The meeting was called to order by Byron Hatchett at 7:30 p.m.

Invocation was given by Allen Wilson.

Superintendent, Lacy Hogue reported enrollment at 430. He also reported that the Baird Band received a 1 (one) rating at the UIL marching contest this past Saturday at Shottwell Stadium in Abilene.

A motion was made by Allen Wilson and seconded by Tony Robinson to approve the minutes from the September 20, 1999, board meeting and the two Special Session board meetings on September 27, 1999. Vote was unanimous.

A motion was made by Terry Hunter and seconded by Butch Barron to approve accounts payable. Vote was unanimous. Abstinence-Ck# 017791 by Butch Barron.

A motion was made by Tony Robinson and seconded by Tom Windham to approve Shared Service Agreement with Taylor-Callahan Cooperative. Vote was unanimous.

### # 4 Baird Bears Dominate Santa Anna Mountainers

The Baird Bears traveled to Santa Anna Friday night for a contest with the Mountainers. The Bears entered the game ranked #4 in the Class A state rankings, and 7-0 overall and 2-0 in district play.

The Bears totally dominated this game from start to finish. In the first quarter, the Bears had a fumble recovered by Bucky Rivera that set up an 11-yd touchdown by Jack Pruet. The Bears had an interception by Todd Vestal that led to a touchdown run of 15-yd by Justin Rivera. Another fumble recovery for a TD by Bucky Rivera, and to finish the 1st quarter, Jack Pruet had a 1-yd run for a TD. Logan Russell was 2 of 4 on his PATs to make the score 26-0.

The 2nd quarter was much the same, but with longer touchdown runs. Russell returned a punt 79-yds for pay dirt, and Vestal had a 67-yd scamper for the same. Russell was 2 of 2 on his PATs to make the score 40-0 at half-time.

The 3rd quarter also produced 14 points for the Bears, with Curtis Lehw scoring on a 5-yd run and Russell again returning a punt 79-yds for a TD. The Bears had another interception by Vestal, his 2nd of the night. Russell was 2 of 2 on PATs. At the end of the 3rd quarter, it was the Bears 54-0.

The Bears scored almost at will in the 4th quarter, and added another 14 points. Jeremy Gonzales intercepted a pass, and Lehw scored on a 13-yd run. Becky Rivera added the last score of the night on a 14-yd run, and Russell was 2 of 2 on his PATs, making him 8 of 10 for the night. A fumble recovered by Ronnie

Rivers ended the only threat Santa Anna gave the Bears all night. Final score 68-0 Baird.

The Bears suffered a couple of injuries in Friday night's contest. Justin Rivera dislocated his left thumb, and Kyle Hogue suffered a hyper-extended right knee. Rivera is questionable and Hogue doubtful for this Friday night. We wish both boys a speedy recovery.

The Bears had a well-balanced game from the beginning. The offense performed well, the defense never let up, and the special team play was always just right. The younger varsity Bears saw a lot

of good playing time that will provide invaluable for next year's season. With this victory the Bears moved to 8-0 for the season, and 3-0 in district play. The Bears will host the Bronte Longhorns Friday, Oct. 29, in the Bears' Den. This will be the last home game for our outstanding group of seniors of Jeremy Gonzales, Logan Russell, Lee Harle, Justin Rivera, Ty Wilson, Dustin Watson, Junior Gomez, Jason Gomez, J.J. Carrillo, and Kyle Hogue. Come out and support these young athletes as they seek a district championship. Go Bears!

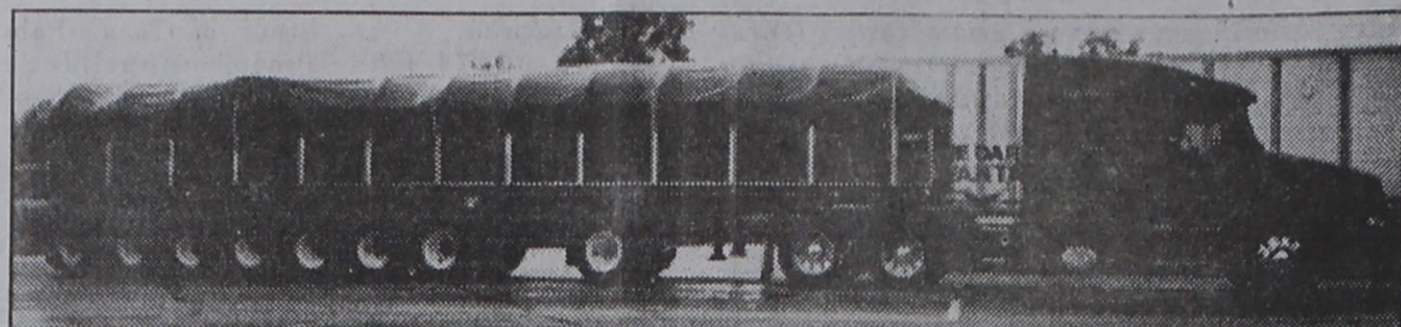

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General John Cornyn on Oct. 18 filed a lawsuit against Publishers Clearing House for violations of the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act.

The sweepstakes company made a variety of misleading representations through mail order solicitations designed to deprive money primarily from elderly recipients, the state's lawsuit alleges.

"Elder Texans need and deserve protection from those who would try to take advantage of them."

"By taking legal action, I hope to bring to an end the clearly illegal practices Publishers Clearing House has engaged in," Cornyn said.

According to the lawsuit:  
■ Publishers Clearing House developed a cycle of illegal acts designed to reinforce one another.  
■ Victims, who disproportionately are seniors, are lured into believing they will win if they respond to the solicitation in a timely manner.

■ The company implies that placing an order for advertised items may enhance their chances of winning.  
■ Those who place orders receive a barrage of solicitations claiming the victim is closer and

closer to winning and that additional orders will help cement their multi-millionaire status.

By concentrating on those customers who have spent from \$500 to \$20,000 or more each year in hopes of winning, Publishers Clearing House has taken millions of dollars from Texas consumers, the lawsuit alleges.

The lawsuit asks a state district court in Travis County for a permanent injunction requiring the company to discontinue certain marketing practices in Texas and for civil penalties to be paid to the state of up to \$10,000 per violation.

Under the terms of the injunction, Publishers Clearing House also would be required to provide restitution to consumers identified as victims.

Other states have filed similar lawsuits against Publishers Clearing House. Those include Missouri, Michigan, Wisconsin, Florida, Arizona, Connecticut, Indiana and Washington.

**Voter Registration Rises**  
Voter registration totals increased slightly between January 1999 and this month, according to updated information from county election officials.

A count of registered voters taken in anticipation of the Nov. 2 constitutional amendment election reflects a Texas voter registration count of 11,405,562. That figure represents 80 percent of the voting age population in Texas.

Voter registration in January 1999 was 10,987,639 or 77 percent of the voting age population in Texas.

**Codine Scammers Beware**  
Officials at the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse recently have alerted doctors and pharmacists about scams to obtain codine cough syrup to get high. Users with insurance or Medi-

icaid have learned which symptoms to describe to get a prescription for cough syrup.

Information on this illegal practice was cited in a study by Dr. William N. Elwood, adjunct professor at the University of Texas School of Public Health in Houston.

**More Firms Cleaning Up**  
The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission last week saluted the 200 firms that are members of "Clean Industries 2000" for progress in reducing pollution across the state.

Members agree to reduce hazardous waste generation and/or releases and transfers of toxic pollutants and contaminants to the

Texas environment by at least 50 percent by the year 2000.

Some new Clean Industries 2000 members include Exxon Co., USA Baytown Refinery; Mobil Chemical Co., Houston Olefins Plant; Alcatel, Plano; General Motors, Arlington; Motorola, Fort Worth; and TXU Electric plants in Fort Worth, Dallas, Monahans, Mesquite, Waco, Savoy and Coppell.

**Other Highlights**  
■ Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander last week or-

dered the agency's general counsel, Steve Koebele, to resign after he admitted to secretly recording meetings and telephone calls. All four of the tapes have been destroyed according to a spokesman for Rylander.

■ The Tigua tribe has filed papers in U.S. District Court in El Paso seeking the dismissal of a lawsuit brought by the state of Texas to close the 6-year-old Speaking Rock casino on their reservation. The Tiguas are claiming sovereign immunity.

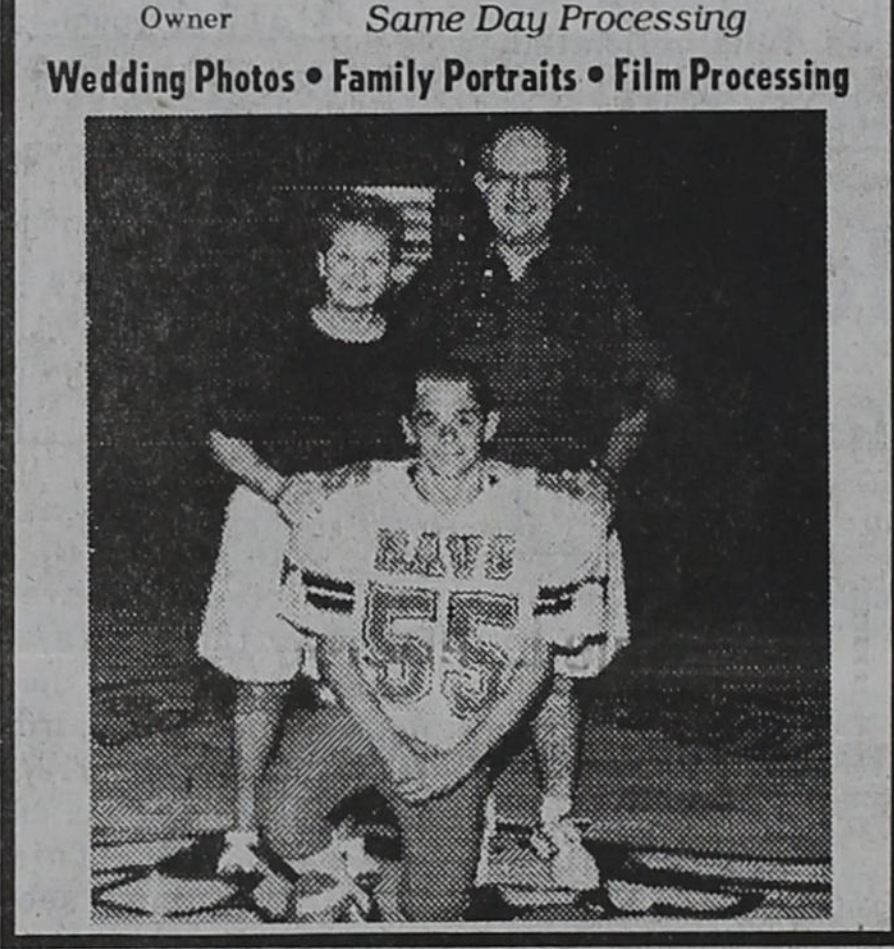

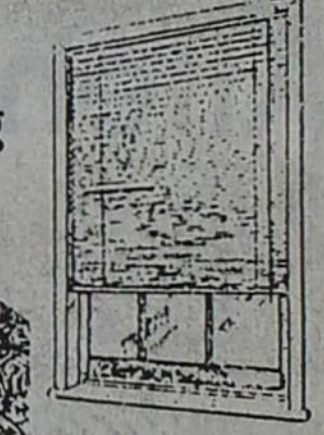

**Emergency Care for Rural Hospitals**

No one ever said balancing the federal checkbook would be easy but the consequences of the Balanced Budget Act of 1997 (BBA) have been a lot harder on rural hospitals than anyone, including Congress, anticipated.

During the '80s health care costs escalated at a pace which was rapidly approaching an unsustainable level. "Managed care" developed into a major mechanism for controlling the growth of costs by pulling in the reins on what, when and where medical procedures would be covered by insurance. Wanting to capitalize on that cost containment, the federal gov-

ernment began creating incentives for Medicare beneficiaries to choose managed care insurance plans, especially when compared to traditional fee-for-service insurance.

Here's the Catch-22 situation in which rural areas find ourselves as a result:

On the one hand, the government has sought to capitalize on managed care's lower costs, both by enhancing managed care and by tightening payments to traditional fee-for-service providers. At the same time, the smaller populations and Medicare reimbursement rates in rural areas have failed to attract manage care to bring its business to town.

Thus, the government-promoted and financially beneficial managed care option remains unavailable to most rural residents while fee-for-service providers and consumers face tremendous Medicare cut-backs which threaten the availability of all health care to rural residents.

Operating in the black has always been a challenge for rural hospitals, both because of the smaller patient base from which to draw "customers" and because of the ever-increasing complexity of keeping pace with insurance company and government paperwork and regulations.

Now, the new BBA restrictions on Medicare payments have brought the multiple pressures on rural hospitals to what many would call a breaking point.

Fortunately, the House Rural Health Care Coalition has heard the distress signals sent out by rural hospitals. Both Democrat and Republican,

we have taken our case to all of the relevant House leaders, and there is reason now for cautious optimism that help is on its way.

This week, the chairman of the health subcommittee put forward a proposal that is a step in the right direction, although more help will be needed. He still has not dealt with the central issue of the Hospital Outpatient Prospective Payment System for rural hospitals.

"Prospective payment" creates a predefined payment rate, based on the average costs for any given treatment. Rural hospitals are more reliant on outpatient services than urban hospitals and, therefore, are more vulnerable to Medicare payment cuts for these services. Also, since rural hospitals historically have tended to do more with less, most had less of that "fat" which prospective payment is intended to cut.

Meanwhile, two influential members of the Senate have been moving on a parallel track in finding remedies for some of the harmful BBA cuts. Among other things, their proposal does include relief on the matter of prospective payment for rural hospitals.

The bottom line of all of this is that we're not out of the woods yet but it does appear Congress is likely to deliver some relief to rural hospitals before the end of the year.

Just as government policies aren't the sole source of hospitals' financial challenges, neither will these remedies be the sole solution. Still, the government needs to do its part in keeping health services available to rural residents.
