Dr. J. W. Adkisson, president of the Clarendon college, preached at the Methodist church Sunday morning and night, the latter from the text: "I will consider thy testimonies," Psalms 119c, 96v. It was a most appropriate and eloquent sermon, and so far as perused was eminently Christian. He asked why the gospel was preached to so many and accepted by so very few? Then explained that it was the lack of "considering," as did David, the "testimonies"—the neglecting of the gospel by the busy world. That it was not infidelity nor skepticism, so much as neglecting to consider. This is no doubt true, but it also suggests the further inquiry, Why do people neglect their Christian duties? He failed to explain. The gospel is the power unto salvation, he quoted, but like lightning and magnetism unless applied its power could not be brought in. This is also true, but why was not the power applied? He failed to answer. Without further comment the News will be pardoned for saying that the reason the power is not applied is because the preachers fail to preach the whole gospel. They do not preach against sin in high places—against monopoly, that makes poverty—the one thing of all else that drive men to sin. Let them prepare the way—make it possible for men to live as Christ would have them to live. Under present economic conditions it is not possible for men to love their neighbor as themselves or obey strictly the golden rule. They are driven to adopt the motto: "Every man for himself and the devil take the hindmost." The first duty of any citizen is to look after government sins, and afterward the individual one; but instead the preacher is doctoring the snake bite instead of helping to kill the snake. They fail to consider the testimonies, and the people follow them. Now, like Solomon, let's pray for wisdom—such wisdom as leads to salvation only.

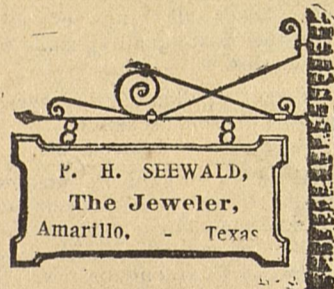

ORDINANCE NO. 26.

An ordinance creating the office of City Attorney and defining his powers and duties.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Amarillo:

That the office of city attorney for the city of Amarillo be and the same is hereby created, and the Board of Aldermen, as soon as practicable after this ordinance takes effect, shall appoint some competent attorney to fill said office, who shall hold his office until the first regular meeting of the City Council after the next general election for city officers and until his successor is appointed and qualified. And at such first regular meeting after said election and at the first regular meeting of the Council after each and every general election for city officers held thereafter, or as soon as practicable thereafter, the said City Council shall appoint some competent attorney to fill said office who shall in like manner hold his office until his successor is appointed and qualified. Before entering upon the duties of his office the City Attorney shall take and subscribe the oath of office prescribed by the constitution of the state, and shall execute a bond with two or more good and sufficient sureties, to be approved by the City Council, payable to the city of Amarillo in the sum of one thousand dollars and conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties as such City Attorney.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the City Attorney prosecute in the Mayor's, Recorder's or other city court, all actions in behalf of the city, and to defend said city in all cases brought against it in any court; to prosecute and defend all suits and actions in any court of this state wherein the city of Amarillo is interested or is a party; to advise the city council, or its committees, or any city officer on such legal questions as may arise in relation to the business of the city; to draw any bill or ordinance that he may be called upon to draw by any committee of the city council, and to give his opinion in writing of any and all questions in law submitted to him by said council or any city officer. He shall, when requested attend the meetings of the city council and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law or by the ordinances of the city of Amarillo.

Section 3. The City Attorney shall promptly pay over to the City Treasurer all moneys that may come into his hands for the use of the city and shall make a written report, verified by affidavit, to the city council on the first days of January, April, July and October of each year showing each item of money collected by him for the use of the city for the quarter last preceding, and the disposition made of the same, and shall also make report of any other matter in which the city may have an interest, that shall, from any cause, have been committed to his care or attention.

Section 4. The city attorney shall have power, by consent of the city council, to appoint in writing, an assistant, to continue in office during the pleasure of his principal, and who shall have the power and authority to perform all the acts and duties of his principal, and who shall take and subscribe the oath of office prescribed by the constitution, which shall be endorsed upon his appointment, and such appointment and oath shall be recorded in the office of the city secretary, and deposited in said office.

Section 5. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to in anywise abridge or restrict the right of the city council to employ such other attorneys as it may see proper to advise it, or to represent the city in any civil action pending or to be instituted in any court.

Section 6. No admission made by the city attorney, or his assistant, or any other attorney employed by the city, in any suit or action in which the city is a party, shall operate to prejudice the rights of the city.

Section 7. The city attorney, in criminal matters, shall receive such fees as are now or may hereafter be provided by ordinance, and in civil matters he shall receive such compensation as may be allowed by the city council.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
