Energy Problems Aired at Meeting of Electric Co-op

A large, enthusiastic number of member-owners and guests gathered at the Muenster Public School auditorium Monday night, April 18, for the annual membership meeting of Cooke County Electric Cooperative Association.

President Jack Crownover was emcee and recognized directors, wives and officers. He said directors are doing all in their power to hold the line on cost of electricity, but added that rates will continue increasing because of the rising cost of fuel and supplies.

He recalled problems of the past and said that they are worse today, nevertheless the co-op brought electricity to rural people when it seemed impossible and will do its best to keep it available.

Crownover outlined the development of Brazos Electric Power Co-op to assure adequate electricity at an affordable price, and the present construction of a coal fired plant to insure continued service.

Manager Mike Sloan presented his report for 1976. He stated that trends of the previous year continued as the so called "Energy Crisis" and inflation affected both the co-op and its consumers. However consumers reacted by conserving more power. He said the co-op encouraged this practice at the beginning of increasing energy prices and it is interesting to note now that conservation is an important part of President Carter's energy policy. Along with saving on fuel cost, he said, it will save by requiring construction of less generating and transmission facilities.

Gains Reported in Deposits, Loans At Muenster Bank

Deposits and loans at Muenster State Bank gained during the past year and loans also gained in the last quarter while deposits dropped slightly.

Responding to the state banking commission's request for a statement of condition as of March 31, the bank reports total deposits of \$9,353,993.07 and total loans of \$3,630,909.68.

This indicates an increase in deposits of \$1,281,769.72 for the past year and a decline of \$96,354.62 for the past quarter. Also it shows a gain of \$215,946.94 in loans for the past year and a gain of \$112,094.55 in loans for the past three months.

Combined deposits of the four Cooke County banks were \$76,298,386.66 and combined loans were \$46,607,839.61. This is a gain in deposits of \$7.76 million for the year and \$1.96 million for the past quarter. Also it is a gain in loans of \$9.63 million for the year and a gain of \$2.88 for the quarter.

Deadline Near on Tax Exemptions

Persons applying for exemption on 1977 taxes are reminded this week that the deadline is only a week away, on April 30. The alert has been issued by the Cooke County tax office and also by the Cooke County Farm Bureau. The exemptions are available to farmers, to people over 65 and to disabled veterans.

Farmers are allowed to have their land assessed on the basis of agricultural production rather than market value. Persons over 65 may apply for the \$3000 homestead exemption on their county tax. And disabled veterans may also qualify for a tax reduction.

Applications are to be made at the county tax office, and proof of eligibility is required. Mrs. Hillis said that a disabled veteran must bring the letter that was mailed to him from the VA office. Also a person over 65 signing up the first time must have something with proof of age that can be attached to the application. A photostatic copy of the proof can be made at the county clerk's office if the person wishes to keep his original.

Mrs. Hillis also stated that each of the applications has to be made every year. Last year's sign-up does not count for this year.

Details Listed on Certification to Use Pesticides

Opportunity to receive certification as private applicators of pesticides is available to Cooke County residents, according to County Agent Neil Tibbets, who points out that the certification is required by the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act and is enforced by the EPA.

Particulars on certification in Cooke County are offered at three meetings, one of which was held Tuesday at CCC. Another meeting will be held Monday, April 25, 1 p.m., in the Ag Building of Valley View High School, and the third will be held Monday, May 2, 1 p.m. in the Cooke County Electric Co-op building.

Delegates to the convention enjoyed bus tours of the city planned by convention directors.

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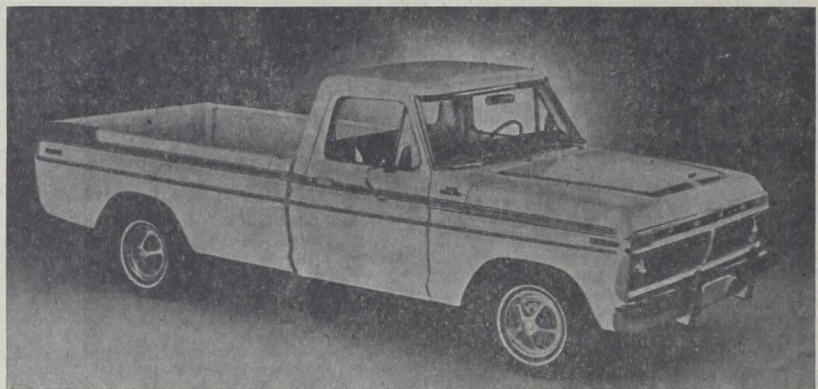

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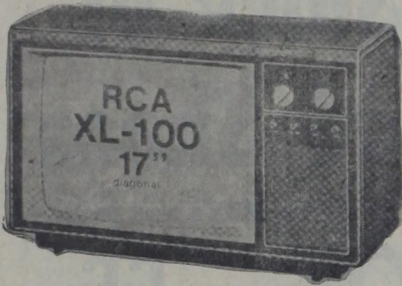
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Letter To the Editor

der to obtain and legally use or supervise the use of restricted use pesticides.

The state pesticide control act does not require certification but authorizes the Commissioner of Agriculture to establish a program to certify private applicators in compliance with the federal law.

The term private applicator means a certified applicator to use or supervise use of restricted use pesticide in producing farm products on land owned or rented by him or an employer, or if applied without compensation other than trading personal services.

The Texas Department of Agriculture provides three options for certification. One is completion of approved training or training group. Another is to submit a completed questionnaire to the Texas Agriculture Department after study of its self-study material. The third for single product, single purchase use, in emergency situation, is available through the Agriculture Department.

Tibbets announced that private applicator training programs will be scheduled in the county, also that self-study materials will be available through the county extension office.

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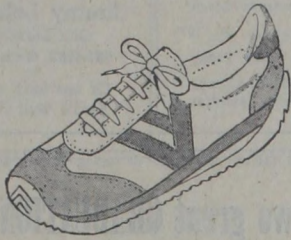
