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Speaking at a college commencement a few days ago, President Reagan was emphatic in stating that education in America is not what it is supposed to be. And he went on to say that the federal government has been the biggest cause in the decline of quality. One statement, for instance, is that the slump began with establishment of the Department of Education, which can be quite accurately described as the political outgrowth of the liberal American Education Association.

This is the organization of self-styled elitists who have been clawing at the fundamentals of Americanism for decades. They are a part of the intellectual conspiracy seeking to convince the country that it can get along without God, that humanism is the modern way. They are the advocates of divorce and abortion and homosexuality, in fact the supporters of a shabby moral standard which ignores the law of God and maintains that a person's selfish desires come first.

They are the people who believe in gun control rather than criminal control, who go all out for a criminal's right but brush off the crime victim's right. In the economy they advocate socialism while sneering at the free enterprise system which made the nation great. In government they believe in plundering the public purse to buy votes.

For years the American Education Association has been busy establishing its beliefs in the nation's schools. They are the people who have belittled American heroes and glorious events of our history, as well as cherished custom and tradition. And they did not change their principles when they adopted the new title Department of Education. They only intensified their attack on the nation's fundamentals.

The President was correct in stating that the federal government is not the friend of American education. Rather it is the principal reason behind the currently lamented decline of quality. Its best possible service would be to quit interfering and let states and communities stay with the basics as well as classroom prayer.

The ironic fact about all this is that DOE organized with school welfare as only a secondary aim. The real motive was political, an arrangement whereby the liberals of the administration granted power and prestige in return for support. So the misguided idealists got greater support in imposing their wild ideas on American schools and liberals of government got more support toward perpetuation in office.

That fact was apparent in 1980 when DOE threw its support solidly behind Reagan's opponent and did its utmost to influence the country's teachers. Aware of the department's over-all shabby record, the president proposed eliminating it after election. Unfortunately that has not happened and DOE continues sabotaging the country and the president.

In a recent issue Conservative Digest lists nineteen cases in which DOE, ostensibly a part of the administration, has been

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
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June 13-17 set for Bible School

Registration for summer classes set

For the many local and area students planning to spend at least a part of their summer vacation in the classroom, summer school at Cooke County College is just around the corner.

Enrollment for the first summer session at CCC will take place May 30-31 (Monday and Tuesday) on campus, with classes set to begin June 1.

"For returning students, getting into summer school couldn't be easier," says Dr. Don Stafford, CCC registrar. "All that previously enrolled students have to do is come to registration and sign up for classes."

Dr. Stafford adds that, unlike for the longer fall and spring semesters, there will be no time permits issued for summer registration. Enrollment will be conducted on a first-come, first-served basis.

Neither are returning students required to see a college counselor prior to registration for the summer sessions.

"It would still be a very good idea for returning students to go ahead and see a counselor anyway," says Bill Caver, director of counseling, "especially if they have questions or are having a problem deciding which courses to take this summer."

Caver points out that a pre-enrollment counseling session is strongly recommended for students who will be attending CCC for the first time this summer.

"Many times, new students may not understand the system of prerequisites or certain courses offered," he explains. "Also, some courses and programs require presentation of ACT test scores for placement. A few minutes with a counselor could save a lot of wasted time and effort for new students."

Dr. Stafford says that students who have not previously attended CCC — whether recent high school graduates, college transfers or holders of GED certification — should visit the Registrar's Office as soon as possible to pick up and complete an application for admission.

In addition to the completed admissions application, all that is required of new students wanting to attend summer school at CCC is an official transcript from the last school attended or proof of GED certification.

Among the students expected to sign up for classes this summer at CCC are many who have been out of school for some time, Caver says.

"We especially want to make such students aware of the many support services available to them through our Counseling Center," he said. "It's not an easy thing to get back into the classroom after several years, but we can help ease the transition. We also are equipped to supply valuable career planning advice for students looking to qualify themselves for better jobs through education and vocational training."

Time for registration for the first summer session at CCC will be 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. on May 30 (Monday) and 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on May 31.

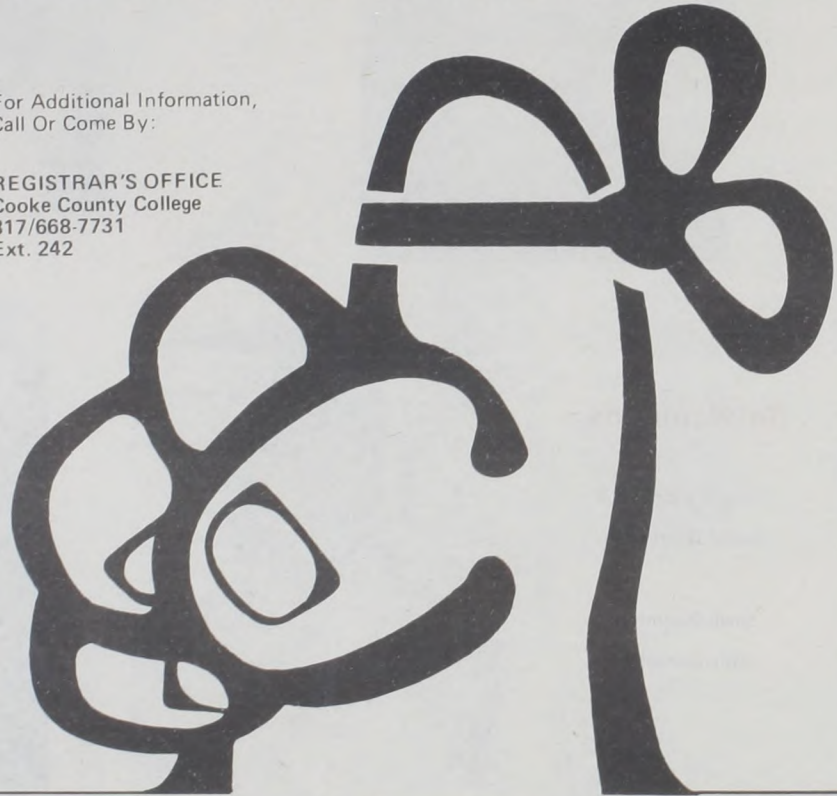

Job market tight for '83 graduates, officials say

Upon graduation from high school, people generally do one of two things — they either keep going to school, or they go to work. And members of the Class of '83 who go for the second option are going to find a very tight job market when they start looking, according to local officials of the Texas Employment Commission.

"Generally, it's pretty tight right now, and probably will be for a while," Gerald Blase, Denton TEC placement supervisor, said recently. He said there are very few jobs available for persons looking in the unskilled labor field; some construction jobs are to be had, but very few jobs in manufacturing are available. Bill Conely, an employment interviewer in the Sherman TEC office, which administers both Cooke and Grayson counties, sees things in much the same way.

Many of the jobs in this area, particularly Cooke County are very dependent on the oil industry, which isn't very good right now, he explained. Conely says he wouldn't call the situation completely dismal, but predicts the young person out looking for a job in the local

area will have to be patient and knock on a lot of doors before finding something.

Both men say the reason for the tight job market lies in the fact that a nationwide recession just took longer to get to this area, and consequently, may be here for quite a while.

Neither is overly optimistic about the immediate future of that job market. Blase says another manufacturing plant is expected to begin operations in Denton sometime late in the summer or early in the fall. That will offer some relief, he said.

Conely says there are some retail establishments planning to begin operations in Grayson County in the near future, but nothing in Cooke County that will make a significant difference in the number of available jobs.

When looking for a job, being able to present a good school record and having a healthy attitude about working are two of the best things a young person can concentrate on, Conely said. Blase said some background in vocational areas will be a good point when job hunting.

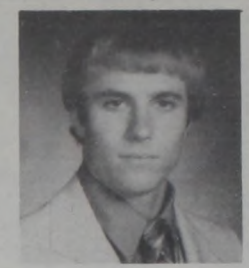

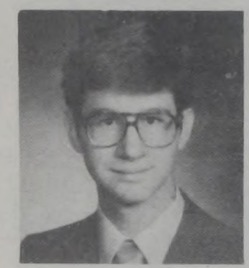

"The poor getting poorer"

Looking at the farm to retail price spread, it's basically a case of "the poor getting poorer."

Farmers are continuing to get less of the dollars that consumers spend at supermarkets and restaurants,

says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Last year only 28 cents of every dollar spent on food went back to the farmer," said Dr. Forrest Stegelin, "while 32 cents went for labor and the remaining 40 cents covered marketing costs."

This difference between what farmers receive and what consumers pay for food products is called the "farm to retail price spread" and represents food industry charges for handling, processing and retailing farm good commodities, notes the economist. That difference rose 5.1 percent in 1982 and is expected to grow even larger this year.

Why? "Because, while the farm value of food is expected to rise only 1 to 4 percent in 1983, marketing costs are forecast to increase 4 to 7 percent," Stegelin says. Thus the trend of marketing costs rising faster than the farm value is expected to continue as it has for the past three years.

"This means that the overall food price increases have been influenced less and less by changes in farm prices and more and more by changes in the cost of packaging, processing, fabricating, transporting and distributing, and food industry wages," he said. "This year the higher marketing bill will account for more than three-fourths of the increase in total consumer spending on food."

Marketing costs are particularly high for highly processed crop products, notes the economist, while they are lower for animal products. The farm value represents 50 to 60 percent of the retail prices for meats, dairy products, and poultry and eggs but only about 20 percent of the retail prices for processed fruits and vegetables and some 14 percent for bakery and cereal products.

County Agent's Report

We just received the results from a hay ammonization demonstration conducted on the Werner Becker Dairy at Hood. Results showed what should be expected from use of this relatively new practice for improving hay quality. Both crude protein and digestibility were increased in all hays sampled. The poorer the quality of the hay, the greater the benefit derived from the ammonization process. In this particular demonstration Werner selected poor quality hays and as you can see in the chart below, most of the protein content was doubled. In high quality hay (10 percent crude protein or above) the effectiveness of the ammonization is less and probably not cost effective. Digestibility is also increased due to the breakdown of fiber content in the hay.

All of the hay with the exception of ten square bales were round baled. The process used was a pyramid type stack of 27 bales stacked in a row with two on the ground and one bale stacked on the top. The row was covered with 6 mil. black plastic and sealed around the edge with dirt. Dirt will do an excellent job in sealing off the stack to prevent the escape of the anhydrous. A six foot piece of pipe was added on to the end of the nurse tank hose, and the ammonia was released under the plastic. Four to five percent ammonia was added and measured by the percent gauge on the tank. The total pounds of anhydrous applied was based upon the weight of the hay.

The cost of this process including the ammonia and plastic is about \$6.50 a ton.

The plastic should hold up well enough to be used several times.

The hay was left covered for two weeks. In the hot weather of summer, action is faster and the hay will only need to be covered about 10 days. You can identify properly ammoniated hay by its dark color, soft texture, and smell.

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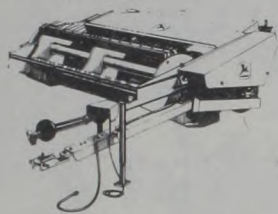

Cotton, leads '82 cash crops

Texas farmers got about \$800 million less from crop sales last year compared to 1981, with cotton sales taking the sharpest nosedive — from \$1.4 billion to \$875 million.

Despite these heavy losses, cotton (both lint and cottonseed) was still the leading cash crop last year, with the South Plains leading the state at more than \$270 million in cash receipts.

Grain sorghum was the second leading cash crop with receipts of \$619 million. The Panhandle was the leading area with a \$165.5 million crop.

The Panhandle also led in cash receipts from wheat, ensilage and sugar beets. Wheat sales totaled \$169 million; ensilage, \$11.6 million; and sugar beets, \$10.4 million for the district.

Wheat was the third leading cash crop in the state last year with receipts totaling more than \$499 million.

Along with its cotton crop, the South Plains was the leading producer of corn, soybeans and sunflowers. Cash receipts from corn surpassed \$130.5 million, soybeans brought in \$64.9 million, and sunflowers sales reached \$24.4 million.

Total cash receipts from hay were the largest in North Central Texas, totaling \$22 million. That region also led in cash receipts from plums and peaches at \$515,000 and \$3.5 million, respectively. Cloverseed sales in North Central Texas totaled \$595,000 and led the state.

Alfalfa and guar crops brought top cash receipts in the Rolling Plains

Texas farmers should see some improvement in farm prices as huge stockpiles of farm commodities are reduced through the PIK (payment-in-kind) program, says Anderson.
