners is a legislative priority set by Republican Gov. George W. Bush, and Junell is the first ranking Democrat to openly back property tax reform.

After Junell's speech, Sen. Bill Ratliff, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, said the "chances of property tax relief are improving."

Texas public schools rely on about \$10 billion in school property taxes. According to the *American-Statesman*, Junell would cap school property taxes between 50 cents and 75 cents per \$100 valuation, then calculate the amount local jurisdictions would lose under the formula. A mix of sales, franchise and other business taxes would make up for the lost revenue.

Meanwhile, Sen. David Sibley, chairman of the Senate Economic Development Committee, said he

will introduce legislation in 1997 to ban future property tax breaks to businesses.

"Our children's future should not be traded for new jobs now. Schools struggling to meet their budgets should not be forced to forgo tax revenue that could be spent on supplies, teacher salaries and other needs," Sibley, R-Waco said.

Sibley's committee reports that 186 of the state's 1,043 school districts have given tax exemptions to companies since 1985.

PUC Studies Utility Debt
Texas' electric utilities would be saddled with \$14 billion in costs that they might not recover if their industry becomes deregulated in 1998, the *American-Statesman* reported last week.

Much of those "stranded costs" are debt owed on nuclear power plants, according to a report released by the Texas Public Utility Commission.

Utilities that distribute electricity generated in nuclear power plants say they would be unable to pay their bills if they began losing customers to competitors who generate power more cheaply.

How companies could recoup stranded costs is a question to be tackled by the state Legislature, which convenes in January. The PUC, which has the authority to approve or disapprove fee changes, is developing recommendations.

If no competition is allowed, ratepayers will continue to pay all stranded costs through their current rates, the *American-Statesman* reported.

Travel Records Subpoenaed
A federal grand jury last week issued a subpoena for the state travel records of Texas Lottery Commission employees who traveled to Georgia on business in July.

An Atlanta firm has a contract to print the Texas lottery's scratch-off games. The trips in question would have coincided with the Atlanta Olympic Games.

The subpoena was one of at least two served for lottery commission records at the request of U.S. Attorney William Blagg of San Antonio, the *Dallas Morning News* reported.

The subpoena was served on the state comptroller's office, which reimburses state employees for business expenses.

The comptroller's office was ordered to either deliver the travel records to the grand jury room at the federal courthouse in Austin Nov. 19 or turn them over to an FBI agent, the *Morning News* reported.

School Fund Deposit Grows
More than \$155.1 million was deposited in the Permanent School Fund — the largest amount to be deposited in five years — during the 1995-96 fiscal year, the Texas General Land Office reported.

Deposits to the fund, which help finance public education in Texas, depend largely on oil and gas market prices, which have increased and stabilized in recent months, the land office reported.

"This increased interest in state leasing is part of an overall comeback for oil and gas activity in Texas and the Gulf of Mexico," Land Commissioner Garry Mauro said.

Diabetes Causes Concern
One in every 15 Texans has been diagnosed with diabetes, according to statistics released last week, and the report shows the disorder is most prevalent in minorities.

The Texas Diabetes Council and the state comptroller's office released figures showing that 11.4 percent of African Americans and 9.3 percent of Hispanics have been diagnosed with diabetes, while 5.8 percent of whites have been diagnosed.

State Comptroller John Sharp said the 865,000 known diabetes cases may be only half of the actual number of cases, because many people don't know that they have it.

Sharp expressed concern about the disabling complications of diabetes that can rob Texans of their productivity and cost more than \$1 billion a year in lost wages.

CAN A BUSINESS GROW TOO FAST?
Most businesses hope to grow. They consider themselves successful if growth is taking place, and the faster the growth the better. Can too much business growth be bad for a company? It can be if the company grows too rapidly without adequate planning.
For example, a company that doubles its volume every year for three or four years may find itself strapped for cash, for working space, and for trained personnel.
In most companies, a 12% to 15% annual growth rate would probably be manageable. The ideal growth rate for your company depends on the unique circumstances in your firm and industry.
A new company (starting with zero sales) must obviously grow more rapidly than an established one. Some new businesses may double their sales each year for the first five years before reaching the level where a 15% annual rate is healthy.
Rapid growth may require more inventory and more space. Who will fund the growth? A 15% growth can probably be funded by retained earnings. A more rapid growth may require an injection of cash. 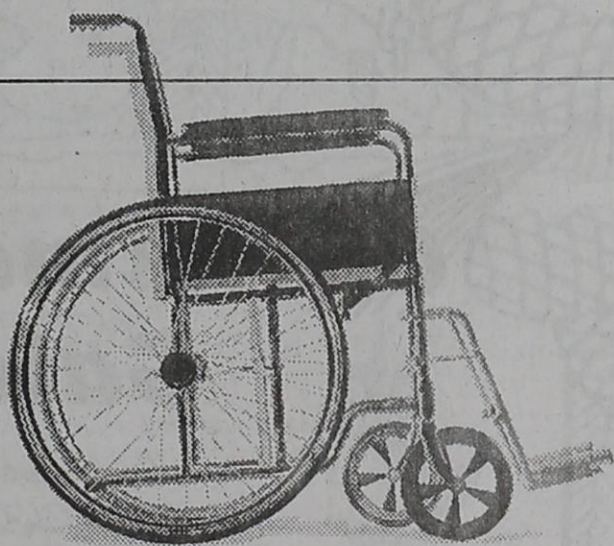

to Gov. George W. Bush last week. And there were no surprises: Texans want relief from high property taxes. According to the *Austin American-Statesman*, which published an article on the findings before they were officially released, the report said, "From the public testimony received, it is clear that high property taxes in Texas are having an effect on the economy and are placing a substantial burden on homeownership." Rep. Tom Craddick, R-Midland, chairman of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, said, "The report gives credence to

the governor's belief that property taxes are too high and are hampering growth and job creation." Still unsolved is the riddle of how to replace the \$11 billion in property taxes that Texas' public schools collect each year. A mix of new sales and business taxes has been discussed. The issue will take top priority when the state Legislature convenes in January. **Poll Studies Gun Law Effects** Some Texans aren't behaving the same since the state's concealed handgun law went into effect on Jan. 1. One out of four surveyed in

the latest Harte-Hanks Texas Poll said they now approach others differently, whether on foot or in a car. But 71 percent said they are not concerned about those who lawfully carry a handgun. State Sen. Jerry Patterson, an author of the right-to-carry law, said the fact that 71 percent of the respondents are not concerned is a "fairly substantial endorsement of the law." "They haven't swallowed the anti-gun contention that there will be a bloodbath, which there hasn't been," he told the *Dallas Morning News*.

Nina Butts, president of the Austin-based Texans Against Gun Violence, said, "It doesn't surprise me a quarter of the people out there would feel different in public now because of the law." Robert Montserrat, general counsel of the Texas State Rifle Association, said, "Those who have changed their behavior are probably more polite and there's nothing wrong with that. There's a saying that an armed society is a polite society."

Conducted Oct. 7-13 by the office of Survey Research of the University of Texas, the poll, which has a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percent, was answered by 1,001 Texans.

Voter Turnout Concerns Garza

A "pathetic" 53.18 percent of Texas' registered voters went to the polls on Nov. 5, Secretary of State Tony Garza reported.

The turnout calculated by Garza, the state's chief elections officer, would have been higher if not for a change in federal law. The change required Texas to count as registered voters about 1 million "suspense voters," people who have moved and in past elections would have been purged from the rolls.

Without the suspense voters, the Nov. 5 turnout would have been 58.7 percent — still lower than any statewide election since 1970.

Garza says this year's lackluster performance boils down to people not realizing the importance of government in their lives.

"Unfortunately, our approach to getting out the vote is very similar to Nike's approach to selling sneakers: We're saying, 'just do it.' When you ask people to vote...people ask why."

"I'm not blaming the voters," Garza added. "It's our fault if we don't get the message to voters."

Phone Protections Sought Consumer advocates want the Texas Public Utility Commission to amend its rules so Texans with outstanding long-distance telephone bills cannot be cut off from local and emergency calling services. State Public Utility Counsel Suzi Ray McClellan said, "The practice of disconnecting local service for nonpayment of long distance is outdated. The PUC should stand up for consumers and stop this practice."

McClellan, the Center for Economic Justice, and the Consumers Union asked the PUC to separate local and long distance bills.

Under current PUC rules, bills for long distance and local services are linked so nonpayment on either can result in disconnection.

Smart Jobs Fund Grant

The Texas Department of Commerce has awarded a Smart Jobs Fund grant to General Cable Corporation of Bonham. The company will receive \$199,458 in worker training funds to train 107 new employees.

The grant will help General Cable train new machine operators, shipping clerks, a quality control technician, a process improvement coordinator and a production supervisor.

General Cable manufactures communications cable for telephone companies. The firm's major customers include U.S. West and Ameritex as well as many independent companies. The firm also exports its products to foreign countries.

The Smart Jobs program is employer-driven and helps Texas businesses train their workforce for the kinds of jobs that lead to opportunities for advancement.

In the first year of the 1996-97 biennium, 88 grants were approved to train more than 22,000 workers.

Democratic ballot was the norm. No longer apparently. Over time, candidates are coming forth at all levels. Down to the County Commissioners, constables and J.P.s.

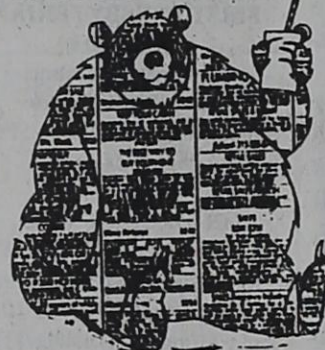
