High winds hit area

High wind with Saturday evening's rainstorm caused property damage at two locations some five miles northwest of Muenster. The damaged items were a barn at the Ed Knauf farm and a pulling unit of oil field equipment on the McCormack-Meador Lease at Joe Knauf's.

Damage to the barn was extensive as the west end was torn away and the entire structure needs an overhaul. The pulling unit, owned by Tommy's Well Service of Nocona, was toppled over completely with draw-works and tandem truck. Its 96 feet derrick

portion, valued at \$440,000 is considered a total loss. Some 2500 ft. of tubing standing beside the derrick, as well as the truck and draw-works, received less damage.

Workmen said the rig had previously stood up to winds of 50-60 m.p.h. and the accident happened at 6:30 after it had been shut down. No one was there.

A new rig has been brought to the site. Meanwhile a clean-up is in progress with plans to salvage as much as possible.

Another storm incident at the location: a galvanized water tank was picked up and carried about a fourth of a mile.

Rained out parade re-dated Saturday

The annual Christmas parade-program-drawing sponsored by the Muenster Chamber of Commerce will be held Saturday, Dec. 7, 4 p.m. The event, originally planned for November 30, was postponed because of bad weather.

Ben Bindel, chairman, points out that a few changes besides the date will apply. The parade starts at 4 instead of 1 p.m., allowing time for entries from the Gainesville parade to come and join. And the mini-parade will be held at 3 p.m. instead of 11 a.m.

He also said that if bad weather interferes again the parade will be cancelled and the drawing for prizes, with Santa present, will be held at the mid-park on Thursday the 12th, at 5 p.m.

To enhance the Christmas atmosphere he suggests that merchants have their Christmasfest lighting displays up for the occasion.

The schedule of events as announced originally will apply this Saturday. It starts with the mini-

parade for kiddies at 3 in a 1 block area of Main. It's for children under 8 with decorated bikes, trikes, wagons, doll buggies, etc. All entries will receive Christmas gifts and the first place winner will receive a trophy.

The main parade will include floats, clowns, horse-drawn wagons, covered wagons, classic cars, marching units, army trucks

and Jeeps, the NTSU Eagle mascot, Coors Beer Wolf, Cub Scouts, and the Mike Otts sound truck.

Entertainment and a drawing at the mini-park will follow the parade. More than 50 prizes will be given by participating stores which are accepting registrations from persons over 18. A person must be present to win at the drawing.

It seems rather strange that the Soviet leader Gorbachev made an issue of the Star Wars defensive weapon which President Reagan proposes as the US answer to nuclear war. After months of publicity on the purpose of the weapon, there can be no doubt that Gorbachev knew very well that the weapon's only purpose is to destroy missiles which are sent out to attack people and countries. Obviously it can be no problem to Russia except if it attacks.

By that reasoning the USSR ought to be more amused than concerned if US spends time and fortunes developing and producing Star Wars. After all, it would be useless if the Red scheme of disarmament were adopted. It's very similar to an admission that USSR has ideas of defaulting on mutual disarmament and continuing its well known habit of breaking treaties. If Russia intends to attack it doesn't want us to have a good defense.

So, we have to wonder what was actually accomplished at the summit. From here it looks like a friendly stand-off that may heat up when interests clash. By our way of thinking President Reagan impressed the world of his good intention, and apparently believes that Red attitude has improved, but he still can't trust the Reds.

A gloomy thought faces U.S. We had hopes the summit would be fruitful but find ourselves with the same old worry. Our future depends so very much in trusting a dictatorship and a political organization that can't be trusted.

When Gorbachev came to office he was hailed as a Mister Personality Plus, a big improvement over the several crude characters who preceded. British Prime Minister Thatcher said, "I like him. We can do business together." The American press agreed that he is a great fellow with a fine record through Moscow University and the Communist party.

During those times he associated with many of his hard line predecessors and absorbed their attitudes and policies. He was and still is communist to the core. His burning ambition, like that of other reds, is to establish global Marxism.

In support of such opinions we can recall a few facts indicating that the "charming" Russian is not so different from the other Kremlin occupants. What can he say for himself about the attempted assassination of the Pope? or the shooting down of a civilian airliner? or how about the con-

Senate backs Gramm on deficit reduction

The U.S. Senate has rejected House Speaker Tip O'Neill's alternative to U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm's deficit reduction legislation, voting 74-24 to back Gramm and a balanced budget.

The O'Neill alternative would have exempted social welfare programs from any automatic spending control measures, requiring heavy cuts in defense and programs such as Veterans Health Care.

"Since the House Democrats' plan exempts 70 percent of the budget, a \$25 billion reduction could produce a 10 percent cut in

Veterans Health Care. Their plan could mean the potential layoff of 19,400 VA employees, 3,300 nurses and 1,200 doctors," Gramm said.

"The political as well as the economic problem with the O'Neill alternative is that by exempting the House Democrats' political plums from across-the-board reductions, O'Neill and his supporters would decimate the programs that are not granted such political favors," the senator said.

"Fortunately, the Senate rejected O'Neill and his House Democrats and stood firm in supporting a broad-based program which asks every part of the budget which is part of the problem to be part of the solution."

The Senate bill does not exempt any on-budget program from the spending control effort and requires that half of the growth in revenue produced by the creation of 2 million new jobs each year -- about \$72 billion annually -- be applied to reduce the deficit and to balance the budget in 1990.

U.S. checks get new look

All checks issued by the U.S. Government are getting a new look. The federal government is doing away with its familiar blueish-green, punch card check, said Congressman Charles Stenholm.

The new check is the same size, but features a multi-colored design and light-weight paper. A full-length likeness of the Statue of Liberty will replace the small, standard treasury seal on the left hand side of the check. It will have light colors that fade from blue and green to orange and peach.

The congressman said, "There are many benefits from converting to a new check. The change was

not solely cosmetic, although the new look will be very difficult to counterfeit. More importantly the redesign will save at least \$6 million by using a lighter, thinner paper, which will also cost less to store."

Stenholm said the national conversion will be conducted over a staggered period to help ease any confusion caused by the new look. Mass distribution of the paper checks is set to begin with this December's Social Security checks to more than 20 million beneficiaries.

In February, the IRS will issue nearly 80 million tax refunds of checks with the new look. More

than 8 million people, who receive Civil Service retirement, Veterans Compensation or Railroad retirement, will also be paid with the checks starting in April. Most of the checks received in the area are issued from the regional financial center in Austin.

"There is no cause for alarm or confusion because of the new look," said Congressman Stenholm. "Businesses and corporations who deal with cashing government checks have been notified about the change and citizens will not have a problem cashing them. I think everyone will like the checks. Having Miss Liberty on them makes them better looking, too."

Federal employment benefits denied to non-registrants

Under a new law signed by President Reagan, appointment to Federal jobs will be denied to men who have not registered with Selective Service. The new law, effective immediately, applies to students seeking temporary summer employment, as well as men searching for permanent employment with a Federal agency or department.

Offered by Senator Strom Thurmond (R-SC), and known as

the Thurmond Amendment to the Defense Authorization Bill, the amendment was co-sponsored by thirteen fellow senators including Senator Gramm. Rep. Sonny Montgomery (D-MS) had introduced similar language in the House of Representatives.

Men of registration age must be registered to receive Federal student aid and job training benefits. Additionally, registration is a requirement in some states for

various employment opportunities, such as law enforcement agencies and permission to practice law.

Men born in 1960 and later years are required to register with Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Registration takes only five minutes at any post office. Failure to register is a felony, punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000 and/or up to 5 years imprisonment.

By civilized standards Gorbachev is a huge disappointment. He could have been a man of history by living up to the compliments of generous world figures. He botched the opportunity at the summit to cooperate with President Reagan in a program of world peace and happiness. And in the process he failed the people of the entire Soviet system who deserve civilized standards of freedom and economy.

Some argue it constitutionally belongs in the Permanent School Fund, while others say the Legislature should spend as it sees fit. The governor wants all of it to go to education, as well he might since his tax reforms are pushing up the cost of public education and adding to the expected deficit, but how?

Bullock, who has the job of depositing the money when it arrives, has asked Attorney General Jim Mattox to rule where it belongs.

No-Pass, No-Play

The class-action trial to determine whether the controversial no-pass, no-play reform is kosher was postponed last week to let a special master gather statewide stats on its effect.

Meanwhile, a recent statewide poll indicated Texans overwhelmingly support the reform by 70 percent. However, a similar questioning found that only about 35 percent approve of Gov. Mark White's performance, even though he championed the reform. That discrepancy is liable to be picked apart and studied by politicians for months to come.

Veterans Saved

When the Reagan Administration unveiled its plan to scrap the Texas Veterans Loan Program next year, Land Commissioner Garry Mauro called on the Texas delegation for support.

Last week he thanked them, particularly U.S. Rep. Jake Pickle, for probably saving the program by writing it into the House version of the tax bill.

The Texas veterans program is the only one in the nation, a modern version of the Texas tradition of rewarding its veterans with land. The state now provides loans, not land, and the program will likely be continued.

GOP Switch

The victory couldn't have come at a better time for Pickle, who learned the day before that popular former Austin mayor Carole Keeton Rylander switched to the GOP, probably to run against him.

Rylander was appointed last year to the State Board of Insurance by Gov. White, who tried last week to talk her out of defecting. She will have to resign if she runs.

Word has it that several more top White personnel will leave his service in the coming months. Last week his head of the Texas Department of Community Affairs, Rafael Quintinilla announced he will quit in January for private law practice.

Short Takes

An interesting historical footnote came to light on JFK's assassination date: San Antonio Congressman Henry B. Gonzalez revealed he took photos of the dead president as he lay alone in a Dallas hospital. The camera with its unprocessed film was stolen from his car when he returned to San Antonio, and the record was lost.

The federal census bureau indicated last week that the Midland-Odessa area leads the state with a 37.5 and 25.2 percent growth rate the first part of the '80s.

Other Texas cities: Bryan, 25.4 percent; Austin, 20.1 percent; Laredo, 19.1 percent; McAllen, 19.0 percent; and Houston, 15.0 percent.

U.S. House Majority Leader Jim Wright, who says he has enough votes to become speaker in 1987, raised over \$1 million at two Fort Worth fundraiser events.

Comptroller Bob Bullock has urged Attorney General Jim Mattox to appeal a Lubbock court ruling declaring unconstitutional part of the increased court fees approved during the last legislative session.

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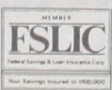
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JOHN KUPPERS OBSERVE GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

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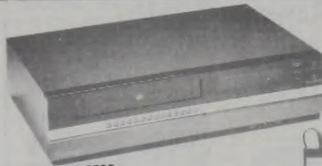

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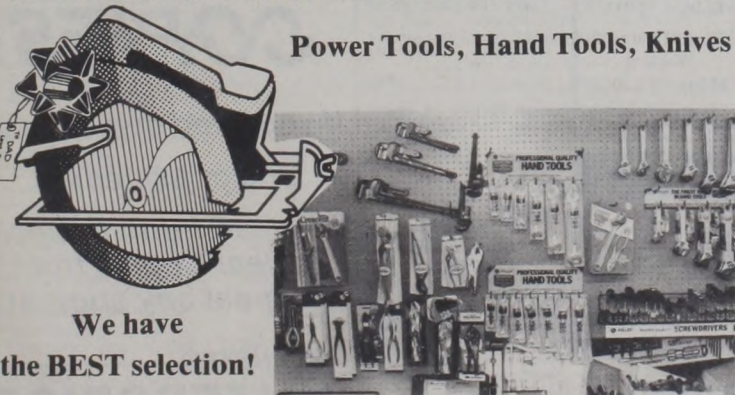
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Hornettes start with 59-34 win

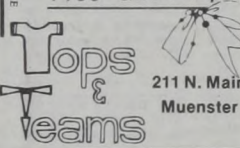

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County Agent's Report

by Craig Rosenbaum

Phosphorus supplementation is a must during this time of the year. Dry forages do not contain enough available phosphorus to meet the requirements of a dry cow—much less that of a cow nursing a calf. A deficiency of phosphorus will severely reduce breeding performance and calf weaning weights. A cow will normally receive 15 to 40 percent of her phosphorus requirements from the forage she eats. If you are supplementing her with two pounds of 41 percent cottonseed cake per day, nearly 50 percent of her needed phosphorus is in the

cake. On the other hand, two pounds of a 20 percent all natural protein cube will at best only furnish 20 percent of a cow's phosphorus requirement. Depending then on the kind and amount of supplemental feed cows receive, they will still need to receive 15 to 65 percent from a phosphorus supplement.

Three ounces per day of a 12 percent phosphorus supplement would furnish 45 percent of a lactating cow's requirements. An equal amount of 8 percent phosphorus supplement would

furnish 30 percent of her requirement. A desirable supplement should then contain 8 to 12 percent phosphorus and preferably the 12 percent. Calcium is present in our grasses in abundance even though all the

calcium is not available to the animal, there is still plenty to meet her calcium requirements. It is not undesirable to have some calcium in a mineral supplement, but the percentage of calcium should not be more than twice that of the phosphorus.

There are a number of factors

that will influence the consumption of mineral supplements. Season of the year, salt content and other ingredients will influence the amount eaten per day. Normally if cows have not had mineral supplements available to them, they will over consume for

one to two weeks. After this initial period, their intake will usually drop back to approximately 3 ounces per day. As a rancher, you may want to calculate your herd's mineral intake and make management decisions based on that information.

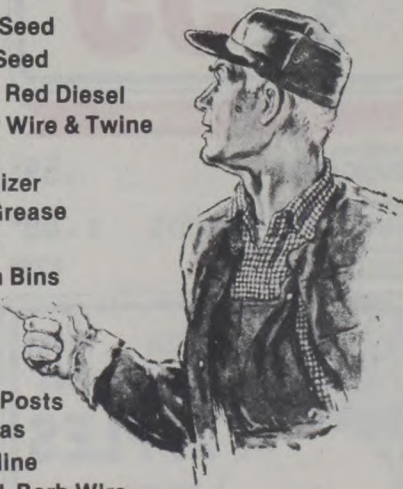
