The favorable vote by a strong majority in last Saturday's bond election is good news for this community's educational program. It goes a long way toward providing for student needs and its price tag is reasonable, but it still falls to make the best use of local potential.

Actually Muenster has a pair of problems. As the school district prepares to take on a bond issue of near a half million dollars, Sacred Heart School is asking for creation of a trust fund, the earnings from which can be used to increase teacher salaries. The fund to be raised by this project is still indefinite but it can be assumed that a sizeable amount is needed to support annual subsidies which would boost the local private school salaries to the state level of teacher pay.

An alternative to this proposal would be an annual campaign to raise gifts for supplementing salaries. Whatever the method, it needs big money, bringing up the question of how many are able and willing to participate, and to what extent.

However there's a way whereby the financial burden of both programs can be reduced substantially. A combination of the two systems, as proposed many times in the past quarter century, would eliminate the need of some construction and also the need of providing supplemental teacher pay. Combining classes of the two schools in many cases would make it possible to use one room where two are being used now. Space gained in that way would provide for at least a part of the present need, and could be expected to reduce the cost accordingly.

At the same time the need of a teacher salary subsidy is eliminated by the fact that teachers would be in a public school system receiving the state's standard salary.

As all of Muenster realizes, this is a touchy subject. There are firm opinions on both sides, but with a sizeable financial burden looming ahead, the community now has added incentive to think the matter over. Considering it calmly, and concentrating on other benefits as well as the money, there could be a way to work out a merger.

One point to think of is that a number of courses now offered at one school or the other would become available to all students. At the same time there are a number of duplicated subjects, some with small enrollments that could be combined into a single class. And there are other subjects not presently taught in either school which can be added if justified by increased enrollment.

It all amounts to greater opportunity for the students along with relief from the high cost of supporting a private school. For more than a quarter century Sacred Heart School parents have paid tuition and textbooks and the parish has paid a sizeable subsidy to keep the operation going while teachers had to get by on a reduced salary.

Another effect of the proposal is that it would reduce the cost of the program. (Continued on Page 10)

TCIL Censure of SH Teams Caused By Unruly Fans

The faculty of Sacred Heart School has been notified of official censure and disciplinary action by the executive committee of Texas Catholic Interscholastic League resulting from the misbehavior of its fans at a football game last season.

Coach Eddie Stock said that the Tiger football team is suspended through the 1977 season from eligibility for district or state honors and all athletic teams are on probation through the 77-78 school year.

Stock said that the trouble originated at the game between the SH Tigers and Notre Dame Knights on November 12, at which Sacred Heart fans are accused of unruly conduct toward officials during and after the game. He further stated that TCIL found no fault with the Sacred Heart players but their record is blemished by the behavior of over-enthusiastic supporters.

An appeal has been filed for re-consideration of the verdict at the next TCIL executive meeting.

The SHH student presentation of Sigmund Romberg's "Student Prince" on April 15 and April 17 at the Community Center will be a special treat for Friday and Sunday nights.

The lively lilting melodies belong to the fresh, delightful, care-free story of the famous university town of Heidelberg and its students of a by-gone era. That scene contrasts sharply with the formalities that crushed the Student Prince, Karl Franz in the gloomy court of his grandfather, the King.

The story tells of the wonderful year the Prince spends in Heidelberg; of his friendships formed with students and their loyalty to him; of his meeting with Kathie, beautiful daughter of the Innkeeper; of the Princess Margaret to whom the Prince is betrothed, of the Prince attempting to escape his destiny; of his wish to rush to Paris; of the Prince's recall to the court of his grandfather, when the old King becomes ill and dies.

School Bond Issue Approved by Voters

In a big turnout, but still far below the community's potential, Muenster voters at last Saturday's election firmly endorsed a \$490,000 bond issue to finance an extensive expansion and improvement program. The vote was 383 favoring the bond and 248 opposing. Members of the school board confirmed the count in a canvass of votes Monday morning.

Superintendent L. B. Bruns said that the board was very pleased with the decisive vote, indicating that the program is backed by a big majority of people. He also said that the board intends to get the program under way as quickly as possible so that the first of its benefits can be available at the beginning of the next school year.

Priority project is the new kindergarten building to provide space as the former half day classes are extended to full day classes, requiring two rooms whereas one was needed before. Likewise additional space will be welcome for other classes.

Next in urgency is remodeling the present elementary building and closing in a patio to enlarge the home-making department. And planned for later are an overhaul of the original building, acquiring more school ground space, changing location of the football field, building an all weather track, a parking lot, rest rooms and grandstands.

These other elections, held with the bond election in the public school building, were routine. Each had a slate of unopposed candidates.

In the city council election results were as follows: David Bright received 297 for re-election as mayor; Ted Henscheid received 296 for re-election as Alderman Place 5; Ray Walterscheid received 306 to succeed Herb Miller as Alderman Place 3. Others serving on the council are Leonard Endres, Aubrey Tuggle and Leo Hess.

In the school board election Adam Wolf and Eddie Fleitman were re-elected by 562 and 574 respectively. Others on the board are Urban Endres, Ed Cler, John David Meurer, Dolphy Joe Hellman and Willie Walterscheid.

Likewise all were re-elected to the board of directors of the Muenster Hospital District. Jimmy Jack Biffle received 556 voters, Paul Fetsch 556, Al Felderhoff 559 and Al Trubenbach 538. Members who continue on the board are Rufus Henscheid, Ray Voth, Norbert Walterscheid, William Hermes and Albert Dangelmayr.

Nursing Home Plan Crushed

Prospects of building a 96 bed skilled nursing home in Muenster dropped to near zero this week. A report from the Texas Health Facilities Commission reveals that an application for Certificate of Need filed by Muenster Manor Inc. has been denied because failure to show need.

The decision, dated March 31, becomes effective on April 16, the deadline for appeal.

Council Has a Busy Meeting

The Muenster city council had a crowded agenda for its regular meeting Monday night.

It started with a request by the local CB Radio Club for a better method of public warning in case of tornado or other disaster. The CB members have been conducting weather watches in the area during bad weather. Accompanied by Civil Defense Coordinator Tom Watson, they explained a program whereby the government cooperates 50-50 in setting up sirens or voice command receivers to warn the public. The council showed interest and asked the CB Club for a report on the proposal and the cost of the city's share.

A scheduled hearing on curb and pavement for Maple and Cross streets attracted only one of the concerned owners. It refers to the detour pavement, 28 feet wide, to be provided on those streets by the Highway Department in connection with the upcoming Highway 82 improvement. The 28 feet width is frbe, and property owners have the opportunity to make the job complete by paying for the curb and additional pavement. Since nothing was done at the meeting Ray Walterscheid, street commissioner, will contact the owners individually to ask about their preference.

Another project is a proposed recreation area of some 45 to 50 acres adjoining the proposed Muenster lake for fishing, boating and picnic facilities and latrine type rest rooms. Henry Weinzapfel explained that, if approved the area can be included in the Soil Conservation Service program for 50-50 cost sharing for recreation. The council approved.

A report by John Pagel of the library board indicated that use of the library increased sharply in 1976 with book circulation up 18 per cent. Also the board made its semi-annual contribution of \$1550 to the library.

City Attorney Julien Smith said that a recent resolution banning mobile homes when opposed by the majority of residents on a block applies only while persons who made the resolution remain in office. An ordinance is needed to make the policy permanent, and Smith was asked to prepare the ordinance.

C of C Meeting

The Muenster Chamber of Commerce will have its regular meeting next Tuesday at The Center. Members can expect a progress report and final planning for Germanfest, which will be less than three weeks away. Also due is a short program on the US Naval Academy presented by Midshipman Ray Luke.

Joe Bright, a cadet at Virginia Military Institute, has just received a solo flight badge and certificate as a pilot in the Air Force ROTC.

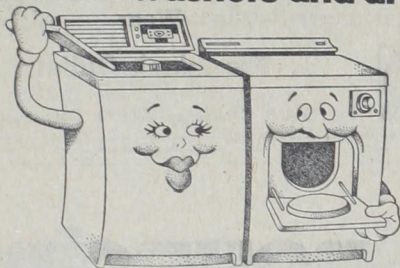

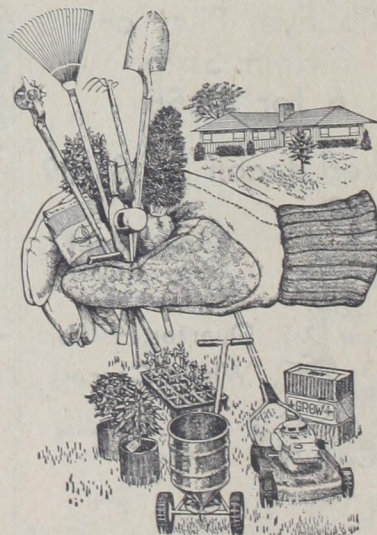

Library Reports Circulation Gain Of 1,017 in 1976

A marked increase in circulation was noted in the annual library report presented by Librarian Mary Moser to members of the Library Board during the March meeting. The total circulation for 1976 was 6,704 an increase of 1,017. Leading book circulation during the year was in June, followed by July, next August, with lowest circulation in December.

A report of book statistics showed a total book stock of 10,483 copies, with 2,903 books added in 1976. Of the books added last year, 320 were purchased from the local budget, 787 came from the Texas Library System; 6 were in memory of loved ones and 890 were donated. The Library holds subscriptions to 20 magazines and one newspaper.

The volunteer library staff contributed 4,258 hours: Lee Toothaker 907; Elizabeth Toothaker 471; Evelyn Schilling 370; Elizabeth Herr 40; Victoria Gremminger 121; Teresa Fowler 945; Betty Felderhoff 323; and Mary Moser 1,081.

Among services or activities sponsored by the library are the following: the children's summer Story Hour program, whose members are Della Hellman, Margie Wimmer, Annette Anderle, Janet Henschel and Julia Bayer, held in the library meeting room; and the Children's Activity Program held once a month at the Community Center. Directors are Mary Alice Bayer and Betty Miller.

The Friends of the Library chapter has been very active. Theresa Walterscheid was president during 1976 and Emily Klement is current president. Colette Biffle is vice-president and Martha Koesler is secretary-treasurer.

YOU CAN BANK ON IT!

Many things about the American system of banking are unique from other banking systems in the world. One of those things is the dual nature of chartering.

Some are chartered by the federal government and are most often called "national" banks. Others receive their charters directly from their respective states. These are called "state" banks.

The dual system came about in the early days of U.S. banking because of general opposition to a single, "national" banking system. This opposition to a central system created many strong state banks, so strong that until the 20th century several state banks issued their own currency.


The closest thing now to a true national bank is the Federal Reserve System, which essentially acts as a bank's bank. Both state and national banks maintain accounts, make deposits and withdrawals from the Federal Reserve Bank in their particular region.

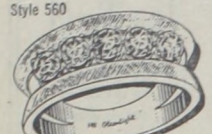

ent arrangement is a divided community. Two schools inevitably bring on rivalries and separate loyalties, along with incidents that cause ill feeling. Fortunately the tenseness has been relieved somewhat in recent years, but the community is still aware of it. There are occasions of unpleasantness, or at least discomfort. It is an undesirable atmosphere to impose on the youngsters and their parents, frequently a cause of strained feelings between friends and relatives.

At one time we thought our arrangement was a matter of diocesan policy. But that hardly applies when other communities with similar circumstance were not expected to keep schools separated. The indication is that Muenster can combine its schools if it wishes to do so.

These things are food for thought, especially now as the community is considering a pair of programs that add up to big money. If people here would like to eliminate much of the financial burden, if they would like to relieve the parish of a big annual strain, if they would like to offer better opportunities to their children, if they would like to end their awareness of a divided community, they ought to start thinking about a merger. It can be accomplished if people will think seriously about its benefits and try earnestly to make it work.
