Census Takers Easy To Identify

Householders will not have any difficulty identifying the takers of the 1960 Census of Population and housing when they start their rounds on April 1, District Supervisor Max V. Moss-holder pointed out today.

Each census taker will be provided with a red, white and blue identification card to be worn on the lapel. This card bears the seal of the Department of Commerce and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. Persons purporting to be census takers who do not have this identification should be reported immediately to the local district Census office.

Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is brown and bears the legend, "1960 Census of the United States," printed in green ink. In the portfolio, the census taker carries his supplies of report forms, maps, pencils, and other tools of his trade.

350 Attend TB Convention

The 52nd Annual T.B. Convention was held in Abilene March 24, 25 and 26, at the Windsor Hotel. Approximately 350 officers and delegates registered.

Dr. James E. Perkins, of New York City, managing director of the National Tuberculosis Association, especially stressed the need for adequate control and records by public health authorities and adequate case detection work.

"Each private practitioner must make his office a TB detection center," said Dr. Elliott Mendenhall of Dallas, chairman of the Texas Medical Association committee on tuberculosis.

Dr. Mendenhall declared that new treatments and cures must be developed very soon because the bacilli are developing resistance to present treatments. He said that unless new developments were immediate that future years would present more and more uncontrollable outbreaks of the disease.

Dr. Daniel E. Jenkins of Houston cited five chief needs in the program for combatting tuberculosis - (1) continuing research in the field; (2) developing well trained medical workers in the field and reviewing them on the latest developments in fighting the disease from time to time; (3) emphasizing infant testing and treatment during the first three years for children; (4) promoting greater cooperation in study and treatment between medical schools, doctors and tuberculosis workers, and (5) promoting greater interest in the study and research of tuberculosis among medical students.

The three day meeting ended with a business meeting luncheon and board of directors meeting at noon.

The state group awarded two medical fellowships and one grant for research. Dr. W. T. Knicker of Little Rock, received his second fellowship for teaching and research in the field on immunology in TB, and Dr. Willam Potts of Dallas received a fellowship for his study of drugs used in early tuberculosis in children. Dr. Paul R. Ellis of Houston got a grant for study of the effects of insufficient blood supply to the lungs and its correlation to such diseases as TB and emphysema.

Mrs. E. G. Hampton of Clyde, Callahan County TB Association president and Mrs. W. P. Brightwell of Baird, were delegates to the meeting. Mrs. S. L. McElroy, chairman of the State TB Board Resolutions Committee, presented resolutions to the body Saturday.



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
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
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
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IT'S THE LAW In Texas...

Speaking before juries -- the beginning of jury trials -- goes way back to Greek colonies about 600 B. C., in lawsuits over land seized by tyrants.

Soon afterwards Athens itself took over such oratory, but seems never to have worked out rules of evidence or control of the trial by a judge.

Jurors often booed or cheered the parties, talked together, and shouted at speakers. What one man knew or thought he knew about the case he told his neighbor.

All evidence could go: Personal knowledge, hearsay, prejudice, and a juror's opinion.

The Athenian juror had power: Each "dicast" (a juror chosen by lot) was both jurymen and judge.

Jurors sat in many courts; the smallest had 201 dicasts, the largest one such as tried Socrates had 601. (The odd man broke tie.) The jurors heard and decided their cases out in public, often amid swarms of citizens and foreigners.

One day to each case; and the accused -- like Socrates -- had to prove his innocence.

Each juror earned one obol a day -- about three cents.

Each juror swore: "I shall vote according to the laws of the Athenian people and the Council of the Five Hundred; but as to things about which there are no laws, I shall judge as best I can without favor or enmity. I shall judge as to things at issue and shall listen fairly to both the accuser and the defendant."

These things I swear by Zeus, by Apollo, by Demeter. May there be blessing on me if I keep my oath; but if not, let there be ruin for me and my family."

Today as yesterday our juries are under fire: Some say juries waste time, people won't serve; jurors make stupid mistakes. Let experts do justice, critics say.

Such things hold true only if citizens forsake their right to serve.

Only a free people can enjoy the privilege of jury duty. A Greek thinker once said that the mark of a citizen, as opposed to an alien, was his right to share in administering justice.

When jury duty calls, think of yourself seeking truth, hearing all the evidence, heeding the court's instructions, following the lawyer's arguments, and laying aside prejudice.

Who knows how far ahead he was looking when in 1864 he wrote "Journey to the Center of the Earth," now a Twentieth Century-Fox production opening Sunday at the Plaza Theatre in Baird.

Fox doesn't claim to answer the question in its forthcoming CinemaScope, De Luxe color film, but it will give you an excellent glimpse at the imagined marvels that are said to lie under the earth's crust.

The guides on this perilous journey into the innards of the earth are none other than Pat Boone, James Mason, Diane Baker, Arlene Dahl and Peter Ronson, a new face on the screen from Iceland, and his pet duck, Gertrude.

On their way to the lost city of Atlantis, this attractive quintet actually encounter a giant forest of mushroom trees, a reptile stampede, a cavern of glis-

tening quartz, an underground natural shower, a magnetic storm, a waterspout, and a huge subterranean ocean. The expedition begins in Iceland and ends when the party rides a great stone altar--like a cosmic elevator--up through the volcano Stromboli and out onto the floor of the Mediterranean Sea.

Pat Boone, who kisses a girl for the first time in a movie, is making his fourth film appearance in "Journey to the Center of the Earth." Although the picture is basically non-musical, Pat sings four songs while on his subterranean junket.

James Mason plays the part of the University of Edinburgh geology professor who leads the expedition. Mason's an old hand at Jules Verne, having played the dour Captain Nemo, master of the Nautilus, in "20,000 Leagues Under the Sea."

As the lady explorer, Arlene Dahl is making a departure from her usual sophisticated roles. No chic wardrobe for her. In fact, her costume gets more and more tattered and scant as the journey progresses.

"Journey" is the third picture for Diane Baker, who debuted as the quiet older sister Margot in "Diary of Anne Frank," and followed up with a lead in "Best of Everything." STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

It's nine months until the 57th Legislature comes to Austin to pass laws, appropriate money and, probably, enact new taxes. But the major decisions are being made now.

Whether it's the warmer weather or the dwindling time --- (first primary is only a little more than a month off) --- the deciding process is now going full tilt.

Candidates have their literature off the presses and their campaign organizations in action. Challenges and promises are being made, mostly centered on one issue --- meeting the state's in - the - red financial predicament.

In most areas legislators are

being forced if their announcement platforms aren't clear, to say pretty specifically what sort of new tax they would favor.

On the statewide level, it's the same. Jack Cox, with the backing of Former Gov. Allen Shivers, has come out for a 2 per cent sales - tax - for - education. Gov. Price Daniel has consistently maintained that the state's financial problems are not so great they cannot be solved by other means.

Jake Pickle is leaving his post as director of organization for the State Democratic Executive Committee and will work in Governor Daniel's campaign. Jake Jacobsen, former Daniel aide,

will head the Daniel headquarters.

RANCHERS EXPECT GOOD YEAR -- Reflecting the age-old Texas philosophy that everything depends on rain, most Texas ranchers are wearing a smile this spring.

Members of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association meeting in Austin said wet weather had put a "season" in the ground. Prolonged cold meant a lot of expensive feeding, but, in general, the cattlemen look to this year as one of the best ever.

Amid the optimism, U. S. Sec'y of Agriculture Ezra Benson warned against too-rapid expansion of herds. It will almost certainly result in a sharp drop in prices, said Benson.

Benson noted that in the past two years cattle in the U. S. had increased by almost 4,000,000 head a year, double the rate he felt the consumers market can easily absorb.

He estimates there were a record-breaking 101,000,000 head of cattle in the country at the start of the year. This is "not yet excessive," said Benson, but he urged that future increases be "moderate."

Governor Daniel warned the cattlemen to watch the import situation. Governor's Exhibit A was the Texas Oil Industry which has suffered crippling setbacks from the competition of lower-priced imports.

Secretary Benson opposed raising import barriers. He suggested that losses would offset gains in that a \$4,000,000,000 export business in hides and tallow would be choked off.

Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde, former legislator, was elected president of the Cattle Raisers Association.

CATTLE MEASURES URGED

-- Cattlemen voted to seek governmental action in these areas:

1. State and federal agency help to enable railroads to operate more efficiently and economically.

2. Legislative enactment of a stronger trespass law to protect landowners.

3. Full authority for the Texas Animal Health Commission to direct the brucellosis eradication program begun under a law passed by the Legislature in 1959.

4. Confirmation by the U. S. Sec'y of Agriculture of the Association's right to carry out its brand registration and inspection program.

5. Launching by the USDA, as quickly as possible, of a screw-worm eradication program in the Southwest similar to the dramatically successful Florida program.

HIGHER COLLEGE COSTS -- Next legislature probably will be asked to appropriate about 23 per cent more for support of Texas' state colleges and universities.

Ralph Green, director of the Commission on Higher Education, said an estimated \$31,400,000 more than present allocations would be needed for the 1961-63 biennium.

This is some \$15,000,000 a year more than the \$65,000,000 being spent this year. Green told a Legislative Economy Committee the extra funds would be needed to meet increased enrollment and improve faculty salaries.

Green reminded the lawmakers that part of increased cost results from legislature's having made a junior college into a senior college -- against the Commission's recommendation.

playing boxball). At cleaning the guns, reloading them and at whitewashing the targets, I became quite adept -- and there was one (seemingly) difficult feat that I could perform and that was hitting a swinging target.

The pendulum, upon completing a swing, would pause before starting to swing back and the secret was to aim at the spot at the end of the swing and be ready to fire the single instant the pendulum halted.

Quite a few Latin Americans attended school and my chum was one of these. His name was Joe Aguirre. He had sparkling eyes and flashing white teeth and he was always smiling. He was very quick in all his movements in our contests on the campus. I recall that one day I playfully tapped him and then ran. Fleet as a deer, he raced in pursuit and, just as he overhauled me, out went a foot, tripping me and the ground rose up and I saw a shower of stars.

My father died the next spring and we moved away and I have never been back to Douglas. I used often to think of my former playmate and wonder whatever happened to him.

Years went by -- as years do -- and one day I read a brief news item from Mexico saying that a revolutionary leader had been killed in battle. He was Colonel Jose Aguirre. I never have known whether he was my former playmate.

for juveniles released from state training schools.

Legislature failed to enact this last session.

Council also outlined need for establishing a home for dependent and neglected Negro children and expanding other state schools for young people.

Other two members of the Council refused to add their support to a wide-scale delinquency prevention program proposed by Chairman W. C. Windsor, Jr. of Dallas. It included such recommendations as making 12 years of schooling compulsory, keeping schools open to 5 p. m. for students with special needs, working with the Texas Employment Commission to provide more job opportunities for youngsters, more emphasis on child and family guidance centers, etc.

Louis Henne of Round Rock and Robert Knebone of Houston said Windsor's program invaded the fields of other state agencies.

SAFETY LAWS OUTLINED -- Brad Smith, director of the Texas Traffic Safety Commission, has proposed a four-plank platform for cutting Texas' Traffic toll. Planks are:

1. Provide driver education for every public high school that wants it.
2. Revise the 20-year-old drivers license requirements.
3. Set up a statewide chemical test for suspected drunken drivers.
4. Set up a system of traffic courts.

BRIDGE WORK SET -- Texas Highway Commission has announced plans to spend \$5,216,500 in strengthening or rebuilding more than 100 bridges.

They are bridges regarded as not strong enough to take the increased 72,000 lb. load limit authorized by the last Legislature. At present these bridges are "zoned" to prevent use by trucks loaded to the limit.


