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Congressman Charles Stenholm talked good common sense to several hundred persons attending the Electric Co-op's annual meeting Monday night. He said the nation's spendthrift policy of the past has resulted in lavish living and the solution is to tighten belts.

He favors eliminating and reducing the spending program wherever possible throughout the budget so that the deficit can be systematically reduced, even to the extent of balancing the budget in a few years. The government's money borrowers need to quit competing with private business so that money supply will become more abundant and interest rates can go down. 18 to 22 percent is simply too much to pay for the use of money.

The congressman is also critical of the relentless opposition by liberals and special interests to efforts to reduce government expense. He referred especially to the reaction of the media in seeking those who claim they will be deprived whenever the elimination of a waste is suggested. He is convinced, like most of us, that taxpayers are being ripped off by the billions for the benefit of ineligible or underserving individuals as well as thousands of bureaucrats who get big pay for goofing off our money.

Stenholm has lots of companions in Congress who agree with him on the welfare mess. They all support the president in his belief that America will get out of its trouble only by correcting its boners of the past few decades. He claims it is possible to halt the deficit at its present level of near \$100 billion a year and continue reducing until the budget is balanced.

This strikes us as a big achievement, but the sad fact is that it still has not touched the enormous debt. If the nation can make ends meet it will still owe more than a trillion dollars for which the interest charge is something more than \$100 billion a year. Someone has calculated that this amount comes to about \$500 a year for each of us 200 million persons.

Referring to the recent observance of FDR's birthday, Stenholm recalls an interesting experience. A liberal critic asked how a "Bollweevil" Democrat was impressed by the outstanding policies and achievements of the great president. The reply: "If FDR were here now he'd be a Bollweevil." In the first place the New Deal was work related, not a give-away. People accomplished something while receiving financial help. Besides, the money paid then for work is a mere trifle compared to the present give-away.

Imagine, the total cost of government was only 3 to 4 percent of the gross national product in 1929. It increased to 10 percent of GNP by the arrival of World War II, and gained to 20 percent during war time. By comparison, the present cost of government is 23.4 % of the GNP, and GNP then was a small fraction of what it is now.

Conservatives of the depression thought FDR was too generous with public money. Today's conservatives would be most pleased with his moderation. We can be confident that he would have found no room

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Electric Co-op operation reflects US economy

The operation of Cooke County Electric Cooperative during the past year reflected the trend of the nation's economy, with limited sales growth over the previous year, along with higher fuel costs and higher operating cost, plus higher equipment and material costs.

That was the message to member-consumers Monday night in the 44th annual meeting of the co-op in Muenster High School auditorium. Several hundred members attended and were treated to an address by Congressman Stenholm along with refreshments, door prizes and the business report.

President Vincent Zimmerer explained that kilowatt hour sales declined 1.5% in 1981, due to a moderate summer and conservation efforts of the consumers. However the number of customers increased, 375 meters being added.

Offsetting the drop in use of current, the gross operating revenue increased 13.1% because of a 16% increase in the cost of power.

After paying its power cost the co-op had only 16 cents out of each revenue dollar to meet other obligations. Operations, maintenance and administration cost \$107,729, nevertheless the business was able to pay \$252,790 in capital credits accrued for 1982.

President Zimmerer said the number of outages increased because of wind and

rain which hit particularly hard during the year. This was a factor in the operating cost, however the system was fortunate in escaping severe property damage.

Looking to the future he observed that the need of electricity is expected to increase but securing adequate funds for expansion will be a challenge because of double-digit inflation, soaring interest rates and increase of environmental and regulatory costs. Zimmerer said "a rate structure to cover operating expense and provide sufficient return for plant expansion, improvement and replacement will be increasingly difficult to maintain since the price of energy is already burdensome." He added that directors intend to continue efforts to hold the line on costs and construct only the facilities needed for efficient service.

Alois Trubebach, chairman of the nominating committee submitted the names of Billy Farr and Vincent Zimmerer as candidates for the election of directors and C. William Hermes was nominated from the floor. Balloting resulted in the reelection of Farr and Zimmerer.

After the meeting directors held a special organizational meeting in which Zimmerer continued as president, Robert Lewis as vice president and Wendell Proffer as secretary-treasurer.

Manager Mike Sloan

presented Frank Felderhoff with a plaque recognizing his retirement after 41 years of service.

Then Sloan introduced Congressman Charles Stenholm whose talk emphasized the state of economy and problems involved in recovery. He referred to the staggering national debt which costs an average of \$500 a year to every person, and to the national agricultural program which is in urgent need of improvement so that farmers can make ends meet. Ruling out price subsidy as a solution, he favored control of supply as a way to influence price, and to accomplish it by not raising a surplus or exercising more control over the market.

He felt US should not refuse to sell grain to Russia or any other country but should demand adequate prices. Even in spite of the problems, he reminded his audience that Americans are still fortunate. They spend only 15% of their income on food whereas other nations pay much more.

As an essential to deal with the problem, the congressman asked primarily for a spending cut. He said government now competes with the private sector for the available money, and the resulting scarcity of money forces up the interest rate. The first need, he said, is to reduce the high cost of money so that people will have a better

chance to reduce costs. Nevertheless, he was encouraging and optimistic, saying America has a history of muddling through the hard times and will do it again.

Last item on the meeting's agenda was the traditional drawing for attendance prizes. The 28 lucky winners were August Lutkenhaus,

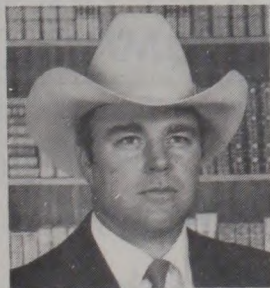

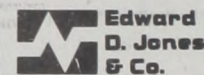

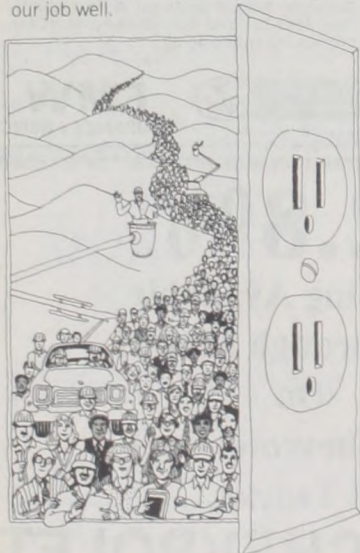

The project begins with designing the tiny vehicle with specifications of a racing car. This includes starting with a sketch of the creation and, after approval, making two more drawings resulting in a full scale three dimension set of plans.

Next the drawings are transferred to a Styrofoam blank which is then cut along the lines to produce the general shape of the car body and further trimmed for the desired streamline.

This object becomes a pattern, its measured specifications to be followed in carving a piece of white pine. And finally the car receives its finishing touches and holes are drilled for two axles and the carbon dioxide motor. The car must weigh

75 to 100 grams before painting. Last step in the building process is to mount plastic wheels and finish the painting.

Finally the project reaches its final and eagerly awaited stages, a double elimination race before envious seventh graders to determine whose car is the champ. It was Kenny Reiter's.

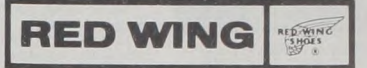

Justice of the Peace Precinct 4

Vote for Available, Impartial, Responsible JUSTICE

I am a Candidate for re-election to the office of Justice of the Peace, Precinct 4. I had not intended to become involved in the race for County Judge.

However, a political advertisement pertaining to that race which appeared in the Sunday, April 11, 1982 Gainesville Daily Register insinuated that my court could be "...coerced By"... officers group of officers into finding innocent people guilty or setting unreasonable fines..." and that my court might be less than "...fair, honest, and impartial...to all..."

In fairness to the citizens of my precinct, I cannot ignore such insinuations upon my court. I conduct my Court in accordance with the laws of our community, State, and Nation. In deciding cases brought before me, I am very impartial and fair. I respect both legal and moral rights of the citizens, hear both sides of the story, and treat everyone as I would want to be treated. I dismiss any case where there is a question of guilt and I have never nor do I intend to allow my judgement to be swayed by coercion or persuasion from anyone.

I do conduct my Court in accordance with principles in which I firmly believe. Those principles include:

- (1) upholding the law
- (2) protecting the community
- (3) working cooperatively with all agencies
- (4) respecting the legal and moral rights of the citizens, and
- (5) being available to conduct the business of the court to which I was elected by the citizens of my precinct. I do not have an unlisted phone number. I will not neglect the duties of the office to which I was elected, fail to respond to a citizens need in time of grief or sorrow or refuse to support the efforts of Law Enforcement agencies.

During my approximately 3 years and 4 months in office, I have processed 24,636 cases and collected \$517,460.41 in fines and fees, for an average fine or fee per case of \$21.41. (I do not consider a \$21.41 fine excessive punishment of the guilty for violation of the laws of our land.)

The heavy caseload in my court is primarily due to one reason, AVAILABILITY to conduct the business of the court.

Also during my term in office, I have conducted 35 death inquests. Nineteen of these inquests have been within my precinct. The remaining 16 inquests were outside my precinct, where I was called to perform the service due to the non-availability of other Justices of the Peace.

Incidentally, I do not receive additional pay, other than travel pay, for this rendering of service to the deceased and their loved ones.

I respect the right of my colleagues to hold opinions that differ with my own. But I will not allow such differences of opinion to sway me from the principles I have outlined above.

To the citizens of Precinct 4, I pledge that if I am returned to office, I will continue to process all cases filed in my court and to assess proper fines with the purpose that assessment of such fines may save the lives of an innocent persons and uphold the laws of this State.

I will sincerely appreciate your vote on May 1.

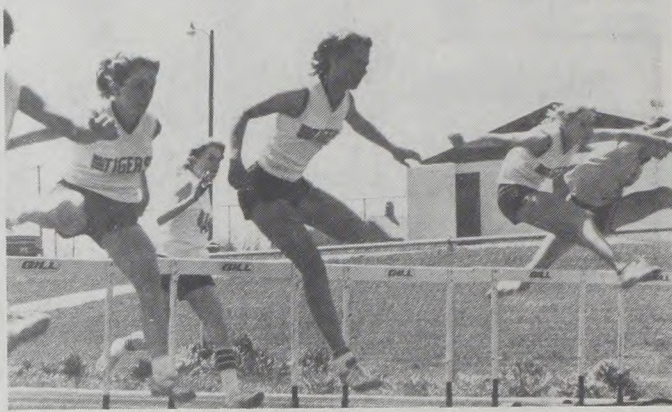

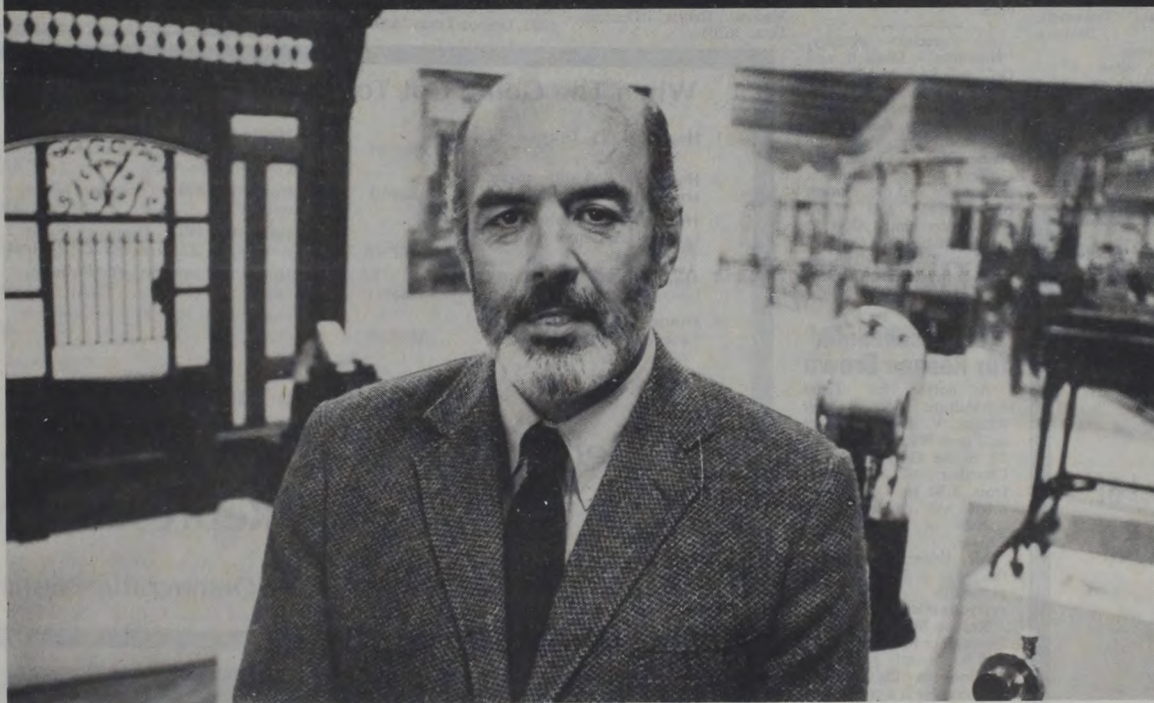

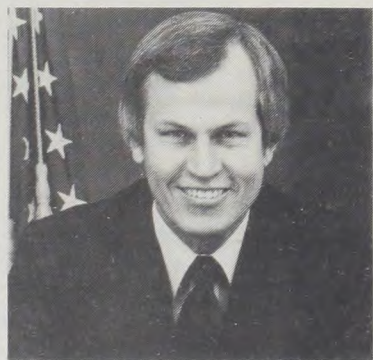
