YOUTH CHARGED WITH MURDER OF FATHER IS RELEASED UNDER BOND

WELLINGTON, Texas, Aug. 17—John I. Black of Fort Worth held in connection with the slaying of his father, A. E. Black, produce merchant of Fort Worth and San Antonio, was released from jail here today on bond of \$7,500 following a habeas corpus hearing.

The hearing which continued until late yesterday and was attended by upwards of 400 persons, spectators filled every seat and crowded about the door to the room throughout the hearing.

The elder Black was found shot to death about two weeks ago on the banks of a creek near here. He and his son were driving from Pampa and had camped for the night. The youth reported to officers he heard a shot and awakened to find his father mortally wounded. Officers later found a gun near the camp site.

Attorney Marvin B. Thompson of Fort Worth and R. H. Templeton of Wellington represented the youth.

Two Arrested By Federal Officers For Counterfeiting

HOUSTON, Texas, Aug. 17—Charges of printing, possessing and attempting to pass counterfeit \$20 bills were filed today against Clint Croft and Lance E. Hill, following federal seizure of an alleged counterfeiting plant a mile from Lufkin last Saturday.

The charges were filed by Inspector Edward Tyrell of the Secret Service Bureau at San Antonio, who said the spurious money had been circulated widely. Croft and Hill, both of Houston, were charged with being distributing agents for the plant.

Arrested at their homes by Tyrell and local officers, they were to be arraigned before United States Commissioner Winston McMahon. Several other persons were held at Lufkin on similar charges.
