

Stenholm lobbies for rural health care

Changes to the federal govern-ment's Medicare Peer Review Organizations (PROs) must be made in order to protect rural health care in Texas and across the

health care in Texas and across the nation, Congressman Charles Stenholm recently told a U.S., Senate panel in Washington, D.C. Congressman Stenholm appeared before the Senate's Finance Subcommittee on Health recently to relay much of the information and comments he heard from area residents at a day-long meeting in the 17th District just two weeks ago.

At the Senate hearing, the Stamford Democrat said, "West Texans accustomed to fighting hard for their survival are willing to make the sacrifices which naturally come as a part of their chosen rural lifestyle. They are not willing, however, to be forced to the heavile with their survival contents.

naturally come as a part of their chosen rural lifestyle. They are not willing, however, to be forced to do battle with their own federal government. And it is precisely the federal government which they see as the greatest threat to the survival of rural health care today."

"I refuse to be a defender of either wasteful spending or bad medicine in rural Texas or anywhere else in the country," Congressman Stenholm continued. "I believe in the concept of federal oversight in a program which currently requires a budget of \$75 billion for 30 million beneficiaries. Physician peers are the best qualified individuals to make those determinations. But

Congressman Stenholm recommended several changes, emphasizing two areas. He said, first, the PRO law must contain improved due process to allow the physician the right to present his side. Second, he said an amendment to the PRO also should provide for administrative hearings and reviews as a part of the sanction proceedings prior to implementing any sanction. "Currently, the sanctions come first and then the appeal follows, implying a 'guilty until proven innocent' attitude," he said.

their trash responsibly. Oil cans, beer cans, feed and fertilizer sacks, beer cartons, ice sacks and any loose litter can and does blow out of the pickup bed. Strong winds this time of year compound the problem. Over 90 percent of the litter (which excludes bottles, but includes beverage cans) is caused by just a few individuals. It is known that this group is male, 18 to 35 years of age, owning pickup trucks. The litter thrown into the pickup bed is left to be picked up by the 4-H, Kiwanis, Bluebonnets, Cub Scouts and other organizations. HELPUS!

Dallas Brush Company withdrew their offer to rent the City a street sweeper for a week.

A wet and muddy spring, persistent littering and windblown debris, all combined to give Muenster piles of problems along city streets and curbs.

About three months ago, the Chamber of Commerce approved \$500 towards the purchase or lease of a street sweeper. Dallas Brush had such a machine which was reconditioned and on sale for \$8,900. They had offered to lease the machine for a week in hopes the City would purchase the machine after seeing the results. In the regular City Council meeting on April 6, the council approved the lease idea, but noted that budgetary restraints would not permit purchase any time soon.

During the meeting, local area resident Ron Jones volunteered to haul the unit to and from Dallas for free. All seemed set for the sweeper until Dallas Brush was contacted to make the final arrangements. When they learned that no funds were available for actual purchase of the machine, they then withdrew their offer.

While it was hoped that the machine could go a long way is improving the looks of the community, it appears such an idea in nothing more than an idea at this time. Without local business an residential support, streets in Muenster will continue to reflec an attitude of neglect. Again, it looks as if residents must rely or something inside themselves to get the job done - PRIDE!

-If you're inactive but healthy, start with mile-long walks at a pace of three miles per hour, five times a week. Over the course of a month, boost your distance to three miles at a pace of four miles per hour, five times a week. If you can't walk that fast, walk a little further.

You can increase the aerobic benefits of brisk walking in two ways. Swing your arms: your upper body needs a workout too. And as you get used to walking, carry a six-pound backpack, or hand weights.

Put variety into your walking.

-Put variety into your walking program. Take a companion along. Try a different route, par-ticularly leading to hilly territory, which will boost the aerobic benefits. If you get tired, alternate

-You' don't need special footwear, but don't walk long distances in soft, shapeless shoes. Walking shoes should have a shank (a rigid arch), as well as some cushioning for the heel and the ball of your foot. Cotton socks will add to your comfort and absorb perspiration as well.

Easter Egg Symbol Of Earth's Rebirth

(AUSTIN)—The practice of coloring eggs began centuries before Easter at pagan festivals celebrating spring and the earth's rebirth. Eggs were symbols of life, lertility and immortality, so it seems only natural that Christians adopted them as a sign of life's renewal on their highest holy day.

Jews, too, use eggs symbolically over Passover when a "roasted egg"—one that is boiled and seorched over an open flame—represents a burnt offering at a seder, a ceremonial dinner commemorating the exodus from Egypt.

In many countries Easter eggs are covered with designs that are centuries old. Czechoslovakians trace lacy patterns onto egg shells, and Bavarians paint them with water colors. Ukrainians make intricate, geometric designs by tracing beeswax on the eggs and dipping them in dye, a process that is repeated several times before an egg is deemed finished.

Texas has its own Easter egg tradition, rooted in Mexican-American communities but also observed by other Texans. Cascarones, Spanish for egg shells, are dyed, filled with confetti and cracked—usually by children—over the heads of family and friends. As folklore rells it, whoever gets cracked will have good luck.

Though information is sketchy, the history of cascarones probably can be traced to the Italian Renaissance when colored eggshells filled with perfume were said to be cracked on individuals, drenching them in sweet scent. Carlota, wife of Maximilian, the Austrian nobleman who ruled Mexico in the mid-1860s, introduced the custom to Mexico, and from there it migrated across the border.

David Galvan, a Houston resident who grew up in the Rio Grande Valley, remembers his family hiding cascarones for the children when he was a boy. "In our family we would collect a 'pot' (of money). Then we'd put a piece of paper in one of the eggs to denote the prize. The child who found that egg would win the money," he said.

"After we'd collected all the cascarones, we'd break them on our riends' heads," he continued. "Our eggs were filled with confetti, but we'd also put a little flour in them. After we broke the shells, there'd be this little spot of white on the person's head."

Families usually begin saving

aside.

Cascarones can be dyed before they are filled or decorated with paint or colored markers afterwards. After the shells are stuffed with confett, tissue paper is glued over the hole to seal it.

Symbolic as they are in the spring, eggs are valued more for their role in cooking the rest of the year. The sculptor Constantin Brancusi called the tegg"the must perfect form of creation." He might have been describing its nutritional value as well as its form. A hen's egg with its protein, essential amino acids, vitamins and minerals is close to a complete food.

"Except for Vitamin C, eggs supply all of the necessary vitamins and most of the minerals required in a healthy diet." said Texas. Department of Agriculture (TDA) home economist Carol Ware.

Eggs also contain saturated and unsaturated fat and a small quantity of carbohydrates. They are the cook's multifaceted friend, aerating souffles, binding meathoal, thickening picliflings, emulsifying mayonnaise and clarifying soup.

To ensure that eggs sold in Texas are of the highest quality and freshness. TDA inspectors randomly check more than 10 million dozen every year in grocery stores all over the state. Shells are inspected inside and out for cracks, and a canding device is used to detectiregularities in yolks and whites. Egs that do not meet standards are pulled from the shelves.

Inspectors and on the label. To protect consumers futher, an Egg Enforcement Task Force backs uprand om checking with intensive inspection in targeted areas of the state.

During the Easter holidays, egg supplies are expected to range from good to ample. Use eggs left over from making cascarones in this "Sneaky Souffle." It's not quite a souffle but just as delicious and easy to make. The longer the dish sits before baking, the creating with intensive.

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Butter a 2-quart soutfle or baking dish with 4-inch sides. In mixing bowl beat eggs, milk and spices until nice and light. Line bottom of dish with two slices of bread that have been halved diagonally. Spirinkle lavishly with cheese and pour about a third of milk mixture on top. Press down. Repeat sequence until all ingredients are used. Press everything down to saturate bread. Bake about 45 minutes or until brown and bubbly and a knife inserted through the middle shows the bottom is set. Makes 4 maindish or 6-8 side-dish servings. Note: For a creamier dish, make ahead several hours or the morning before serving and refrigerate. If refrigerated it may take 10-15 minutes longer to bake.

Variation:
Use 2 thickly-sliced tomatoes, cooked broccoli, asparagus, green beans or leftover ham or chicken. Add meat or vegetables on top of bread-cheese-milk layers and press down. Repeat sequence twice, ending with vegetables.

season need to be fertilized early this spring for rapid recovery. Pasture fertilization this spring also can help provide additional grass for harvesting hay. Spring rains generally provide 65 percent of the total seasonal growth dur-ing the first two months. If rain-fall is adequate this spring, excess forage can be harvested as a hay cron.

Pasture fertilization is most efficient and effective when based on a soil test, and producers still have time to get soil tested before fertilizer is needed. Although nitrogen is needed in large amounts, other nutrients such as phosphorus potassium and secon-
