Don't Tinker With Our Schools

IF THERE were the remotest probability that anything would be done about it, the people of Brown county would be justified in literally raising up arms to prevent the consummation of a proposed plan of the State Board of Education to reorganize and centralize the public schools of the county. Even though there is not such a probability, and the whole scheme may well be dismissed as merely another brainstorm of the Board, the people should give thought to the matter, and determine to strengthen their defenses against any proposed tinkering with their schools.

Briefly, the State Board, using Brown county schools as an involuntary laboratory, proposes that in Brown county all district lines should be abolished, eleven of the eighteen elementary schools in the common school districts would be eliminated, Brownwood junior and senior high schools would be used to serve the high school requirements of the entire attendance area, and a county system of education would be set up to supersede the present district system. The cost, in case anybody is interested, would be increased from \$246,595, which was the total in 1935-36, to \$336,400-a mere trifle of \$89,805 per year. The Board of Education is sometimes a bit careless about this item of ultimate costs. . . .

Deputy State Superintendent G. D. Holbrook, who recently succeeded H. E. Robinson here, strikes a popular chord when he voices disapproval of this fancy plan for taking control of the public schools out of the hands of the people in each local district. It is a cinch that Mr. Holbrook reflects the attitude of the State Department of Education, too, for that Department is headed by the doughty L. A. Woods who among other things insists upon unanimity, or approximately that, throughout his organization. Mr. Holbrook wants it understood, as it should be, that the whole matter originated in the Board, and not the Department, of Education. It is a distinction that is worth keeping in mind.

Now, let's look at this county unit school plan. First, it would increase the estimated cost of the schools of the county approximately 36 per cent. That's an item. The actual the estimated cost, because it is almost invariably so.

Second, the control of the county system would be placed in the hands of a five-man board, who would select a superintendent and direct the policies of the entire system. That takes control too far away from where it should be.

Third, it would junk school plants and school programs in which thousands of dollars in cash and many years in labor have been invested. Further, it would create a super-high school in Brownwood, with either a constant congestion due to the excessive attendance, or a constantly expanding building problem with which the people of the whole county would be burdened. Still further, it would increase the cost to the individual patron of the schools whose children would be sent from the far corners of the county to the high school here, to say nothing of the inconvenience of such an arrangement. It would lead,-this proposed system of a county unit school system-eventually to highly centralized control of the whole business in Austin, where too much authority over our schools is already centralized. If anybody in Brown county wants that, let him advocate the system.

Here is the important fact in this whole situation. Brown county schools are not in need of experimental modernization. They are better than those of most counties, as good as those of any county. The school system and its component parts reflect the many years of tireless and intelligent effort that have been invested in building and maintaining them, and every school in the county is under the direct control of its patrons who pay their tax money for its support.

. . .

The State Board of Education has been trying, no doubt, to envision a scheme which would result ultimately in improvement. Let's give the Board credit for trying. Perhaps its plan might be workable in some counties. It might even be ideal in some counties. But

not until the people of Brown county reach the conclusion that managing their own schools, and keeping them near their own homes, and holding the costs down to reasonable figures, and hiring and firing their own superintendents and principals and other employes is either too much trouble or bad in principle, a county unit school system for this county is as improbable as a Democratic governor for Maine or New Hampshire.

Mr. O'Daniel's Advisors

GOVERNOR-ELECT O'Daniel has named his much heralded board of advisors, inviting twenty-nine Texans of diversified interests to assist him in formulating policies of state. Twenty-seven of the number are men, while only two women will be included in the group to remind one of the Scriptural maxim that "a little leaven leaveneth the whole lump.

Mr. O'Daniel has selected for his advisors representatives of two dozen or more major business and industrial and social-economic divisions, which undoubtedly is wise if he is actually to derive much of benefit from the counsel of the twenty-nine. He makes it clear that each is to serve solely as a patriotic duty to the state, paying his own expenses and receiving neither compensation nor a promise of any other emolument for the time and labor involved. "It is to be their contribution to the cause of better government," the Governor-to-be asserted.

There is much of potential value in this plan, we believe, especially in view of the fact that Mr. O'Daniel is about to take up a highly important task with which he admittedly is but poorly acquainted. There is not the least doubt of his sincere desire to establish business principles in the state government. and conferences with business and industrial leaders of proved ability and wide experience should be of help to him.

If the plan fails actually to produce the results he expects of it, the failure likely will be due to the inability of his advisors to reach agreement upon specific programs and policies. Included among his advisors are several persons representative of what is usually called "big business." It is not likely that they will be in a kindly attitude toward increased tax levies on natural resources or corporation earnings or utility franchises in order to pay old age pensions. And old age pensions must be paid, else Mr. O'Daniel and two hundred thousand other Texans will be sorely dis-

JUST AROUND the corner-where prosperity stayed so long, perhaps-is the Christmas season. Nobody needs to be reminded of that fact on December 1, but it does no harm to call attention to it, any way, because for some unknown reason Christmas usually slips up on most of us long before we are ready for it. The exceptions, of course, are the children. Time moves slowly for them.

The pre-Christmas season is a matter of cycles. Just now is beginning the first cycle, in which the family, or maybe the head of the family only, goes into a huddle and decides that on account of the hard times and Treaty No. 19 . . . et cetera the giving this year will be strictly limited.
