

## Callahan County Voters Urged To Vote in Saturday's Election

County citizens will go to the polls Saturday, June 1st, to vote in two important run-off elections. Two positions will be filled on that date, that of County Superintendent and County Commissioner Precinct No. 3. Incumbent L. C. Cash and E. L. "Chief" Reese will battle for the County Superintendent's position. In the Primary election, Cash received 860 votes to 673 for Reese, and both expect a close race in this election.

Cash is a 24-year veteran of the Superintendent's office and is a longtime resident of Baird. Reese is a former teacher in the Baird School System, and has been in business in Baird for the past several years. Both men are qualified for the position and only the counting of the ballots on June 1st will determine the winner.

Another key race in the County is that for Commissioner of Precinct No. 3. Six candidates filed for the position in the May Primary, with only two names being shown on the ballot in the run-off election. Incumbent Duke Mitchell and E. F. (Franz) Odum. Mitchell received 223 votes to Odum's 144.

Over 6,000 citizens in the county are qualified to vote, yet only 2,002 voted in the Primary election. It is hoped that more voters will turn out and cast votes in the June 1st election.

The Baird voting place will be in the Community Building, (Chamber of Commerce office) with polls being open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

All voters are urgently requested to go to the polls and vote for your choice.

training will be the summer concert choir, ensembles, private and class lessons. A lab band will give young musicians experience in jazz, rock and other popular music forms.

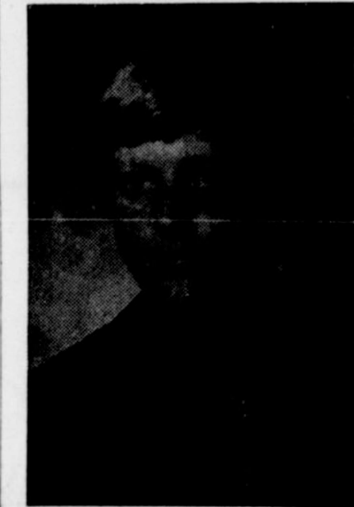
Music teachers may earn up to four hours of credit. To two-hour course in techniques of arranging, and a two-hour course in vocal and choral techniques will be taught.

## Weldon Moore New Elem. Principal & Band Director at Baird Schools

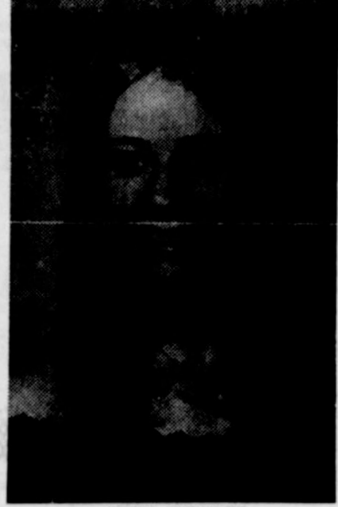
BAIRD — J. Weldon Moore, band director at Ballinger for the past 11 years, has been named Elementary Principal and Band Director at Baird Schools.

Mr. Moore is a graduate of McMurry College and has a M. Ed. degree from ACC. He taught three years at Lafors before going to Ballinger.

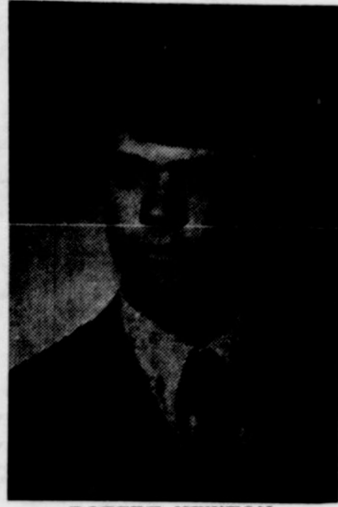

## Callahan County Receiving New Installations and Changes

BAIRD — While driving by the Hospital, you may have noticed some remodeling or changes taking place, with the installation of new windows and aluminum screens. Callahan Co. Hospital has undergone very little remodeling since it was built in 1939, up until last year, when several changes were made.

In order to keep up with the Medicare requirements, the hospital must abide by the Life Safety Code of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, along with the State Safety Code.

Two safety devices have been installed - the main one being an automatic smoke barrier or smoke door. In case of fire on either end of the hospital, the barrier will close automatically to prevent the spreading of the fire to the other end of the building. A sprinkling system has also been installed over the cook stove in the kitchen.

Dr. J. E. Mikeska Jr. of Clyde is the only full time practicing doctor on the staff. Several doctors have courtesy privileges, such as Dr. Pruet, Dr. Halbert, Dr. Strader, Dr. Jarrett Williams and Dr. Joe Randal. There are 29 employees in the hospital, including 16 nurses.

Callahan County Hospital is well-equipped, staffed, and is a great asset to our community and County.

## Brother of Clyde Woman Dies

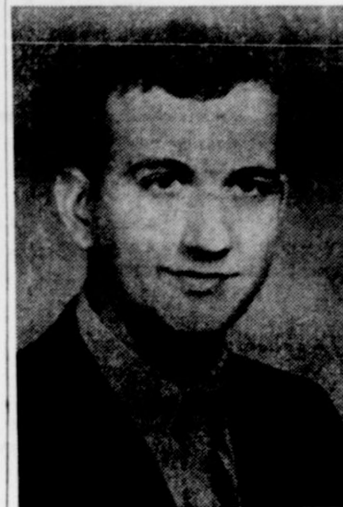

## Eligible Dependents and Survivors Urged to Use CHAMPVA Program

BAIRD — Public Law 93-82, enacted by the Congress on August 2, 1973, authorized a program to provide medical care for the dependents and survivors of certain disabled veterans. According to R. M. Cunningham, Veterans Service Officer for Callahan County, many eligible persons are not taking advantage of their entitlement under the program, known as Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Veterans Administration CHAMPVA.

Eligible to participate in this cost-sharing medical care program is the spouse or child of a veteran who is permanently or totally disabled because of disabilities which were incurred during military service. Also eligible is the surviving spouse or child of a veteran whose death was caused by a service-connected disability.

Persons eligible under this program are provided with medical care identical to that furnished to the military retiree and his dependents and survivors under the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services. The reim-

bursment claims made by eligible participants are handled by the Mutual of Omaha Insurance Company, the Fiscal Agent for Texas. For inpatient care in a civilian hospital, an eligible person must pay 25 percent of the total cost, and CHAMPVA will pay the remaining 75 percent. There is an annual outpatient deductible amount of \$50 for one person and \$100 per family. After the deductible is met, CHAMPVA will provide reimbursement of 75 percent of the total cost of outpatient care, including medicines and drugs.

Any person who meets the basic requirements may apply for Veterans Administration eligibility by contacting their local Veterans Service Officer. An application form must be completed and sent to the nearest VA hospital or clinic. Each eligible persons will be furnished with evidence showing their entitlement to participate in the CHAMPVA medical care program, along with instructions on how and when to file claims for reimbursement.

## Cisco Junior College Extension Classes Begin at Clyde June 3

CISCO — Eight different college courses will be offered in Clyde during the first summer term of the Cisco Junior College Extension Program, college officials have announced. They also said that the demand for courses in Clyde was sufficient to hold two daytime classes and three different sections of Freshman English.

English 113.7 (Composition and Rhetoric) will be held on Monday and Wednesday mornings, with on Friday meeting, from 9 a. m. to 12 noon. Another course, Sociology 223 (Social Problems) is on the schedule for a time to be arranged, probably during daytime hours on Monday and Wednesday.

Classes to be held on Monday and Wednesday evenings, with one Friday meeting, include History 113 (History of the U. S. to 1865), English 213 (Readings in English Literature),

Mathematics 113 (College Algebra), and the English 113 course, all meeting 6:45-10:15 p. m.

Tuesday and Thursday, with one Friday, night classes at Clyde will be English 113, Business 153 (Introduction to Business), Government 213 (National Government), and Psychology 123 (Social Psychology).

Registration for the Clyde extension program will be held on Friday, May 31, from 6 to 7:30 p. m., with classes beginning on Monday, June 3. Final exams will be given Monday, July 8.

Cisco Junior College's state-supported tuition and fee costs for the extension program, as well as all other CJC summer courses, total \$35.25 for one 3-hour course, and \$65.50 for two courses, or six hours.

# Mesquite and Prickly Pear Control Important in Callahan County

BAIRD — Brush control is a subject of much importance to many Callahan County ranchers. In 1974, landowners have a choice of three herbicides for mesquite control. These are 2,4,5-T, 2,4,5-T alone; Picloram mixture (Tordon 225 mixture) and 2,4,5-T; Dicamba mixture (Banvel 2+2). Tordon 225 must be applied by an applicator approved by Dow Chemical Co. Also site must be inspected and approved by a Dow Chemical Co. representative.

Result demonstration conducted in Callahan County over the past six years indicate that brush control does pay even though results may be erratic

from year to year. Which product should you use? This is a broad question that could have several answers.

A study of one pasture evaluated in 1972 showed a mesquite kill as high as 43% using Tordon 225. In this same plot 83% of the Prickly pear was controlled. 2,4,5-T plus Dicamba also showed good results that year with one plot registering a 42% kill. Plots sprayed with 2,4,5-T alone showed a 29% kill. All of these plots were sprayed in 1970 and evaluated in the fall of 1972.

In general, where mesquite foliage is heavy and pear control is desired, the foliage should be knocked off one year and the 2,4,5-T Picloram mixture sprayed the following year for pear control.

Complete results of these demonstrations over the past few years are available from the County Extension office.

# County Agent Gives Information On Control of Pecan Casebearers

BAIRD — Many pecan producers and homeowners have been inquiring about the proper timing of spray applications for the control of pecan nut casebearer in Callahan County, says Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent. The date of spraying is determined entirely by the egg hatch and other factors.

The casebearer moth lays eggs on the tips of nutlets. The eggs are greenish white when deposited but turn red or pink right before hatching and this occurs in 4 - 5 days.

Spraying should begin as soon as the eggs are found on the nuts. Extension Entomologists recommend the use of one of the following insecticides to control casebearers: Guthion, Malathion, Thiodan or Toxephene.

As with all insecticides, precaution should be taken when handling and using. Also, use the manufacturer's directions for use.

More information can be obtained from the County Extension Office in the Courthouse.

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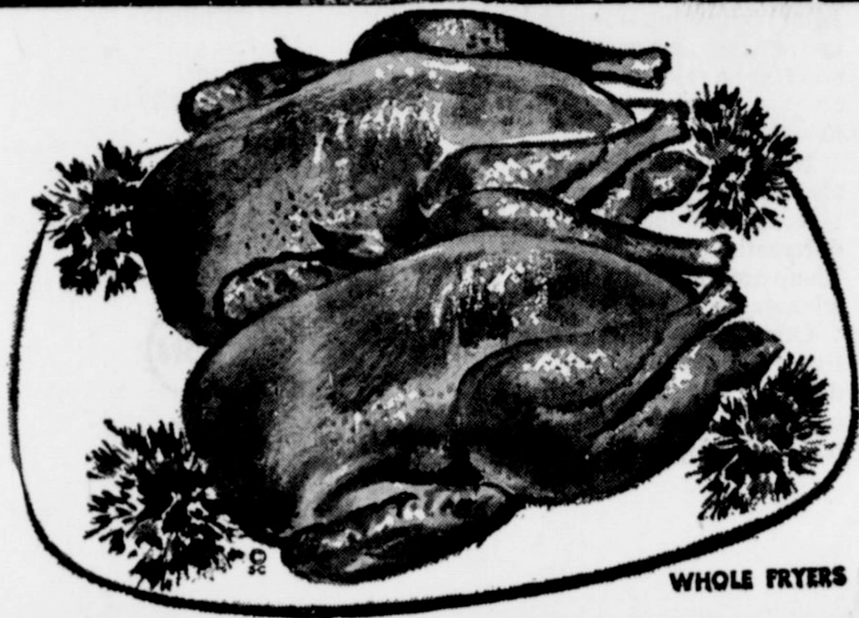
