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A few days ago the government of Nicaragua protested officially to our government for its violation of international harmony in supplying military weapons used by the Contras near the Guatemala border to shoot down a Nicaragua army helicopter.

Secretary of State George Schultz and Texas Former-Governor Clements lost no time in replying. Both said the US did not send arms, and if it's true that US individuals supplied the help they are proud and thankful.

There has been much official bickering concerning President Reagan's efforts to help the Contras, and last week's incident appears to support him. America opposes the official Nicaragua forces, known as the Sandinistas. On the other side, it supports the Contras, who originally helped to oust the dictator Samosa but were promptly rejected by the Marxist Sandinistas.

As regards the Nicaragua complaint about US help to Contras, the objection actually is absurd. The fact is that Sandinistas get help from Cuba in their program of ruling Nicaragua while plotting to overthrow San Salvador. It is the old Marxist policy of blaming the enemy for the faults that Reds themselves are guilty of.

A deplorable fact about the Sandinista situation is that the American public and American media have been taken in by floods of Marxist misinformation. Evidence of that was abundant in government and reflected by the fact that Congressional liberals stoutly resisted Reagan's attempts to assist those who resisted the Reds.

An enlightening article on the subject was recently published by Pete Bertie, a Canadian free lance journalist who spent a month on the Nicaragua-Honduras border with the Nicaragua Democratic Force (FDN), the largest of the Contra groups fighting the Sandinista government.

The man said this group of young people, of average age 20, was made up of persons who for various reasons rebelled against the cruelty and oppression and treachery and agriculture policy of the government.

Their grievances were religious as well as political and economic. The author observed that besides being very young his companions were all wearing rosaries and crucifixes around their necks, apparently part of the uniforms. He was told the FDN is devoutly Christian, 90% Catholic and 10% Evangelical, and that for many guerillas it was religious persecution that influenced them to revolt.

The author pointed out that before going with the Contras he expected to see a struggle of the two sides for the hearts and minds of the people, but learned that government had virtually lost that part of the contest...partly because of the highly unpopular collectivized agriculture. The state exercises arbitrary power over buying and selling prices and rationing, an all round burden to the peasant farmer.

The attitude of oppressed people, the "Correas," is reflected in their cooperation with the Contras. Wherever FDN goes it receives whole hearted help from messengers and guides of the correas. At the same time Sandinistas are constantly deceived in their searches for the FDN. The end result is that the young freedom fighter guerrillas move through Nicaragua with little resistance.

Back in the days of Somosa peasants were oppressed by a greedy dictatorship. They rose up to depose him just as they did in Cuba. The struggles ended similarly in betrayal by Marxist dictators more ruthless than the originals. Unfortunately the Reds

Stolen vehicle found stripped

The incident prompts Officer Tompkins to ask that anyone seeing suspicious activity to make

prompt contact with the police. Day times the contact can be made through the City Hall, 759-2236. Nights the best way is through the Sheriff Department number 911, which is constantly in contact with local police.

H.H. Homsley dies

Memorial service for H. Howard Homsley, 74, of Fort Worth, was held Saturday, Dec. 7, in Brentwood Church of Christ, Fort Worth, with Rev. Robert Banks officiating and David Wilkins, a nephew, delivering the eulogy.

Burial was in Poolville Cemetery, Parker County, with the following serving as pallbearers. Howard Fincher, Eric Fincher, Terry Walterscheid, Kim Walterscheid, Jimmy Little and David Fulton.

Honorary pallbearers were John Hosea, Claude Parker, Walter Rhodes, Alvin Farrell, Maurice Garrett, John Garrett and Lionel Garrett.

Mr. Homsley died suddenly of a heart attack at his home on Wednesday, the 14th. He was a 25 year resident of Fort Worth, a 28 year school administrator and a 27 year sales representative of Garrett Book Co., a distributor of school books.

His school administrator career includes more than four years as superintendent of Muenster Public School. Other superintendent assignments were in Balley County and Lorraine.

Mr. Homsley was born at Poolville on Nov. 18, 1911, and was married to Laverne Weir on Dec. 24, 1932. He came to Muenster Aug. 1, 1954 and resigned March 1, 1959, to join the Garrett Book Co. Before reporting to that position he took time to organize the MISD tax office.



He graduated from Daniel Baker College (now Howard Payne Univ.) with a bachelor degree, and received a master of education degree from Texas Tech.

He was a 32 nd degree Mason, a member of the Brentwood Church of Christ in Fort Worth. At Muenster he was a charter member of the Lion's Club, also its 1958 selection as man of the year.

Survivors include his wife, Laverne; three daughters, Ann Fincher and Barbara Traweck, both of Fort Worth, and Queenie Walterscheid of Muenster; eight grandchildren, nine great-grandchildren; and two sisters, Ruby Fulton and Ruth Stearn both of Mineral Wells.

400 attend kickoff for Finnell re-election campaign

Approximately 400 80th District supporters of State Rep. Charles Finnell crowded into the Holliday cafeteria, largest facility in town, to launch his re-election campaign this week.

Speaker of the House Gib Lewis, State Treasurer Ann Richards, and Railroad Commissioner Mack Wallace each took the microphone, saluting the work of the veteran North Texas legislator at the every-other-year Finnell Fish Fry.

State Sen. Ray Farabee and State Rep. John Gavin, along with other Finnell colleagues and local elected officials participated in the casual event.

State Democratic Committeeman Calvin Gambill of Seymour, and State Democratic Committeewoman Dorothy Wise of Wichita County joined local party officials from each of the nine counties of the 80th House District.

As a surprise, the Petrolia Senior Citizen Rhythm Band sang a song they had written, dedicated to Rep. Finnell entitled "This Man Is Our Man". Finnell served as founding chairman of the House Committee on Retirement and Aging in 1983, and this year passed seven measures directly benefiting Texas Senior Citizens, at no additional cost to the state.

As a current member of the Appropriations Committee, and a Chairman for Budget and Oversight, Rep. Finnell is responsible in part for the "Make Do With Less" state budget enacted this year. During the Thursday night gathering, Finnell took the opportunity to endorse, amid applause, the constitutional prohibition of a state income tax.

With the "Holliday Fight Song" playing, and his wife, Kay, at his side, the Archer County businessman announced for re-election to the Texas House of Representatives, subject to the May 3rd Democratic primary.

County medical standard praised by society

The Cooke County Medical Society held its final monthly meeting of 1985 on December 2. In place of its customary educational program, the society elected new officers for 1986. Dr. Malcolm Wall, the outgoing president, conducted the election.

The new president of the society is Dr. John Parker. He is the hospital pathologist at Gainesville Memorial Hospital. Under his direction, the hospital enjoys one of the best equipped and most sophisticated laboratories in the region. He has been instrumental in the hospital's adaptation to the new prospective reimbursement system mandated by Medicare.

He will further serve as medical director of the new extended care facility currently being established at the Hospital.

Gerald Culwell, hospital administrator, commenting on Dr. Parker's service, said, "I don't know what we would have done this past year without Dr. Parker's expertise and devotion to duty. Our extended care facility has just been approved by Medicare without a single deficiency found during a two day inspection."

Dr. Khawaja Anwar was elected vice-president, and Dr. Gerard Balsley was elected secretary-treasurer. Dr. Anwar is an Internist specializing in cardiology. Dr. Balsley is an obstetrician/gynecologist. Dr. Martin Kralicke, was elected to the grievance committee for a three-year term, to join Drs. James Cole and Stanley Saikin. Dr. Wall will be the delegate to the Texas

Medical Association, and Dr. William F. Powell will be his alternate.

In commenting on what he hopes the Medical Society will accomplish in the coming year, Dr. Parker said, "I have two major goals for the Society. First, we want the whole community of Cooke County to realize what fine medical facilities they have in Gainesville and Muenster; modern hospitals with state-of-the-art equipment, and skilled doctors, both primary care physicians and specialists, to serve them. Next, the physician members of the Society want to work in conjunction with the hospitals to provide more services for our neighbors." Dr. Parker welcomes comments from citizens.

State Sen. Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls and his wife, Helen, have been named to share the title "Texan of the Year" for 1985 by TEXAS BUSINESS magazine.

The Texas Department of Health Regional Office in Arlington announces a Hypertension and Diabetes Screening Clinic to be held in Muenster on Wednesday, December 18 at Sacred Heart Community Meeting Room, from 9:30 a.m. to 12:00 and 1:00 to 2:00 p.m.

The screenings are targeted toward those individuals who could not obtain them otherwise and they will be performed by Public Health Nurses at no charge. The goal is to find suspect cases of these so-called "Silent Diseases" early in their course, refer the patients to physicians for diagnosis and treatment, and thereby reduce disease, death, and health care cost. "Since these diseases can be serious and can contribute to other health problems, each adult should visit his or her private physician or the Public Health Clinic on a regular basis," said C.R. Allen, Jr., M.D., Director, Public Health Region 5.

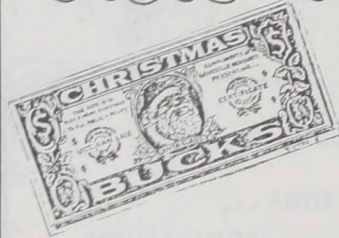

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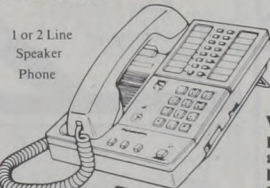

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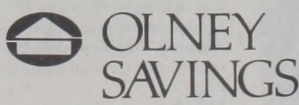

"It's hard to believe that the current fall term is already drawing to a close," says Dr. Eddie Hadlock, CCC dean of student services and registrar. "That means the beginning of the spring semester is just around the corner, and we urge students to begin preparing for registration now."

Registration is still a little more than five weeks away, but Dr. Hadlock issues a reminder that at least a week of that time -- from December 25 through January 1 -- will be taken up by the Christmas and New Year holidays, during which college offices will be closed.

"Exactly one week after we come back, on January 9, will be the first day of spring registration," he says. "That could mean a big rush during the week before enrollment begins so, again, we urge students to go ahead and make preparations now."

Those preparations not only include picking up a time permit but

also seeing a college counselor to work out course choices, schedule classes and so on. A "trial schedule" form, picked up along with the time permit, must be signed by a counselor before the student will be allowed to enter the registration area.

"Official class schedules for the spring semester are available here on campus and will soon be distributed also in area newspapers," says Bill Caver, director of counseling. "Students should study the schedule carefully and then go ahead and set up an appointment with a counselor. This can be done when the pick up time permits, or they can call the Counseling Center at 668-7731, Ext. 215."

Dr. Hadlock says that students enrolling for the first time at CCC this spring also need to complete an application for admission form and submit a high school transcript -- if graduated within the past five years -- or proof of GED equivalency certification. Transfer students should submit a transcript from the last college attended.

"Although we are urging students to prepare now for the spring term, we do understand that many persons may not be able to do so," Dr. Hadlock says. "We will certainly make every effort to accommodate latecomers, and nobody should stay away because they think it might be too late to

get enrolled."

In addition to the two days of regular registration on January 9-10 (Thursday and Friday), two additional days of "late" registration are scheduled -- on January 13-14. Students registering late, however, will be assessed a \$5 fee.

Regular office hours for both the CCC Registrar's Office and Counseling Center are 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Wednesday; 8 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. on Thursdays; and 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Fridays.

Local Hesston dealer to sponsor rodeo telecast

A special two-hour, prime time telecast of the National Finals Rodeo, from Las Vegas, Nevada, will be sponsored locally by S & W Tractor Co. in Gainesville.

The telecast will feature top Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (P.R.C.A.) contestants vying for the world champion titles and the largest purse in rodeo history.

More than 200 stations across North America will participate in this special Hesston Rodeo Network broadcast. The National Finals is the culmination of nearly 600 P.R.C.A. sanctioned rodeos held across North America during 1985.

This year's NFR telecast will of-

fer "same day" coverage of the final world championship performance via a special live tape delay on most U.S. stations. Viewers will be seeing all the action, and the final results of this world championship round on the same day it takes place, December 15, 1985.

Hesston's two-hour prime time telecast will cover the final championship performance of the week-long NFR.

Coverage of the final championship round is sponsored by the Hesston Corporation and more than 1,000 participating Hesston Farm Equipment dealers across the United States and Canada.

This is the 12th consecutive year that Hesston has televised the "World Series" of ProRodeo.

The following economic information is submitted by Extension Economist Ron Knutson, Mechel Paggi, and Ed Smith.

1985 FARM BILL UPDATE
House action is complete with a bill that is basically an extension of the 1981 Act. The Senate is tied up in a quandry of conflicting forces -- an over budget bill reported by its Agriculture Committee, an uncertain Administration position, 14 farm state Republican Senators up for reelection, the Gramm, Rudman, Hollings budget balancing bill, and increased Administration exercise of its veto power on budget busting appropriations bills.

When will it all end? With prompt Senate action, Christmas is still a reasonable target. However, if the Senate does not complete action, it will likely be a 1986 farm bill. In all probability

the Conference Committee will have many serious differences to resolve -- not the least of which is the budget busting provisions of current versions of the bill. That will take time. So it's maybe February.

TRADE POLICY UPDATE
In November the Senate, following the lead of the House passed their version of a bill imposing quota reductions on textiles and shoe imports. The problem for agriculture is that the nations who will be hurt by these actions are large purchasers of U.S. agricultural products. The three countries hit the hardest imported a total of \$3.6 billion worth of U.S. agriculture products in 1984, about 10 percent of the total. A large list of 12 countries contained in the House version are estimated to account for 34 per-

cent of total U.S. agricultural exports. If these countries retaliate and turn elsewhere for their agricultural imports, the U.S. agricultural trade outlook would be dealt a severe blow.

Now the Senate and House must agree on a compromise bill to be presented to the President. At last report presidential aides were quoted as saying the bill is an almost certain candidate for a veto." If so, Texas farmers and ranchers should breath a sigh of relief.

AG EXPORT UPDATE
U.S. agricultural exports fell to \$31.2 billion, down 22 percent from last year. The volume of agricultural exports fell to 126 million tons, down 12 percent from last year, and the 5th year in a row of declining shipment volumes. The outlook for fiscal 1986 looks like more of the same as the new marketing year for most crops is displaying weakness over last year. Cumulative exports for most commodities are well below last year's pace. Cotton exports are off by 50 percent primarily due to decreased sales to Japan and the European Economic Community. Wheat exports are also running about 50 percent behind last year with decreased sales volumes to Russia and China primarily responsible.

Feed grain exports are about 35 percent behind last year's pace with noticeable declines in early year purchases by the Soviets and Mexico. Rice exports are about even with last year's pace, only down 3 percent while soybean exports are ahead of last year by 14 percent. Overall weakness in major commodity exports throughout fiscal 1986 are expected to more than offset gains in soybean exports that are expected to continue through the year.

WHEAT AND FEED GRAIN OUTLOOK -- GOVERNMENT DEPENDENT

The market continues to feel pressure from abundant supplies and weak demand. Projections point to expected carryover stocks equal to or greater than those existing prior to PIK in 1983. The price outlook for the 1986 crop is clear, or is it? The market price will depend on the method and level for 1986 government price supports. The outcome of the 1985 farm bill debate is critical to long term planning, however, it appears 1986 plans will need to be made before Congress gives us the rules of the game.

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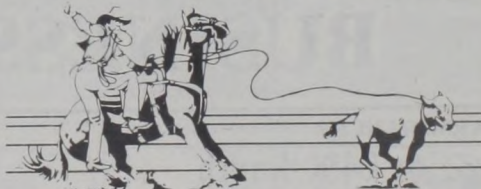
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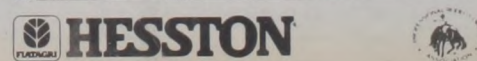
