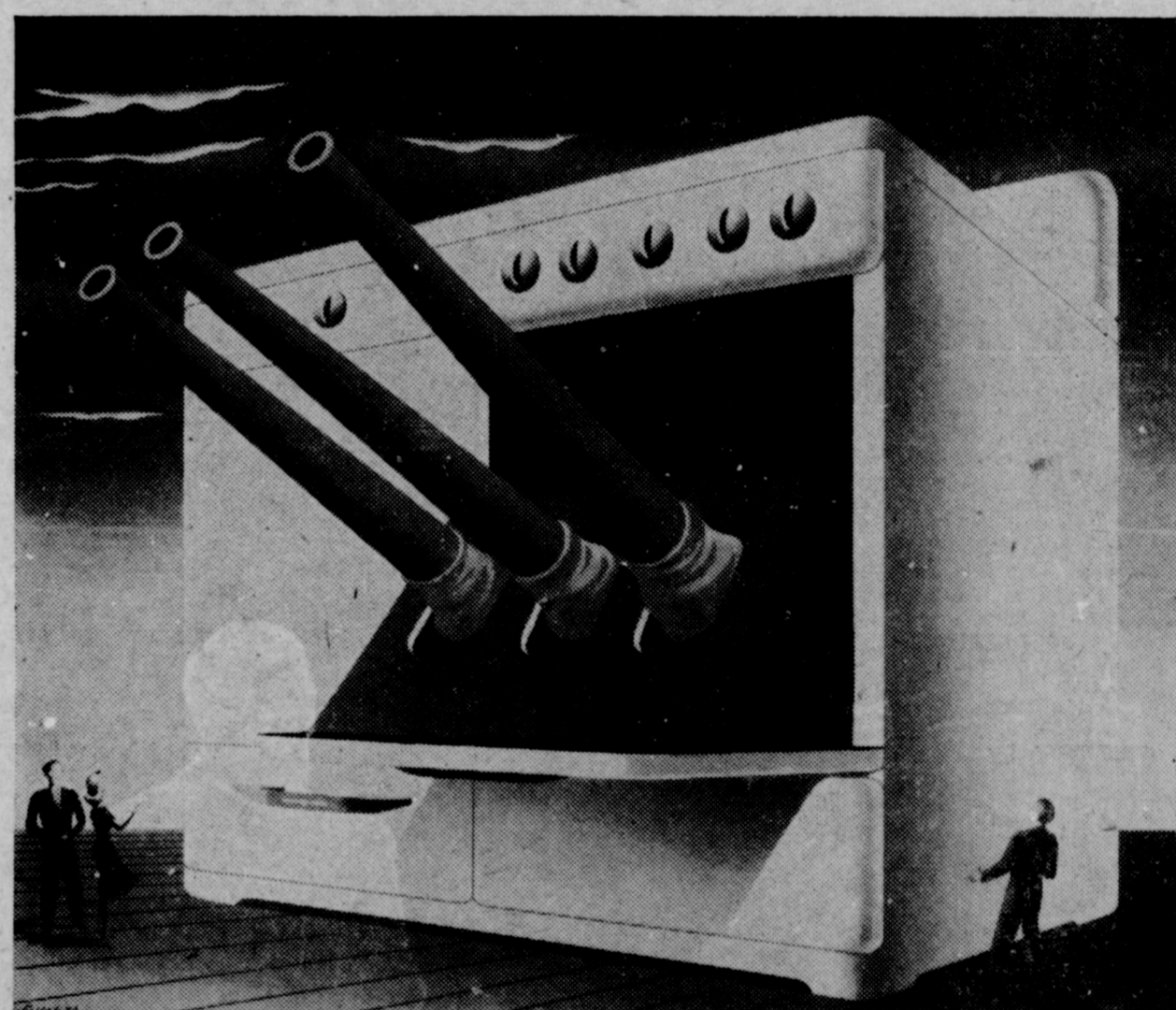

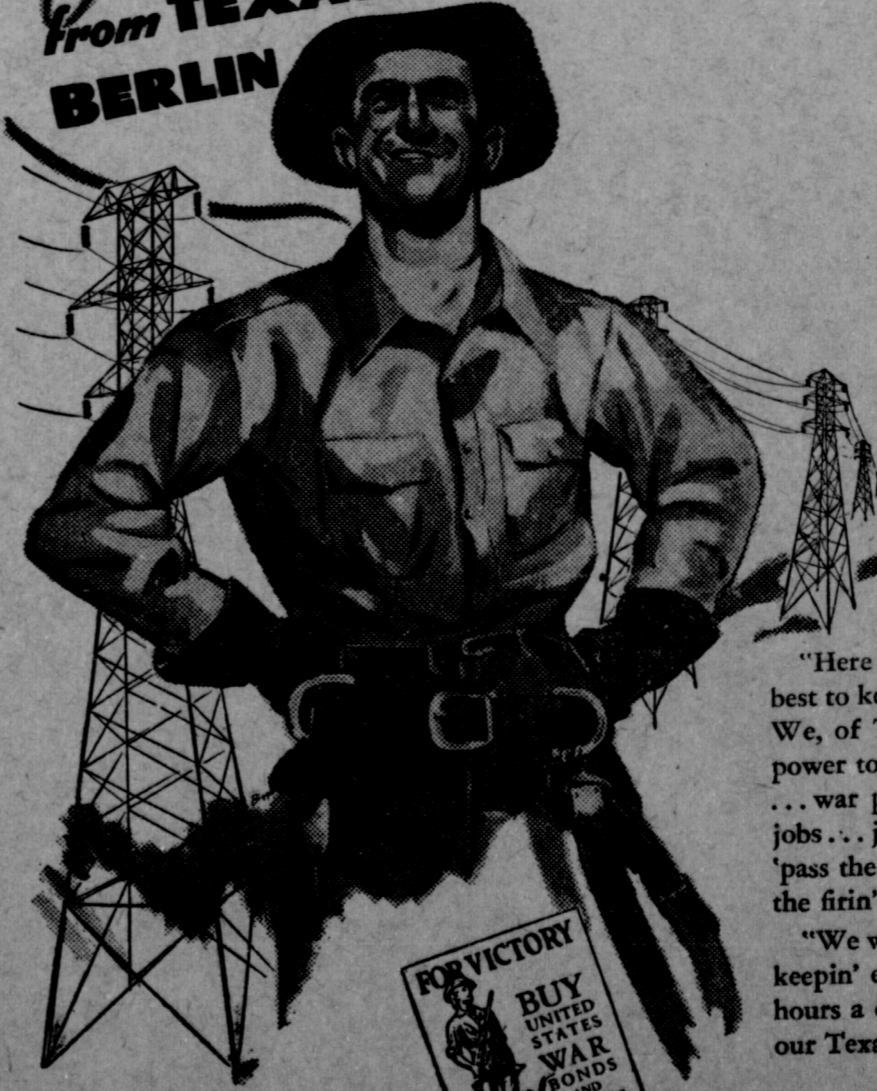

accuracy than the old rifle, don't worry. If the shooting scores of our outfit is any indication of the gun's effectiveness in combat, I would say let the enemy beware. Whether or not the gun is slightly off, the fact that counts is that the men consistently hit the mark they were shooting at. We had a few experts, quite a few sharpshooters and lots of marksmen. Naturally some failed to reach the marksman score, but not many.

Translated into combat terms this means that an enemy had better not show himself within a reasonable firing range if he expects to survive. Furthermore he'd better not feel safe at a distance of five or six hundred yards. Unless he has a charmed life, like the rat wandered out in front of our pistol targets. From the moment that one of the guys spotted him that rat became the official target. 45 slugs were tearing up the ground on all sides of him but he didn't seem a bit disturbed. There must have been 30 or 40 shots fired. Then I fellow contemptuously said gimme a real gun for this, and took up the Garand. A rapid fire burst of eight shots followed. The dust

LT. BEZNER WRITES FROM GUADALCANAL

LINDSAY — Lieut. Raymond Bezner, with the army air force, wrote a very interesting letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Bezner, which they received this week.

Lt. Bezner is stationed at Guadalcanal and mentions that "things are really popping." Excerpts from his letter, passed by the censor, follow:

"I suppose you are hearing plenty over the radio about Guadalcanal and the Solomon Islands. That's where I am while writing this. I arrived on Nov. 12, and I mean hell's bursting loose here. We live about a mile from the front lines but are well protected by those ever famous Marines, they're twice as rugged as people think they are.

"As yet I haven't even seen an enemy aircraft, it seems as though the Jap Zero fighters and Bombers are scared to death of our P-38. I've taken off after them a couple of times, but everytime they've run like - -. I want at least on to my credit before I come home.

"When I was in New Caledonia I couldn't write much as every letter was well censored, but they are more lenient here.

"Friday, the 13th of November, we were shelled. It was terrible. It seems like every shell is going to land right in your own "fox-hole" with you. You just lie there and wait until they're through and hope to God they don't get you. In years to come, the school children will probably read in their histories about the things that go on here. To us it is quite a show.

"While writing this I have been on the alert, awaiting a Jap bomber formation. I hope they don't turn around, before we get up, as they have been doing."

Ray received his wings at Ellington Field on March 7th and left the States for foreign duty on September 20. He received his lieutenant's commission, on September 14. He has a brother, Hugo J. Bezner, who is with the Navy Construction Battalion, stationed on Kodiak Island, Alaska.

settled and the rat was still contentedly hopping around. However, he must have been getting tired of the noise, for he scampered off into the sage brush without further delay. I can't vouch for the claim that he turned and gave us a Bronx cheer before taking off.

Something we did discover about our weapon is that it is not fool proof. If kept in the proper condition it is the sweetest shooting rifle a person could want, but if permitted to get dirty it may fail to bring the next round in which case a person has to reach up and reject it like any bolt action rifle, probably having a little more trouble in the emergency than an old time rifle would give. However, the vast superiority under normal conditions will more than offset the handicap in scattered emergencies.

As much as I hate to admit it, my score failed again to come up to my hopes. Plenty points to spare as a marksman but still short of the sharpshooter figure. Nevertheless it was good enough that one of the officers threatened to pull me away from the desk and put me at sniping. I suggested sticking where I am to furnish protection for him in a pinch. 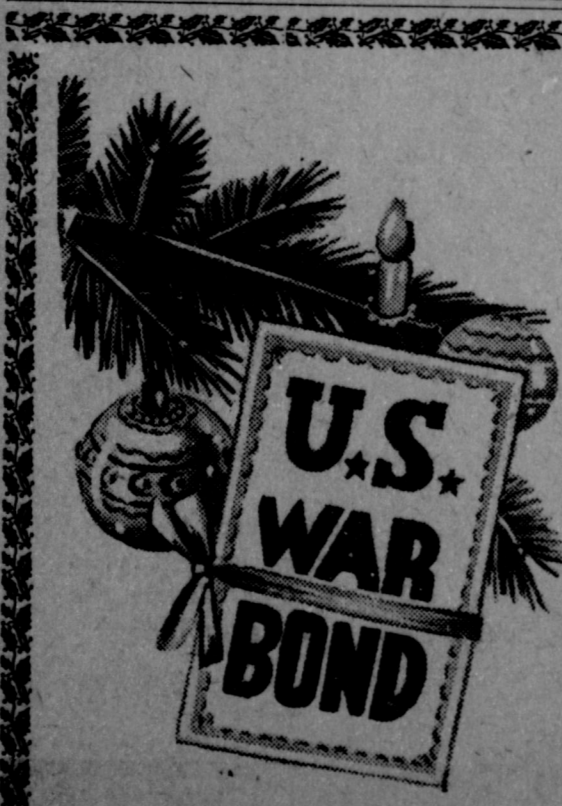

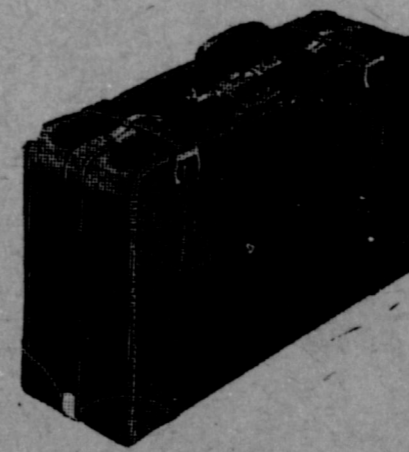
