In addition to question and answer session and refreshments, the Taylor Co. Chapter of Young Homemakers, from Merkel will give a presentation of their work and activities.

Young Homemakers of Texas (YHT) is a non-profit, educational organization aimed at young homemakers with an overall goal to provide creative opportunities in maintaining effective personal, family and community life. The State Association is a chartered organization which functions under the direction of the Division of Homemaking Education, State Department of Education, in cooperation with the local school and the homemaking teacher who serves as chapter adviser.

Members of Young Homemakers elect their own officers, plan their own programs, and usually meet one evening a month to gain information in such topics as child care and guidance, home care and beautification, consumer buying, management, self-improvement, and meeting the family's food needs. There are opportunities to attend area and state conventions to share ideas with other Young Homemakers throughout the state.

Active membership is open to women not enrolled in high school and who are not over 35 years of age. Eligible members may be single or married, employed outside the home or not. Women over 35 may become associate members with all the rights of active members except that of holding office.

Young Homemakers as a fast growing organization with new chapters being added by the dozens each year - Wylie and Tuscola being two new local additions in the last two years.

## Grass Fires Brought Under Control Tuesday After 24-Hours of Fighting

BAIRD — Ranchland fires were still burning out of control Tuesday at noon, as fire fighters continued to fight the blaze, fed from the parched and dry grass that has gone most of the summer without measurable moisture.

The fire on the Snyder Ranch, northeast of Baird, was reported at 4 p. m. Monday and continued throughout the night. The blaze on the Hugh Ross Ranch began sometime Tuesday morning and at noon Tuesday both fires were reported out of control.

Fire Department units from Clyde Volunteer Fire Department and Cisco joined the Baird Fire Department in trying to control the blaze. Also assisting were members of the highway Construction crews who are now working on the repairing of I-20. It was reported to

this office that approximately 250 people were attempting to control the fires, and assisting the Baird Department.

Fire units from Moran, Albany, and numerous equipment operators were on the site giving aid to the local unit Tuesday.

The fire was brought under control about 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, after burning approximately 2,000 acres, over a 24-hour period.

Baird Volunteer Fire Department Chief Mike Bell expressed his appreciation on behalf of the department for the many hours of help from fire departments, highway crews and volunteers who came to help in fighting the fire. The cooperation from neighboring towns is especially appreciated and the department here expresses their thanks.

## Clyde Schools Announce Price Increase for School Lunches

CLYDE — The Board of Trustees of Clyde Schools has announced a new price schedule for meals served in the school cafeteria effective the opening of school on Aug. 21. Bids received by the school on food items and milk have increased over the previous year to a point to make this increase inevitable.

The board expressed regret at having to take this step but an audit of last year's operation showed an average cost per meal of .51. This figure along with increases in price of practically all food items was considered.

The new price for lunches will be .45 per meal for all pupils in the elementary school. Junior high and high school pupils will pay .50 for each meal.

School officials have been notified that the Special Milk Program which has been in effect for many years expired on June 30, 1973 and would not be available to schools this fall. This program provided extra milk at a reduced price to pupils at lunch and at other times of the day. Milk will continue to be provided with the lunch and one-half pint of milk is included in the price of the meal but any other milk purchased will be at the full price of .10 per half-pint.

Free lunches will again be available to low income families under Section 9 of the National School Lunch Act. The scale for

## Cisco Junior College Will Offer Extension Courses at Clyde High

CLYDE — Cisco Junior College will offer a new extension program at Clyde beginning with the coming fall semester, according to an announcement by Dr. Leland Willis, President of CJC. The courses will be taught at Clyde High School in cooperation with the Clyde Independent School District and the Clyde Chamber of Commerce said Dr. Willis.

The initial program at Clyde will include five courses: English 13 (English Composition and Rhetoric); English 213 (Readings in English Literature); Math 113 (College Algebra); History 113 (History of the U. S. to Reconstruction); and Government 213 (American National Government). Willis said that any other courses would be offered if a sufficient demand is indicated.

Registration for the courses to be offered at Clyde will be held on Monday, Aug. 26 between 6 and 9 p. m. at the Clyde High School auditorium. Dr. Willis stated that the same

low tuition rates will prevail at Clyde as are maintained at the colleges main campus in Cisco, as well as its other extension locations. Tuition and fee for one course will be \$46.75; for two \$57.50; for three courses \$89.25; and for four, \$109.00.

Class schedules may be obtained at the Clyde Chamber of Commerce office or at Cisco Junior College. Dr. Willis said that up to 12 hours can be taken with classes meeting one evening per week, and that all courses are those which are required on any degree program. They will be transferable to any senior college since CJC is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Dr. Willis concluded.

Officials of the Clyde Chamber of Commerce and Clyde Independent School District have urged all interested persons in the Clyde-Baird area to contact them or Cisco Junior College for any additional information.

## Callahan County Preparing For Food Stamp Implementation

BAIRD — The first food stamps in Callahan County will be issued Nov. 1, 1973. But before the statewide food stamp program is implemented here, there is much work to be done.

Commodities is the food assistance program currently operating in this county. The 62nd Texas Legislature appropriated \$7.7 million for a statewide food stamp program to replace all

county food stamp programs and commodity food distributions. By November 1973 the 254 counties in Texas will be operating the statewide program administered by the State Department of Public Welfare.

Before the first stamps are issued here, extensive preparation must be completed. Current commodity recipients will be notified that food stamps will replace the present food assistance program. Most commodity recipients should be eligible for food stamps also as well as others who might not receive commodity foods.

Certification for food stamp eligibility will begin at a later date. All persons who don't make much money or who are unemployed are encouraged to apply at this time. Welfare recipients aren't the only ones who can qualify for food stamps.

Local issuance offices will sell the food stamps to all who are certified eligible to receive them. Participating households will be able to buy their stamps at the issuance office nearest them and at their own convenience. The long waiting lines which are now a problem at commodity distribution centers should be eliminated.

Food stamps, which can be used for the purchase of most foods and food products, will be accepted by many of the local grocers. Payment is made by tearing the necessary amount of food stamps from the coupon book at the time of purchase. Tobacco, alcoholic beverages and imported items can not be purchased with food stamps.

Grocers can deposit food stamps just as they do money. Local bankers then send the stamps to the United States Department of Agriculture for redemption.

Food stamps are good for everyone. The community enjoys increased economic activity, new jobs are created and low-income households are able to eat more and better food.

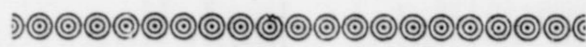

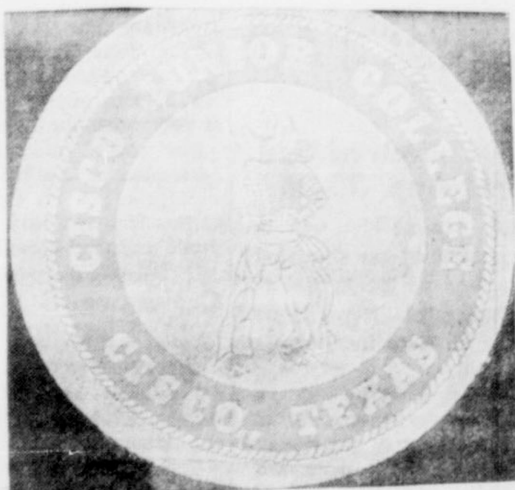

## Putnam Kindergarten Can Use Many Items for Small Children

Have you checked to see if you have anything you can donate to the Kindergarten program at the school? Items needed are dolls, doll clothes, play dishes, building blocks, toy chest, stuffed animals, toy iron and ironing board, toy telephone, small table and chairs, doll beds, play stove and refrigerator. If you have any of these items which you can donate, please contact Mrs. Howard at the school. Or, if you would like to donate some money toward buying some of these items, please send it to her at the school.

Free lunches will be available to children unable to pay for their meals. School officials announced a free lunch policy and adopted the following scale to be used in determining eligibility:

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in some applications sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the superintendent's office.

Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under provision of the policy the superintendent will review

applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied in the ruling he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. School Board president, R. B. Taylor, whose address is Putnam, Texas has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing proceedings are outlined in the policy.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification of or discrimination against any student unable to pay the cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in the office of the superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

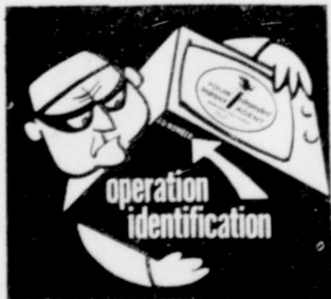
