## Baird Bears Win 22-12 At Woodson

The Baird Bears, hogging the ball and keeping the Woodson Cowboys on defense nearly all the way, ground out a 22-12 non-district victory at Woodson Friday night.

Woodson quarterback Tooter Reeves put the Bears in a hole early in the game with a 91-yard return to the Baird four-yard line. Fullback Royce Jones punched over to put the Pokes ahead, 6-0.

Baird's Harvey Christison put the Bears back even with an 18-yard scoring scamper in the first quarter.

In the second period, halfback Dale Coley went wide for a touchdown. Halfback Wayne Boyd ran the conversion for a 14-6 halftime bulge.

Woodson scored again in the third period as Larry Sullivan intercepted a pass on the Bear 11-yard line. Reeves scored from the four on a sneak.

Baird got its final score in the fourth quarter on a 26-yard roll-out by quarterback Terry Joy and Boyd ran for the two-point premium.

The victory gave the Bears a 2-0 record and evened Woodson's showing at 1-1.

## About 40 At Clyde Take Scholarships

About 40 students have taken up an offer by the Clyde Businessmen's Scholarship Assn. to pay half their tuition.

T. H. Odum, president said the goal for the classes this year is 100 students. Odum said the program is being underwritten by about 20 businessmen who feel that having college night classes in this community will benefit the growth of the town. In addition, he said, having the classes in Clyde permits the community's students to start a college education they might otherwise be unable to afford.

Cost of the classes given by Cisco Junior College will be about \$40 a course, he said, and the investment of about \$2,000 in education of the 100 expected students would be worth it to the town, the merchants felt, Odum said.

Final registration will be held Monday night in the old West Texas Utilities building which has been remodeled into classrooms. Courses offered are standard freshman college courses.

## County Taxable Valuations Drop

Operating budget for Callahan County for the ensuing year will be about as last year, despite a small decrease in taxable valuations.

The estimated assessed valuation in the county is \$14 million, based on 60 per cent of the true market value. The county tax levy is 80 cents on the \$100 valuation.

The budget shows decrease in taxable valuations of \$59,560. The tax levy for the year is \$147,555, of which 97 per cent will probably be collected, or \$143,050.

Net outstanding bond and time warrant debt as of Jan. 1, 1958, was \$315,000. By Jan. 1, 1959 it is expected to be cut down to \$266,000. In the meanwhile \$38,000 is expected to be paid on the principal and \$7,997 on interest on the debt.

## Prison Rodeo Opens Oct. 5th

While the spotlight of the 27th annual Texas Prison Rodeo will be on five of the nation's top television and singing stars, 10,500 inmates of the Texas Department of Corrections want their rodeo fans to know they will have some "stars of our own" in the limelight each Sunday in October.

Albert Moore, veteran Prison Rodeo Director, announced that in addition to inmate cowboys who have proven their ability in the arena during the past few years, there will be a number of new faces whose performances may surprise the "experts."

Moore pointed out that the reason the Prison Rodeo is rough and tough is the fact that inmates get only two practice try-outs before the rodeo on prison stock brought in from the prison's several farm units.

Since inmate performers know that the success of the rodeo means more funds for their welfare program, they don't "spare the horses or bulls" to make every effort please the crowds.

This year's top-flight stars to make personal benefit appearances at the rodeo include Richard Boone on October 5; Dale Robertson on October 12; Ward Bond on October 19; and Robert Culp and Tommy Sands on October 26.

## Rat Control Program Oct. 21-24

A county-wide Rat Control Program will be conducted October 21 through October 24. The Callahan County Commissioner's Court, Callahan County Farm Bureau Vocational Agriculture Departments, The Extension Service, and The Fish and Wildlife Service, are cooperating in this rat control drive. A complete schedule of farm demonstration sites will be announced soon. A good non-poisonous rat bait will be available at a nominal price at the farm demonstrations.

In the meantime, everyone should take all means available to control their immediate rodent problems. There are some good commercial baits available; trapping is slow but effective to control mice, and the rat and mouse harbors can be eliminated.

## 1959 Conservation Reserve Program

Several weeks ago we sent all producers an announcement about the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank for 1959. This is a reminder that you must get in touch with the county ASC office by September 26, 1958, if you wish to sign up for participation in the program. Here are some of the features of the Conservation Reserve Program for 1959.

1. A contract for reduced crop acreage for up to 10 years.
  2. Annual rental payments on the land during the period of the contract.
  3. A special incentive to place all the cropland on the farm in the program.
  4. Cost-sharing to establish an approved grass cover on the reserved land.
- When you come to the county office, bring information about the acreage of each crop on your farm for the past two years and the average yield of your three main crops. We can then determine maximum payment rates for your farm and give you full information about the program.

## Baird United Fund Budget Set At \$3,636.26; Drive To Begin Soon

Approved budget for the 1958 United Fund Drive has been lowered from \$4,036.26 to \$3,636.26, due to the refusal of the Boy Scout Chisholm Trail Council Committee to accept \$400.00 as contribution to the Boy Scout Fund. The Council Committee had asked for \$900.00.

The Boy Scouts have received \$515.00 each year since the United Fund was organized, all of which went to the council headquarters in Abilene. Due to the fact that the drive last year was some \$850.00 short of the goal, some organizations had to be reduced, and the Budget Committee and Fund Directors offered \$400.00 for the Boy Scouts, which was not accepted.

## Rochester Takes Bulldogs 14-6

The Rochester Steers bulled from behind at Rochester Friday night to drop Clyde, 14-6, in a non-district high school football tilt.

Clyde took a second-quarter lead in the Conference A battle when Johnny Walker recovered a bad Rochester punt on the five yard line and Harold Hicks, quarterback, carried it across.

The Steers tied it up early in the fourth quarter with an 88-yard drive, climaxed by a nine-yard pass from Quarterback Sam Adkins connected with shovel pass to Jimmy Gammill for two points and the winning margin.

Rochester added the clincher later in the fourth on a 28-yard run by Huntsman to set up a one-yard plunge by Fullback Doyle Strickland.

## Shaft Honors San Jacinto Hero

A gray granite shaft erected by the State of Texas marks the last resting place of a hero of the Battle of San Jacinto in Ross Cemetery at Baird.

He was Capt. Andrew Jackson Berry, who died in Balry July 31, 1899, after being fatally injured in a vehicle runaway accident. His father, who fought in the War of 1812, and settled long before the Civil War at Georgetown, Texas, was a noted Texas pioneer. Berry's Creek was named for him near Georgetown. The Berry family held its reunion on the old home place last May.

The gray granite shaft carries the legend: "Captain Andrew Jackson Berry, Veteran of San Jacinto, Officer in the Confederate Army—Born May 16, 1816, Died at Baird, July 31, 1899." As a corner marker of the burial lot is the original marker, a WOW-Masonic trencured facsimile in marble. It bears in italics the following inscription, "Farewell, my wife and children all—From a father in Christ Doth Call."

If we demand "free lunches" and "free Government aids and benefits and services," we must pay the Provider "in taxes."

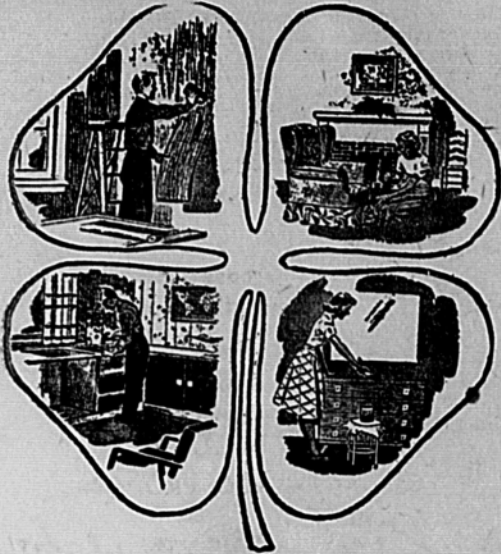

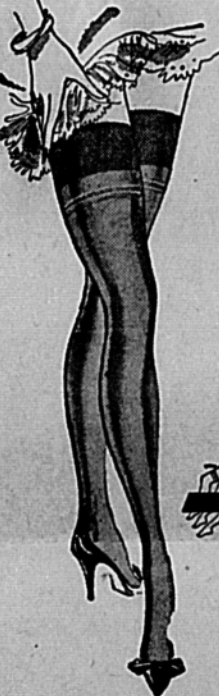
