 "When in the course of human events..." it began, and then the resolution continued, "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with

certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

As we celebrate the 221st anniversary of the endorsement of that document by the 13 United States of America, it's almost impossible to recognize how radical those words really were. So radical that the signers of the Declaration of Independence felt compelled to put their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor on the line to conclude the document. In ways we can barely imagine, those forefathers understood that freedom does not come free of charge.

Today it is both a wonderful and a dangerous thing that we take our liberties for granted. Wonderful because it is a result of the remarkable peace and prosperity our Nation has enjoyed for so long. Dangerous because a cavalier attitude towards freedom bodes ill for its protection in the future.

My grandparents came to this country from Sweden. They knew that the United States offered something denied them in the Old World. It offered room to dream and the opportunity to realize whatever you dreamed. They knew that America meant hard work and struggle. But they also knew that it was a place where hope was possible, where aspirations were rewarded. It was, to be sure, a place with faults, but also, a place to be free.

On July 4th, over half a million people gather in Washington, D.C. between the U.S. Capitol and the Lincoln Memorial to hear patriotic music, picnic with their families, and watch a grand display of fireworks. With the majestic monuments as back-drops, it is a truly impressive sight.

But every bit as impressive are the thousands of parades and picnics that take place all over the Country, indeed throughout the 17th District of Texas. It is there that neighbors gather and youth ride horses down main street and children wave their flags, all making colorful tapestry of American life.

Our communities are filled with the police officer, the teacher, the business owner, the farmer, the factory worker, the housewife -- all who have an opportunity to live as patriots, honoring the values and freedoms which undergird our Nation.

Even though we're not in a time of war or economic depression or other serious external danger, all Americans have a responsibility to protect the freedoms we enjoy. We must be vigilant not just against threats from outside, but from within. We must fight our own cynicism, our own shortsightedness, our own intolerance, our own selfishness. The great privileges we enjoy cannot be maintained passively and without effort. We must honor -- in our hearts, in our minds, and in our actions -- what our Country means and stands for.

As the signers of the Declaration of Independence concluded, we too, should place "a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence" and pledge a commitment to carrying forward these freedoms and values which make America the land we love.

marketing committee is to raise \$10,000 through a community-wide effort. All funds collected will be used exclusively for advertising and promotion. As of this week \$5,935 has been pledged from thirty-two businesses and organizations.

Each participant receives an outline of the marketing plan/budget and is encouraged to give their suggestions on prioritizing the plan and additional ideas for the committee to consider.

Cities around Texas are working to improve their flow and reduce emissions to comply with federal mandates in urban areas, Sharp said, noting that air pollution has been linked with respiratory problems and premature deaths. The number of cars and trucks on the road has a direct impact on air quality.

"Dallas is increasing its HOV lanes and also has a new electric light rail service that has about 30,000 passengers each week day.

"San Antonio was the first Texas city to use road sensors, video cameras, and warning signals that move traffic much more efficiently."

Transit authorities in Corpus Christi, Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, and Austin all operate rideshare programs, Sharp said, including vanpool and carpool services with riders paying a monthly fee and drivers participating for free.

"Today's rideshare programs even come with a guaranteed ride home in case commuters have to work late or leave early to respond to emergency situations," Sharp said.

When it comes to bus travel, Houston leads the state with nearly 7 million monthly passengers. San Antonio and Dallas report about 3.6 million monthly rides, while Austin provides 2.8 million monthly rides. Bus ridership has declined in recent years, but other transportation options like HOV lanes and vanpools are increasing.

Callahan County Extension Report

The final date to report 1997 spring seeded crops, such as cotton, grain sorghum, peanuts, hay, native and improved grasses, fruits and vegetables, is July 15. Although acreage reports are voluntary for AMTA, timely acreage reporting is required for other USDA programs. To remain eligible for price support loans, NAP, CRP, and CAT, producers MUST submit timely certifications of all crops.

For peanuts, producers will need to provide seed receipts (with lot numbers), copies of cash leases, and planting dates by type of peanuts.

MAJOR CHANGES TO CATASTROPHIC CROP INSURANCE FOR 1998

FSA will no longer carry catastrophic crop insurance as they have in the past years. The private insurance sec-

tor will take over the catastrophic crop insurance.

Those current catastrophic policies will be transferred to private crop insurance providers for 1998. Current (FSAO 1997) policies remain effective for this crop this year only.

Once producers receive their notification of their new providers, options are given to transfer to another provider or cancel or upgrade at the producer's discretion. Small grain producers must make changes by September 30, 1997 if a change is in their best interest.

Producers with FSA catastrophic policies are urged to submit their small grain production totals for history and coverage levels for future crop years. Please make sure the

Texas cities use greater efforts to reduce traffic

(AUSTIN)-- State Comptroller John Sharp says Texas cities are now pursuing a variety of new programs to reduce the number of vehicles on roads and highways, which will help reduce air pollution and keep Texas cities and towns in compliance with federal mandates for urban air pollution.

"The typical urban commuter in Texas spends an average of a 40-hour work week or longer stalled in traffic each year," Sharp said. "Not only is this lost time for commuters, but when you factor in the wasted time and fuel costs, the average Texas motorist has to spend hundreds more dollars a year just to get to work.

"Today, many people are concerned about their quality of life," Sharp continued. "If you live in an urban area, the length of time it takes to drive to work is a quality-of-life issue.

"Even if you don't live in an urban area, when you get caught in traffic in town, it becomes an issue for you, too. I don't know many people who enjoy the frustration of being caught in traffic any longer than necessary," Sharp said.

Commenting in the latest issue of his award-winning monthly publication, Fiscal Notes, Sharp pointed out that some Texans who have traditionally been reluctant to give up solo driving

may now be more open to trying new ways of getting to work. About 30 percent of commuters who live in urban areas have joined carpools or vanpools, or have switched to buses, trains, and other public transportation, the Comptroller said.

Cities are also improving traffic flow with high-occupancy vehicle (HOV) lanes, light rail systems, road sensors, and video cameras, Sharp said.

"Between 1986 and 2000, road traffic will increase by 50 percent, but there is only going to be a 6 percent increase in new roads. This will affect the state's economic growth, air quality, and quality of life," Sharp



First Methodist Church will be having there Vacation Bible School July 7th to 10th 6 to 8:30 p.m. For the children ages 4 years old to the 6th grade.

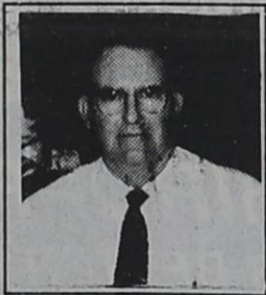

Comanche County Electric Cooperative Association (the Cooperative) proposes to change rates for electric utility service by adding a new Commercial Service Economic Development Rate for Large Power Service and changing the service fee and returned check fee to a cost based fee which is applicable to all rate classes.

No increase or decrease

in total operating revenues over actual test year revenues is expected; thus the change is \$0 or 0%.

The Cooperative proposes the creation of a new rate class entitled "Commercial Service-Economic Development" applicable in the event that the Cooperative has entered into an agreement to provide electric service at the rates provided utility may apply a rate based on marginal costs and for which customer the Cooperative may make special arrangements to secure the supply of electricity, for all of the electric service supplied at one point of delivery and measured through one meter. 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TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

ANTIQUER ROSES: THRIVING HEIRLOOMS

Antique roses will fit your garden, whether you need a climber, a shrub, a hedge or a potted plant. These hardy roses are easier to care for than the "traditional" hybrid tea roses.

Antique roses are also more hardy and disease resistant than traditional roses, but they still need at least 6 hours full sun, fresh air and well-drained soil with a pH between 5 and 8. They need some care the first year, but then grow well on their own.

Bill Welch, extension landscape horticulturist, recommends the following five practical favorites.

Polyantha class climber Cecile Brunner is easily trained up a central column and outward. Its dark green foliage makes it a nice addition to any landscape.

For a shrub, Mrs. B. R. Cant is a vigorous tea rose that will grow 6 to 8 feet high and 5 to 7 feet wide. Its silvery-pink flowers bloom more than most tea roses.

Souvenir de la Malmaison reaches only 3 to 4 feet high and equally as wide. This Bourbon class rose blooms reliably with a fragrant, pale pink flower. Bourbons are more susceptible to black spot and mildew than other antique roses, so mulch Souvenir and water it only in the morning to prevent disease.

For a container-grown rose, try Marie Pavie. It reblooms constantly with pale pink buds. Prune it carefully to keep it 2 to 4 feet tall in a 5 gallon container.

If your area is too wet for traditional roses, try the Swamp

Rose. Native to wet regions like Louisiana and Florida, it is probably the most unique of all roses. It can tolerate minimal drainage that would murder all other roses. Swamp rose blooms only in the spring, but it is an attractive shrub with a "weeping" appearance.

These antique roses are only five of the many to choose from. Contact your local nursery or garden center for ideas on other heirloom varieties.

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News And Views For The 17th District

Air Quality?

This week President Clinton endorsed new air quality standards proposed by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). I have been a consistent opponent of the implementation of these new standards for ozone and dust, not because I do not want our children to breathe the healthy air, but because the Administration's own experts do not agree on the benefits of this legislation. It is crucial that on which the standards were based would convince the President to delay or block implementation. Unfortunately, the Administration has indicated that they will impose these unnecessary cost-burdens on agriculture, industry, and small businesses without any indication that there will be a tangible health benefit in return. Implementing these strict new standards without an adequate cost-benefit analysis will only deliver another blow to the viability of rural America.

Estate Tax Relief
This week the House of Representatives considered several proposals to cut taxes. I voted against the Republican tax cut proposal which was passed by the House because it failed to target tax relief to small businesses, family farms, and working men and women. While the legislation which the House passed included some estate tax relief, that relief would be phased in over a long time period rather than being effective immediately. As anyone who has owned a family farm or small business knows, estate taxes are an area where immediate relief is needed. I attempted to change the bill to provide for immediate estate tax relief for family businesses and family farms. Unfortunately, the House leadership opposed this effort because they preferred other tax cuts that I believe are not as important as estate tax relief.

The Senate is currently considering tax cut legislation, and the differences between the House and Senate bills must be reconciled in a conference committee. I will be actively involved in the negotiation of the final tax cut legislation, and I am hopeful that it will include true estate tax relief which is of great importance to rural America and the 17th District of Texas.

DESCRIPTION OF EVENTS:

BAREBACK
Bareback riding, an event developed in the rodeo arena, is the most physically demanding in rodeo. Immense stress is placed on the arm and back, and

barback riders face more long-term injuries, such as elbow and lower back problems, than other rough-stock cowboys.

Sheer strength isn't all that's required. A bareback rider is judged on his spurring technique, the degree to which his toes remain turned away from the horse through out the ride and his exposure, or willingness to lean far back and take whatever may come during a ride. The horse's bucking action also contributes half a rider's score.

Bareback riders grasp a rigging, a handhold made of leather and rawhide that is secured to the horse with a cinch. The rigging must meet size and design specifications set by the Professional Rodeo

Cowboys Association.

Bareback riding also requires the rider to mark out his horse to place his feet above the horse's shoulder until the animal's front feet hit the ground on its first move out of the chute. Failure by the cowboy to keep his feet in place results in disqualification.

After the initial jump out of the chute, the cowboy pulls his spurs up the horse's neck and shoulders until the spurs are nearly touching the rigging. The rider then straightens his legs, again placing his feet on the horse's shoulders, in anticipation of the next jump. An eight second ride is required.

CALF ROPING
More than any other event in professional rodeo, calf roping has roots dating to the old West. When a calf was sick or injured, it had to be caught and immobilized quickly for treatment. Ranch hands prided themselves on how fast they could rope and tie calves, and soon they began informal contests.

Being quick and accurate with a lasso aren't the only requirements in calf roping. A successful roper also must be an experienced horseman and a fast sprinter.

After giving the calf a predetermined head start, the horse and rider give chase. As the

cowboy throws his loop, the horse comes to a stop.

After catching the calf, the cowboy dismounts, runs to the calf, throws it to the ground by hand (called flanking) and ties any three legs together using a pigging string he carries in his teeth. While the contestant is accomplishing all this, the horse must keep slack out of the rope, but not pull it tight enough to drag the calf.

If the calf is not standing when the roper reaches it, the cowboy must allow the calf to stand and then flank it before making the tie.

When the roper has completed his tie, he throws his hands in the air as a signal to the flag judge. He then remounts his horse and rides toward the calf, making the rope slack. The calf must remain tied for six seconds after the rope is slack or the cowboy will receive no time. The calf must weigh at least 250 pounds.

BARREL RACING
It's the only women's event in a PRCA-sanctioned rodeo. The event is a cloverleaf-pattern horse race. Three 55-gallon steel drums are placed in a triangular formation in the arena, with the rider having to circle all three barrels at top speed without knocking them down.

The rider is allowed a running start, and

she may start well outside of the arena. Since this is a timed event, it's not possible to earn extra points. However, five seconds will be added to her time if a barrel is knocked over. Touching the barrel is permitted.

As the cowgirl crosses the start line (which is the same as the finish line), she trips the electronic eye and her time begins. Also, a judge times the event with a stopwatch in case the electronic timer fails.

The rider can be disqualified for not being ready when her name is announced. She can also be disqualified for an incorrect pattern, turning around a barrel twice or crossing the finish line before she completes the pattern.

BULL RIDING
The goal of the bull rider is to stay on the bull for eight seconds. It requires balance, coordination, quick reflexes, flexibility and, perhaps above all, a positive mental attitude.

Besides the fact that the bull just doesn't like a rider on its back, it also has a braided rope around its chest from which hangs a heavy bell. The sound of this bell irritates the bull into more robust bucking action.

The braided rope has a handhold in which the rider puts his gloved hand. He then takes the rope and wraps it around his riding hand and lays it across his palm again.

When the rider is bucked off, the rope should slip off his hand, and the weight of the bell will cause the rope to fall from the bull. The bull is judged

on strength, power, speed and rhythm. The judges also look at how much the bull spins and if he jumps and kicks with the spin, and whether he jumps and kicks in a straight line or in a big circle. A bull that kicks while his body moves side-to-side increases the difficulty of the ride and gets a higher score.

ALL-AROUND
The title of the PRCA world champion all-around cowboy is the most prestigious designation in professional rodeo. The cowboy who wins the most prize money in a year in two or more events is recognized as the champion.

SADDLE BRONC
Considered rodeo's classic event, saddle bronc riding evolved from the ranch work of breaking and training horses. Many cowboys say bronc riding is the most difficult rough-stock event to master because of its technical requirements.

Spurring action must be synchronized with the horse's movements. If a rider is able to keep in time with the horse, the ride will be fluid and graceful, not wild and uncontrolled.

A saddle bronc rider's feet must touch the horse's shoulders on the first jump out of the chute. This is called a mark-out, and a contestant who fails to have his feet in place at the beginning of the ride is said to have missed his mark and is disqualified. He will receive a no score for the round.

The rider, gripping a thick rein attached to the horse's halter as his only means of securing himself to the animal, attempts to place his feet over the horse's

shoulders a split second before the animal's front feet strike the ground.

As the horse bucks, the rider bends his knees and finishes his spurring stroke with his spurs near the cantle, the back of the saddle, then snaps his feet back to the horse's shoulders as the animal's front feet hit the ground. The rider strives to keep his toes turned out during the entire ride.

A saddle bronc ride is judged on the cowboy's spurring action, his control of the horse, and the degree to which his toes are turned out. The horse's bucking efforts also contribute to the score. An eight-second ride is required.

Steer wrestling is the quickest event in rodeo and one of the most unlikely.

The objective is evident in its name: to wrestle a 600 pound steer to the ground using only leverage and strength.

The steer wrestler begins his run behind a barrier along with his hazer, a second cowboy whose task is to keep the steer from veering from the steer wrestler.

The steer is given a head start, the length of which varies depending on the size of the arena. After the steer has reached the score line and the barrier is released, the

steer wrestler and hazer chase the steer on their specially trained quarter horses until the steer wrestler is in position to dismount onto the racing steer.

The steer wrestler slides down the right side of his horse until he can reach the steer's horns. He hooks his right arm around the

steer's right horn in his left hand, then digs his heels deep in the dirt and uses leverage to bring down the steer.

All this occurs in three to five seconds, depending on the size of the arena.

The hazer is an important factor in the equation. Without him, the steer could quickly sour a run by veering from the steer wrestler. Many hazers also supply horses for the steer wrestlers. If the steer wrestler places, the hazer receives a share of the payoff. If not, both go home empty-handed.

RODEO TALK AVERAGE:

When there is more than one go-round, the average is the total time or score from all of a contestant's rounds. The average winner earns additional money and wins that event of the rodeo.

CANTLE:
The seat back of a bronc riding saddle. The rider attempts to reach the cantle at the end of a spurring stroke.

BARRIER
A line stretched across the roping box that is released when a calf or steer crosses the score line. If the contestant's horse hits the barrier before it is released, a string is broken and the contestant is assessed a 10-second penalty.

BULL ROPING
A flat braided rope that circles the bull's chest. The bull rope is the rider's only means of holding on. No cinches or buckles are allowed. It must be held in position by the bull rider's hand. The bell attached to the rope helps free the rope from the bull after a complete ride.
