Summer Water

The summer water rate went into effect on June 20th, meter reading day, due to the rapid rate water is being used during the recent hot days. The summer rate does not change the minimum, but the price goes up when a consumer uses more than 4,000 gallons per month. The minimum is 2,000 gallons for \$1.00; 4,000 gallons for \$2.00; over 4,000 gallons will be charged at the rate of \$2.00 per 1,000

Arthur Burleson, water superintendant, reported Monday that the city reservoir is now about half full and pumps are running constantly to produce the maximum supply. The water demand took a jump, he states, since the last rain and the hot

weather has set in. Mayor Freeland says that no attempt will be made this summer to prevent the irrigation of flowers and gardens. Arrangements are now being made to haul water if and when it becomes necessary, and water customers can use all they want to pay for at the summer rate. He warns, however, that customers should not complain when they use a lot of water and receive a high bill. Every effort will be made to have water for everybody this year, and this policy will be followed as long as water can be hauled. Of course, if water cannot be purchased and hauled, that would change the picture entirely, but this is not liable to be the case, He added, "Let us hope we continue to get summer showers and hold the demand on our water system

MASON WINS FIRST ROUND IN LEGAL FIGHT WITH WTUC

The city of Mason won the first round of a legal battle with the West Texas Utilities Co. here Saturday when Judge Thomas Ferguson ruled for the city in litigation aimed at ousting the utilities company for operations here.

Attorneys for the WTUC immediately gave notice of ap-

Mason at present has two electrical systems, one operated by the utility and the other by the city. The principal question involved in Saturday's hearing concerned recently passed state egislation which gives utilities companies the right to operate 10 years without a franchise in a city which later becomes incorporated.

The WTUC has been in Mason, which was incorporated in 1945, for 23 years. The company has been operating under a franchise granted by the Mason County Commissioners Court.

Defense attorneys argued that this franchise still is valid. The company was not given a new franchise after the city was incorporated. Representing the utilities

company were Scott Snodgrass of San Angelo, E. L. Harwell of Abilene, and Roscoe Runge of Mason. R. E. Lee, city attorney, presented the city's case.



BLISTER BEETLES

Several people have been having trouble from blister beetles in their vegetable gardens. The

treatment for these insects is dusting with a 5-10% DDT dust or with undiluted cryolite dust. undiluted cryolite dust should be used on tomatoes.

A cryolite-copper dust mixture could control frustworms in tomatoes also.


