



Whereas most outlaws found military forts a hazard to their work, these strategists took it that Fort Davis in Jeff Davis County had been established for their special benefit. So one morning the four Americans and twenty Mexican desperadoes hid in the tall grass on the edege of the post grounds. When the white lieutenant and his ninety-nine Negro troops fell out, leaving their guns stacked, the outlaws opened fire. The official report sent to Washington recorded "sixteen Negroes killed by Indians," but unofficial sources generally agree that one lone, terrified Negro escaped the slaughter.

The desperadoes picked out two choice mules apiece, and loaded them with ammunition, provisions, horseshoes, saddles blankets and other goods, and struck out south for Mexico.

They paused at Paso Viejo to shoe their animals for the long, hard journey. A day's ride below the Rio Grande they stopped at the huge bat caves, and loaded with bat guano. This they would peddle in Monterrey, and thus appear as legitimate traders

long enough to fool the people.
The bandits encamped near the edge of the city, and sold their guano for a hundred dollars per ton. Then they opened a monte game. One night, after the mules were well rested the guards of the mint and smelter were tolled into a monte game - where the bank was supposedly losing thousands, and all the tequila one could drink was free. Twelve guards walked into the trap, and all twelve of them died while a picked crew looted the mint and smelter, and sacked the cathedral.

The gang headed back for the Davis Mountains nearly four hundred miles away, in such a rush as not to take time to remove the packs from the overburdened mules once during the trip. After crossing into Texas two of the Americans rode out ahead of the column with Estrada. With planned thoughtfulness he was killed quietly so as not to disturb his countrymen. Later, when the other nineteen Mexicans entered the pass leading to El Mureto Springs, the Americans opened fire on them. Only one escaped.

The loot was buried in a hole twelve feet deep near a cave. The outlaws left the cave for two weeks while a Mexican cavalry unit rode in, found no one, and rode out again.

The outlaws filled their saddle bags with money and headed for El Paso from a spree. Then they drifted into New Mexico where, after a few petty robberies and incider al killings, they held up a train near Tombstone and took such a fabulous amount from the express company's safe that the company would never admit the amount taken.



To facilitate mailing of wing collections, the Game Commission will supply special business reply envelopes on request These provide space for recording pertinent data and require no postage from the hunter. The active help of hunting clubs and other groups is being solicited.

It is essential that wings from cocks and hens be placed in separate envelopes but any number of wings from birds of the same sex may be placed together Only one wing from each bird should be saved. Date and county of collection are also necessary. If official envelopes are not at hand, any kind of paper sack will sufice if properly labeled.

One further bit of information is requested. In order to compare quail populations in different parts of the state, a place on the wing envelopes will be shown for recording the number of coveys found per day of hunting.

**Creamy Mince Ple** Broadcast: December 16, 1950 oz. pkg. mince meet 2 tablespoons dark cup water molasses slightly beaten eggs ½ cup sugar cup Pet Milk

Turn on oven; set at very hot (450°). Break mince meat into pieces. Put into saucepan with water. Cook and stir over low heat until smooth. Mix rest of mgredients; stir in hot mince meat. Pour into deep 9-in. pie pan lined with unbaked pastry made with pie crust mix. Bake 10 min., reduce heat to 350° and bake 30 min., or until firm. Serve warm or cold.
