Possible Change In Date For Grazing Set-Aside:

Since small grain cover crops such as wheat and rye may not be grazed on acreage to be set-aside after May 1, the County Committee has recommended a change in the final grazing date from May 14 to April 30.

You will be notified when this is approved by the State Committee.

Wheat Certification:

The final date to certify wheat is May 1. On farms enrolled in the wheat program only, the set-aside must be designated at this time also.

Signup:

Friday, April 9, will be the last day to sign up in the 1971 farm programs. Many of you were in earlier and talked about the program but have not been in since the sign-up period opened.

Preservation of Feed Grain Bases And Allotment Acreages:

In order to protect the allotments and bases on a farm from loss, at least 90% of the cotton and wheat allotment and 45% of the feed grain base needs to be

planted or credited to that crop. If you do not plan to participate in any one of these programs and will not plant the crop, you may preserve your base or allotment by having cropland acreage established in vegetative cover. Requests for history preservation should be made by April 1, 1971.

Social Security

Q-I will be 65 in March and I am still working. What do I need to do to sign up for Medicare?

A-You should apply for Medicare now. You can sign up for Medicare by calling 376-5151 or by visiting our office at 317 East Third, Amarillo. You should bring your birth certificate or any other proof of age you have with you.

Q-I have had about \$150 in doctor bills this year. Should I request payment from Medicare now or wait until after the end of the year?

A-You may request the payment now. Medicare pays 80% of the covered medical expenses after the deductible of \$50 has been met.

Q-My father traveled north to work last summer. While he was in Michigan he had to see a doctor. Will Medicare pay for doctor's services in another state?

A-Yes, Medicare will help pay doctor bills incurred in any part of the United States. Your father should file a claim with the agency that handles Medicare in the State of Michigan. The name and address of the agency in Michigan is listed in the Medicare Handbook which was given to your father at the time he signed up for Medicare.

Q-My husband and I are getting a combined social security check. I would like to get a separate check for my part. Is this possible?

A-Yes, Your request is being acted upon and in the future separate checks will be mailed to you and your husband.
