





# DR. HORN WILL BE BURIED AT LUBBOCK TODAY

LUBBOCK, Texas, April 14.—(UP)—Objection of one of the school's nine directors today ended the plan to bury Dr. Paul W. Horn, first president of Texas Technological College, on its campus. The educator who died yesterday will be buried late today in a private cemetery here.

John W. Carpenter, Dallas, was the director objecting. He said he had the highest praise for Dr. Horn but objected to the burial on the grounds that it would establish an undesirable precedent. The other directors approved the proposal.

Students and faculty members filed by the bier for an hour today and most of Lubbock also mourned the educator's death.

Several thousand persons will attend the funeral services in the college administration building at 3 p. m. today. The Rev. J. O. Haynes, pastor of the First Methodist church here where Dr. Horn was a member, will be in charge of the services. Other local clergymen will assist.

The University of Texas, Baylor University, Texas Christian University, West Texas State Teachers' College and other schools will have representatives at the services. Active pallbearers will be: Clifford Jones, Spur, and Roscoe Wilson, Lubbock, directors of the school; A. H. Ledkin and O. V. Adams, deans; W. T. Gaston, business manager; E. L. Doherty, registrar, and C. A. Sanford, Lubbock, a life long friend.

Classes continued suspended today on account of the funeral. Spring football training and other extra-curricular activities at the school also have been halted since the educator's death yesterday morning.

Messages of condolence were received yesterday and today from all parts of the country. Some came from Mexico City where Dr. Horn was head of the American school for a time a decade ago. The local Rotary Club meeting which Dr. Horn planned to attend yesterday afternoon adjourned in his honor.

The educator is survived by his wife, a daughter, Miss Ruth Horn of Lubbock, and a brother, E. G. Horn, Terrell newspaper man.

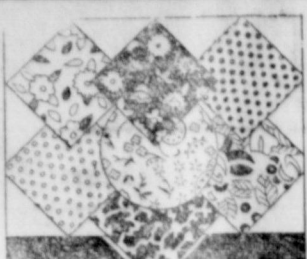

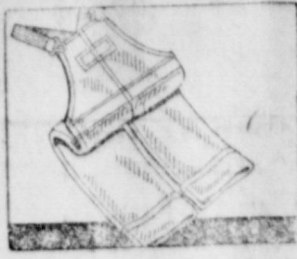

Courageous Congressmen

TEXAS has sent many fine Congressmen to Washington, and is keeping many of them there for service to the nation and to their state.

With characteristic thoroughness, Congressman Blanton has sought and secured evidence of wholesale grafting by what he calls "government parasites."

This sort of thing is a national scandal, not only because it convinces one of grossly inefficient and dishonest administration of some phases of the Veterans Bureau work, but because it constitutes a rank injustice to the millions of men who gave their time and service and some of their lives to their country during the world war.

Theory and Practice

IN THEORY New York's widely discussed Baumes laws—the habitual criminal act designed to protect society against hardened law-breakers—seemed to be extremely meritorious; and a number of states copied the plan and put it into operation.

In theory, the habitual criminal ought to be restricted so that he can not prey upon respectable society. But in practice a more workable definition of the habitual criminal is needed than is provided in such statutes as the New York Baumes laws.

The Army Pay Cut

FORMATION of a "citizens' national safety committee" to protest against reductions in army pay scales tentatively approved by Congress is noted in recent dispatches from Washington.

A broadside sent out by the committee asserts that the pay reduction is being supported by "pacifist, war-resister, atheist, socialist, communist, un-American and anti-American groups."

That makes it pretty dreadful. If those oddly-assorted groups are able to sway Congress, is there any hope for the republic?

And why is it that one cannot suggest that the army or navy share in the government's economy program without having a lot of names like those applied to him?

### HINDENBURG IS GIVEN GREAT MAJORITY OVER HITLER IN GERMAN PRESIDENTIAL VOTE

BERLIN, April 11.—(UP)—President Paul von Hindenburg will serve another seven-year term as a result of the sensational victory at the polls over his Fascist opponent, Adolph Hitler, by approximately 6,000,000 votes.

The election Sunday resulted in a great personal triumph for the hero of the German people in war and their idol in peace, although Hitler increased his popular vote over that received in the March elections. The President received an absolute majority. Only a plurality of Hitler was required.

The final returns as announced by the federal election board were: Hindenburg 19,359,142; Hitler 13,473,388; Thaelmann, 3,866,338.

Thaelmann was the communist candidate. His vote fell off heavily from the March election.

There was the usual election tension among rival groups and five persons were killed and many injured in street fights and brawls. Several hundred persons were arrested for disorderly conduct. Two fascists, one communist, and one socialist were killed "in action." One woman killed her husband en route to the polls after a quarrel on how the family was to vote.

Hitler received 2,076,000 more votes than in the March election, while the communists, most bitter foe of fascism, lost heavily.

The President's popular vote was increased only 705,000, but he won 29 of 35 electoral districts.

Hindenburg's majority in Sunday's vote was 1,235,794; his lead over Hitler 5,042,172; his approximate percentage of the total vote 53.

### BROWNWOOD THIRD HIGHEST TEACHERS' MEET ATTENDANCE

Brown county was third highest county in point of attendance at the meeting. Coleman county was second and of course Tom Green county was first since the meeting was held in that county. Attendance reached the 1,900 mark.

Mr. Woodward said the meeting was one of the best yet held by the association. Many prominent educators of the state appeared on the program.

Other officers elected were: Superintendent J. E. Burnett of Stephenville, first vice-president, and Superintendent J. C. Scarborough of Santa Anna, second vice-president. Mr. Sims succeeds Superintendent W. G. Barrett of Coganche as president.

**Reads Hill's Address.**

The address of J. A. Hill, president of West Texas State Teachers College and president of Texas State Teachers Association, was read Saturday by Superintendent Woodward. Mr. Hill not being able to attend the meeting.

The address was based on the statement, "It is my contention that bad morals are at the root of all our difficulties today and that education of the best order is the way out."

Views on the tax situation were given in the address. Mr. Hill said there are three classes of people—one composed of those who pay their taxes, another of people who are honest but cannot pay their taxes because of people who will not pay their taxes. The last class is dishonest and is in a group with people who dodge bill collectors and do not pay their debts. "Tax-dodgers and falsifiers are increasing the load of the honest people, just as people who beat the grocery bill put the burden of maintaining business upon those who pay." Dishonesty is the cause of our tax troubles," Hill said in his address.

### Big Turkey Crop Predicted In This Section Of Texas

One of the biggest turkey crops in the history of this section is predicted by W. S. Jarrett of the Rainbow Hatchery. Mr. Jarrett says he is setting turkey eggs from over this entire section and believes more turkeys will be raised this year than last year. He says the poultry business is also increasing, judging from the large number of chicken eggs now hatching every week.

The hatchery's 30,000 egg incubator is full now and has been filled to capacity since the season started. The incubator is a new one and is of the moisture type. The incubator is connected with the city water line and water goes through the heating line. The machine all time and moisture is blown into the machine by large fans. The incubator also is heated by electricity and is kept exactly at the same temperature all time.

Eggs from the following counties are now in the incubator: McCulloch, Coleman, Mills, Eastland, Comanche, San Saba and Brown. The hatchery now is setting about 7,500 eggs per week.

James D. Prewitt, county agent of McCulloch county, visited the hatchery Monday and brought some turkey eggs to be set, Mr. Jarrett says.
