The application blanks are beto contact 3-1 million senior citizens before March 31 deadline imposed by the Medicare law.

President Johnson has proclaimed March as "N Medicare Enrollment Month." He urged all federal agencies and a'l citizens to cooperate in enrolling senior citizens in the

Initially, some two and onehalf million application blanks were distributed to nearly 34,000 main post offices throughout the 50 states. Additional forms are available as needed.

Through direct mailing and other means, the Social Security Administration has had contact with 16 of the 19.1 million citizens who will be 65 or over on July 1. Of the 16 million who replied, less than one million said they did not want to sign up for the supplemental pro-

The supplemental program costs \$3 a month and provided doctor bill and other benefits. Everyone 65 and over is eligible for the basic hospital benefits under Medicare.

A copy of the application blank is displayed on the lobby bulletin board of the Baird post office.

Senior citizens who reached 65 before 1966 face a two year delay if they do not sign up by March 31. The application forms are preaddressed to the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Maryland.

Effective interest rate was 3.5 per cent of the 25-year issue.
