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Secretary of Labor William Brock expressed the American ideal very well in his Labor Day message to the nation's working men. He said he is proud to join the public tribute to them, acknowledging that their skills have been vital to our achievements in peace and war, that workers and their unions have been at the forefront over the years for greater social and economic justice, for more and better education, and for other reforms that made our country the moral as well as the political and economic leader in world affairs.

He praised them for their sweat and sacrifices, their ingenuity and creativity, which have been crucial to the building of our nation in every sense. "The dignity of work that you represent and the pride that you take in doing your jobs well have been symbols of America over the years."

The words are well chosen. The labor movement has been a mighty factor in America's progress. By unity and dedication to quality, it has enabled workers to achieve more security while assuring more and better production. Aided by farsighted industrialists, they have enabled their country to take the lead among nations.

Moreover, as many older folks can happily recall, Labor and Industry teamed together and provided the stout support enabling our armed forces as well as our allies to win World War II.

Such complimentary rhetoric is well deserved, especially in observance of Labor Day. But it does not quite cover the subject. It does not admit, as it should, that some current facts are not complimentary.

For instance, teachers of Chicago are observing the day by striking for higher pay. They are making children's needs secondary to their demands. As Paul Harvey remarked, they are teaching while on the picket line. Their actions fall far short of the Labor Secretary's mention of dedication and sacrifice. Considering average teacher salaries nowadays, one has to wonder whether demands are based on need or greed.

In fact, one could ask the same question about lots of other demands for more pay. We often hear of cases when pay is already fabulous but workers want more. Also, some demands are made even when jobs are jeopardized by foreign competition. We hear frequently that the United States loses markets because its products are undersold ... because American workers price themselves out of their jobs. Without question, the situation could be improved if the worker dropped his demand for a raise, or even offered to take a slight cut. It's better to tighten the belt and keep eating.

Another consideration is quantity of production. It made a difference in war to work harder. It could do the same in peace. Some of the solution to this problem may depend on industry to provide more efficient equipment. Japan and Germany are said to gain by better technology. Similar change may be some of the answer here. Labor and Industry could profit by thinking it over. In fact, they could solve other problems by a mutual attitude of helping each other and the public rather than clash in hard-headed greed.

Still another thought for the day is quality work. The frequency of recent airplane crashes has people suspecting the standards of maintenance. Planes have a great record of durability, but will develop weakness eventually. Those faults should be found and corrected, but appear to be overlooked. Likewise, we often hear that faults are found in other items, like cars, appliances, etc., which often could be avoided.

There are two ways to look at Labor Day ... concern as well as appreciation.

Trustees veto budget estimate of county appraisal district

Trustees of Muenster ISD, in regular session Thursday, Aug. 29, adopted a budget of \$1,220,624, an increase of about \$10,000 over last year's budget.

Actually, the figure is some \$60,000 more than last year's expenditure, which was used as a guide, along with some anticipated changes, in making this year's estimate.

Before beginning its budget hearing, the board reviewed its '84-'85 budget, which indicated that actual operation was about \$50,000 less than expected. After its hearing on this year's budget, the board approved it unanimously.

Superintendent Charles Coffey presented a detailed list of the expenditures which are included in the total. The big item on that list is \$695,182 which consists of teacher pay plus related instruction cost. Other major costs are instruction administration \$45,230; library \$33,094; pupil transportation, salaries, supplies and capital \$61,934; food service

\$59,850; co-curricular \$26,515; general administration with legal services, audit, tax appraisal service, etc. \$93,950; plant maintenance and operation along with supplies and contracted services \$145,053.

To support the expenditures, the board estimated total revenue of \$1,228,377.47. Principal sources of the revenue were listed as follows. Local maintenance and debt service tax based on a rate of .595 and total value of \$81,198,037 amounting to \$483,128, and expected collection rate of 97 percent yielding a net of \$468,463; co-curricular revenue such as athletic gate receipts and lunchroom income \$65,000; state aid \$652,300; federal programs \$19,858; sale of driver ed car \$9,500.

The tax this year is 59.5 cents per \$100 worth of assessed valuation. It was 60 cents per \$100 last year. However, the total revenue is expected to be higher because district valuations are higher.

MISD budgets \$1,220,624

Other than the budget, three items received principal consideration at last Thursday's meeting of the Muenster school board. First was unanimous rejection of a budget for operation submitted by the Cooke County Tax Appraisal District.

Superintendent Coffey pointed out that many of the district's charges for services have been raised to the extent that the proposed budget is 35 to 38 percent higher than last year. The result to Muenster I.S.D. would be an increase of about \$7,000 in its annual bill.

Coffey added that taxing entities all over the county were demanding an adjustment of the appraisal district's estimates.

Another item is a modification

of the school calendar. The date of March 10, 1986, has been set for a statewide test of teacher competency. Students will have a holiday on that day and will have to make up the lost day on May 29.

Also, the trustees agreed to join in hosting the Texas Sesquicentennial wagon train on its arrival here June 19, 1986. Monica Hess, representing the Chamber of Commerce, asked the school to help in providing parking space for teams and wagons, and shower and toilet facilities. Particulars on numbers and accommodations will be told when they become available. Whatever the answers, the Chamber of Commerce will try to make the necessary contacts for an adequate welcome.

Blood drive Wed.

Volunteers of the Muenster Hospital staff and the Hospital Auxiliary are ready for the next community blood collection to be held here Wednesday of next week. It will be in the K of C Hall from 2 to 7 p.m., conducted by the Red Cross regional blood center of Wichita Falls with local personnel assisting in both technical and clerical work.

David Bright, local chairman, is spreading word of the collection, especially to the regular donors, and urging them to come and join in the good work of providing for the blood needs of their friends.

The blood is available to patients of Muenster Memorial Hospital and to residents of the district receiving transfusions in other hospitals.

The Muenster Hospital District participates in the Red Cross program of Wichita Falls, in which some 30 communities have their blood needs met and take turns in providing for the system. The arrangement is a money saver for patients. There is no cost for the blood in a transfusion because it was donated. The only charge is for expenses in collection, packaging, storing, delivering, etc.

September scorches

It's September and still summer. After 23 days of 100-plus in August, the scorches continued through the next four days, the Sept. 1 reading setting the record at 108 ... and the day before was next high at 105. Combined count of 2 schools is 655

Enrollment gains 33

Both Muenster schools are starting the year with an enrollment increase, a gratifying turn-around from the drop of a year ago.

Combined totals this week reveal a gain of 33 over the 1984 starting figure as contrasted with the decline of 8 in last year's enrollment. And that's not all. As a bonus, the Young Children's Learning Center has 10 more pre-kindergarten children. Totals are 655 in both schools and 43 in preschool.

Detailed listing reveals that 23 of the school age gains were at Sacred Heart (224 to 247) and 10 were at the Public School (398 to 408). Further details show that Sacred Heart has 170 in elemen-

tary, a gain of 17, and 77 in high school, a gain of 6. The separate figures at Public School are 284 in the grades, a gain of 2, and 124 in high school, a gain of 8.

Other combinations show a total of 201 high school students in the two schools and 454 in elementary.

Though a pleasing contrast with other recent enrollments, the present figure is far under the total of 797 in 1968, which then did not include kindergarten. Not counting kindergarten, the enrollment now would be only 600, almost 200 under the '68 total.

Pat who?

WASHINGTON, VA. — In 1974, most folks assumed the 1976 Presidential race would be between Republican Nelson Rockefeller and Democrat Ted Kennedy. A year later, polls showed either Gerald Ford or Ronald Reagan losing to the Democratic front-runner, Hubert Humphrey. In 1977, George Will was one of the few commentators who foresaw Carter's reelection defeat; Carter, he said would lose to the Republican nominee, Howard Baker.

In every election, things happen that no one could have predicted. In every election, there is an important figure - in political jargon, a "major player" - who was only a tiny dot on the horizon one, two or three years earlier. Between now and 1988, a businessman may be picked from obscurity to become Secretary of the Treasury ... a Jaycees chapter president may win election to the U.S. Senate in a stunning upset ... a college professor or a shop steward may become nationally known as the leader of a revolt against high taxes ...

Or a broadcaster from Virginia - a university president, ordained minister, commentator, successful businessman and humanitarian - may seek the Republican nomination for President of the United States. If you haven't heard of Pat Robertson, you will soon.

Pat Robertson is the son of Senator A. Willis Robertson (D-Virginia), longtime chairman of the Senate Banking Committee. A Golden Gloves boxer and *magna cum laude* graduate of Washington and Lee, he saw combat as a Marine in Korea. He received a law degree from Yale University and a Master of Divinity degree from New York

Theological Seminary, and he did graduate work at the University of London.

In 1959, he bought a dilapidated UHF TV station in the Virginia Tidewater area. Eventually he would parlay his personal fortune of \$70 into a worldwide communications organization known as the Christian Broadcasting Network.

Today, Pat Robertson serves as president of CBN, which reaches more people every day than *Time*, *Newsweek*, *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post* and *The Chicago Tribune* combined. He is host of the "magazine" program "The 700 Club," which is carried on 190 television stations in addition to the CBN cable channel. He is president of CBN University, a fully-accredited school that offers graduate degrees in five areas as well as a journalism institute. His book *The Secret Kingdom* was the Number One religious book in America in 1983 and Number Three on *Time's* non-fiction list. His current book, *Answers to 200 of Life's Most Probing Questions*, has also been on *Time's* best-seller list. He is the president of the Freedom Council, which works to protect American-Constitutional liberty.

Last year his "Operation Breadbasket" program fed, clothed and housed between four and five million poor people in the United States and some five million in other countries.

More than any other person, his candidacy could change the course of American politics. He would bring millions of new voters to the caucuses and polling booths where convention delegates are elected. Hundreds of thousands of those would stay active in the Republican Party; tens of thousands would seek party office

in the years to come; and thousands would seek and win public office.

Meanwhile, he would have the ability to set the agenda for the 1988 campaign. Unlike the Democrats who are tied to the welfare state, and Republican royalists who blindly follow their party's establishment, Robertson would be able to address issues like:

- The Big Bank Bailout: the use of taxpayers' money to compensate international banks for their ill-advised loans to Third World and communist anti-American nations.

- The scandalous use of literally billions of dollars in taxpayer funds that go to left-wing lobbying organizations like the National Organization for Women and Planned Parenthood.

- U.S. trade with the Soviet empire, and loans and credits that help prop up communist regimes in Angola, Mozambique and other countries.

- Four tax increases in the last four years.

- A lack of national leadership on issues like pornography, abortion and prayer in schools.

Unlike Bush or Dole or Kemp, he would not be required to defend the current Administration. He would be free to criticize when criticism is due.

Not many politicians and bureaucrats look forward to the day when a Presidential candidate travels the length and breadth of this country, exposing the ways in which Washington establishment rips off the taxpayers. The idea makes their blood run cold. And most of the leaders of the political parties dread the day when a candidacy like Pat Robertson's brings out millions of new voters and campaign workers who will eventually want their own piece of the action.

If he runs - even if he loses - Pat Robertson will re-invigorate the conservative cause. He will help finish the job that Barry Goldwater began and Ronald Reagan continued: not to adjust conservative principles to political reality, but the other way around.

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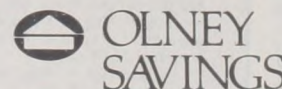

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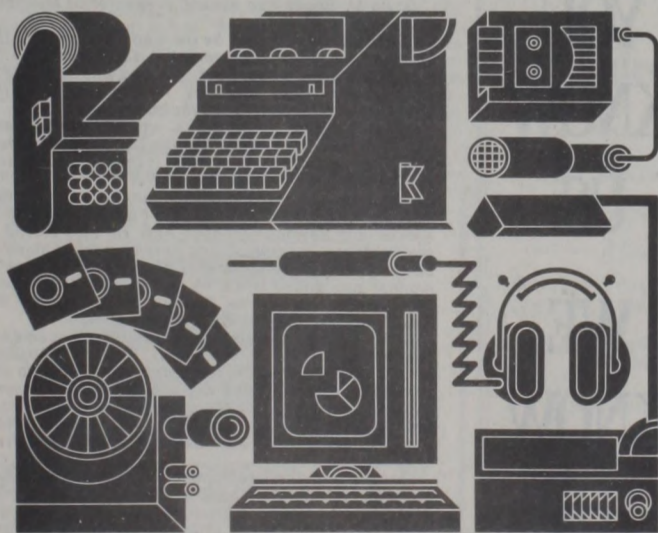

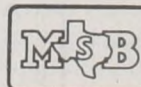

Father Bertin Miller will be remembers in Lindsay and Muenster as having conducted visitations for the Secular Franciscan fraternities.

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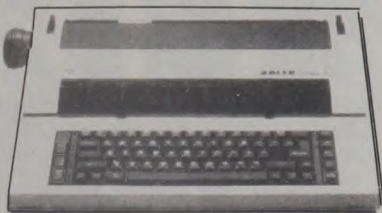

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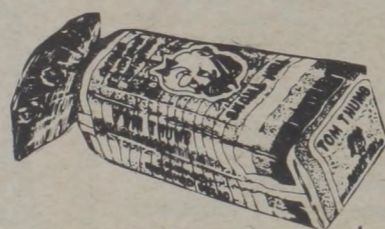
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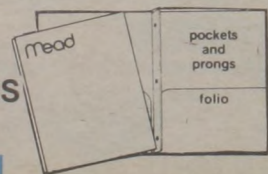

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CROSS COUNTRY

New coach sees success for GHS cross country

Glenn Fry was in the right place at the right time, and that got him back into coaching as the cross country and track coach at Gainesville.

Last summer, Charles Estill resigned as cross country and track coach, leaving the position open. Fry had been out of coaching for several years and has been a science teacher at Gainesville High.

"It just came along," Fry said. "It was sort of a last-minute thing. They were kind of between a rock and hard place, and I was in the right mood. I enjoy watching the mechanics of a kid run, and then trying to make them better."

Fry was a part of a highly successful track program for nine years at Rockdale. While he was an assistant there, Rockdale won seven straight district titles and one state championship.

And Fry thinks this year's cross country team also can be successful.

"We've got a young team," he said. "I feel like they'll come around and will be able to compete real well this year. I feel like we've got a better than average chance of getting out of district and going to regional."

Last year, the Gainesville boys' team finished second at the district meet. Five runners return from that team, and there are no seniors on this year's squad.

Two of the top prospects on the team are juniors Kyle Draper and Andy Rodriguez. Fry calls Draper the "ace" of the team and said Rodriguez is a "hard worker and runs consistently."

Junior Trey Schalk also is expected to have a good year.

While depth is a strong point of the boys' team, it is a weakness for the girls. So far, only two girls will be running.

"We've got some good kids out there that will make some good runners," Fry said. "Cross country is something that you can work into your schedule. We need to sell it to a few more girls."

Fry hopes that when school starts, others will want to join the team. Those interested

Two matches are scheduled during the regular season, but if Era and Muenster split, a third match would have to be played for the tie-breaker.

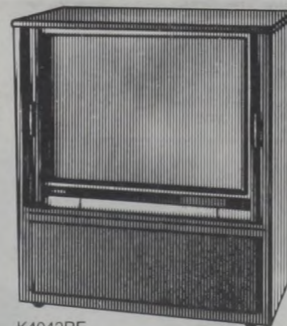
"We really don't know anything about them (Era), since this is their first year," Walterscheid said.

Byars hopes Gainesville offense will get rolling in 1985

Last year was not a typical one for the Gainesville Leopards.

It was the first losing season since 1971, and it was only the seventh time that had happened in the past 25 years.

So what's in store for the 1985 Leopards? "We want to better ourselves," Leopard coach Robyn Byars said. "The kids are working real hard. We've all got a taste of 4-6 in our mouth. We came in wanting to improve on last year. The thing we want to do is score points. We've been working real hard on offense in the spring."

The Leopards have always been known for their strong defense, but the offense has been sluggish of late. But Byars and his staff hope this is the year that the offense gets going.

Gainesville was 4-6 overall last year and 1-4 in the tough North Zone of District 7-4A, which includes defending state champion Denison.

But Byars thinks this year's schedule will be in the Leopards' favor. Three of the five district games are at home, and those are against Denison, Terrell and Rockwall.

"If we can will all of them at home and split on the road, we'll be in the playoffs," Byars said. "I feel real confident playing at home."

"Our zone is real tough. Any of the teams can beat anybody. We have to be ready to play at all times."

Byars feels McKinney will be the favorite because of a large number of players returning, including quarterback Greg Ziegler, who passed for 1,959 yards last year.

"Denison lost a lot of people, but they have a big school," Byars said. "I like our chances. If we can stay healthy, we may surprise some people as far as what we can

Staying healthy is a big concern of Byars. A couple of players will be going both ways for the Leopards, and some positions are thin as far as backup personnel.

"We can't have another season like last year, as far as injuries," Byars said. "Conditioning-wise, we're in pretty good shape, if we can keep from getting injured."

Byars, who is entering his third season as the Leopards' head coach, lost 15 lettermen and 12 starters from last year's team. There are 20 lettermen returning, including 12 starters.

"Both of our starting backs start defensively, so they're going to have to have people back them up and give them rest," Harper said. "I have a lot of confidence in those four men."

Experience favors Callisburg volleyball team

The Callisburg Wildkettes won the District 10-2A volleyball title last year, and with a good senior class returning, the 1985 outlook is bright.

"We have the senior leadership with the experience needed to have a very successful

year," Wildkettes coach Sherri Hankins said. "All of the girls work well together; teamwork should be our greatest strength."

And when the Callisburg squad lines up this year, it will have a different look from in the past.

"We're real excited about our new offense," Hankins said. "They're already effectively running it. We also have set numbers this year. They're real excited about running set plays. They have to pay more attention this year."

The new offense includes going to an international 4-2 formation, where the setter works out of the right front instead of the middle.

"This allows us to have the attacker in the middle," Hankins said. "It allows for fake plays and options. That middle attacking spot is hard to defend or block."

Hankins says the team's strengths should be quickness, hustle and determination, and defense.

"We should have good hitting and blocking," she said. "Our setters have three good years of experience."

As far as weaknesses, Hankins said, "Our serving in match situations must improve this year. We lost some height but have the aggressiveness to make up for it."

Callisburg finished the year at 17-7 last season and was 5-1 against district teams. The Wildkettes defeated Nocona in district, but with injuries to two starters, Callisburg lost to Kennedale in an area playoff.

Two lettermen and starters are gone from that team, but five lettermen are back, including four starters. Those starters are Kristin Lennon, Tracy Lee, Stacy Lee and Kelly Hollandsworth.

"Kristin Lennon is probably one of the toughest hitters and blockers," Hankins said. "She has the hardest spike of all the players. Tracy Lee is four inches shorter, but has a good vertical jump. She's a real

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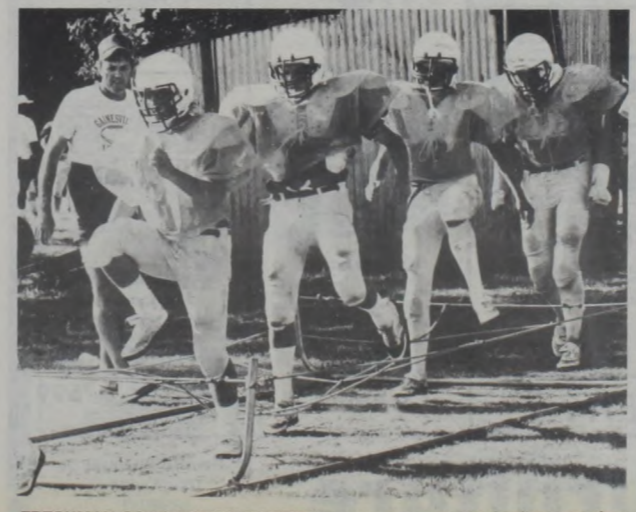

Knights count on quickness

Lindsay looks to battle for top spot

The Lindsay Knights were in their usual position last year as they were co-champions of the District 4-A North Zone with Valley View.

This year appears to be no different as the Knights will again be battling for the top spot in the zone.

But if and when the Knights climb up to the top, they'll do it with more quickness than last year, which Coach Grady Roller hopes will make up for their lack of size.

"Our offensive line is small, but it's going to be quick," Roller said. "We've got some kids who've played quite a bit the last few years."

And with that, Roller cites leadership and experience as the team's assets along with the quickness on the offensive line.

That offensive line will be anchored by three seniors — center Adam Arendt, left guard Jeff Metzler and right guard Joe Myrick.

"He's real quick," Roller said of Arendt, who is a returning starter. "We had very few exchange problems last year. He's one of the quickest linemen we've got — probably one of the quickest in the district."

Metzler also is a returning starter and was an all-district selection last year. Roller says Metzler is also quick and "does a real good job on sweeps."

Myrick, although he wasn't a starter last year, did see a lot of action, and Roller expects a lot out of him this season. Roller said Myrick could double up on positions because of a lack of depth.

Those three will be joined by junior Frank Fangmann and senior David Cooper, the team's largest player at 210, at the tackle positions.

Senior Wayne Fleitman, who was an honorable mention all-district pick last year, returns at quarterback for the Knights.

"He's got a real good head on his shoulders," Roller said. "He throws the ball well. It looks like we're going to have him throw the ball more at this point."

One of his main targets will be tight end Leroy Hermes, who was an all-district selection at tight end and defensive end last season. Both Fleitman and Hermes also had a lot of playing time as sophomores two years ago.

"He's got good hands, he catches the ball well, and he's a real good blocker," Roller said of Hermes.

The split end position was up for grabs, but Roller said the most likely candidate is Eddie Hughes.

Last year's split end, senior Tim Carpenter, moves to wing back this year. Carpenter is the team's biggest back at 170 pounds and is "probably the fastest kid on the team at this time," according to Roller.

Both running backs started some games last year and did have a lot of playing time. At fullback is junior Roy Neu, who picked

Young Eagles look to return to playoffs

15 lettermen lead Valley View attack

Valley View, Cooke County's only school with a state championship football trophy in its case, enters the 1985 football campaign in its usual position — ready to stake claim to another district title.

The Eagles annually are in the thick of their district race, and this year is no different than the rest. Last season, Valley View was the North Zone runner-up of District 4-A.

Valley View defeated Paradise, 14-7, in a zone playoff, but lost to Munday in bidistrict, 28-19. The Eagles finished with a 9-3 overall record.

But Valley View, along with Muenster and Lindsay, the zone's other two top teams, have lost some players to graduation. Valley View lost 10 lettermen, including seven starters.

"We're awful young," said Eagles coach John Kassen. "We just have two seniors starting offensively. That experience means a lot. It's how well the younger kids come around for us."

Kassen, entering his eighth year as the Eagles' coach, says good size and the running game are his team's strengths, along with a good defense.

"Our defense the other night (in a scrimmage against Prosper) was overpowering, but again you have to consider the competition," Kassen said.

Valley View won that scrimmage, scoring four touchdowns to Prosper's none, but the Eagles were facing a much weaker team with just 15 players.

"Our passing game is a little shaky," Kassen said. "That will come around with a little experience. We've got a young quarterback. We've had our receivers for a good while, but it takes a while to get their timing down."

Fifteen lettermen return from last year's squad, including four starters.

John Cope, a junior, will be the quarterback for the Eagles. He'll have junior fullback Kerry Kyle and either junior Brian Jones or freshman Tony Keen joining him in the backfield.

"He (Cope) is doing a good job running the ball right now," Kassen said. "It's tough to gauge quarterbacks when they're starting out, but he's going to be a good one."

Two of the team's top receivers are junior split end Steve Sparkman and junior wide receiver John Grussell. They'll be joined by senior Craig Martindale at tight end.

Kassen is expecting big things from his line, which includes junior Phil Clark at center, senior Dave Kubicek and sophomore Steve Kubicek (Dave's brother) at tackle, and junior Rusty Richardson and junior

Lady Lions feature local volleyball talent

Cooke County College will begin competing in volleyball for the first time ever this fall with a roster full of former county and area high school players.

"We wanted to get as many from Cooke County as possible," CCC coach Joe Wilson said earlier this year. "That was our concept going in. But sometimes you just don't have the numbers to recruit from. We're trying to create more local interest with local players."

The decision to field a volleyball team was made in April, and Wilson got a late start in recruiting. But he was able to sign five players from the county and the other eight from the North Texas area.

Those recruited from Cooke County are freshman Kelli Tuck from Callisburg, who was an all-district and all-area selection; freshman Patty Rhoades from Callisburg; sophomore Bridget Anderle from Lindsay, who was all-district in basketball (Lindsay doesn't field a volleyball team); freshman Kim Eldred from Muenster; and freshman Lashun Kemp from Gainesville.

Wilson signed two players from Denison — freshman Angela Barnum, who was all-tournament at three tournaments last year and was the team's MVP, and Linda Carruth, who was all-district and is an "excellent student," said Wilson.

Two sisters from Wylie will be playing for CCC. They are freshmen Lori Gray and Nancy Gray. Nancy Gray was all-district last year, while Lori Gray was bothered with a knee injury. She also injured her other knee in softball over the summer, but she is wearing a brace and is able to workout with the team.

Those two will be joined by another former teammate of theirs at Wylie — freshman Pam Rollins, another all-district pick.

Whitesboro will be represented by two

players. Sophomore Donna Shares, who was all-district for two years and also all-district in basketball, and sophomore Mechelle Nichols join the team, along with sophomore Kim Kutas of Sanger, an all-district selection.

anyone else on the team." Wilson is spending most of time these first few weeks getting a good look at all the players and working on getting the starting lineup set. Wilson said he had only seen one of his players before, one that was enrolled in one of his volleyball PE classes.

"That's probably good, because I don't have any preconceived ideas about who can play better than the others," Wilson said.

The Lady Lions will open the season Sept. 16 at Dallas Eastfield, with the first home match scheduled for Sept. 30 against Dallas Cedar Valley.

Wilson hopes the fact that most of the players are from the county or area will

draw good crowds. There will be no admission charge for the home matches this year. "The only drawback is the time factor," he said. "All of the matches are in the afternoon. That may be bad, or it could be good."

Most of the Lady Lions' opponents this year will be Dallas area colleges. CCC is playing an independent schedule this year.

"I think we'll be competitive with the teams we play this year," Wilson said. "The most difficult thing is getting them to work together."

"We're kind of like an expansion team in the majors. Everybody knows how to play, but they haven't played together."

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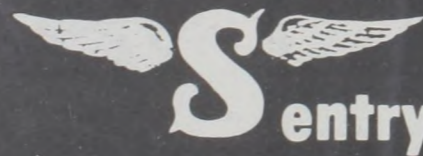

Veterans return to lead CCC tennis team

Chaloupecky looks for strong showing

The little college may sit quietly and sometimes unnoticed on the hill, and that may be true for the tennis team, too.

But there is one difference. The college may be small, but the tennis program is big — that is, big as far as winning goes.

The Cooke County College women's tennis team finished fifth in the nation last spring in the National Junior College Athletic Association.

And the winning isn't a new thing, either. While the CCC tennis program doesn't get the recognition it deserves, it has quietly been winning. There have been only two losing seasons since 1971, and those were two of Coach Bob Chaloupecky's first years as the tennis coach.

Chaloupecky, entering his 15th season as the CCC tennis coach, has a 510-146-15 dual matches record at the college for a .777 winning percentage.

Last year, CCC had a 34-11 record for the entire year (fall and spring matches combined), and CCC finished second at the Region V Tournament.

Two players from that team will be missing from the lineup this year — Judith Hosie, the No. 3 player, and Betty Chaves, the No. 4 player. Hosie, the only freshman last year not returning, is back in Scotland, while Chaves, a sophomore last spring, transferred to Texas-Tyler on a tennis scholarship.

But the good news is that Chaloupecky has

six players back from last year's squad, which he says was his best ever at CCC. "Overall, I felt like 1985 was the strongest team we ever had, but the competition was the strongest at nationals," he said.

Leading the list of returnees is three all-American honorable mention selections from last year — Samantha Gough from Kent, England; Diane Walker from London; and Lissa Rocha from Macio, Brazil. Gough and Walker were the No. 1 and No. 2 players respectively last year.

The six players returning is a large number to have back for junior college tennis, according to Chaloupecky.

"You never know in junior college — you could have an all freshman team, and some might go to four year schools. Six is actually really good. I feel that with six players coming back, that's a lot of experience and a lot of leadership."

The three other returning players are Helena Mansson from Stockholm, Sweden; Ase Andersson from Karlshamn, Sweden; and Angie Ryan from Springtown.

In addition, three incoming freshmen have been recruited by Chaloupecky. They are Punam Paul from Denton, who also played high school tennis at Gainesville; Jamie McCaffery from Albuquerque, N.M.; and Sallyanne Fossey from Brisbane, Australia.

All three have been playing the tennis circuit over the summer to prepare for the fall season. Chaloupecky hopes his returning players have also played during the summer.

"That's a big concern," Chaloupecky said. "Hopefully, they all practiced in the summer like they were supposed to. If they did, we should be competitive."

And speaking of competitive, Chaloupecky has another challenging fall schedule for his team. As usual, the CCC coach tries to line up as many four-year schools to play as possible. However, a new NCAA rule that went into effect this year limits the number of matches four-year schools can play to 31. This is the first time in several years that CCC won't be competing against TCU or Oklahoma State.

"The coaches hate it," Chaloupecky said of the new rule. "I don't think it will last long."

One highlight of the schedule is the 13th annual CCC Tournament on Oct. 4-5, which is now the longest running current junior

college tournament in the state. Tyler Junior College, which won the CCC spring and fall tournament last year, will be back to defend its title.

"We've got a competitive fall schedule," Chaloupecky said. "I've got it set up where the toughest matches are at the end of the fall season."

Near the end of the of the season, CCC will participate in the Odessa Junior College Fall Tournament, which will feature some of the toughest teams in the nation. Chaloupecky said Midland, Tyler and South Plains will be there, and the Odessa coach is trying to get the top two junior college teams in Florida to attend. It will be a dual-match tournament.

There are no postseason tournaments in the fall in Region V. The Lady Lions, after their nine-week season, will take a week off and then begin their off-season conditioning program before the spring session begins.

The shorter fall season also gives the players more time to study, which seems to be paying off. One of Chaloupecky's goals is to have a 3.0 team grade-point average.

Last fall, the team's average was 3.5, and it was 3.3 in the spring.

Ricky Sparkman at guard.

Defensively, the secondary appears to be strong with cornerbacks Jeff Alexander, a junior, and Martindale. They will be joined by Grussell and Steve Sparkman at safety.

Sophomore Danny Sullivan and Clark will be the defensive tackles, while the Kubicek brothers will be the defensive ends.

Starting at middle linebacker is Kyle, while Richardson and Ricky Sparkman will be the outside linebackers.

Senior Billy Martin should see some action at linebacker when he returns from a knee injury. He was scheduled to undergo orthoscopic surgery last Thursday and is expected to be back in three to four weeks.

"We need him back," Kassen said. Martin also is the backup fullback.

Kassen said two freshmen may move in

With only four seniors on the team, Kassen says he has young players that are good, but need the experience. How well they mature will be the key for the Eagles in the their quest for the playoffs.

"We're going to try to be competitive, as we have in the past," Kassen said. "We've got a good, hard working group. That about all we can ask."

Hornets hungry for playoffs

New coach mainly concerned with lack of depth on squad

Even though Muenster coach Dewey Sims is entering his first season as the Hornets' football coach, he won't be as behind as other new coaches with new teams.

Sims was hired as the school's head football coach and athletic director in the spring, so he was able to do some work at the end of the last school year in preparation for this season. And it seems to have paid off.

"Some of the work we did in spring on the offense helped," Sims said. "I made out a complete offensive play book that the kids can take home and study, and the kids said that helped a lot. We're so pleased that we've backed off some of the conditioning. The kids are ready, and we're ready."

Sims' only main concern is depth, which is the concern on most Class A schools. Sims plans to carry 15 players on the varsity and 16 on the junior varsity. If a large number of players get hurt, the JV schedule will be cancelled, and the players will be moved up to the varsity.

"That's our big concern — whether or not we can hang on and keep this JV schedule," Sims said.

Sims said intelligence is the team's main asset.

"They're extremely smart. They pick up things real well. We've got complicated blocking schemes, and they've picked them up real well. We can do a lot of things on offense that other teams can't do because of their intelligence."

The Hornets also have good average size on the line and good team quickness, Sims said.

The Hornets lost nine lettermen and starters from last year's 8-2 team. Despite the record, Muenster finished 3-2 in the District 4-A North Zone, which put the Hornets third behind Lindsay and Valley View.

Six offensive and five defensive starters return from that team, headed by senior offensive and defensive tackle Ronnie Trubebach, a 215-pounder, and senior offensive guard and defensive tackle Darren Walterscheid (185).

Tight end Andy Burnette, who runs a 4.68, is the fastest player on the team, Sims said. He will also start on defense at linebacker.

"That's pretty good speed for a tight end," Sims said. "He's an excellent blocker."

Junior Shawn Flusche, whom Sims says has good lateral movement, will start at running back and be joined by fullback Bubba Eldred in the backfield. Junior Ryan Klement will start at quarterback.

"He's very intelligent," Sims said of Klement. "He runs the offense extremely well. When we work on our two-minute drills, he does a super job there. We feel real good about that."

Junior Mark Hennigan will start at split end, while Darren Cheaney and Dave Bynum will alternate at flanker. Completing the offensive line are Joe Pagel at center, Gary Grewing at guard and Stuart Hess at guard. Hess, at 230 pounds, is the largest player on the squad.

The defensive line will have Walterscheid at fullback and junior Roy Neu, who picked

Wildcats primed for a winning season

When former Callisburg athletic director and head football coach Gary Utsler was promoted to principal, the task of finding a new AD and coach began for Callisburg.

The field of 31 applicants was slowly narrowed down from 11 to eight to three, and then one — Mickey Finley.

Finley was hired in late June, and after he got settled in to his new position, he had some catching up to do.

"We've had to spend a lot of time getting the kids in shape," Finley said. "We haven't had as much time spent on football as we need."

"They've been real enthusiastic and working real hard, but it's been a complete change on offense and defense, so we're having to spend a lot of time catching up."

Finley came to Callisburg from Comanche, where he held a similar position for the past four years. He had previously coached at Klondike, where he had 8-2, 10-1 and 11-2 teams. He was an assistant at Sealy when they went 15-0 and won the state title.

Finley hopes to bring some of that winning to the Wildcats, who were 3-5-2 last year. And the players seem to have the right frame of mind, according to their new coach.

"I think attitude right now is a big plus for us," Finley said. "I think probably overall quickness is one of our strengths. We've got pretty good quickness."

Depth seems to be the biggest concern of Finley, as many of the players are having to learn two positions each on offense and defense.

Keith Williams, a 5-8, 150-pound senior, will start at quarterback for the Wildcats. He'll be joined in the backfield by tailback Junior Tolbert, a junior, and running back Monty Gilbreath.

"He's a fine running back and linebacker," Finley said of Gilbreath, who

Small, scrappy Era returns 12

The numbers are usually small at Era, and this year is no different than past years. With only 212 students in the entire school, grades K through 12, Era coach Mike Allison has a hard time trying to get enough players for his football team. But he hopes that even with just 19 players, they will be able to be competitive in the tough District 4-A North Zone. "We have a lot of enthusiasm, and we're working hard," Allison said. "We're limited on what we can do because of our numbers. If we can stay healthy, we can

have a good season." Last year, despite a 7-3 overall record, the Hornets finished 2-3 in district behind Lindsay, Valley View and Muenster. Six starters are gone from that team, but 12 lettermen and five starters are back for the 1985 season. There are just three seniors on the team. Allison said Muller "has looked real good so far in two-a-days both ways. He's showed a lot of hustle." Junior Kevin Ford will start at tailback and safety, while sophomore Stuart Kyle, who was a starter both ways last year as a freshman, will play at fullback and linebacker. "He's got a lot of ability," Allison said of Ford. "He was our split end last year. He's adopting real well to it." They will be joined by junior quarterback and linebacker Sammy Moore, a transfer student who is the son of assistant coach Sam Moore, who joined the coaching staff this year. "We're expecting a lot of good things from him," Allison said. Others joining the offensive lineup are junior Kevin Hinzman at tackle, senior Justin Hansard at center and junior Peter O'Connor at guard on the line. 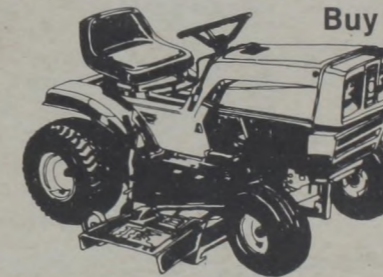

Area athletes pursuing college careers

Several former high school football players have been continuing their careers at colleges around the state and the nation. Some have been quite successful, while others will be entering their first year of college ball this fall with hopes of being successful. One of those expected to have a banner year is Ernest Evans, a 1982 Gainesville graduate. Evans, a 6-1, 215-pound defensive back, will be competing for the Rice Owls in the Southwest Conference.

Evans was featured in **Dave Campbell's Texas Football** in July as one of the preseason all-SWC defensive players. Rice coaches call him their "best player on defense."

Evans is a returning starter at strong safety, and his 4.5 speed and size could make him a pro football prospect. His highlight at Rice was against Arkansas in 1984, where he had 13 tackles (nine unassisted). He had seven the following week against SMU.

Evans transferred to Rice from Tyler Junior College after lettering for two years with the Apaches.

The former Leopard is also a standout in the classroom. A pre-cardiology student, Evans was a member of the National Honor Society in high school and had a 4.0 grade point average.

At Sam Houston State, four former

Leopards are playing for the Bearkats, and one reason for the large number of Gainesville players there is that a former assistant coach at Gainesville, Dave Bassore, is the defensive coordinator for the Bearkats.

Junior strong safety Tollie Royal, a 6-0, 197-pounder, is one of five starters returning on defense. Royal, a Gulf Star Conference all-conference selection last year, is expected to have another good year after finishing fourth on the team last year in tackles with 59 and two fumble recoveries and eight pass breakups.

Royal was freshman of the year in the Lone Star Conference (Sam Houston State was formerly in that conference), and he could become one of the state's best performers this year.

Rickey Royal, Tollie's younger brother, will be joining him as a starter this year in the defensive backfield after seeing a lot of action as a freshman. Royal had 13 tackles last year, including a fumble recovery and a pass breakup. Rickey Royal, a sophomore, is a 5-10, 182-pounder.

Cornerback Carl Mims, a 5-11, 170-pound sophomore, was the only freshman starter for the Bearkats last year. He was voted freshman of the year by his teammates, an award that also went to Tollie Royal in 1983.

Mims had two interceptions last year, four

pass breakups and 36 tackles. Also joining the Bearkats this year from Gainesville is freshman Bubba Alsup, a 6-2, 250-pound defensive lineman.

At East Texas State, Daven Overstreet and Mark Copeland are playing for one of their former coaches — Eddie Vowell — a former Leopard assistant who is ETSU's defensive coordinator.

Copeland, 6-0, 220-pound linebacker, is entering his senior year, and he is one of the team's captains. Copeland was an all-Lone Star Conference second team pick last year and has started at linebacker for the past two years.

A 6-0, 175-pound defensive back, Overstreet started as a sophomore last year and had 34 tackles, two sacks and two interceptions.

Former Leopard Spencer Leftwich is back for his second year at Stephen F. Austin after being redshirted for a year. Leftwich, who has grown to 260 pounds, should get a starting spot at guard this year after competing on the special team last fall.

At Navarro Junior College in Corsicana, former Gainesville quarterback Terry Jackson will be entering his second year with the team.

Two former Leopards are playing further away from home than the others — Arthur Johnson at Bethel College in North Newton,

Kansas (where Gainesville coach Robyn Byars played), and Roger Hill at Kansas Wesleyan.

Hill will be joined by Valley View's Mike Montgomery at Kansas Wesleyan. Montgomery, a quarterback, will be entering his first year at the school. Another area player will be in Kansas this fall. Mark Knabe of Myra, who played football at Era, signed a letter-of-intent with Tabor College in Hillsboro, Kansas.

Gary Dankesreiter of Lindsay will be competing for the North Texas State Eagles in the fall.

Dankesreiter is a 6-1, 215-pound defensive lineman and will be entering his first season with the Eagles.

And last, but certainly not least, Gainesville's Dante Williams will travel up to Norman, Okla. to begin what should be a promising career with the Oklahoma Sooners.

Williams was one of the most sought-after players in the state last year before he signed the letter-of-intent with the Sooners.

The former Leopard, he gathered 27 awards or honors while in high school, recently gained another as he won an award at the Texas High School Coaches Association all-star football game in Irving recently.

He was co-winner of the lineman Most Valuable Player award in the North's 14-7 win over the South.

County Agent's Report

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service cooperates with the Extension Service of the other Western and Great Plains States and the U.S.D.A. in providing technical assistance and financing for the Western Livestock Marketing Information Project. Each August their project provides an annual feeder cattle supplement to its regular monthly Western Livestock Round-Up.

The following is a summary of their project's market forecast for this fall and winter.

Tighter feeder cattle supplies, lower feed costs, and other factors normally would translate into higher calf and yearling prices this fall. However, substantial rallies are not expected for the fall feeder cattle market. It is likely that prices will remain near current

levels or slightly higher. Yearling prices are expected to average \$1 to \$3 per cwt. better and calf prices \$2 to \$4 per cwt. better than comparable prices in the fall of 1984.

The current situation and outlook for fall feeder cattle market contains the following positive and negative factors:

Negative - The current backlog of marketings by feedlots, while possibly clearing up by fall, may not result in higher fed cattle prices until early 1986.

Total meat supplies will remain large, and relative price spreads between beef, pork and poultry are not likely to improve in beef's favor. This could affect consumer demand for beef compared to other meats, especially as we move

into the fall and winter which are traditionally low beef consuming periods.

The financial situation for many producers may preclude their ability to obtain financing to hold calves over the winter.

Positive - Lower feed costs, especially for concentrates, will encourage cattle feeding, particularly if the current backlog situation is soon resolved. With some changes expected in the

tax laws for 1986, investor cattle feeding could be large this fall.

Calf and yearling cattle supplies are reduced so there will be upward pressure on feeder cattle prices when feeders start looking for feedlot replacements.

Fed cattle prices are expected to improve in late 1985 and 1986, which will allow cattle feeders to

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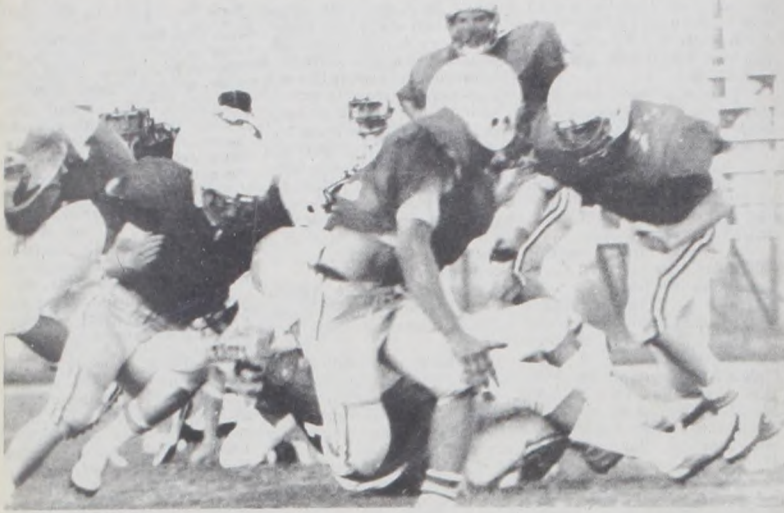
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HORNET DEFENSE gangs up on a ball carrier as the MHS boys look good in practice with Southlake Carroll.

pay more for placements. Interest rates are expected to remain relatively low for the next six to nine months, which will assist by lowering costs and making financing more attractive. No great changes are expected in new farm legislation, so more stability in grain prices arising from continued large feed grain production and lower support prices may aid feeder cattle demand.

Alternatives

For producers with yearlings ready to market this fall, closely watching the market for periods of price strength is suggested. Often there is a slight seasonal rise in prices in the August-October period and producers watching the market closely may do well to take advantage of any such price advances to sell animals. For producers comparing fall calf sales with wintering strategies, the current prices for calves may be about the best for the remain-

der of 1985 and should be seriously considered. This is especially important in the case of producers who are experiencing serious cash flow needs. Wintering calves is an alternative that has proven to be profitable about eight years in every ten. While yearling cattle prices likely will improve early in 1986, the price advances may not be great enough to offset the additional cost of holding calves. Producers who do opt for the wintering option may want to look for forward pricing opportunities both in the futures markets and cash forward contracts. Both a close watch on the market and close attention to feeding costs will be necessary to make a wintering option work.

Based on current knowledge, best estimates for calf prices this fall would be in a range from \$71 to \$74. Prices for yearlings next spring are projected to average around \$67 to \$71.
