## Hospital welcomes new doctors

The staff at Muenster Memorial Hospital and the community will soon be welcoming two new physicians who may move to town on a permanent basis.

Hospital Administrator Herman Carroll announced last week that Dr. Robert H. Nobles and Dr. John Kozura III, who have a shared practice in Denton, will begin their duties on a rotating basis beginning April 1.

The men plan to provide full-time general practice services on a rotating basis for a minimum of six months while they make their decision whether to make Muenster their home and give a permanent commitment to the hospital.

Dr. Nobles, a native of Deport in Lamar County, was the founder of the Osteopathic Hospital in Denton in 1963 and has been practicing medicine since 1956. A graduate of the College of Osteopathic Medicine and Surgery in Kansas City in 1955, Nobles did his internship in Amarillo Osteopathic Hospital from 1956-57 before opening a practice in Lorenzo, Texas, where he served from 1957-59. He began his practice in Denton in 1959.

Dr. Kozura, who was born and raised in a small community in Pennsylvania, received his medical training at the College of

Osteopathy and Surgery in Des Moines, Iowa, where he graduated in 1969. He did his internship at the York Memorial Hospital in York, Penn., where he finished in 1970. He had a practice with three other doctors in the small mountain community of Renovo, Penn., in 1970-74, and then joined Dr. Nobles in Denton in 1974 to the present.

Both are certified for general practice and are members of the American Osteopathic College of General Practitioners. They are both members of the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association,

The American Osteopathic Association and have been on the staff as assistant professors and clinical faculty supervisors of senior medical students at the College of Osteopathic Medicine in Fort Worth from its foundation in 1972.

Both physicians cited a desire to return to a small town environment and the warm reception they received while visiting in Muenster as the reasons for wanting to locate here at this time.

"I came up to see Dr. Antonetti because he had an EKG for sale, Please see Doctors, page 2

## Fire damages Tony's dock

Thick black smoke filled Muenster's southern sky for a short time Tuesday afternoon when a small grass fire reached the old railroad loading dock used by Tony's Seed and Feed. The Volunteer Fire Department responded quickly with 2 trucks to extinguish the stubborn blaze. Damage to the dock was fairly heavy on the eastern ramp end but lighter on the west. A medium west north-west wind was fanning the flames.

The fire was started purposely to clear some inaccessible grass. Despite keeping a garden hose present and ready the fire went out of control and spread to the dock. Fireman and a few helpful citizens doused the blaze in about 20 minutes.

This was the fourth recent fire, innocently started, to go out of control and require fire department help. Every one costs the city money and costs valuable time

for firemen who must leave their job. Although any unauthorized burning within city limits is illegal, no citation was issued. "This will not remain the case," said Police Chief Helen Tompkins. "City ordinance specifies up to a \$400.00 fine for unauthorized burning. The next occasion will be cited." The chief reminds everyone that burning may be allowed when coordinated with the Fire Department for assistance at their convenience. Any person burning without fire department approval is subject to a fine.

## Ray Endres seeks city council place one, others re-file

Three people have filed for three positions on the Muenster City Council while the two other elections slated for April 5 are still open for people to file.

Raymond Endres, who filed for place one on the council, is the only newcomer as John Pagel decided not to run for another term. Incumbents Aubrey Tuggle filed for re-election to his place two position and Claude Klement filed for re-election to his place four seat. Filing for city council elections closed Feb. 19.

People have until March 5 to file for seats on the Muenster School Board and Muenster Memorial Hospital Board of Directors.

Two seats are available for the school board and only two candidates have filed to date. The place one position, currently held by Gerald Walterscheid, presently has Jerry Bynum as a candidate. Dennis Hess has filed for re-election to his place two position.

No one has yet filed for any of the positions on the Hospital

Board. Albert Dangelmayr, William Hermes and Dan Luke, all long-time members of the board, will have their positions open for election as well as the positions currently held by Werner Becker and Andrew Klement, both of whom have served since 1984. The election is at-large.

People interested in filing may apply at the superintendent's office for the school board election and with the hospital director for the hospital board election.



## Jerry Bynum announces candidacy for trustee



Jerry Bynum is a candidate for Place 1, Muenster Independent School District Board of Trustees.

## LaCoe is G.O.P. chairman candidate

Robert E. LaCoe of Muenster is a candidate for County chairman of the Republican Party of Cooke County, subject to the May 3 primary.

Mr. LaCoe was born on Oct. 11, 1935 in Lackawana County, Pennsylvania. He graduated as salutatorian from Newton Ransom High School in 1953 and graduated from East Stroudsbury State Teachers College in 1957 with a bachelor of science degree in Education.

He enlisted in the U.S. Air Force

in 1958 and was commissioned as 2nd Lt. in 1961 and retired as Major in 1979. During the years in service he was assigned to Lackland AFB, Texas; Gunter AFB Alabama; Fairchild AFB Washington; Elmendorf AFB Alaska; Sheppard AFB Texas; Clark AFB, Republic of Philippines and Eglin AFB, Florida.

He was married to the former Annette Kane in 1960. They are parents of three daughters, ages 24, 23 and 16.

While in the Air Force he atten-

ded Ohio State University and the University of Illinois.

Positions held in the USAF included: Laboratory officer; Chief of Laboratory Services; Instructor in Laboratory Services and Physician Assistant program; Research in the use of computers in medical education; work with the World Health Organization to control venereal disease in all of Non-Communist Asia. The 1986 4-H and FFA Livestock Show for Muenster students will be held at the McKamey Ranch, the former Hadley Ranch Show Barn in Muenster on Sunday, March 2.

Judging of the various categories of animals will start at 2 p.m. Steve Seeds, Saint Jo Vocational Agriculture teacher will be the judge for this year's show.

Show officials have announced that there will be four different weight classes for the 24 steers that are expected to be entered. Hogs, dairy heifers, feeder calves, lambs, a few pens of broilers and rabbits are other types of animals usually entered in the local show.

Local beer distributors are once again furnishing trophies for the show. Muenster I.S.D. is supplying rosettes, and blue, red or white ribbons to be placed on each

participating animal. Superintendent Charles Coffey stated, "We hope many people will turn out for this activity, to recognize the many hours of hard work these youngsters have spent preparing their animals for this and other shows."

Many of the entries in the Muenster show will later be entered in the Cooke County Show to be held March 13-14, 1986 at the Cooke County Fairgrounds in Gainesville. The auction will be the following Saturday.

Last year's 4-H winners had the

distinction of being the top County Show winners also.

4-H members will provide and staff a concession stand Sunday. Everyone is invited to attend the show and support the efforts of the community youth.

A late announcement informed juniors and seniors who would be unable to participate Sunday since some will be attending a religious renewal program, that they may be represented by a brother, sister or friend who is capable of showing and handling the 4-H or FFA member's animal.

and we hit it off. He asked me to come up here and, even though I wasn't thinking about anything like that, I always wanted to go back to a small town. I've never really enjoyed my practice as much as when I was in Lorenzo; my heart has always been in the country," Dr. Nobles said.

Dr. Kozura also came from a small town and had practiced for three years in a low-income mountainous community where the nearest town was about 30 miles away. When he completed medical school, he set up a practice there with two other doctors. "There were no other doctors, no dentists, just us; that meant whatever came in was yours, no backup. I had nobody; we were it," he said.

"The key has been the reception that we've received," Dr. Nobles said regarding his decision to try a practice in Muenster. "It's a small town; it's a neat town with a small hospital; it's something I've always wanted," he said.

For the first six months the two physicians plan to rent a house in Muenster and serve on a rotating basis. One will take care of their practice in Denton while the other will be in Muenster. If we have an adequate patient load and patients accept us in the community, I have no doubt that we will be in this area," Dr. Kozura said.

The two plan to offer general practice services which will include obstetrics, although they don't plan to take maternity patients from the very beginning, Dr. Nobles said. They will also provide the service of fiber optics scoping of the bladder, stomach and colon, a service which formerly could only be provided to the hospital by out-of-town physicians.

Both doctors agreed that Denton and the type of Medicine offered there has changed dramatically over the years from a general practice setting to more of an impersonal situation where a patient will see many doctors rather than one.

"I was only the seventh doctor in Denton when I arrived, now there are 150," Dr. Nobles said. He said, while the doctors have moved their patients to Flow Memorial Hospital since the Osteopathic Hospital closed in 1983, the atmosphere in Denton had changed for them. "I enjoy taking care of people, but I think it's too late in life to be getting into the politics of a big hospital," Dr. Nobles said.

Dr. Kozura said people in Denton are now getting used to other types of clinics where it doesn't matter who they see as long as they see a doctor. "I like it where the patient still appreciates seeing their doctor; it's the personal relationship that's important to me," he said.

Both pointed out that the atmosphere in Muenster should provide them with the personal patient-doctor relationship they wish to continue. The difference is not so much in being needed as in being appreciated; people are starting to shop for doctors as they would shop Montgomery Ward or Sears; I like a practice where you are also appreciated," Dr. Kozura said.

The term osteopath may be new to some people, but the physicians said the differences between osteopaths and M.D.'s are not as marked as they were in the past. They said D.O.'s, which stands for doctor of osteopathy, and M.D.'s generally take the same courses in their training to become physicians, and take the same state board exams.

The only difference between the two groups, the doctors said, is osteopaths tend to go into general practice while M.D.'s tend to specialize. Osteopaths also emphasize the holistic approach to medicine, the doctors said.

Holistic medicine is the theory that you can't take the part out without seeing the whole. If you look at a person and just look at

one part, you can't see the whole person," Dr. Nobles said.

He said many of the things that formerly set osteopaths apart have either been disregarded, thrown away, or have been absorbed into the general practice of medicine. "What used to be a marked contrast now amounts to very little," Nobles said.

Dr. Kozura pointed out that the American Medical Association in Texas is made up of a combined board of M.D.'s and D.O.'s. He said Dr. Martin Kralicke recently supervised an osteopathic medical student from Tulsa, Muenster native Sue Moster. "At osteopathic schools there are M.D.'s teaching, and there are D.O.'s teaching in medical schools; they're interchanging," he said.

Dr. Kozura said he feels there is now a trend nationwide to return to the days of the doctor who provides primary care or general practice. He said the M.D.'s are actually trying to encourage more people to enter general practice rather than specialize. "The tide seems to be swinging back to general practitioners," he said.

Hospital Administrator Carroll sees the addition of two new physicians to the staff as a real plus for the town. "It's still difficult attracting doctors to a small town; we may see this trend change later, but it's still hard to get doctors," he said. Carroll basically sees the addition of the physicians as a way to provide additional services to the people of Muenster and the surrounding areas. Since both Dr. Nobles and Dr. Kozura have been hospital-based physicians, meaning they have worked directly through hospitals, Carroll feels both will fit in immediately with the workings of the hospital in Muenster.

Dr. Nobles and his wife, Jimmie Lu, who is presently helping to complete the closing of the hospital in Denton, have five children and twelve grandchildren. Robert Jr. is 34, Ricky is 32, Beth is 30, Nancy 28, and Kim is 18. They are members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

Dr. Kozura and his wife, Gerri, who is a registered nurse, have three children, all of whom attend Denton Public Schools. John IV is 17, Keith is 15, and Kristine Ann is 10. They are members of Immaculate Conception Catholic Church in Denton.
