# Burns Fatal To

Durwood Henderson, and Hugh McMahon who were burned in blast while working on the Gulf Pipe Thursday merning of last week, died a few hours after receiving the burns at 8 o'clock while working on the line five miles east of Baird.

McMahon died in the County Hospital here and Henderson in a Ranger hospital where he was carried.

The body of Hugh McMahon was sent to New Zulch, in East Texas, his home, for burial, He is survived by his wife and a daughter, Minnie Sue 11, also three brothers and sister.

McMahon and young Henderson, his helper, were welding screw-colars on the Gulf Oil corporation's 10-inch high pressure pipeline from Odessa field shortly after eight. While there were conflicting reports as to tragedy details, it was thought that pressure forced one of the collars off, and that oil caught fire from a blowtorch.

Flames shot 100 feet into the air, and drenched the two men. The fire continued several hour until the flow of the crude

The victims were employed by the Williams Brothers of Tulsa, contractors for repairs to the pipeline.

The bogus checks are printed in green ink on a cheap grade of paper stock, it was pointed out, and those presented have carried a registered protectograph number "464". The fraumulent check which have no resemblance to authentic Pure Oil Company pay roll checks, have generally presented to storekeepers, it was said, and have been signed by in dividuals not connected with the company. The bank's indentifying code number has been transposed to 81-6 on the bogus check

#### Government Grades And Grading On **Peanuts**

By W. B. Sarr The government has affected standards of grades of practically all crops grown by farmers, Just why this has been done, is a matter not altogather understood by many formers.

Many peanut growers feel that the ematter of grading their peanut crops affects only the grow ers and those to whom they sell their crops, (the shellers'. The governement in setting up a stan dard of grades for "thresher-run' peanuts considered not only the interest of the farmer and the sheller, but also a third sction of our population-the consumer of peanuts products. The consumer ( who eats the peanut crop' represents a much larger section of the public interested in our peanuts crops than do either the peanut grower or the peanut sheller. The government in setting up standard grades of all commodities (this holdstrue also in grades affecting "finished goods"-processed of manufactor ed articles) gives first consideration to the consumer, and it is proper that this should be so have a Cooked Food Sale next.
