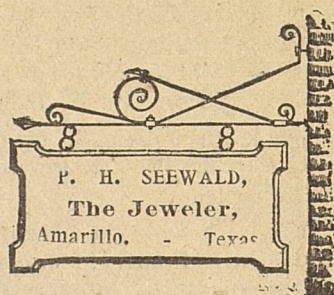

IT WILL PAY YOU.

Chicago, Ill., July 30,—John V. Farwell, who owns immense tracts of land in the Panhandle of Texas, verifies the report that he is interested in the proposed combination deal by which the promoters of the Consolidated Cattle company expect to round up 600,000 head of cattle on the big ranches of western Texas and eastern New Mexico, for breeding, fattening and marketing.

Swift & Co., the Chicago packers, who some time ago were reported as having invested \$300,000 in Texas cattle, are credited with preparing to invest \$1,000,000 in a similar manner.

Now that the free cattle ranges are a thing of the past in the western states, cattle for market must be cared for on close ranges, said Mr. Farwell. "Not only is there plenty of grass for stock in western Texas and eastern New Mexico, but plenty of corn. Some of the finest beef cattle in the market now come from Texas."

Mr. Loving, the promoter of the cattle deal, is at present in New York city. The Capitol syndicate of Chicago and Texas has entrusted Mr. Loving with options on part of its holdings. The syndicate controls 8,100,000 acres of land in the Texas Panhandle, on which some 160,000 head of cattle are fed at present.

**AMARILLO CATCHES THEM!**

Because it Must Be So.

South McAllister, I. T., July 30.—General Manager Wood of the Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf, in an interview with a Dallas News reporter, gives the following with reference to the extension of the Choctaw system:

"The Little Rock and Memphis, now the Choctaw and Memphis, can never do much until it gets an outlet from Little Rock. This having been denied it by the other roads that enter the city, this outlet will now be given it by the Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf, the Frisco, Katy, Santa Fe and Rock Island for Texas points, and Louisiana by the Pittsburg and Gulf.

The Choctaw has to build 200 miles west to Amarillo. The stockholders understand this, and it will be done because it must be.

The Choctaw will not build to Texas as long as satisfactory arrangements can be made with the Missouri, Kansas and Texas.

Our large increase in coal sales is due to increased use by railroads in Texas and Oklahoma. The large crop requires a large amount of coal for threshing purposes, and the increased demand for coal for domestic purposes, due to increased population in the western countries, alone will cause the development of our coal mines. The coal mined along the line of the Choctaw is far superior to any other coal mined west of the Mississippi river.
