WATCH FOR OAK POISON-ING - Cattle grazing in pastures in which sand shin oak is growing should be watched carefully. Dr. James M. Armstrong, Extension veterinarian, warns that the plant is very palatable and toxic to cattle when it first buds in the spring. The blossoms, buds, leaves and stems are all toxic. Since grazing is very short in areas where the oak is found, stockmen should take special note if cattle are grazing the

TEXAS CALF CROP UP -Calves born on Texas farms and ranches during 1970 totaled 5,-378,000 head, up 2 percent from 1969. The increased calf crop, says the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, was due primarily to the greater number of cows since the calf crop percentage remained stable, 88 percent compared to 89 for '69. Social Security

Q-I am already receiving monthly social security check. I have been told I should come to your office 3 months before my 65th birthday to sign up for Medicare. Is this necessary?

A-Since you already receive monthly benefits you will have the hospital insurance part of Medicare beginning with the month you become 65. About 3 months before your 65th birthday you will receive a card from the Payment Center asking whether you wish to enroll for the Supplementary Medical Insurance part of Medicare. The card should be completed and returned to the Payment Center ad-

Q-I have never worked under social security but I receive a widow's benefit from my deceased husband's social security record. Will I be entitled to Medicare when I am 65?

A-Yes. Although you have never worked under social security, you are still eligible for Medicare at age 65 since you receive a widow's benefit.

Q-I understand that when a person accepts social security benefits at age 62 his benefit is reduced by 20%, but I heard recently that it goes back to the full amount at age 65. Is that right

A-No. If you elect a reduced benefit at age 62 and you receive all your checks between age 62 and 65, your benefit will continue to be reduced at age

True to advance warnings, Welfare Board ordered a cut in Aid to Families with Dependent Children effective May 1. Average grant of \$118 a month

will be reduced to approximately \$80, about one-third of current payments. Cutback also will eliminate 4,500 families from AFDC rolls.

Gov. Preston Smith expressed regrets, said he has no legal authority to alter the cut, since the state has reached the \$80 million a year ceiling for welfare outlays.

Smith gave his endorsement to the constitutional (amendment 3) to be voted on May 18 which will raise the ceiling.
