The Hornets' loss to DeLeon last week in quarterfinals of the Class A playoffs for state championship was a disappointment only in that the team's contention ended there. The game also had a positive side which makes it an object of intense pride for the community, the school, the coaches, and especially for the boys.

Being eliminated is much less painful when one considers how much the team accomplished in becoming a contender. The fact that MHS played in the quarterfinal means that it was one of the top eight of the state. While many of us have to admit the day-dreaming before the game — how great to win the next three and become No. 1 of the state — we can come back to earth with a mighty satisfied feeling. The rating already reached is something to be proud of.

Just to sweeten that rating a bit, at least in our own minds, we can take comfort from the thought that the achievement really means more than it seems at first. Muenster, with only a few more than the minimum required for Class A, has the smallest enrollment in 13-A, and must also be among the smallest of the state's Class A schools. A good guess is that it probably was the smallest school of all Class A district champions. There is an added distinction in doing well when it's done in spite of numerical handicaps.

Another pleasing experience was a great boost in community pride. It was a delight to see people wearing those signs proclaiming "Hornet Dad", "Hornet Mom", "Hornet Fan", etc. And the many many banners on cars and buildings with a similar message. The team brought our home folks closer together while making a fine impression on lots of folks away from here.

Similar praise is in order for the band and cheerleaders who gave great assistance to the team and did credit to their school. They made themselves heard at the games and gave a good show at half time. The precision of their marching and the quality of their music has been a source of pride to those hundreds who enjoyed seeing their town well represented.

And how about those fans? It has been satisfying to note that Muenster attendance beats that of lots of the opposing towns and also produces more vocal support. This fact has applied all season to supporters of both local schools.

The Tigers, like the Hornets, had a season to be proud of. Until the district showdown they had a matching record and, on the basis of statistics, deserved to win their district's championship. But despite the loss they can still hold heads high. By all the standards in athletic records — high school, college, or professional — a 7-3 season is mighty good. So Muenster has something to brag about in two very good teams with seasons of 7-3 and 10-3.

Spreading our interest farther, Muenster people can brag about being in a county with four outstanding football teams. Besides the good records at Muenster High and Sacred Heart, are the District 7-B championship at Era and the District 6-AAA championship at Gainesville. Since then Era was eliminated in bi-district and Gainesville has advanced all the way to state finals, which will be played this week. And talking about season records: Gainesville's is still perfect, and Era's was perfect until bi-district.

Extending our pride to two more counties, we can claim to be in a three county area that had a district champ in all five classifications of UIL football. Besides B, A and 3A district champs, at Era, Muenster and Gainesville, the area had 2A champions at Sherman and 4A champions at Sherman. Both Muenster and Sherman was eliminated from the playoffs last week and Sherman a week earlier.

Swine Flu Vaccinations Will Be Given December 14

The second swine flu clinic in Muenster will be held next Tuesday, December 14, in the Community Center between the hours of 3:30 and 7 p.m. Mrs. Joan Walterscheid announced it this week after receiving word from Mrs. Lucy Williamson of the Health Department, who will supervise the clinic.

Again the program will be free, and it will be similar to that held here on November 13, except that children in good health ages 3 to 17 may receive the vaccination along with all ages of adults and 3 to 17 children with chronic illness. Well children are to receive the monovalent split this time and a second shot about a month later.

Otherwise procedure will be the same as a month ago. Persons 18 to 64 will receive monovalent vaccine, New Jersey Swine Flu virus. Persons 65 and over will receive bivalent whole virus vaccine combining New Jersey and Victoria varieties.

Sacred Heart teams did themselves proud last weekend at the Saint Jo basketball tournament. They returned home with a champ trophy for the boys and a third place trophy for the girls plus all tournament selections of Janet Henschel, Joe Hoedebeck and Danny Stock.

The Tigers had a bye for the opening game and met Alvord in the semifinal. The game was a run-away ending 70-30, with points being scored by Joe Hoedebeck 18, Danny Stock 15, Glenn Walterscheid 12, Brent Hess, 8, Bob Hartman 6, Danny Walterscheid 5, Tim Sicking 4, Gary Rohmer 2.

The champ final with Gainesville B was more of the same as the Tigers did a fine job all around. They did well on turnovers and ball handling and hit 41 per cent of their shots for a final count 70-42.

Also as before, persons 18 to 64 with chronic illnesses — including heart disease, broncho pulmonary disease, kidney disease, diabetes and other chronic metabolic disorders — may receive the bivalent vaccine. And children 3 to 17 with the same diseases plus neuromuscular disorders, malignancies and immuno deficient disorders can receive the same vaccine.

The thing to remember now is that any person over 3 can be vaccinated, however shots for the ailing are not the same as those for the healthy.

Other clinic details likewise are the same as before. The vaccine should not be taken by persons allergic to eggs or with a temperature. People who have had another vaccine within 14 days should consult their doctor before taking it.

The vaccine will be injected into the muscle of the upper arm, so persons receiving it should not wear tight sleeves or shirts or blouse made of acetate fabric. Acetone, used to swab the arm can damage such material.

Usually people have no side effects from the shot. However tenderness at the injection area may last a few days, or fever, chills, headache or muscle ache may occur within 48 hours. It is safe for pregnant women. Anyone in doubt should consult a physician.

Hornets Lose 20-14 to DeLeon In State Playoff Quarterfinal

The finest season ever in the history of Muenster High School football came to an end at Weatherford Friday night when the Hornets lost 20-14 to DeLeon's Bearcats in quarterfinals of the state championship playoffs.

Though overpowered by the defending state champs, they gave a good account of themselves and remained in contention all the way. Twice the Bearcats had comfortable margins and twice the Hornets got back within TD distance of a win.

Big plays did it both times. First it was a pass play from midfield in which Jim Koelzer made a great catch, twisted out of a tackle and made a final sprint to pay dirt.

The next one was a combination of two fine plays by

Mark Mollenkopf; a gain of 46 yards on a reverse play followed by a screen pass of 12 for a touchdown.

As regards plain old tough football, however, the Bearcats were in command all the way. The name of their game was ball control as they were in possession for 90 plays whereas MHS was for only 37. And they just missed a pair of touchdowns that could have given them a long lead in points.

DeLeon started showing muscle on first possession. Big Sig Wolfe, who was the game's leading rusher with 114 yards, and Alan Saderby took turns at consistently ripping off 4 to 6 yard gains. The first drive gained 40 to the Hornet 23 in ten plays.

In the next series a 5 yard penalty plus Hornet defense

seemed to have them stopped but a pass interference ruling gave them the another first and ten at the 23. At that point Hornet defense did the job.

Two gains for 8 were followed by a loss of 4 on a busted play and a loss of 5 on a quarterback sack by Danny Fisher. The series netted a 1 yard loss.

On the next three plays Mark Sicking and Tim Wolf gained 16 to the MHS 40 and the drive suddenly ended in a fumble on the 43.

So the Bearcats started another drive which gained 35 to the 8 before Hornet defense resisted again. Two tries netted zero, a pass to Steve Hallmark in the end zone failed to connect, and a last chance try for a field goal was wide. The game was scoreless at the end of the first period.

Muenster made a first down on next possession but had to kick on second series, after which DeLeon started its third possession from its 28.

Seven plays got 2 yards beyond center stripe where a halfback pass by Rocky Hallmark got to the 5 before Mollenkopf wrestled him down. Hardin crashed through the middle from there for the first Bearcat TD. Hallmark missed his kick for the extra point.

After kickoff Muenster succeeded for the third time in starting its possession with a first down. Mark Sicking gained 12 on two carries and netted 1 on the next 3. Thoroughly defended all night, he had his least productive game of the season with only 33 yards rushing.

MHS had to kick and the Bearcats, sacked by Carl Pagel on the third play, had to do likewise on their first series. After a nice run back by Hermes MHS was on its way with 23 seconds before half time.

Wolf used those seconds on an incomplete pass, a completed pass for 2 yards gain, and another attempt that ended in near disaster. A sideline pass was stolen by David Walker who tore down the sideline with an easy score apparently awaiting him. Meanwhile Bryan Sicking was streaking toward him diagonally and arrived just in time to stop him on the 2 yard line. In the meantime the clock had run out. The set up would have been a cinch for the Bearcat power but it came too late. Return

on the interception went for 53 yards.

After intermission the Hornets started by spoiling a first down with an offside penalty and had to kick. It was a dandy that backed the Bearcats to their 8 yard line.

Ending its series DeLeon kicked and Mollenkopf's 14 yard return put MHS on the 38. On the series the Hornets tried a fourth down gamble and missed by a yard, so the Bearcats took possession with 71 yards to go.

From there the Bearcats ground out the yardage with short tough plays. They used 14 plays making four first downs to the 13, requiring the fourth down in two of the series. At that point Hardin tossed a halfback pass to Hallmark for the second TD. (Continued on Page 2)
