Baird Public Schools Opens Sept. 7th

Lunch Room To Be In Operation

The Baird Schools will begin the 1942-43 term Sept 7th with a brief program in the high school auditorium at 9 o'clock, war time.

The frame building on the grammar school campus is being converted into a school lunch room. Plans are being made to have it ready for operation on the date set for school opening.

Mr. Bailey Johnson, who for the past four years has served as high school principal at Clyde, will fill a similar position in the Baird High School. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson with their three children will move to Baird as soon as they can find a suitable house. Their daughter Madelyn will be a Sophomore and their son Tommy will enter the first grade.

At least one new course will be offered in the high school curriculum. Supt. South, who has just completed an eight-weeks term in Pre-Aeronautics will offer this course to Junior and Senior students.

The Federal Government as well as the State Department of Education has urged high schools to add this Pre-Flight Training Course this Fall.

There will be several new faces among the faculty members this year, but not more than usual, according to Mr. South, who said he had expected an unusually large turn-over.

A doll wearing the uniform of the first American soldiers—a uniform believed to have been designed by George Washington—went to war recently.

It was a doll made by Mrs. Frank Estes of Baird, who for a number of years has made a hobby of making and dressing dolls in authentic costumes.

This particular doll, from a collection she had made to represent historical periods, was auctioned off by Dave Elman of the Hobby Lobby, in a Tew York radio studio. It brought a \$25 war bond which as is the custom at all of Elman's Victory auctions, Mrs. Estes explained, was donated to the war effort.

Her doll hobby came to the attention of Elman several years ago. Recently he had written her of his Victory auction, and asked her to donate a doll. All purchases are made with stamps or bonds, and these are then donated to the war effort, said Mrs. Estes.

She chose the "first American soldier" as the most appropriate. She plans to send another doll for the auction from time to time.

NO WEST TEXAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE THIS FALL

There will be no general convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce this fall, or for the duration—this by overwhelming vote of the board of directors. It has been announced by the organization's headquarters office.

Instead of the general assembly the regional chamber, by vote of its directors, will conduct a referendum convention over a two weeks period, Oct. 15 to Nov. 1, terminating in a clearance meeting of a combined work and elections committee. This will be held Nov. 4 and 5 in Abilene, the headquarters city.

The directors' vote was taken by mail. The affirmative response on both proposals presented by J. Thos. Davis, president, was almost unanimous. Only one director favored holding the general session and only four were against the referendum convention plan. The votes were canvassed Thursday and the result made public Friday in a statement by Davis. With the ballots came letters from directors commending the proposals made by Davis as a measure to conserve rubber through elimination of convention travel and in support of the war effort.

Davis said: "As a result of our directors' balloting, the confident expectation is that instead of the general convention there will be held, without wear on automobile tires, a series of 185 town meetings of directors, local chamber of commerce managers and Public Affairs committees, in which group alone are more than 1,200 West Texas leaders. At these town meetings business that ordinarily would be transacted in a general session will be attended to by voting on a series of referendum proposals sent to the town groups by mail. From this action will emerge the WTCC's new officer and director list, and the program of work for the coming year.

H. J. R. No. 1 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49a, requiring all bills passed by the Legislature on and after January 1, 1943, appropriating money for any purpose, to be sent to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for his approval, and fixing the duties of the Comptroller with reference thereto; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the issuance, sale and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by the General Revenue Fund on September 1, 1943; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, immediately after Section 49, a section to be known as Section 49-a, to read as follows:

"Section 49a. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of Public Accounts in advance of each Regular Session of the Legislature to prepare and submit to the Governor or to the Legislature upon its convening a statement under oath showing fully the financial condition of the State Treasury at the close of the last fiscal period and an estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the then current fiscal year. There shall also be contained in said statement an itemized estimate of the anticipated revenue based on the laws then in effect that will be received by and for the State from all sources showing the fund accounts to be credited during the succeeding biennium and said statement shall contain such other information as may be required by law. Supplemental statements shall be submitted at any Special Session of the Legislature and at such other times as may be necessary to show probable changes.

"From and after January 1, 1945, save in the case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each House, no appropriation in excess of the cash and anticipated revenue of the funds from which such appropriation is to be made shall be valid. From and after January 1, 1945, no bill containing an appropriation shall be considered as passed or be sent to the Governor for consideration until, and unless the Comptroller of Public Accounts endorses his certificate thereon showing that the amount appropriated is within the amount estimated to be available in the affected funds. When the Comptroller finds an appropriation will exceed the estimated revenue he shall endorse such finding thereon and return to the House in which same originated. Such information shall be immediately made known to both the House of Representatives and the Senate and the necessary steps shall be taken to bring such appropriation to within the revenue, either by providing additional revenue or reducing the appropriation.

"For the purpose of financing the outstanding obligations of the General Revenue Fund of the State and placing its current accounts on a cash basis the Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to provide for the issuance, sale and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid and approved obligations owing by said fund on September 1, 1943, provided such bonds shall not draw interest in excess of two (2) per cent per annum and shall mature within twenty (20) years from date."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas, at the

next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, being November 3, 1942, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring all appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments there to.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
