Check up another boner to the credit of the Nazi master race, the kind of boner that no other people on earth — except maybe the Japanese — would have been

dumb enough to try. That's the planting of time bombs in a city If the motive was revenge it was pitifully inadequate, for it added comparatively little to the city's

previous toll of death and destruction. If the motive was to break morale it was a complete boomerang, for it only served to intensify the hatred and determination of both the Italians and their new friends, the Yanks.

Very likely the incident had some influence on the Italian decision to declare war on the Germans. At least it seems like more than mere coincidence that the declaration should follow the atrocities so closely.

Germany, of course, is not greatly concerned over Italy's change of heart. In the few years immediately past it learned from bitter experience that the Italian gave little help, hence it now assumes that he will give little opposition. Perhaps coming events will show that he has changed. On the other hand they may prove that a despised and bullied ally whose heart is not in the fight is far different from an incensed enemy whose blood still boils from the memory of former abuse and outrage. Italy with something to fight for may revive a little of the spirit that Home On Leave

made its ancient legions famous. Regardless of Italy's performance in the fight, its declaration of war on Germany has far reaching effects. It has started the rush to the Allied band wagon. Small nations previously afraid to assert themselves are now lining up against Hitler. More of them will follow in due time.

The fiendish scattering of bombs in Naples is in keeping with Nazi disregard for the lives of those to whom they arrogantly refer as inferior races. What they do is not war. It is wanton mass murder. their victims are not soldiers but innocent non-combatants. Children, women, babes in arms, blown to bits or horribly mangled by a contemptible trick that hasn't the faintest semblance of military significance.

The fact that Americans have to contend with booby traps, have contended with them from the opening of the African campaign, emphasizes one favorable circum stance in this war. # Bring Book 3 To Obtain New Issue And Register

Early To Avoid Rush

New war ration book No. 4 is being distributed in Muenster this weekend. Registrations for the book, which is to be good for approximately two years, began Thursday at the public school and will continue throughout Friday and Saturday.

Doyle Blodgett, school superintendent, is in charge of the registration, assisted by volunteer workers. Registration hours are from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m., and it was asked that local persons reg-

ister early to avoid a last-day rush Applicants for the new book do not have to fill out any forms declaring the amounts of food they have on hand but will have to take with them to the school their old ration books when they apply for Book 4. Applicants who do not bring their old books with them cannot be issued the new book.

An application blank will be retained by the board for the record. but this will be filled out by volunteer workers and will only need the signature of the housewife or other member of the family making application for the book for the members of a family unit.

The registration has been simplified, only the age, complete name and sex of the applicant being necessary. The old procedure of registering weight, color of eyes

etc., has been junked. Attention is called to the fact that green stamps in book 4 will be used to purchase canned fruits and vegetables beginning Novemwith the word "sugar" printed on becomes valid on the same date,

for five pounds of sugar. Recipients of the new books will observe that 12 of the stamps have the word "coffee" printed on them. This is because the books were printed before coffee was taken off the ration list and does not mean that coffee is to be rationed again, it was explained.

The final series of blue stamps in book 2 may be used through November 20. The green stamps in book 4 will be used in the same way as the familiar blue stamps but only until the ration tokens system goes into effect. Then blue and red stamps in the new book will be used for buying rationed food, in connection with blue and red tokens, expected to be in use by the end of the year

Approximately 1,700 books are expected to be distributed here in this registration. For the first registration in May 1942 the nur of books applied for totaled 1,663. At that time the work was done alphabetically and that system was intended to be used at this time also but since announcement to that effect was not made earlier all persons are urged to register as early as possible so that all work will be completed by Saturday at 6 p.m.

A few more volunteer workers are needed, it was stated. Those who have time to devote a day, or portion of a day, to this work are asked to report at the school to Superintendent Blodgett.


