A short time ago I announced that I would be a candidate for Mayor of the City of Brownwood at the city election April 5. I feel that the voters of Brownwood should know any candidate's attitude toward a number of matters confronting the City at this time; therefore, I am issuing the following statement:

MAYOR AND CITY MANAGER. I believe that the offices of Mayor and City Manager should not be held by the same individual. I am candidate for Mayor only. I will not accept appointment as City Manager under any circumstances. I feel that the best interests of the City can be served by the employment of a capable City Manager, with training and experience sufficient to serve in this capacity, and that his work should be supervised by the Mayor and the City Council.

Best good for the city can be accomplished, I believe, under such an arrangement. Where one individual serves in both capacities, he performs the work of City Manager, then as Mayor directs and reviews that work, saying whether or not it is good. I believe the Mayor and Council should direct the work of the City Manager, and at any time when they feel it is not being performed in the best interests of the taxpayers, should discharge him and employ another. I do not have any individual in mind for City Manager and have discussed the position with no one, nor will I do so prior to election. I have made no trade, deal, promise or compromise with any of my opponents or anyone else regarding this or any other position or job of any kind. I am very much interested in changing the present consolidation of these two offices, however, and will insist that this is done, if elected. I believe the people of Brownwood should concern themselves upon this very important matter if they are interested in a more efficient City government.

COOPERATION WITH OTHER DEPARTMENTS. No city can make definite progress with one department constantly bickering with another. If the people of Brownwood decide that they want me to serve as Mayor, I pledge cooperation with all other city departments, especially the Police and Fire Departments. The Chief of Police is an

elective officer, just the same as is the Mayor. I pledge cooperation with the Chief of Police and his department, that Brownwood can go forward and that greater efficiency be obtained in both departments. I promise that if elected there will be no jealousy on my part of the duties assigned by law and charter to the Police Department. I also pledge cooperation with the Fire Department, and will give every possible aid in increasing the efficiency of that and other city departments.

A CLEANER CITY. Brownwood receives much criticism for the dirty appearance of the City. More attention should be given to cleaning the city streets of dirt and trash, and the prompt removal of garbage. Especially should the streets in the business district be kept cleaner. I propose to give more attention to this item.

ATTITUDE TOWARD LABOR. I believe labor should be paid the highest possible wage scale and will insist that this be done on city work. The WPA has done much to increase the hourly wage by prescribing a minimum on WPA jobs in the city. This gain should not be given up, but should be increased if possible and as conditions warrant. I will not be a party to employing as City Manager one whose attitude toward labor is not favorable, nor to continuing a City Manager in office who does not respect the rights of labor.

There are a number of matters in connection with the purchase of the parking meters that have not been satisfactorily explained. Why did they cost so much? Brownwood contracted to pay \$65 per meter for 426 hand-turned meters, or a total of \$27,690. Austin installed hand-turned parking meters in September, 1937, paying \$29.83 each for 524 meters, \$16,154.92 for the lot. Abilene installed automatic parking meters in September, 1937, paying \$58 each for 469 meters.

A city official of Abilene says: "We closed a contract for the purchase of meters at \$58 each for type C, automatic meters. We can buy the hand-turned or manual meters for around 39 dollars each. I understand, however, they are being discarded gradually wherever they are used." Why did the City of Brownwood pay \$65 for the hand-turned, or manual meters, when other Texas cities can buy parking meters at so much lower prices? And why was a contract for \$27,690 worth of meters awarded by the city without advertising for bids? You can be assured no such dealings as this will go on if I serve as Mayor.

I believe the will of the people should be followed in the matter of parking meters as in other civic matters. That expression now is against them. So far as I am concerned, I will try officially to reflect that feeling until such time as the citizens, by their votes, instruct the City to install meters, if ever. Under such a situation, the City should buy them at the lowest price, consistent with a good product.

GENERAL BETTERMENT. These matters do not constitute all of the items pertaining to the Mayor's office, to be sure. If you see fit to elect me to the office, I will work in every possible way for the betterment of the City in all its departments, in all its activities, and in all its relations with the public. As the city develops and as new conditions arise, I will endeavor to see that insofar as the City Administration is concerned, Brownwood retains its place as one of the leaders of the progressive cities of West Texas. I have no personal quarrel with any of my opponents. I am very much interested in Brownwood, its people, its institutions and its City government. I am a candidate for Mayor in the hope that I may be of service to Brownwood and Brownwood people in furthering the progressive and business-like development of the City. In this spirit I earnestly and sincerely solicit your support and your vote.

Safety Tire & Battery Co. Sponsors Life-Guard Demonstration

One of those things that have to be seen to be believed, the blowing of a tire on a car traveling at upward of 60 miles an hour without serious consequences of any kind, is to be shown in Brownwood on Tuesday, March 15th.

This demonstration will be staged between Anderson street and Santa Fe tracks on Main Ave. in this city. Local police authorities have consented to the demonstration and will assist in conducting it.

The purpose of this apparently dangerous but really routine performance is to prove that in a car equipped with Life Guards, tire failure at any speed is no more dangerous than a slow leak. The blow-out is induced either by means of railroad spikes firmly fixed in heavy steel plates or by dynamite caps detonated from within the car.

The casing is ripped to shreds, but the car remains in control of the driver and is brought to a smooth, safe stop without weaving or leaving the road. The explanation, according to Mr. D. C. Pratt, manager of Safety Tire and Battery Company, local Goodyear tire dealer, is that the Life Guard, a reserve tire within a tire, is not affected by the destruction of casing or tube but holds air long enough to enable the car to be stopped. The Life Guard is a two-ply tire placed within the regular tube, to which it is joined at the base. They are inflated through the same valve. When the tube is suddenly deflated, a tiny vent allows the air to pass slowly from the reserve tire of the Life Guard, which within the tube, it "gives" with meanwhile supports the car. As the LifeGuard reserve tire freely sharp object that puncture casing and tube, instead of being ripped.

Although the demonstrations are conducted by factory representatives, there is no special premium on skilled driving or coolness.
