A distinguished advertising consultant, after a speech to retailers, was asked to name the outstanding characteristic of good advertising.

"News," he replied without hesitation.

"Advertising which is not news is not advertising. Good advertising contains all the elements of a front page news story. It must contain fresh information which concerns the vital interests of the reader," he said.

In the early days of the newspaper, the importance of advertising as news was recognized by giving the front page to advertising and placing other information on the inside pages.

In colonial America, the listing of goods arriving from foreign ports was the most exciting of all local news. The health, comfort, and wealth of the whole community were related to ship arrivals.

The arrival of new products to local retail outlets is no longer subject to the hazards of wind and sea. However, news about goods and services may be as exciting as two centuries ago.

Grocery advertisements are compact news stories which affect every family budget. They are studied with more intensity than any other economic news.

Advertising of dress shops contain more practical fashion news than articles originating in Paris or Rome.

The classified sections of local newspapers give a running account of real estate values, employment conditions, population movements, and agricultural and industrial development.

On Saturday of this week and Tuesday of next week, citizens of the area will have an opportunity to exercise their voting privilege by casting ballots in both the School Board election and City Election.

On Saturday, three trustees will be elected for the Baird Independent School District, and on Tuesday, three Councilmen will be elected.

Every citizen who is qualified to vote should go to the polls and vote on both of these days as these two bodies govern our school system and our city.

School Board Election To Be Held Saturday

CONG. OMAR BURLESON TOURS WATERSHEDS IN COUNTY TUES.

Cong. Omar Burleson completed his tour of two projects nearing completion in Callahan County, Tuesday.

Joe Antilley, District Supervisor of Middle Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation District, acted as master of ceremony for the day's tour of the dam projects.

Cong. Burleson, accompanied by some 200 people, made their first stop at the Pecan Bayou Watershed dam on the Frank Windham Ranch, 14 miles south of Baird. It is one of the 33 projects in the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District. According to James Herring, SCS Work Unit Conservationist of Baird, this project on the Windham Ranch is one of 13 such projects that are nearing completion.

This particular program was started in July of 1966 and is being completed in a near record time, due to the extremely dry weather in this county in the past few months.

The group made their second stop of the day at the biggest project in this area, the dam on the Bill Cutbirth Ranch, southwest of Baird. This lake, when completed, will be exceptionally deep and will provide not only flood control for a vast area south, but a good fishing spot when stocked.

The third stop for Cong. Burleson and party was on the Leo Chrane Ranch, 1 mile south of Dudley, just inside the Taylor County line. After the inspection of another dam, the group watched a Hydro Mulcher machine in operation. The machine was spraying a mixture of colored wood fibers, water, seed and fertilizer over the spillway of the dam. The machine operated similar to a high pressure

hose on a fire truck, and was operated by one person.

At the end of the tours in other areas, Cong. Burleson expressed his own thanks for the attendance on the tour and extreme pleasure over the projects they had inspected during the tour. He stated that Congress had made vast sums of money available for such programs, but the administration had not seen fit to release all the funds as yet.

The Congressman said he was pleased to see so many young farmers on the tour. I wonder sometimes, he said, "just what incentive there is for young people to go into the farming business. The farmer must spend \$35,000 or more just to go into business, but his income is rather hazardous. The future for farming may not be too bright. There is too much of a spread between what you sell and what you buy. Farming is not as profitable as it once was. The farmer's income stands at the lowest level since 1934."

This Saturday April 1, an election will be held at the American Legion Hall for the purpose of selecting three trustees for the Baird Independent School District.

Seeking re-election for a second term to the board, is Bill Cason. New candidates are Bruce Williams, a former member of the board, Mrs. Lucille Burfield and Mrs. Glenda Ivy. Bill Cason, an oilfield pumper, and his wife have three daughters, Linda, 17, Beverly 12 and Billie 10.

Bruce Williams, who has served Baird Schools as trustee for

three years, is an 11-year resident of Baird. Before becoming a rancher, he taught school in the Rotan School System for 4 years. The Williams' have three children, David 10, Lindy 9 and Barry 4.

Mrs. Glenda Ivy, who has been employed by Lone Star Gas Co. since 1953, is seeking her first term on the board. She is the wife of Randall Ivy, employee of the Texas Highway Department. The couple have one son, Rodney, who is in the first grade at Baird school this year.

Mrs. Burfield, editor of The Baird Star, is also seeking her first time to the board. She is the wife of Clifton Burfield, publisher of Star Publishing Co., with newspapers at Baird, Clyde and Lorraine. The Burfields have four daughters, Charlene and Darlene, 11-year old twins, Vicky Lynne, age 9 and Davona Lenae, 4.

Trustees whose terms expire and who are not seeking re-election are James Snyder and Terrell Williams.

Asking for re-election to the Putnam School Board are Clinton Waddell and Travis Chapman.

Announcing for re-election of the Eula School Board are Melvin Faircloth and Hilton Tarrant.

With some 150 persons in attendance, Judge Jim C. Langdon, Texas Railroad Commissioner, commented on Callahan County's "quiet oil boom" at the Baird Chamber of Commerce Banquet Friday night, March 24, at the School Cafeteria.

Preceding Judge Langdon's principal address, James Paul Shanks, outgoing chamber president, publicly honored officers and directors of the Shady Oaks Recreation Center for their "outstanding work on an outstanding project."

Those honored for their work in developing the facility were Jimmy Godfrey, incoming chamber president and also president of the recreation association, Charles Reeves, Charles Walker, E. A. Connel Jr., Rev. Albert Cooper, Ed Cotton and Vernon Townsend.

Mrs. George (Pat) Owens of Cisco entertained in her own unique style of singing and jazz piano playing of such tunes as "I Got Rhythm," "You're Nobody Till Somebody Loves You," "Stormy Weather," and "Old Black Magic."

She ended with an original "ditty," written that afternoon, entitled "B-A-I-R-D" which was well suited to the occasion.

Judge Langdon, introduced by Baird attorney Rupert Jackson, opened his address with several jokes concerning Bairdites before praising the county as the "quietest boom area."

"As a matter of fact, the Callahan County oil boom has been so quiet that we are not sure

just when it did start," Langdon said.

Langdon noted that a wagon-yard keeper named Martin Blindsinger dug what was intended to be a water well, but stuck oil instead at Brownwood in 1878. Blindsinger sold the stuff for 25 cents per bottle as medicine.

"We know that commercial oil production began in Callahan County before 1924, because in January of that year the county was credited with the production of 26,331 barrels and had produced 488,440 barrels by the end of the year, at depths ranging from 150 to 1,800 feet."

Judge Langdon congratulated Baird on missing the confusion which came with other discoveries at Corsicana in 1896, at Spindletop in 1901, at Electra in 1911, Ranger in 1917, and at Breckenridge and Hogtown in 1918.

THREE ALDERMEN TO BE ELECTED HERE TUESDAY

Langdon noted that laws of the 1890's seemed designed to protect oil from water pollution rather than the other way around. He added that the oil industry is now taking a responsible attitude toward correcting the flaws in the law, toward salt water pollution and other pure water problems in oil fields.

"The man who said water and oil don't mix was not in the oil business. They don't mix peacefully, and they don't mix happily, but they do mix."

Langdon concluded: "It is obvious that a problem which took 40 years to develop will not disappear overnight, but we will certainly exert every effort toward the aim that the problems of oil exploration and production, which developed with such a quiet boom in Callahan County, can be solved with an equally soft splash."

1.82 Inches For Three Months

The Baird area received it's largest amount of moisture for the year Sunday night, March 19 and early Monday morning, when 1 inch of rain fell, according to B. C. Chrisman, who maintains the official government rain gauge for Baird.

Some rain gauges in the east part of town showed 1 1-8 to 1 1-4 inch of moisture fell during that weekend.

Total rainfall for the year now stands at 1.82, which is approximately one-half the normal amount of moisture for this date.

There was no measurable amount of moisture reported for January, and only 6.1 inch for February.

"WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

"And he said to them all, If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me." Luke 9:23.

The fundamental question Christians need to answer is whether they are willing to "take up their cross" with Jesus in order to accomplish the will of God in the world. Through the centuries the cross has been central in the Christian faith. On it Jesus died that we might live. By the cross He did for man what man could never do for himself. It is no wonder that the "emblem of suffering and shame" is central in the love and devotion of Christians. But the cross is more than an event of the past; it is a present reality which the Christian must experience. "I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me." (Gal. 2:20). Nor is it a "one time" experience; it is a way of life. As Paul said, "I die daily." (1 Cor. 15:31).

For many people any tragedy, disaster, or affliction is considered a "cross" which one must bear. But this interpretation mistakes a "cross" for what Paul called a "thorn in the flesh." "A thorn in the flesh" is some affliction or tragedy which is unavoidable. The individual had no control over the

situation, no choice in the matter. The cross, on the other hand, is always avoidable. The individual can refuse to accept the cross; he can refuse to suffer; he can refuse to die. Thus, to "take up one's cross" means voluntarily to accept and follow a course of action that will lead to suffering and perhaps to death in order to do the will of God.

Today, we want to be Christians without the cross. We want to be safe without suffering. We rationalize, compromise, water-down, and become like those about us who have rejected the cross. Not so with Peter and John. Coming into conflict with the world, they said, "We cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard." (Acts 4:20). They had good reason to follow the principle of expediency. They could have reasoned that considerable progress had been made through early preaching of the Word of God. Perhaps they should slow down and consolidate their gains. They might be able to win more of the Jew if they did not get into serious conflict with the authorities. Why risk antagonizing them? After all, one could not do much preaching from prison. But expediency was not a guiding principle in early Christianity. Instead they preached; they gave a radical expression of the Christian life. To be sure they suffered; many of them died. But they changed their world.

Today, we do not suffer; we do not die; but neither do we change our world. Why? Because we who claim to be Christians face the cross and back away from it.
