COLEMAN WILL VOTE ON BONDS

COLEMAN, Texas, Sept. 18.—(Sp)—The city commission at a regular meeting last night ordered an election held for the purpose of determining whether or not the city of Coleman shall issue bonds in the sum of \$140,000 for permanent street paving. The election is to be held within 30 days and if it carries it will mean the expenditure of \$420,000 for additional street paving. Mayor Scarborough said this morning, including Cottonwood, Calveson, 9th, 11th, 13th and Calveson streets and Commercial Avenue, which is now partially paved; Concho street, the city's longest north and south thoroughfare which extends from the new municipal building on the north to the San Angelo highway on the south, a distance of more than a mile, was officially opened last night by Mayor Scarborough and Judge T. H. Strong, one of the oldest residents of the street. During the ride from one end to the other the judge became reminiscence and pictured the street as it appeared in '76 to the young mayor and incidentally recalled thrilling events when the thoroughfare was nothing more than a mesquite thicket inhabited by various kinds of vermin.

Stays At Prison To Finish Job After Discharge

MADISONVILLE, Tex., Sept. 18.—(Sp)—It remained for A. H. Woodfin, formerly of Fort Worth and Houston, to introduce a new form of convict action to the Texas prison system.

Instead of running off before his term ended, as so many of his fellow convicts did, Woodfin remained a week after his discharge at the Ferguson farm near here. Woodfin believed he was paying a debt to society he did not owe but so long as he was discharging it in the form of a three-year sentence he did not mind adding a little into the bargain. "I want to get that power house finished before I leave," Woodfin explained two days after his term was up. "I wouldn't like to leave 'em in the lurch."

While he was taking a three-year "rap," Woodfin, an expert carpenter, rebuilt most of the buildings and fences on the farm, the manager said. And even though a free man he stayed on his job of directing the carpenter crew on the power house until it was finished.

Woodfin was doing important work in the oil fields when another man threatened the integrity of his family, it was said. "He needed killing," Woodfin asserts, "but I've had to pay for it."

J. B. Holderby of Fort Worth, prison board member, said that a good job awaited the former prison carpenter.

Habeas Corpus Case Postponed to October 5th

What local lawyers believe is the first action of its kind in the state to be brought into court was being tried before Judge E. J. Miller in District Court Saturday afternoon. Judge Miller, after hearing some arguments by the attorneys, but no evidence, postponed the case until October 5.

Mrs. Rose Turner brought habeas corpus action against Mr. and Mrs. William L. Turner of Brownwood and Mr. and Mrs. Tom Stone of San Angelo to produce her husband, William L. Turner, Jr., whom she says they are keeping away from her.

The complaint states that Rose Bowden, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. T. Bowden of Brownwood, was married by Rev. C. A. Johnson in Brownwood, July 20, to William L. Turner, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. William L. Turner.

She stated that they lived together until August 22 when her husband went away. She alleges that the parents and relatives of her husband have abducted him, keeping him in some other city away from her, and will not allow him to correspond with her.

Young Mrs. Turner, who is 19 years of age, the same as her husband, has the law firm of Wilkinson and Callaway representing her in court, while the elder Turners and Mr. and Mrs. Stone are represented by Walter C. Woodward of Coleman and Judge E. M. Davis.

William L. Turner is a former postmaster of Brownwood, and the Stones of San Angelo are relatives. M. T. Bowden is in the furniture business here.

Crazed Man Holds Officers at Bay

HAYWARD, Calif., Sept. 17.—(Sp)—Apparently crazed by drink, Joe Cataldi, 70, fruit buyer, shot and killed one policeman, wounded another and held a score of others at bay for two hours last night until he was captured after being routed from his barricaded residence by tear bombs.

George Vierra was the officer killed. Al La Cunha, a constable, was wounded.

Neighbors said Cataldi came home intoxicated and started shooting at his wife with a rifle. She fled, and police were called.

Vierra and La Cunha answered the call and when they started for the front door Cataldi opened fire. Vierra fell, mortally wounded, and La Cunha was shot down as he reached for his gun.

Cataldi barricaded himself in the house and held reserve officers at bay with a stream of bullets.

Tear bombs were tossed through the windows, and after two hours Cataldi emerged from a back door. He was slightly wounded.

Turkeys tattooed to Prevent Being Stolen and Sold

A plan to make the stealing and the successful sale of stolen turkeys nearly impossible is being put into effect in this county, according to O. P. Griffin, county agricultural agent.

All birds belonging to members of the Southwestern Poultry Association will be tattooed on the wings with an S W and the number of the member.

Following the work of marking all the birds, dealers in all Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana will be cautioned against buying any turkeys with this mark, which has been registered, except when dealing with the association.

Dealers will be pretty careful not to purchase birds with this mark, for nine times out of ten, the turkeys will have been stolen, as members of the association are bound to sell their birds through the organization only.

This will put a stop to much of the thieving, Mr. Griffin said, and will make it easy to apprehend thieves who do disregard this warning.

While only turkeys are being so marked this year, members of the association are making plans to tattoo all their young chickens and turkeys next spring.

J. C. Alcorn of Woodland Heights, score 95 1-3; John Gilbrath of Woodland Heights, score 96 2-3; and James Phillips of Byrds, score 92 1-2, will represent the 4-H Clubs.

Morris Polk of Woodland Heights, score 91 1-3; Aubrey Parker of route 4, score 90 2-3; and Thad Mauldin of route 4, score 89 2-3, will represent the vocational classes.

Shortage of Air Corps Officers

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—(AP)—A shortage of nearly 300 flying officers in the army air corps under the five year expansion program has caused the War Department to issue regulations requiring graduates of the advanced flying school at the Kelly Field, Texas, to remain in service two years.

This drastic departure from the previous practice of permitting the graduates either to continue in the military service or enter the commercial field was considered necessary to assure completion of the program.

The great demand for army trained aviators in commercial flying and the comparative scarcity of cadets, who graduate from the rigid course have brought about an acute situation in the army program.

Enright Nominee Square Deal Party

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Richard E. Enright, former police commissioner formally accepted for mayoralty nomination of the Square Deal Party last night on a platform of law enforcement.

He said he stood with President Hoover on the issue and charged Mayor James J. Walker and Tammany for protecting the 32,000 speakeasies in the city amounting to \$83,000,000 a year.

OIL INDUSTRY IS ON UPWARD TREND, SAYS E. B. REESER

NEW YORK—This country's oil industry is on the upward trend and while conditions are not entirely satisfactory the outlook is definitely more encouraging, in the opinion of E. B. Reeser, president of the American Petroleum Institute. He sums up the general situation as follows:

"Gasoline has not only maintained its position as the cheapest commodity in universal use on the market, but the average filling station price today is lower than the average of the last 11 years. The well integrated units of the oil industry are, almost without exception, showing satisfactory and in some cases exceptional earnings and net income statements.

"Gasoline and petroleum products consumption in the United States has outstripped even the highest increased production. The ratio of increase in the use of gasoline and products is relatively at the rate of two to one, compared with the current increase in output.

"The petroleum industry of the United States cannot be attacked as a trust. It is the 'little fellow' who makes the price, whether he be producer, refiner or retailer. We are having that illustrated in California and in the Mid-Continent.

"Overproduction, the currently major problem of the industry, will be solved within the next year. California is the key to the present situation, and California's output will be radically cut through enforcement of the state's gas conservation law, which goes into effect August 31.

"There is greater harmony and willingness to co-operate today between large and small units of the petroleum business than at any previous time in the history of the industry.

"For the first time there is positive assurance that the immense natural resources of petroleum, which the United States possesses to a greater extent than any other country in the world, will be conserved for the use of generations of our people beyond the power of the present generation to estimate.

3 NEW WELLS ADDED TO POOL IN 24 HOURS

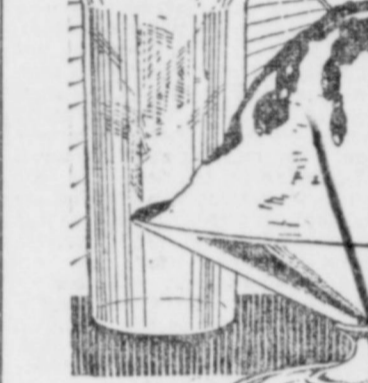

FEDERAL FARM FACTS

THE index of the general level of farm prices jumped from 140 to 143 per cent of the pre-war level during the period from July 15 to August 15, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports. This figure is 4 points higher than that of a year ago.

Larger yields are indicated for crops of the south and smaller for those of the north, according to a survey of the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics. Major crops of the north, such as corn, wheat, oats, potatoes and fruits, are expected to be smaller. Cotton, tobacco and sweet potatoes, the south's major crops, are expected to be larger.

An extensive campaign has been waged this season by farmers in the northwestern and lake states against the currant and gooseberry bushes. These bushes are hosts of the fungus which causes destructive blight rust of pine trees. More than 67,000,000 bushes have been destroyed, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Present indications point to a slight increase in winter wheat acreage this year. If this is carried out, production will be well above domestic requirements and the 1930 winter crop will have to be marketed on an export basis, says the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

That there has been no outbreak of the Hessian fly, insect pest of wheat growers, is due to scientific research and the application of results of these researches by farmers, according to Dr. W. H. Larriemer, entomologist in the U. S. Bureau of Entomology. The last disastrous outbreak of the insect was in 1919.

The "soldados" are women who cook and otherwise care for the soldiers. The Mexican army has no commissary department.

Free After Free Use of Language

HOUSTON, Texas, Sept. 18.—(AP)—An employe of a cleaning and pressing establishment at Pasadena, between here and the bayshore, is once more a free man after running afoul of the officers, including the mayor of his home town.

The man's first trial on an abusive language charge ended when one of the jurors jumped up with an assertion that the verdict would not be in doubt since the constitution guaranteed to every citizen "the right to cuss cut any officer, anywhere, anytime."

The justice of the peace dissented vigorously and ordered another trial at which the Pasadena man was acquitted. A charge of intoxication previously had been dropped.

The charges grew out of a fight between the cleaning and pressing employe and Pasadena traffic officers. One of the officers ordered the man to go home and get not only a refusal but a beating for his pains. Another officer came to his companion's assistance and he too was mauled. The mayor rushed up and a sleeve was torn from his shirt. Vile epithets allegedly were hurled at that dignitary during the melee. The man later surrendered to the justice of the peace.
