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We're frequently told that the Soviet Union is the most efficient propaganda machine in the world. Its news manipulators are masters at creating favorable reports about the USSR and equally skillful at removing the unfavorable facts. As frequently observed before, this condition became crystal clear in the reports of Evangelist Billy Graham after his recent crusade in Russia.

The popular minister, one of the most influential churchmen of the world, goofed in a big way by allowing himself to be taken in by the Red lies and especially by lending his prestige in presenting Moscow's twisted version of its religious situation.

As told by M. Stanton Evans in Human Events, "All in all, Graham's trip was a mindless, stunning propaganda triumph for the Soviets...spreading exactly the kind of disinformation that they labor diligently to propagate about their treatment of religion. The difference, of course is that propaganda this time was served up by an American clergyman...and one of allegedly conservative credentials, at that."

One of the absurd remarks referred to the "free church" of Russia, apparently comparing with the "state church" of England, but obviously failing to note that the British situation concerns formality more than dogma whereas the church in Russia is free to operate only within the narrow limits allowed by the Kremlin.

Actually, Graham became another of several American visitors to be given a Potemkin Village tour of the USSR, and to be coaxed into repeating Moscow's propaganda line. He praised his hosts for a supposedly common availability of caviar. And he gushed about Russian churches being full up to capacity, unaware that such impressive conditions were carefully staged in the area selected for the visitor's guided tour.

Contrasted with the false version presented to visitors there are a few facts that are carefully kept under cover. First the official Orthodox Church is permitted to function only to the degree that it serves the Communist purpose. Its leaders say or do nothing to dispute the state line, whether in the field of religion, politics, economics, sports or what not. Over the years, many of those officials have been identified as high ranking officers of the KGB. Furthermore, as testified by Peter Deriabin, a former KGB agent, most of the priests in the USSR and religious people helping them are agents of the secret police. It's well known who directs the "free church" of Russia.

Still another thing Graham did not know is that many people in churches he visited were KGB agents pretending to pray but actually keeping an eye on true believers and taking up space so that "unreliable" members could be kept away. In addition to endorsing Russia's false claims about religious freedom, Billy Graham used very poor judgment in adding his bit to the anti-nuclear hysteria currently being promoted in several countries with agitation coming principally from Russia. Had Graham given serious thought to this

Rain interrupts disappointing harvest

After more than a week of steady progress, the community's grain harvest was suddenly interrupted Tuesday by three showers which added to 1.62 inch of moisture and included a few moments of marble size hail causing comparative little damage.

With a return of clear weather Wednesday, both of the local grain dealers, Muenster Milling Co. and Tony's Seed and Feed, expect combines to be back on the job at the end of the week, if luck holds out.

However, both are agreed that a bad situation has further deteriorated in the rain. Yields, originally estimated at near 30 bushels per acre, have been re-estimated at some 10 bushels less and were further reduced by the

rain. Grain that was ready for harvest has been damaged. In addition, the areas that were still too wet for combines were set back farther and their yields deteriorated farther.

Based on customer reports, the dealers estimate that the harvest is about half finished, however the last half may be slower in coming because of the many wet spots.

Price, too, continues to be disappointing, and combined with the poor yield the result is disaster. Local opinion is that the season is among the community's worst, perhaps the very worst. Many farmers are trying to improve this situation at least slightly by storing the grain and hoping for a better market.

Ferber gets top state rating in wastewater operations

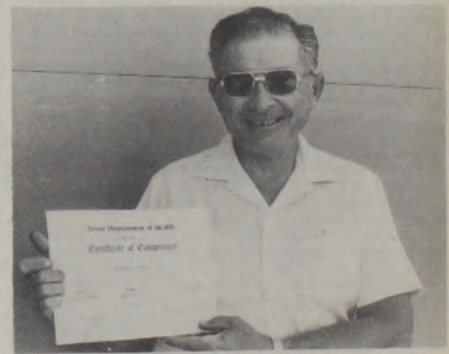
A Grade A wastewater certificate, the highest certificate of competency that can be earned in sewage management, has been awarded to Richard W. Ferber by the Texas Department of Health.

24 accidents in May reported by DPS

Msgr. Thomas Weinzapfel and Father Joseph Weinzapfel were Eucharistic ministers. Nephews of Bishop Dangelmayr were ushers and great-nephews were Mass servers.

A reception and dinner followed in the Sacred Heart Community Center.

Highlights in the biography of Bishop Dangelmayr

Bishop Augustine Dangelmayr was born December 11, 1898, in Muenster, a son of Joseph and Theresa (Muck) Dangelmayr. He received his primary education at Sacred Heart School and continued at Subiaco College for advanced study graduating with a BA degree in 1919. He studied theology at St. Mary's University, LaPorte, Texas, and Kenrick Seminary, St. Louis, and was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Lynch at Sacred Heart Cathedral, Dallas, on June 10, 1922.

Shortly after ordination Father Dangelmayr became assistant to the rector of the cathedral, secretary to Bishop Lynch and chancellor of the diocese. He was appointed vicar general of the diocese in 1941.

Some of his many assignments while associated with the diocese were actuary of the matrimonial court;

member of the diocesan finance and building commission; In 1938 (depression), Catholic representative and director of relief; During WW II, public member of regional war labor board; headed the Chancery office and all its departments including the matrimonial court, bookkeeping, etc. with assistance of Audna Besse and Catherine Reitz and Fathers Gulczynski and Tschoepe; conducted adult convert classes receiving about 100 per year. In 1926 he won a trip to Europe in a contest sponsored by the Dallas Dispatch. Also, he was director of the Society of the Propagation of the Faith, director of the Union of Catholic Youth and director of the Catholic Nurses Association, while participating in civic and charitable activity.

On Aug. 11, 1934, he was appointed papal chamberlain by Pope Pius XI, and on Jan. 15, 1937, he was named Domestic Prelate with the title of Monsignor. He received an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from St. Mary's University, San Antonio on May 28, 1939.

Announcement of Monsignor Dangelmayr's designation to the Episcopate was made on April 26, 1942 through the

apostolic delegate in Washington. He was ordained Auxiliary Bishop of Dallas Oct. 7, 1942, by the apostolic delegate, Archbishop Almeto Giovanni Cicognani, DD.

On February 26, 1954, Bishop Dangelmayr was appointed the founding pastor of St. Monica Parish, Dallas, and served there until he retired and moved to Muenster in 1962.

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Hot line fights oil field crime

An aggressive campaign against oil field thefts in Texas has begun with the installation of a new permanent statewide hotline. The Petroleum Industry Security Council (PISC) is offering a reward of up to \$5,000 for information leading to the arrest and indictment of persons suspected of stealing crude oil or oil field equipment, or for information leading to the recovery of stolen oil field equipment. The new toll free hotline number is 1-800-645-2677 or 1-800-OIL-COPS.

Chartered as a non-profit corporation in January 1982, PISC was formed by petroleum industry associations in an effort to provide organized support to law enforcement in combating oil field crimes. The

hotline is just the first step in a comprehensive program to reduce the oil industry's estimated \$100 million theft losses in Texas. Headed by Ed Richards, the former Investigator General of the Texas Department of Human Resources and Department of Public Safety officer, PISC plans to develop a uniform marking system for oil field equipment, theft prevention programs for the industry, and a computer backed theft reporting and inquiry system. PISC also plans to place experienced criminal investigators across the state to cooperate with and support law enforcement efforts to reduce the theft problem.

The new hotline will replace the oil field theft

hotline operated by North Texas Oil and Gas Association and supported by other petroleum industry associations. The old number, 1-817-723-1114, will cease operation on June 6. Any citizen having information about oil field theft is requested to call the PISC hotline or write: P.O. Box 15392, Austin, Texas 78761. Citizens are not required to reveal their name, just provide the information and they will be assigned a code number for identification. Richards says citizens should call 1-800-OIL-COPS and help reduce oil production costs by stopping the oil field thefts which ultimately drive up consumer costs for oil products.

New assistant county agent named

A new man is on the job in the office of the Extension Service in Cooke County. He is John Bourquin of Purcell, Okla., assistant extension agent for agriculture, with a principal assignment of assisting 4-H clubs with their projects and programs.

Bourquin is well acquainted with his job. He was born and reared on a farm, participated in 4-H and FFA programs as a schoolboy and also helped with the family's farm work. He attended Oklahoma State University and graduated with a degree in animal science. He is 22 years old and married. He succeeds Dolph Marrs who has moved back to Arkansas.

New heating method described

STILLWATER—Many people eating at home enjoy gourmet type foods packaged to go from the freezer to the range to the table.

Now, microwave heating of frozen foods packaged in aluminum containers is easier than ever because of a new cooking method developed by the aluminum foil container industry.

Sue Herndon, extension housing and equipment specialist at Oklahoma State University, gives steps to follow when heating TV dinners in a microwave oven:

- Remove frozen food from paper carton.
- Remove the lid or cover from the aluminum foil tray containing the food.
- Put the tray of food back into the paper carton, leaving flaps on one end open to release steam.
- Place the paper carton into the microwave oven and heat.

When using this method to cook frozen TV dinners in a microwave oven, be sure the carton is paper, not foil-laminated. If the outer carton is covered with metal foil, the method will not work.

Always remove the lid from the foil container that holds the food. This lets food expand as it is heated and prevents feedback from lids that may be made of aluminum, says Miss Herndon.

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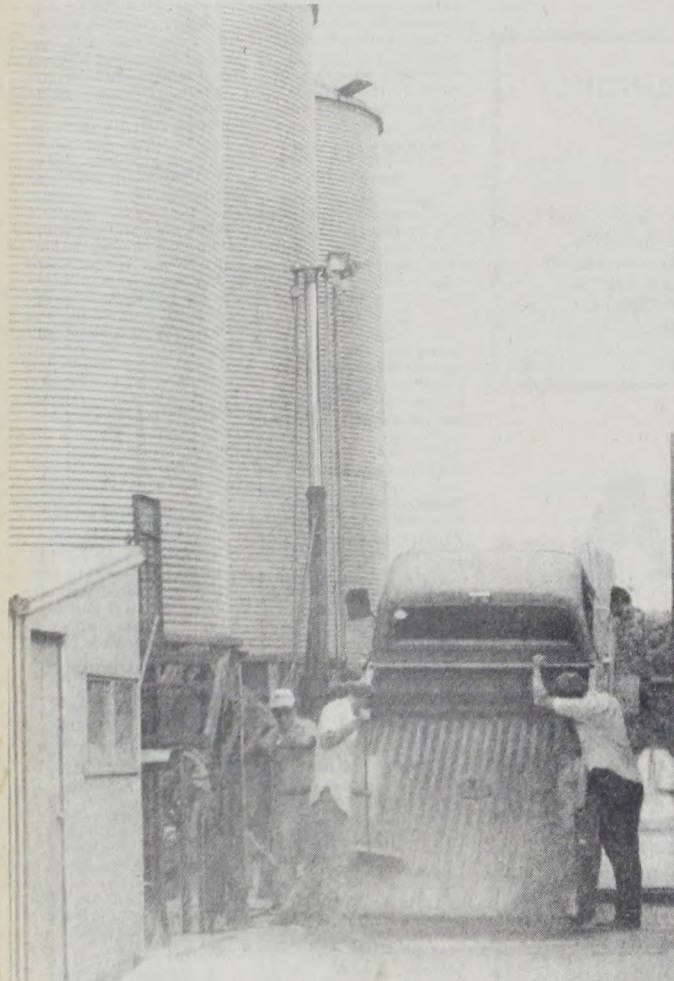
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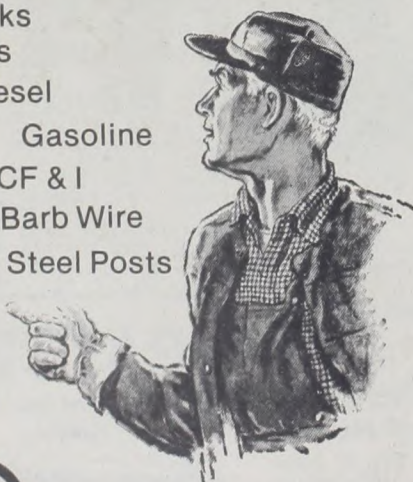
Tony Felderhoff unloads his pick-up of wheat while Muenster Mill employees, Gilbert Hess and Ronnie Felderhoff sweep it clean.

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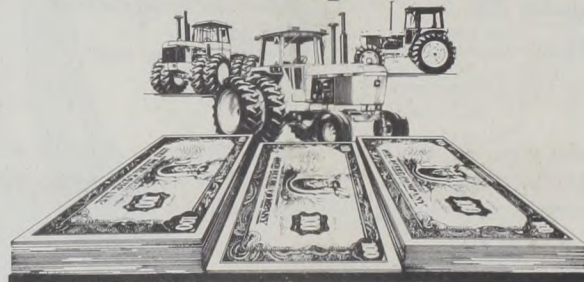
