If, however, you allow yourselves to be deceived as to the value of your crop and sell for the price any buyer will pay you, you become a burden for your neighbors to carry and make it difficult for those who are standing firmly for the good of the county to succeed. Reflect that you not only give away and lose your own money but you assist to ruin your neighbor who is holding to help you get the price, and who has thereby made it possible for you to do so. The cot- ton is worth 15 cents; all you have to do to get the price is to demand it and when the buyer will not pay it, store in a warehouse or your own barn and wait until a buyer will pay your price. 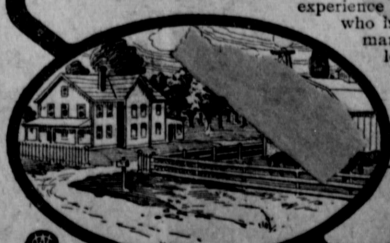
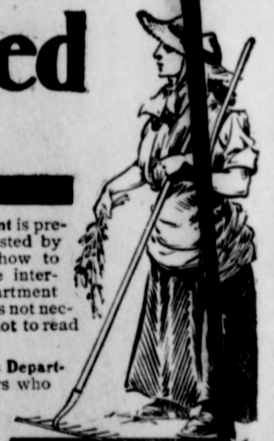

HON. J. N. RUSHING DEAD.

Hon. J. N. Rushing, for many
years an honored citizen of Baird,
died at his home in Weatherford
Tuesday at 11 o'clock. While Mr.
Rushing has been in failing health
for several years his death was a
shock to his friends here.

Mr. Rushing was a good man and
a good citizen, firm in his convictions
and unyielding in his opinions, which
once formed were as unalterable as
the laws of the Medes and Persians.
While he held honorable political
positions in time, had he been like
many politicians that can pander to
every public whim he might have
held high offices in the Democratic
party. He never wanted to see which
was the popular side to form his
opinion on public questions, but
made up his mind and whether with
or against the popular tide he never
yielded an iota.

Mr. Rushing accumulated consid-
erable property and was counted
among the wealthiest men in the
county.

In the death of Mr. Rushing the
writer feels that he has lost a true
and loyal friend. Mr. Rushing was
a Mason and was buried with Masonic
honors at Weatherford yesterday
evening. Dr. R. G. Powell and W.
A. Hinds went down to attend the
funeral. Mr. Rushing leaves a
widow but no children. To Mrs.

fer with the U. D. C. John B.
Gordon Chapter at Baird, regarding

ument. The selection of locality to
be made by the U. D. C. Chapter at

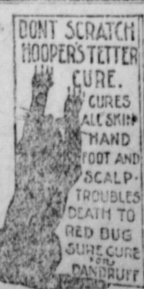

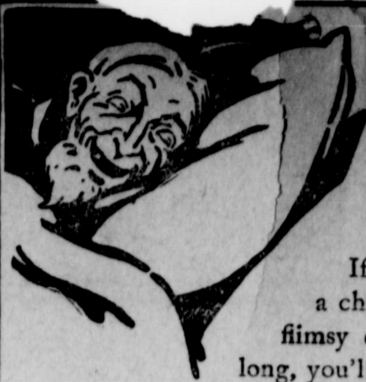

ASSAULTS LITTLE GIRL.

Eight Year Old Daughter of Mrs. J. Tierce.

Bob Barrett Arrested at Baird and Placed in Jail Here Chage With the Crime.

The following account of the crime for which Bob Barrett was arrested here last week is taken from the Big Springs papers:

One of the most fiendish crimes ever reported occurred in this city Thursday week but did not come to light until Sunday and as a result great indignation is expressed on all sides.

On last Thursday the eight-year-old daughter of Mrs. Tierce, a widow who resides in the north part of town, was outraged. Being told that she would be killed if she ever told anything the child through fear refused to divulge the name of the brute until Sunday.

Bob Barrett, who roomed at Mrs. Tierce's home, was arrested at Baird Monday and was brought here and lodged in jail charged with the crime. Barrett's home is in Baird, where he has a wife and two children and he is employed as a fireman for the T. & P. Ry. His father lives 50 miles north of Cisco and a telegram was sent asking him to come to this city.

A crime of this character is enough to make one's blood boil and while we disapprove of mob law the case demands a speedy trial and if the accused is innocent turn him loose, and if guilty it seems that no punishment is sufficient to inflict on the guilty.

An examining trial was waived Thursday by the accused and as District Court convenes here October 7th it is thought an early trial will be in order.—Big Springs Herald.

Robert Barrett, fireman, was ar-

rested at Baird and broeght here the first of the week and lodged in jail on a charge of criminal assault, his victim being Hoyless Tierce, an eight year-old girl, whose mother keeps a rooming house in the north part of town, and Barrett roomed there when here.

The assault was made on the 19th, during the absense of the child's mother, but was not discovered until too days later, as Barrett, so the girl states, told her that if she made known what he had done he would kill her, and that she was afraid to tell. Her mother noticed by the child's movements that there was something the matter with her. She could hardly walk, and when questioned by her mother, told of the outrage that had been committed upon her and said Barrett did it. A physician was called and he said the girl was badly injured.

Barrett, whose home is at Baird, has a wife and two children living there. He was taken before Justice of the Peace Curlee yesterday afternoon but waived an examining trial and was remanded to jail to wait the action of the grand jury.—Big Springs Enterprise.

JOE DAVIS CASE.

Much interest attaches to a noted murder case that has been brought here on a change of venue from Eastland county, after having originated in Shackelford county several years ago, being transferred to Callahan and Eastland, and finally landing here, where it will be tried in the coming term of district court.

The case is that of Joe Davis, charged with the killing of his wife, on account of the mad infatuation for another woman by the name of Carrie Jones.

There are six letters from the defendant to Carrie Jones that will be used as evidence—a letter written

every day for six days in succession, and which are said to be of a very incriminating character.

The case is sensational from start to finish, and as four special venires are to be summoned at this term of court the Herald refrains from any further comment on the case, in order not to interfere with the obtaining of an unbiased jury.—Weatherford Herald.
