The early signs and symptoms may be slight. Some of them, peated nosebleeds, low persistent fever, and frequent complaints or pain in the arms, legs not necessarily mean that a child has rheumatic fever, but they do indicate that he is below par and should be examined by a physician and his advice

The more characteristic signs include painful, inflamed joints. The child may be irritable without good reason, cry easily, or develop other nervous habits.

It is vitally important to spare the heart unnecessary work for at long as the disease is active and for a period of convalescence afterwards. A child with rheumatic fever should remain in bed until, in the physician's opinion, it is safe for him to get

Some children recover from rheumatic fever without develop-ing heart trouble, or the damage to the heart may be so slight that the child can live a normal life. In other tase the child recovers from the acute attack but is left with an impaired
