TAX REBATES PLAN STARTS MUCH GOSSIP

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—(AP)—President Coolidge asked today for non-partisan consideration of his tax refund proposal.

He made known through the White House spokesman his desire that party lines be forgotten in consideration of the proposal by Congress.

It was also disclosed that the income tax credit plan announced yesterday by Secretary Mellon was not the final proposal of the administration.

The president will confer with members of the House ways and means committee before recommending how the surplus should be returned to the taxpayers.

The political whiffing of the capital revolved today around President Coolidge's proposal for individual and corporation tax refunds from the government's fiscal surplus.

Secretary Mellon, after a White House conference, suggested that the proposed income tax refund be effected by crediting the payer on the first two installments to be paid next year on this year's income, the credit being made as high as 12 1/2 per cent of next year's total taxes.

Norris on War Path. Accusing both republicans and democrats with playing politics with the tax question, Senator Norris, Nebraska, republican insurgent leader, declared that any treasury should be devoted to retiring the public debt.

precipitation accompanies cold weather

At the White House conference Secretary Mellon convinced the president that an immediate refund from income taxes collected this year would be too expensive from an administrative standpoint, but he accepted the proposal to divert his surplus away from debt retirement and into the pockets of the American tax payers.

The credit must be taken in the first two installments, the March and June payments, to enable the government to adjust its books by the close of the fiscal year on June 30th. The refund would total approximately \$250,000,000, the amount the surplus is expected to reach at that time.

Originating in Canada, the storm Sunday swept western Montana and the Dakotas and settled over Kansas and Nebraska where shifting winds yesterday sent low clouds over Missouri, Oklahoma and North Texas.

Temperatures were dropping today in Eastern Missouri and Northern Arkansas, changing a drizzling rain to sleet at some points.

Snow Hails Trains

Although the storm caused only slight damage in Kansas and Oklahoma, a three-inch snow fall in Western and Southern Kansas yesterday delayed trains. Snow plows were sent to Mineola, Kan., to release two transcontinental trains on the Rock Island lines, which were reported stalled in deep cuts.

Northwest farmers welcomed the snow as an aid to winter wheat, while cotton growers in Texas feared damage to crops if thermometers continued to fall. North and West Texas points reported temperatures of from 35 to 45 degrees, while the mercury hovered at or below freezing at many Kansas points.

In West Texas the cotton crop also was imperiled by stiff northern winds. San Antonio reported the mercury at 50 degrees with no wind this morning.

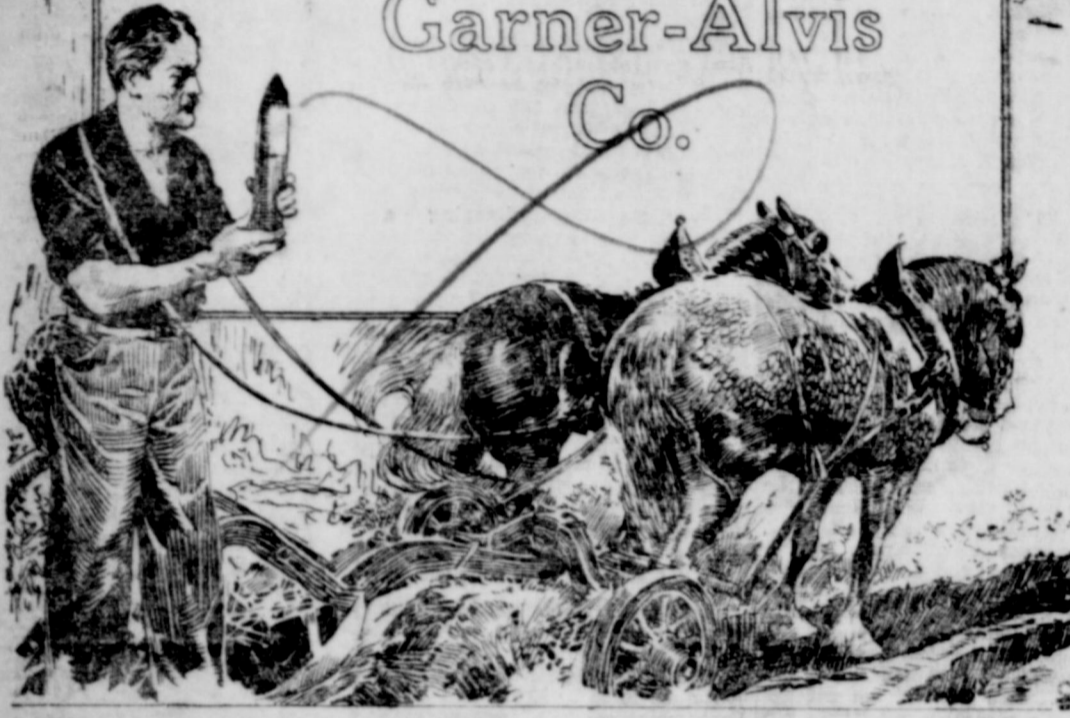

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The midwestern cold wave moved toward the Atlantic seaboard today, as the winds that swooped down from the Western Canadian plains country to touch the Texas Panhandle and leave snow tracks across the corn belt.

Low temperatures, snow and chilling rains followed in the wake of the cold, which assumed gale force at times, and the mercury hovered unseasonably and uncomfortably close to the freezing point and even below.

Cloudy skies brought slightly rising temperatures to the westward, with promise of warmer weather generally by tonight or tomorrow but the cold and snow flurries hung on over the eastern end of the corn belt.

The government forecast was for unsettled weather and more snowfall in the north and middle-west, while the storm center pursued a northeasterly course from the southwest to Ontario.

The premature arrival of winter found the midwest all unprepared and there was suffering from the cold in the cities, with many demands for charities for fuel.

There were no particularly severe temperatures, however, beyond the northwest, where the reading of six below at Minnedosa, in Canada was the lowest reported. Temperatures in the midwest hung around 20 degrees during the night.
