Sidewalks are needed in Amarillo. They are not an absolute necessity very often, but when they are so required they are like the old woman's ipecac tea—"needed powerful bad."

It is reported that the Santa Fe has made arrangements with the Fort Worth and Denver railway to carry their Colorado passengers over the latter line. This should bring an increased passenger traffic to Amarillo, at least over the Southern Kansas branch.

The News learns with regret that the report of Prof. J. D. Hamlin's departure for St. Louis in the near future is only too true. It would seem as if a town like Amarillo should make an effort to retain the services of such men of brains and energy.

Amarillo is, as it should be, proud of its college. With its strong faculty, its broad range of study and splendid facilities for imparting knowledge, it should and will, attract students from every town in Western Texas and hold fast to each and every student in our own town. There is no reason why anyone should leave Amarillo in search of an education, but many why seekers after knowledge should come from other points to Amarillo.

Where is there a town of its size that can boast of as many churches and such a number of church buildings as Amarillo? Is there a town of its size in the state that has the same number of scholarly and zealous preachers as has Amarillo? Where is there a town of its size that can equal Amarillo in the size, intelligence and devoutness of its Christian congregations? Nothing so invites immigration and stimulates business as a church-going, school-supporting community. Where there are churches there are also institutions of education. In Amarillo are seven church organizations—Baptist, Catholic, Christian, Episcopal, Methodist, Cumberland and Old School Presby-

byterian—all of which, except the Catholic and Episcopal, have neat and commodious buildings.

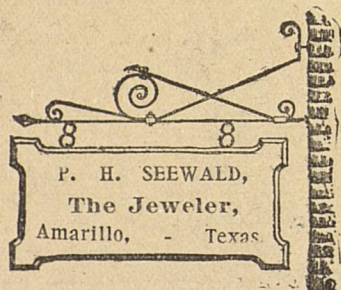

ORDINANCE NO. 26.

An ordinance creating the office of City Attorney and defining his powers and duties.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Amarillo:

That the office of city attorney for the city of Amarillo be and the same is hereby created and the Board of Aldermen, as soon as practicable after this ordinance takes effect, shall appoint some competent attorney to fill said office, who shall hold his office until the first regular meeting of the City Council after the next general election for city officers and until his successor is appointed and qualified. And at such first regular meeting after said election and at the first regular meeting of the Council after each and every general election for city officers held thereafter, or as soon as practicable thereafter, the said City Council shall appoint some competent attorney to fill said office who shall in like manner hold his office until his successor is appointed and qualified. Before entering upon the duties of his office the City Attorney shall take and subscribe the oath of office prescribed by the constitution of the state, and shall execute a bond with two or more good and sufficient sureties, to be approved by the City Council, payable to the city of Amarillo in the sum of one thousand dollars and conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties as such City Attorney.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the City Attorney to prosecute in the Mayor's, Recorder's or other city court, all actions in behalf of the city, and to defend said city in all cases brought against it in any court; to prosecute and defend all suits and actions in any court of this state wherein the city of Amarillo is interested or is a party; to advise the city council, or its committees, or any city officer on such legal questions as may arise in relation to the business of the city: to draw any bill or ordinance that he may be called upon to draw by any committee of the city council, and give his opinion in writing of any and all questions in law submitted to him by said council or any city officer. He shall when requested attend the meetings of the city council and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law or by the ordinances of the city of Amarillo.

Section 3. The City Attorney shall promptly pay over to the City Treasurer all moneys that may come into his hands for the use of the city and shall make a written report, verified by affidavit, to the city council on the first days of January, April, July and October of each year showing each item of money collected by him for the use of the city for the quarter last preceding, and the disposition made of the same, and shall also make report of any other matter in which the city may have an interest, that shall, from any cause, have been committed to his care or attention.

Section 4. The city attorney shall have power, by consent of the city council, to appoint in writing, an assistant, to continue in office during the pleasure of his principal, and who shall have the power and authority to perform all the acts and duties of his principal, and who shall take and subscribe the oath of office prescribed by the constitution, which shall be endorsed upon his appointment, and such appointment and oath shall be recorded in the office of the city secretary, and deposited in said office.

Section 5. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to in anywise abridge or restrict the right of the city council to employ such other attorneys as it may see proper to advise it, or to represent the city in any civil action pending or to be instituted in any court.

Section 6. No admission made by the city attorney, or his assistant, or any other attorney employed by the city, in any suit or action in which the city is a party, shall operate to prejudice the rights of the city.

Section 7. The city attorney, in criminal matters, shall receive such fees as are now or may hereafter be provided by ordinance, and in civil matters he shall receive such compensation as may be allowed by the city council.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
