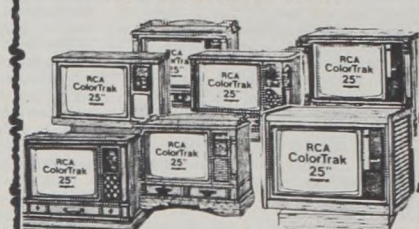

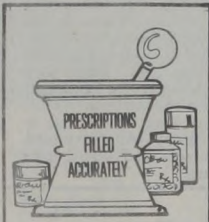

**City Offers Compromise on Gas Company Rate Increase**

The city of Muenster offers to go more than half way in adjusting rates with Lone Star Gas Co. It has been asked to approve an increase of 9.63 per cent, and has offered to along with an increase of 6.41 per cent.

The action was taken following first reading of the company's rate request at last Monday's meeting. Further consideration of the subject is due at the council's next meeting.

Another first reading by the council concerned a resolution on annexing the city to the Greater Texoma Municipal Utility District. The immediate purpose is to organize united action relat-

ive to water rights on Red River. Also anticipated is mutual consideration of other issues that will be interest to cities along the river.

A petition for annexation of about 3 blocks in the southeast part of town also received attention of the Council. Presented by Endico, Inc., it was referred to the zoning commission for identification as residential, commercial or otherwise.

The council also re-appointed John Pagel and J.W. Fisher to another 2 year term on the city park board and approved its usual semi-annual contribution of \$1850 to the city library.

**Official Notice**

Building permits issued prior to adoption of the city's zoning ordinance will become void if construction is not begun before Nov. 1, 1979. Holders of such voided permits will be required to re-apply for a permit.

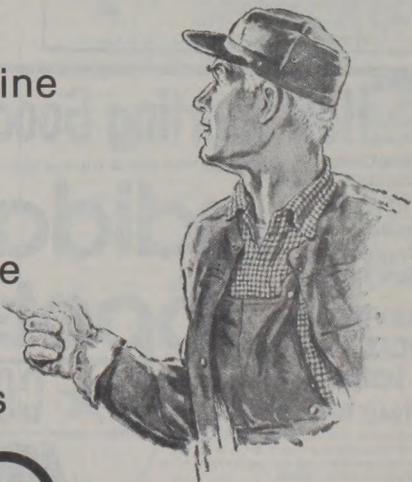

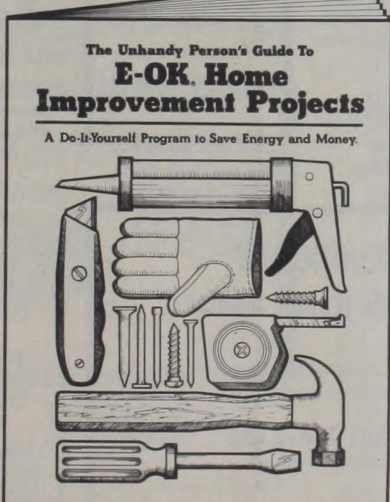
